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Diesel Silverliner Bus Shows in Iowa Park

Iowa Park was visited Thursday, June 14, by two units of the brand new, half million dollar fleet of Continental Trailways Diesel Silverliner buses that will go into service immediately through Iowa Park.

Alan Berry, local agent for Continental Trailways, was proud to announce the company had purchased enough of these ultra-modern buses to operate all 10 schedules through here on the main-line of Continental Trailways' famous Indian Empire Route featuring thru-bus service from Dallas to Los Angeles, Calif.

few cracks in the wood of one of the pictures.

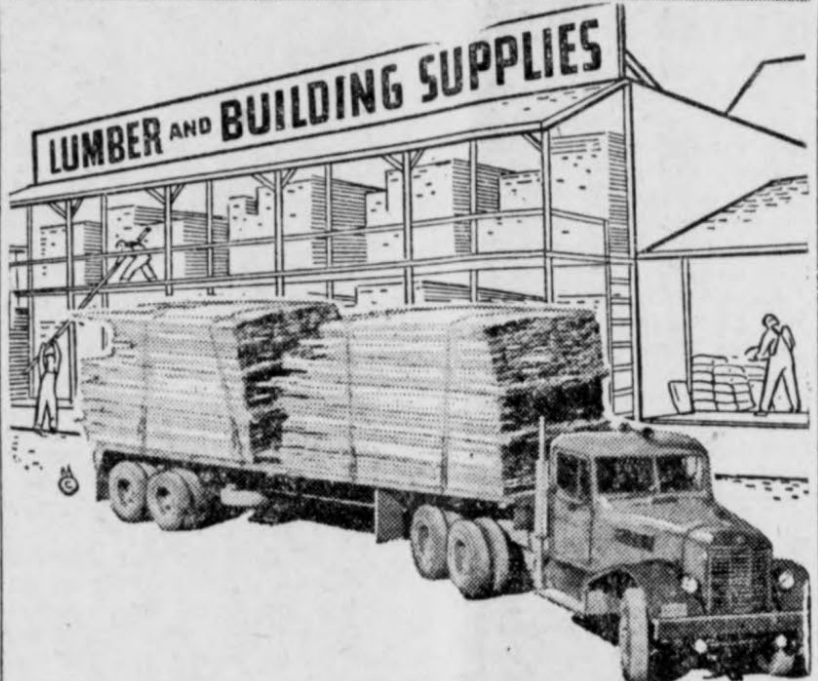
Mrs. Perdue said they had never been retouched. About seven years ago an art teacher oil the pictures and framed them.

Mrs. Perdue said that her mother later did some paintings on canvas but none of them has been preserved.



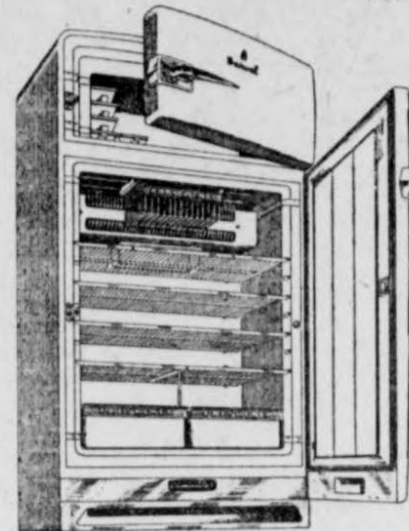
