# Clean-Up Week begins Monday

Iowa Park's annual Clean-Up Week gets underway Monday and is to continue through the following Saturday.

The event is co-sponsored by the city and Chamber of Commerce.

Articles too large or usually disallowed to be placed in the city's trash containers will be picked up by city crews. Residents are to telephone city hall or the Chamber during regular business hours, giving the address, and the items will be picked up sometime during the week. The items should be placed next to the metal containers.

April 16, large articles will be picked up in front of the home, if by the curb. Again, notice by telephone is necessary, with the caller giving the address of the location. The call should be made no later than next Friday.

Two youth organizations have already committed to help with cleaning the downtown area and parks on April 16, according to Linda Merrick, Chamber president.

She said Camp Fire and Cub Pack 37 have pledged their support to the community-wide effort. Members participating will qualify for their

citizenship awards.

Any organizations or individuals who want to contribute their help on the final, big day of cleaning is asked to contact Mrs. Ray Pittman, Chamber secretary, to receive

designated areas to work.

Through the week, homeowners and business people are encouraged to clean their own premises as part of the community effort, Mrs. Merrick said.

## School's annual sale of plants set Saturday

Iowa Park High School's horticulture class opens its greenhouse doors to the public at 8 a.m. Saturday for the annual plant sale, and instructor H.J. Cannon is anticipating continued success of the project.

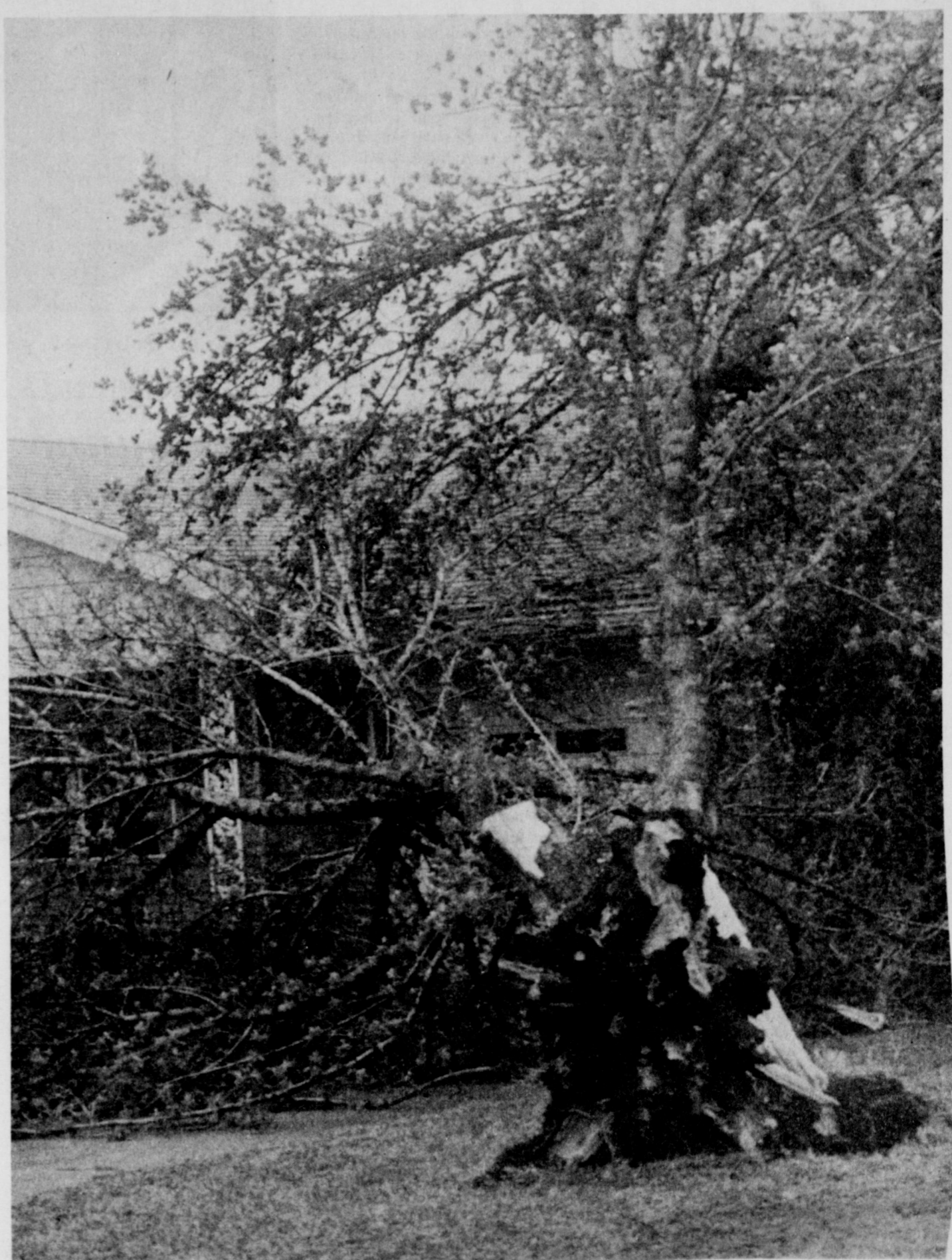
The plant sale, which has been held a decade at the high school, funds the horticulture program for the following year in addition to financing a trip to the state floral culture contest for three of the students.

"Basically, the class is self

supportive," Cannon said, adding that the school pays for the water and heating, while the plant sale pays for next year's plants, fertilizer and other materials.

A wide variety of plants will be offered at the sale, which ends at 5 p.m. that day. Bedding plants, pot plants, rose bushes, hanging baskets and strawberries are just a few.

In the past, shoppers have stood in line before 8 a.m. in order to enjoy first selections. However, said Cannon, many plants are left for sale into the afternoon.

## City council, school trustees plan busy sessions

Besides canvassing Saturday's election results and administering oaths of office for the winners, the agendas for next week's meeting of the city council and school board appear to be heavy.

The city meeting will begin at 7 p.m. Monday in council chambers, and the trustees will meet at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday in the administration building.

On the city agenda are:

- \* a public hearing to modify the revenue sharing budget to finance Park West paving project, with a resolution on the same subject to follow;
- \* a resolution to apply for a grant to

the Texas Department of Health to pay for water plant floridation equipment;

- \* authorization to advertise for bids to sell an old water department

pickup;

- \* hear a report from architect Charles Harper on plans to continue renovation of city hall;
- \* the city administrator will request policies be set on two subjects - one is a request by some businesses to cut the number of trash containers and therefore their monthly costs - the other is a request to cut the number of water meters serving certain areas, reducing the number of minimum bills charged;

- \* hear a progress report on recommendations from the planning and zoning commission;
- \* consider definitions for mobile homes and modular homes for the zoning ordinance;

and consider a one-time purchase of 10 fire hydrants budgeted for this year, or purchase a few as needed.

- School trustees will consider:
- \* salaries for next year for auxiliary personnel;
  - \* discuss newly-required physical examinations for bus drivers;
  - \* discuss major improvements on the four campuses;
  - \* consider vocational department requests for 1983-84;
  - \* take action on Region Nine Service Center board member election;
  - \* discuss computer purchase bids;
  - \* take action on personnel resignations for next year;
  - \* reorganize board following canvassing of votes.

## Incumbents returned in Saturday balloting

Unofficial results from Saturday's city and school elections indicated the incumbents easily won back their positions.

Voting was heavier than officials had anticipated, with most of the ballots being cast late in the afternoon.

The majority of the 585 voting in the city election favored Tim Hunter, Lita Watson and Johnny Coker to return to the council. Most of the votes were cast in precinct 32, as an unusually light turnout of only 90 were cast in precinct 33.

The school trustee election attracted only a few more voters than did the city election, 639. Jimmy Howell and Rusty Rusk were both returned for another three-year term of office.

Both elections are at-large, with those receiving the greatest number of votes being declared the victors. Returns will be canvassed at meetings next week and the results then declared official.

Unofficial vote count in the city

election was: Tim Hunter, 461; Lita Watson, 420; Johnny Coker, 358; Jim Voyles, 249 and Freddie Simmons, 152.

For school trustee, ballots counted were: Jimmy Howell, 549; Rusty Rusk, 428 and Tom Venhaus, 324.

Vote count by poll in the trustee election was 478 at the Kidwell Elementary box, 122 at Bradford and 39 at Valley View.

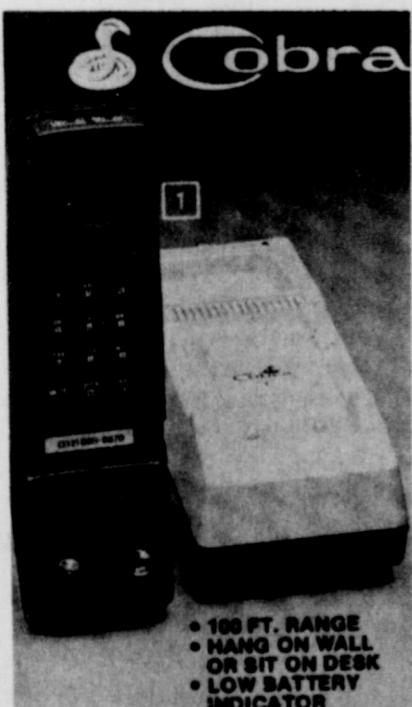

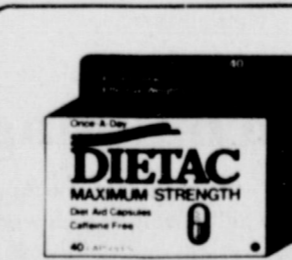

# Cook of the Week

Marian (Mrs. William) Andersen gives credit for her ability to cook to her mother and grandmother, and several of her recipes this week are those handed down by them. The others are her family's favorite recipes.

One of her recipes, "Date-Pecan Pudding", is nostalgic because her grandmother always prepared it for one of the desserts at the family's Christmas dinners. Dates have been an ingredient in desserts for many, many years. The fruit, then called "finger apples" were well known in medieval times. By Elizabethan times, all the great households had dates in their pantries, used mostly for puddings. In the 14th century, dates were among the desserts served at most formal dinners in France, but it was not until after the 1830 conquest of Algeria that the dates came within the reach of the average Frenchman.

The dates have been eaten and cooked for thousands of years. They probably originated in Iraq, and the oldest stones ever found were discovered in the Shanibar Cave north of Iraq. These were wild dates, but the fruit was already being cultivated in the Sahara in Neolithic Times. Records of its cultivation in the Middle East exist since 3,000 B.C. Today in the U.S., Indio, Calif. is a date-growing capital, and a yearly ten-day festival is held in celebration of the fruit, featuring on each day the enactment of a different tale from the Arabian Nights.

Mrs. Andersen is a native of Raton, N.M. where she finished high school. She and her husband, who is in civil service at Sheppard AFB, and their family moved to Iowa Park in 1959.

A member of First Christian Church and Christian Women's Fellowship, Marian is presently area consultant for the CWF in 14 churches. She is a volunteer coordinator for the emergency food pantry sponsored by the Iowa Park Ministerial Alliance. Her hobbies are playing the piano and reading.

The Andersen's children are Carrie (Mrs. Rod) Turner of Burkburnett, Karen (Mrs. Richard) Lehman of Iowa Park, and Billy of Wichita Falls.

About 2 carrots, cook awhile  
About 2 potatoes, cook awhile  
Link Polish sausage  
About 1/4 head shredded cabbage, brown in heavy skillet before adding to above.  
Cook until vegetables and sausage are tender.

### PINEAPPLE-BANANA SALAD

1-20 oz. can sliced pineapple  
4 bananas, diced  
1 cup chopped celery  
1/4 cup chopped nuts

### DRESSING

1/2 tsp. salt  
1 heaping tbsp. cornstarch  
1/2 cup sugar  
1 egg, beaten  
2 tbsps. butter  
1 teas. vanilla

Drain pineapple juice into measuring cup. Pour 1/2 cup juice into saucepan, bring to a boil. Mix together salt, cornstarch and sugar; add to beaten egg and 1/4 cup pineapple juice. Pour into boiling juice; add butter and vanilla. Cook one minute until thick. Chill.

Cut pineapple slices into bite-size chunks. Do not add bananas until ready to serve because they will turn dark. Add celery, nuts and dressing.

### HOT TAMALE PIE

Boil together until meat is done:

3 lbs. stew meat  
1 clove garlic  
1 onion, chopped

Add to meat broth enough water to make 4 cups. Put meat and one onion through food chopper. Add one cup of broth to meat until moist; stir in 1 tablespoon chili powder, salt and pepper.

Stir 1/4 cup corn meal into 3 cups

simmering broth. In casserole dish, layer corn meal, meat mix, corn meal. Bake one hour uncovered until brown at 350 degrees.

### BUSY DAY CAKE

Grease and flour 2 9-inch layer pans or 1-13x9 inch oblong pan.

Into large mixing bowl, put:

3 cups flour  
2 cups sugar  
2 tsps. soda  
1 tsp. salt  
6 tbsp. cocoa

Stir above together, add:

1 cup Wesson oil  
2 tbsps. vinegar  
2 teas. vanilla  
2 cups water

Bake at 350 degrees 30 to 35 minutes or until cake springs back.

### SOUR CREAM ENCHILADAS

1 1/2 lbs. ground beef  
1 pkg. Taco seasoning  
1 can refried beans  
Flour tortillas

1/2 pint sour cream

Prepare meat by directions on seasoning package. Smear 1 teas. sour cream on 1 tortilla; put heaping tablespoon beans and one of meat onto tortilla. Roll and place in oblong pan. Repeat until pan is filled. Pour one can enchilada sauce over rolled tortillas. Sprinkle with grated cheese. Bake at 350 degrees until cheese is melted.

Boil together:

2 cups brown sugar

1 cup flour  
1 cup milk  
1 egg  
2 tsps. baking powder  
1/2 tsp. salt  
1 tsp. vanilla  
1 cup chopped dates  
1/2 cup chopped pecans

Bake at 350 degrees until done. Serve with whipped cream.

## As I See It....

If you should happen to want to read what your water meter is, and while doing it a policeman pulls up and asks who you are and what you're doing... the policeman has a reason. Somebody's been fooling around with the meters.

It all sounds pretty suspicious to me. At a time when the water department has been coming under criticism, that vandalism and apparent tampering with meters is reported.

And I'm not blaming city employees.

I got my first indication yesterday by reading the police reports. City administrator James Barrington told the department to be on the lookout for anyone who might be tampering with the meters.

He had good reason. Two had been discovered as being damaged with what appeared to be a hammer. One was beaten out of shape and the other had apparent signs that someone had attempted to open it.

When checking further, the administrator told me department employees had been getting some "wierd" readings recently, and many of the readings were in general neighborhoods.

Pointing out that the department had one extended period (caused by weather) between readings, followed by a short period, in an effort to get back on a regular monthly schedule, Barrington related good reason for concern.

In some areas of town, the short-period readings were even higher than the long-period readings. Someone's been messing around.

It would seem obvious to me that such tamperings wouldn't be done by city employees, because such things just cause them additional work.

Why would the individual citizen be concerned about this kind of goings on? Well, folks, it costs each of us. Improper readings caused by a tampered meter creates additional work and expense on the water department. Nobody but you and I pays for that, too.

So if you see anyone you don't recognize as being authorized messing around with your meter, or a neighbor's meter, call the police department. We just don't need that kind of thing going on in our community.

On an unrelated subject, I'd like to comment now on that airport zoning situation at Sheppard AFB.

Because our community wasn't affected by the zoning, after it was amended, I stayed out of it. But there has been a lot of interest shown by our citizens.

The zoning ordinance was approved by a wide margin of Wichita Falls voters in Saturday's election.

It all appears to me to have been a badly-handled situation. At least from

a public relations standpoint.

Somebody connected with the government wanted more air space around the base. Easements had already been paid by the government, and apparently somebody didn't want to pay for more.

So they went another route, by involving the city. Wichita Falls government then went through a state law which concerns itself with municipal airports, giving the municipality the right to declare the space needed and affect it by ordinance.

The intent of the state law was for civilian air transport only.

I don't blame the city for wanting to protect Sheppard's future as a flying center. It's a major part of that city's, and our's, economy.

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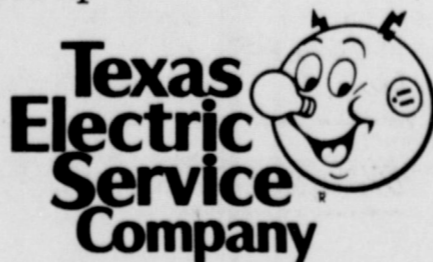
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
