Basketball gets underway next week for athletes at Iowa Park High



NEAR DISASTER - A tractor-trailer rig, heavily loaded with sheetrock, was almost totally demolished in a one-vehicle accident before sunrise Thursday, but no one was injured. Trucker James A. Woolridge of Altus, Okla. was heading toward Wichita Falls about 5:40 a.m. when he apparently dozed off. His left wheels struck the guard rail on the west side of Johnson Road overpass on Highway 287, knocking large chunks of concrete onto Johnson roadside. The truck continued to drag against the railing until it got on the east side, and then cut across the median. It wiped out the center guard rail and, had the right front

wheel not become entangled in the south side railing which flipped both the tractor and trailer, might possibly have continued down the embankment and into one or more homes on the north side. The driver was uninjured. Another west-bound vehicle was slightly damaged when it struck part of the railing which had been strewn in its path. Local man charged with theft of pickup

A school pickup has been heavily damaged, a police patrol car also damaged but not as badly, and a young Iowa Park man has been charged with "unauthorized use of motor vehicle.'

Charged Tuesday before Justice of the Peace R.L. Stewart was Dean Hanley, 20, of Woodbriar Apartment No. 107.

Police were alerted about 10:30 p.m. Monday by a resident of the apartments who said he had seen a man walk from one vehicle to another in the parking lot, finally getting in a pickup and driving away.

While Capt. Robert Dean was at the complex gaining information, officer Ralph Price spotted the pickup matching description of the caller and attempted to stop him at the Pacific Street overpass of Highway 287.

According to Price's report, the pickup continued eastward, exiting at Bell Road. The officer's report indicated the pickup sped away when he sounded his siren and turned on his flashing lights.

The chase continued north on Bell some five miles. Driver of the pickup apparently was not acquainted with the road dead-ending, and the pickup bounced across a deep ditch, through a fence and into a pasture.

Officer Price was also unacquainted with the road and, apparently blinded by dust of the fleeing pickup, did not see the ditch in time to stop. The cruiser plunged into the ditch, damaging the front end but not injuring the officer.

Price and other officers who arrived on the scene, searched more than hour for the driver of the pickup but failed.

The next morning, Billy Joe Johnson, vocational agriculture teacher who had been using the school-owned pickup and lives at the apartments, drove out Bell Road to view the scene.

Just north of Klinkerman Dairy he saw a young man walking and stopped, offering a ride.

Council may name new administrator

Iowa Park's new city administrator may be named Monday night, when the council holds its regular meeting in council chambers beginning at 7.

Mayor Charlie Lee confirmed yesterday that four applicants were interviewed Saturday by council members, and they may be ready to decide among the applicants at the

Iowa Park has been without an administrator slightly longer than a month. Since former administrator Steve Morath left the office Oct. 16, the mayor has been acting in that position. At the council meeting two weeks

ago, aldermen met in executive session and narrowed the list of applications down to six. Two were contacted for interviews but had already accepted positions elsewhere, removing themselves from further consideration.

The mayor explained he would rather not disclose the names of the four finalists, but did say two now reside in Wichita County and the other two elsewhere.

Asked if one criteria for selection would be for the new administrator to reside in Iowa Park, Lee said the council was aware it could not require residency, but it would be strongly urged.

Probably the most common of

complaints about former administrator Morath was the fact that he continued to maintain his home in Wichita Falls where he lived before being hired here.

At least two other topics will appear on Monday's meeting agenda. One will be a public hearing to change zoning of two lots in the south part of town and the other will be to award

bids for a new police car.

Upon recommendation of the planning and zoning commission that zoning of two lots in block 161 be re-zoned, the council will hear public comment on the proposal. The two lots reportedly will be used for a gun repair shop, requiring zone change from single family residence to convenience commercial.

"We were no heros," Col. Burer stated. "We were average Americans who were dedicated to serving our nation."



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

Cook of the Week

Helen Pautsky Brown knows that most families will enjoy either chicken or turkey this Thanksgiving, and she also knows that the cooks will prepare the fowl according to the families' taste, so she is not giving any recipes on the preparation and cooking of the fowl. Rather, she knows that in most cases there will be leftover meat and she thinks that the week before Thanksgiving Day is apropos to share some recipes for glamorizing leftover dishes. She says, however, that the recipes are delicious anytime of the year made with fresh fowl.

Helen has lived in Iowa Park since 1979 since she retired from the teaching profession. Born in Denison, she was graduated from Wichita Falls High School. PHILIPPINE ISLAND CURRY [will freeze]

Step 1: 1 large chicken (or left-over turkey)

- 1 carrot
- 2 stems celery
- 1 onion
- 1 tsp. salt

Put hen and vegetables in pot, cover with cold water and simmer until tender. Remove meat from bones and set aside, cut in bite-size pieces. Step 2:

1 quart sweet milk

1 cup grated coconut Scald milk and pour over coconut. Let stand one hour while chicken cooks.

- Step 3: 1 stick oleo or butter
- 1 large onion
- 2 green peppers
- 4 cloves garlic

Chop vegetables and garlic finely. Melt butter in heavy pot and saute slowly until brown. Step 4:

- 2 or 3 tablespoons curry powder
- 3 tablespoons arrowroot (optional)
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 6 cardemon seeds (1 teaspoon powdered cardemon)
- 1/2 teaspoon ginger
- 1/2 teaspoon turmeric
- 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg 1/4 teaspoon cloves
- 1 red chili pepper
- 1 green chili pepper Juice of 2 limes

Add to vegetables in pot; mix thoroughly and then add very slowly the quart of coconut milk from above directions, stirring constantly. Let simmer 20 minutes. Serve with rice and condiments.

Caution should be used in adding chili peppers or they may be omitted entirely. Condiments should consist of side dishes of coconut, currants, chopped nuts and/or crumbled bacon

CHICKEN OR TURKEY TETRAZZINI

6 ozs. spaghetti, broken up

1/4 cup butter or oleo 1/2 cup flour

23/4 cups chicken broth 1 cup light cream 1/4 cup dry sherry

1 teaspoon salt

Dash pepper 1/2 teaspoon monosodium glutamate

(optional) 1-6 oz. can mushrooms, sliced, drained (1 cup)

¼ cup chopped green pepper

3 cups diced cooked turkey or chicken 1/2 cup shredded Parmesan cheese, reserve this for topping the casserole.

Cook spaghetti in boiling salted water till just tender (do not overcook; drain. Melt butter, blend in flour. Stir broth into flour mixture. add cream. Cook and stir until mixture thickens and bubbles. Add wine, salt, pepper and remaining ingredients. Turn into 12x1/2x2 inch baking dish. Sprinkle with Parmesan cheese. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees) about 30 minutes. Makes five or six servings. Will freeze.

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

Area oil, gas report

Two wildcats for oil are scheduled for spudding seven miles west of Archer City by W. A. Lofton, operator from Wichita Falls. The wells will be known as the No. 2 Abercrombie "Jeff" and the No. 5 Abercrombie "Jeff", with projected total depths of 2,000 feet and 200 feet, respectively. They will be situated in a 339-acre lease in Archer County's John W. Harris Subdivision of the Club Ranch Survey.

A 1,500-foot developmental well is planned by Cleo Oil, Inc. of Olney at a drillsite two miles southwest of Archer City, Archer County. The location is in a 400-acre lease in the Harris Subdivision of the Club Ranch Survey. Well's designation is the No. 7A Abercrombie. It is in the Young County Regular Field.

K.M. Crenshaw of Wichita Falls has filed for permit to drill the No. 8 Tribune, a 1,525-foot developmental well in the Archer Regular Field, seven miles north-northwest of Archer City. The operation will be in a 135-acre lease in Archer County's ATNCL Survey.

Joe McDonald of Burkburnett has revealed plans to drill two developmental probes in the Archer County Regular Field, four miles southwest of Iowa Park. The wells will be located in a 100-acre lease in the H. Balch Survey and are to be designated as the No. 4 Hodges "A", a 1,350 foot well and the No. 5 Hodges "A", a 1,450 foot well.

As I See It....

How can a school the size of Iowa Park be competitive in football with schools twice their size?

The answer: a group of dedicated athletes, headed by the leadership of fine seniors; and an outstanding coaching staff.

Six of the 10 teams Iowa Park played this season were from schools with enrollment larger than our local school. Some were more than double the local student body, which gives them the opportunity for greater depth and selection.

Vernon is the only member of Dist. 3-AAAA with an enrollment near Iowa Park's. But it has 200 or more students than the local school.

Both Breckenridge and Bowie are very near Iowa Park's enrollment, leaving only Electra on this year's schedule with considerably fewer than our enrollment.

Matched against the teams in our conference, the Hawks were, in general, outclassed in speed, size and depth. On paper, every team should have whipped the stuffing out of the proud Hawks.

But this bunch of young men, especialy the seniors, dedicated themselves last spring to have a winning season. And they did.

The Hawks completed the season with eight wins and two losses, best record since 1974. And everyone remembers that one of those wins was over Gainesville, when the Leopards were ranked second among AAAA teams in the state. Gainesville, obviously, advanced into the state playoffs as district champion and remains among the top 10 in the state rankings.

A significant amount of credit for the successful season must be given to the coaching staff of David Baugh, James Ivy, Earnie Reusch and Ray Sefcik.

This group of men has put in many

more hours of preparation than just those working with the players on the field. Their weekends are filled with viewing films of their own games as well as those of their next opponents. With the viewing, they grade the performance of their own players, and then they look for the strengths and weaknesses of the team they will next meet.

This team of mentors has been together both years Baugh has been Head Hawk. Baugh's career record as head coach now stands at 11-8-1. But more importantly, in conference action the staff's record is 7-4-1.

Principal Bob Dawson recently said this group of coaches will never receive the credit deserved for what they've accomplished. I agree, as far as the public is concerned. But their peers know, and the coaching quartet is well respected among their profession.

We're lucky to have them, but I wonder how long we'll be able to keep them.

For those who still don't know, Iowa Park will in all likelihood drop back in classification in the fall of 1984, based on anticipated continued decrease in enrollment. If and when that time comes, the Hawks will once again be matched with schools their own size.

And a lot of people are looking for that, you can believe!

But to the 1982 Hawks and the coaching staff, congratulations for a job well done.



Iowa Park finishes season with 8-2 record!



Hawks close out season with 33-3 win over Azle

In their closing game of the 1982 season, Iowa Park's Hawks allowed the visiting Azle Hornets their glory during the first three minutes of the game Friday night, but that was all.

The rest of the game belonged to the Mean Green.

Azle took the game's opening kickoff and, thanks to a pair of passes which accounted for 60 yards, advanced to the Hawk seven yard line. Facing fourth and six, the visitors chose to kick a field goal from the 15 yard line, and it was all they could muster for the evening.

Before the period was over, the Hawks owned a 7-3 lead, and they dominated play from that point on.

The victory gave the Hawks a 5-2 conference record, which left them in third place in the Dist. 3-AAAA standings behind Gainesville and Hirschi, each with 6-1. But the win also gave the 1982 edition of Mean Green the best season record, 8-2, the school has enjoyed since 1974.

Following Azle's field goal, the Hawks took the following kickoff and marched 70 yards to score, sending fullback Paul Rogers the final five five yards over left tackle.

Wayne Hodges' kick for extra point was good, as the clock showed 2:30 remaining in the first period.

Early in the second period, Iowa Park was on the march again, but an interception by a Hornet stopped the drive on the Azle eight.

Three plays later, Azle punted, and the Hawks marched 50 yards to the Hornet end zone, with Marc Klinkerman scampering the final 16 yards on a quarterback rollout around right end.

A high snap from center on the extra point, the only one this season, threw off Hodges' timing for the kick and it failed. But the Hawks went to the locker room with a 13-3 lead at half-time.

Taking the second half kickoff, the Hawks needed only seven plays to score, with Rogers crossing the goal line from 12 yards out for the TD. Hodges' kick was good, and the Hawks extended their lead to 20-3 with 8:40 remaining in the period.

But that was only the first of three touchdowns for the host Hawks in that stanza.

A Rogers one-yard plunge over left guard capped a 44-yard drive, the next time the Hawks got their hands on the ball.

On their next possession, the Hornets gambled on a fourth-and-one situation at their own 43 yard line, and lost. Six plays later, Lynn Fulfer scored his only touchdown of the season on a 33-yard scamper. But he had to shuck off a tackle at the 22 yard line to earn it.

Hodges' kick sealed the scoring at 33-3, with six seconds remaining on the scoreboard in the third period.

From that point, Coach David Baugh cleaned his bench for valuable playing experience by his reserves who will be on the 1983 varsity.

Azle had one more opportunity to score in the fourth period, when a Hornet covered a Fulfer fumble at the Hawk 30. But five plays and one first down later, the Mean Green defenders turned the ball over to the offense at the Hawk 13.

Iowa Park so dominated the game during the second and third periods of play, the Hawks earned 15 first downs to Azle's one.

Rogers had his fourth 100-yard-plus game of the season, gaining 116 yards on 19 carries. Kevin Parker finished with 84 yards on 18 carries, Fulfer 54 on five, Greg Untalon 46 on three and Klinkerman 15 on four, as the game's

Unlike the other games this season, when the Hawks had more turnovers than their opponents, Iowa Park's defense kept the opponents from capitalizing on their mistakes. While the Hawks lost the ball twice, once on a fumble and again on an interception, the Hornets did not turn over the ball once, playing errorless ball.

The game was the third meeting between Iowa Park and Azle, and the Hawks now hold a 2-1 load

No more water sales outside city limits

An ordinance restricting future water meter tap requests from outside the city limits was deemed "a public emergency and imperative public necessity" and passed by the Holliday City Council Monday night in open session.

The ordinance was one of three items on the agenda for the regular bi-monthly meeting, and was passed without the votes of the two councilmen who requested the ordinance during the council's last

During that meeting, a water meter tap request was approved for Jimmy Dale Willis, who is not related to alderman Jimmy Willis. The approval was the last for anyone not living within the city limits, and ends for the time a problem that has mushroomed over the past few years due to heavy home construction in areas just outside Holliday.

The bulk of the ordinance details four points:

There has been a growing demand that the city provide water service to customers residing outside the city limits;

* There has been no firmly established policy by which the council could be guided in considering such applications;

* Each applicant for the water tap outside the city limits has been required to make his or her application directly to the council for consideration; and,

* The consideration of these applications has caused undue hardship to the applicants and taken considerable time away from other duties of the council.

The ordinance further reads, "The City Council hereby deems it advisable to set a firm policy prohibiting further water meter taps outside the city limits so as to allow the City Council to spend its limited time attending to other items of city business more relevant to the interests of all the citizens of the City of Holliday."

Council members Jim Virdell and Leon Addison requested the ordinance be drawn up during the city's last meeting, but both were absent from Monday's session,

leaving Willis, John Goforth, Mayor James Cook and new council member Elizabeth Gorman to decide its fate. After a few minutes of discussion,

Willis called for a motion to table the proposal until the two absent members could be present, and received a second from Goforth. But, after Cook carried the


discussion further before acting on the motion, Goforth requested that his second be stricken from the minutes, and instead seconded another motion by Willis to accept the ordinance, which took effect immediately.

"I am not against anybody," Willis remarked. "I am just trying to build this city."

Willis' remarks represent the council's overall view of the water problem over the past few years. A format for approving water meter taps outside the city's limits was approved by the same council, with the exception of Gorman. In order to get approval from the council, the person requesting such approval had to sign a letter stating his intentions of approving any future annexation of his property.

In addition, the applicant had to seek written permission from the City of Wichita Falls to buy water from Holliday. Holliday purchases its water from the neighboring city, and it was only after final approval of tht entity.

"We just can't afford to hook anyone else up," Cook said, adding that the present council was having to reverse actions by previous city councils who probably weren't aware of the problems it would create.

Big Red rolls over Ranger, 51-16

Holliday's Eagles mounted scoring drives in each of their first six possessions last Friday night against Ranger to insure both a bi-district crown and a chance to knock off top-ranked Eastland tomorrow night.

Ranger, runner-up to DeLeon in District 12-AA, found the Eagles everything but accomodating throughout the game, but mounted two late-game drives of its own to avoid a shutout. And both were against the Eagle reserves.

Junior Jay Burks took the honors in the rushing department, carrying eight times for 119 yards and one touchdown. But 12 other runningbacks were utilized when starting backs Brad Harmon and Jeff Belcher shredded the Bulldog defense for four early touchdowns.

Belcher carried the ball only three times, but scored each time on runs of 21, two and 18 yards. Harmon carried five times for 14 yards, well below his

game average, and scored once.

Other backs handling the load included Gil Gilbert (two carries for 60 vards). Danny Hinsley (seven carries, 50 yards), Mark Parker (12 carries, 45 yards), Jim Rogers (seven carries, 43 yards), Tom Hamill (five carries, 16 yards), Mike W. Parker (two carries, 13 yards), and Shannon West (two carries, nine yards).

In all, the Big Red racked up 24 first downs with 459 yards rushing, and another 74 in the air for 531 total yards.

The Bulldogs, on the other hand, found the hard-hitting Eagle defense too subborn, rushing 20 times for 60 yards, while hitting 10 of 20 passes for 120 more.

But when Ranger was forced to go to the airways, Holliday responded with three interceptions, made by Gilbert, Harmon and Kevin Blanken-

Add to that turnover total one

fumble recovered by Belcher, and the four turnovers by Ranger contributed heavily to its downfall.

Harmon set up the first Eagle drive when he returned the first of six Ranger punts 32 yards to the Bulldog 20. The senior back was caught for a one-yard loss the next play, but Belcher took over, blasting his way 21 yards for the initial score. Mike A. Parker's kick made it 7-0 with 9:40 left in the first quarter.

Ranger found nothing but red and white jerseys for the second straight possession against Holliday's first defense, when facing third and 13 the Bulldogs went to the air, only to have Harmon intercept at their 27, returning it 15 yards to the 12.

Two carries by Harmon placed the ball at the two, and Belcher carried it over on the next play for the touchdown, giving the Eagles a 14-0 lead with less than five minutes gone in the game.

Belcher recovered a Bulldog fumble at the Ranger 43 following the Bulldog's initial first down. On the play, a quarterback keeper, Ranger signal caller Lynn Stewart was injured when hit by a host of Eagles.

A. Parker warmed up his passing arm the next play, hitting Blankenship for a 41-yard gain to the Ranger three. On the next play, Harmon took it over to extend the lead to 21-0, with five minutes still left to play in the first period.

Ranger tried three running plays on its next possession, but netted minus-five yards, and punted 24 yards to its 36. Gilbert ran for 17 yards to the Bulldog 18 in the six-play drive, and Belcher took it the remaining distance on the next play, upping the lead to 28-0 with just over a minute left in the first period.

Holliday set up shop on its next possession at its 21, and Neal carried it over from four yards out to cap a six-play drive. Gilbert again found success on his second and final carry of the evening, running 43 yards to the Ranger 32, with Neal going over for the score three plays later.

Burks scored the final touchdown of the first half for Holliday on a two-yard plunge, capping an eight-play, 67-yard drive which left the Eagles holding a 42-0 lead going into intermission.

Holliday scored once more in the third period, when Hardin sped untouched, giving the Eagles a 48-0 buffer.

A. Parker finished the Holliday scoring for the night on a 22-yard field goal, increasing the lead to 51-0.

Ranger answered with a 37-yard bomb early in the fourth quarter from Stewart to Powell Compton. Stewart ran for the conversion, making it

On their next possession, the Bulldogs capitalized with a 49-yard run by Adam Lopez for the final

score. Brent Rees converted on a run for two points, freezing the scoreboard at 51-16.

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
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
