Fund-raising campaign launching set Sunday

The long-awaited kickoff for a fund-raising drive to finance renovation of Tom Burnett Memorial Library will be held Sunday afternoon, according to Mrs. W.A. George, president of the library board.

A two-hour program will feature tours of the historical landmark home, dedication of a historical marker, an explanation of the funds

needed, and entertainment by the bands and choirs of both the high school and junior high.

Commencing at 2 p.m., tours of the structure will be held, with library board members posted at various stations to answer questions and explain changes which are planned.

At 2:30, Mrs. Merle Anthony of Wichita Falls will deliver a speech and reveal a state historical marker

for Tom Burnett, pioneer rancher.

Following the speech, Tim Hunter, finance chairman for the fund drive, will explain the costs of renovation and report on plans for soliciting the monies.

High school musicians and vocalists will perform during the initial part of the afternoon, and junior high students are to begin their portion of the program about 3:30.

Estimated funds needed for renovating the structure is \$262,000.

Plans call for remodeling the home in two phases. First phase will do all the first-floor and exterior work, as well as installing the support necessary for the second floor. Completion of the second floor will be the second phase.

Hunter said the estimated funds would do both phases.

The intent of the library board is to move the library into the first floor after the first phase is completed, and do the second floor at a later date.

In order to cut through red tape which reportedly has hampered progress of the city to get renovation underway, a non-profit organization is applying for a state charter of incorporation. It is the intent of the city to lease the facilities to the corporation, which will raise funds, renovate the structure and administer its operations in the future.

Hunter said paperwork is underway to form the Friends of the Library, Inc. He, city administrator James Barrington and three library board members, Mrs. George, Mrs.

Herman Escue and Mrs. James Owens, are the incorporating charter members.

With approximately \$17,000 on hand and some \$40,000 already pledged, the Friends of the Library hope to reach its quarter-million-dollar goal within two months.

Hunter said initial contact with citizens indicates enough interest to give the Friends confidence the goal will be reached, but not without lots of work and contact.

Parking for the afternoon's program and activities will present a problem, Hunter admitted. The circle drive in front of the structure must be left open, and no parking will be permitted there.

"Folks will just have to park along the streets, and they may have to

walk a couple of blocks to get there," he said.

A limited number of chairs, approximately 200, will be available for the elderly and handicapped, Hunter reported.

The library board has been planning the fund-raising project some 14 months, since the home and its complete block of land was given to the city for use as a library. Architectural plans have been drawn for renovation.

Mrs. Anthony, a retired teacher of Wichita Falls High School, is to announce the historical marker in honor of the late Tom Burnett. It is a marker honoring an individual, though there is an application already submitted for a marker to recognize the landmark structure.

Vocational program changes outlined

Changes in the high school vocational program, equipment purchases and major maintenance projects highlighted Tuesday's meeting of the school board.

No action was taken, however, until the recent election voting was canvassed and accepted. That was followed by board "reorganization," which returned the officers to the same positions held during the past year: Roy Boutwell, president; Jerald Brown, vice president and Martha Dudley, secretary.

As explained to the board by Richard Davis, the vocational faculty will be cut by two, through attrition. The counselor post held by the late Carl King will not be continued, and homemaking will be a two-teacher department with the elimination of the cooperative department.

In addition, the vocational department of office education will be dropped and in its place will be computer instruction. This was decided by more students expressing an interest in office machines and computers than in the cooperative training.

Bonnie Medlinger is the instructor in that area, and 73 students have pre-enrolled, it was reported.

Supt. Harold Cowley reported nine businesses bid in response to advertisement for purchase of additional computers and printers.

Trustees approved the low bid for

Apple Two computers from Computer Wares Inc. of Irving which offered six computers and three printers for \$12,573. Of this amount, local funds expended will be approximately \$1,000, with the rest through federal funding for vocational education, Cowley explained.

The school purchased three computers and two printers last spring, all of which will remain in use. They were bought from a Wichita Falls firm, which submitted a bid \$1,000 higher for the same equipment than did the Irving firm.

Major maintenance projects approved for the summer included:

High school - replace original vinyl wall covering in the west third of the building's halls and complete floor covering of classrooms with tile.

Junior high - develop teachers' lounge by erecting walls, fixtures, sewer hook-up, painting and floor covering, and build two sidewalks.

Bradford - pour 3/8-inch liquid urethane covering on gymnasium floor (the covering is the same as was put in the new gym at the high school). Trustees are considering development of a music room somewhere on campus, but no decision was made as to where it would be placed.

Kidwell - replace floor tile in north wing of hall.

Vocational building at high school - put in exterior doors on north side to

each department, eliminating central hallway; renovate restroom in auto body; replace overhead doors in auto mechanics.

Trustees voted to pay for physicals required of all public school bus drivers, if the physicals are taken at Park Clinic.

Approval was also made to purchase a new car for drivers education, and accept donation of a 1978 model from Leon Bidy to be used in the same department. Cowley explained auto dealers were not able to any longer furnish cars for drivers ed.

Trustees accepted resignations of Linda Ayres, home economics teacher who plans to go into business in Wichita Falls, and Anna Dowell.

City considers more city hall work

Plans for phase two of the city hall renovation project were discussed Monday at the city council meeting.

Meeting with architect Charles Harper, the council was told detail plans should be ready in approximately two months, at which time advertising for bids could be accomplished.

The first phase of renovation included exterior and re-roofing work. Second phase would take in the old three-bay fire station which has stood unoccupied since the new fire station was built several years ago.

The overhead doors would be taken out and the walls bricked, leaving one exterior entrance on the north side. Besides office area, the space would provide for badly-needed storage of records, restrooms, city administrator's office and a council conference room.

Harper was commissioned some four years ago to draw plans for

renovation of the entire city hall. Because the entire project was not undertaken, the changes in the plans will be done on an hourly fee basis, he explained.

He estimated the phase two project would cost approximately \$41,000. The bidding will be done with the storage area and exterior wall as the primary priority, with the other proposals as alternates. This would allow the council to select the work as far as its money would allow.

During the initial portion of Monday's meeting, votes of the recent election were canvassed and approved, and the winners, Johnny Coker, Lita Watson and Tim Hunter were sworn into office.

Council members then confirmed mayor Charlie Lee's appointment of Coker to again serve as mayor pro tem.

Other business acted on by the council included:

* passage of a resolution

authorizing the city administrator to apply for a grant from the Texas Dept. of Health for funds to purchase fluoridation equipment;

* approved advertising to sell an

old water department pickup; * in response from downtown businesses to cut back the number of

Clean-Up campaign to climax Saturday

While residents and businesses have been participating in the week-long, city-wide Clean-Up, Fix-Up Week, Saturday will be the climactic day.

Organizations and individuals are volunteering to clean up parks, roadsides, the downtown area and vacant lots, according to Linda Merrick, president of the Chamber of Commerce which co-sponsors the annual project along with the city.

Mayor Charlie Lee, during Monday night's council meeting, read a proclamation declaring the week "Clean-Up and Fix-Up Week."

In his proclamation, he stated residents of the city could haul their rubbish and junk to the city's sanitary landfill and dump it without charge, as long as the dumping was done in accordance with instructions of the attendant.

At least three organizations have volunteered to work Saturday, and more are expected to respond to the Chamber's call for help.

Camp Fire and Cub Pack 37 have pledged their support in cleaning the downtown area and one park.

Tuesday, members of the Iowa Park Lions Club issued a challenge to other civic and social organizations to participate. The Lions will clean the roadside and ditches of West Highway from the downtown area to Johnson Road Saturday morning.

Organizational workers will be

issued plastic bags, donated by Cryovac. The bags will be stacked once filled for pickup by city crews.

Mrs. Merrick noted the project's timing was ideal, in that much of the city will be clean and presentable for viewing for all the visitors expected to be here Sunday for the library's fund-raising campaign kickoff.

Organizations wishing to volunteer can contact Mrs. Ray Pittman, Chamber secretary, to receive designated areas to work.

City crews will also be working Saturday to pick up large articles at the curb in front of homes. However, notice of the articles should be given in advance, by telephoning the Chamber office by Friday afternoon. Without notice, the articles probably will not be gathered, and telephone calls will not be accepted Saturday.

One such meeting will be at 2 p.m. Monday in the Iowa Park city council chambers.

The first meeting was Tuesday in

Wichita Falls. Another is this afternoon in Electra and the fourth will be Wednesday in Burkburnett.

The agenda for each meeting is the same. Status of employment and training programs and the job training partnership act will be explained by Homer Ann Hooper, and Katherine Bujak Hickman will tell of the summer youth employment program.



- * approved purchase of fire hydrants to replace several no longer repairable;
- * approved a request to cut the water meter monthly bill minimums from three to one for Gilmore Incorporated;
- * heard a report from the city administrator on definitions used by the manufacturing industry for mobile and modular homes, which is to be considered for incorporation into the zoning ordinance;
- received an invitation to attend a Tuesday night meeting with the volunteer fire department where discussions would be held for organization of a Civil Defense unit, which would be activated in a community emergency.

Until a few years ago, I never gave thought to throwing something out the window of my car while driving. "Shucks, I don't have any place to keep it in here," I thought.

But that was before I worked my first clean-up project, walking down a roadside and picking up trash others and I had discarded.

The thought to throw something anywhere other than a trash can or receptacle of some sort now never crosses my mind.

There was a big push on anti-littering back in the early 1970s. I guess Lady Bird Johnson would be credited. People everywhere were putting on programs against littering, there were public announcements on television and advertisements and slogans in newspapers. And it was a major subject stressed in our schools.

To make it short, our community gets to looking pretty bad about this time of the year. The weeds aren't tall enough to hide the junk.

That's why our community has a special week, set aside to clean things up. This is "Clean-Up, Fix-Up Week" and we all need to participate.

When we first started the special week, it was during the big anti-litter

promotion days. And we got dozens and dozens of volunteers to get out and help clean up the town. But as the promotion period started wearing off, hardly anyone made themselves available.

In fact, the Chamber of Commerce was so discouraged the directors were ready to call the whole thing off.

But they didn't. And I think we as citizens are the better for it.

You will be better if you volunteer your help Saturday. After you've cleaned up your own property, come out and help with the public property.

Spend just a few minutes, walking along the roads or in our parks, picking up the trash. . . and I'll guarantee you, you'll never throw anything out the window again!

And we'll all be better for it!

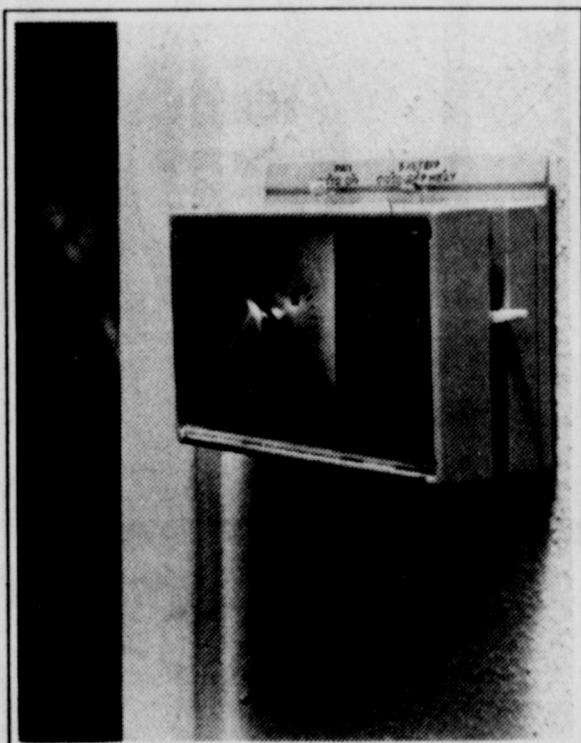

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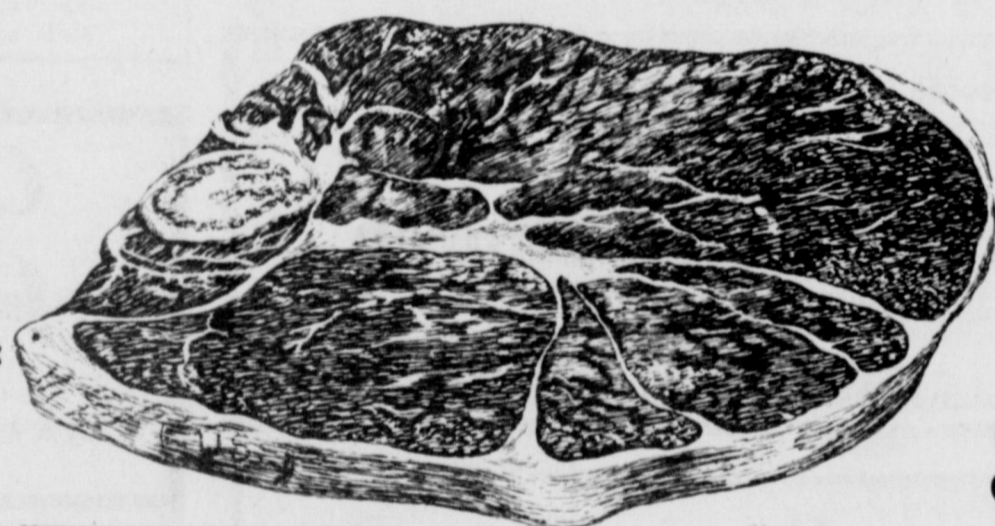

Cook of the Week

There are at least three things that Faye (Mrs. Frank) Slep, a health food enthusiast, does not use in her cooking or have in the house: white flour, sugar and chocolate.

She accepts the growing scientific evidence of sugar's negative effects on nerves and circulation. She prefers to avoid the empty calories of white flour with all its bleaches and preservatives, and does not want to run the risk of allergy problems so many chocolate eaters encounter. She substitutes carob for the chocolate.

The former Faye Ockerstrom of Dallas was graduated from Kimball High School in that city. She received a B.S. degree in elementary education with honors from the Univ. of Texas at Austin where she belonged to Pi Lambda Theta sorority. She has taught in the elementary school system at Austin and in Wichita Falls where she taught deaf students.

When Faye and Frank were students and teachers at Austin, they were house parents for the Texas School of the Deaf. He is presently the physical education teacher at Bradford Elementary. They have one daughter, Sigred, one year old.

Her hobbies include sewing, crocheting, knitting, needlepoint and other crafts; and canoeing. Below are some of her "naturally delicious" desserts and other recipes.

CAROB CHIP COOKIES

- 1 cup butter
- 1 cup honey
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 2 eggs
- 1 cup Bran
- 1/4 cup cold water
- 2 1/4 cups whole wheat flour
- 1 tsp. baking soda
- 1-12 oz. pkg. carob bits

Cream butter; add honey and beat. Add vanilla and eggs and beat well. Mix flour, Bran and baking soda together and add this mixture alternately with water. Beat well after each addition; add carob bits. Drop on greased sheet and bake at

375 degrees for 7-8 minutes. Yield: 25 1 1/2 inch cookies.

COUNTRY CORN BREAD

- 3/4 cup yellow corn meal
- 1 cup whole wheat flour
- 2 tsp. baking powder
- 1/2 tsp. sea salt
- 1 egg, well beaten
- 1/4 cup milk
- 1/2 cup yogurt
- 2 Tbs. oil
- 1/2 cup honey

Preheat oven to 425 degrees. Mix flour, meal, baking powder and salt. Mix egg, milk, yogurt, oil and honey. Add wet mixture to dry and mix well. Pour into oiled 8x8x2 inch baking pan. Bake for about 20 minutes until bread springs back when pressed lightly with finger or until a toothpick comes out clean.

BASIC CREPE RECIPE

- 1 1/2 cups milk
 - 2 tablespoons vegetable oil
 - 3 eggs
 - 1 1/2 cups whole wheat flour
 - 1/8 teaspoon salt
- Blender method: Put all ingredients into blender container in order listed. Cover and process at Blend Hi until smooth.
- Electric Mixer Method: In a large mixer bowl beat eggs well on a medium speed. Gradually add dry ingredients alternately with milk and oil. Beat until smooth.

Batter may be prepared immediately or held covered in the refrigerator until ready to use up to 3 days. Just stir before using. Yield: 20-24 crepes.

ALMOND CRAB CREPES

- [An elegant company dish]
- 6 prepared basic, Parmesan or Herb Crepes
- 1 6-ounce package frozen crab meat, defrosted and flaked
- 1/4 cup butter
- 1/2 small onion, chopped
- 1 cup sliced fresh mushrooms
- 2 tablespoons flour
- 3/4 cup milk
- 2 tablespoons sherry wine
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- Dash pepper
- 1/4 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
- Dash hot pepper sauce
- 1 tablespoon chopped fresh parsley
- 2 tablespoons sliced almonds

In a skillet, melt butter on medium heat. Saute onion and mushrooms until onions are soft. Add flour, stir until well blended. Gradually add milk and wine, cook and stir until thickened. Add crab and all

remaining ingredients. Heat through. Using 1/4 cup, fill each crepe and fold two sides over filling. Place seam down in buttered dish, brush with butter. Bake at 350 degrees for 20 minutes.

BANANA NUT CAKE

- Preheat oven to 30 degrees and grease 3 8-inch layer cake pans.
- 3/4 cup butter
- 3/4 cup honey
- 3 large eggs
- 4 medium-size bananas, mashed (about 1 1/4 cups)
- 1/2 cup chopped nuts
- 3 1/8 cups whole wheat pastry flour
- 1 teaspoon soda
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup yogurt
- 1 teaspoon vanilla

Cream butter, add honey and beat until smooth and light. Add eggs, one by one, beating thoroughly after each addition. Add bananas and nuts.

Mix flour, soda and salt and stir into mixture. Stir in yogurt and vanilla. Pour batter into prepared pans and bake in preheated oven for 30 minutes. Cool layers slightly, then remove from pans and cool completely. Fill and ice with White Frosting or Lemon Icing. Recipes below:

WHITE FROSTING

- 1 cup coconut sugar
 - 2 tablespoons butter, softened
 - 4 tablespoons warm milk or cream
 - 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
 - 2 tablespoons maple syrup or honey
- Blend ingredients thoroughly and spread on cake.

LEMON ICING

- 1/4 cup warmed honey
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice
- 1/8 teaspoon cream of tartar
- Dash of salt
- 1 egg white
- 1 teaspoon grated lemon peel

In the top of a double boiler, mix honey, lemon juice, cream of tartar, salt and egg white. Beat several minutes, then place over boiling water and beat until stiff enough to stand in peaks. This will take about 5 to 8 minutes. Remove from the heat and beat until thick enough to spread. Fold in lemon peel. Note: This is a soft icing and the cake should be used the day it is iced or the icing might soak into the cake.

CHEESE PUFFS

- 1 cup grated cheese
 - 1/8 teaspoon salt
 - 1/4 cup butter
 - 1/2 cup whole wheat flour
- Mix in bowl with fingers and refrigerate 1/2 hour. Form into balls and place on cookie sheet and chill. Bake 10-15 minutes at 350 degrees. Yield: 2 1/2 dozen.

Pecan grafting course slated today, tomorrow

A pecan grafting and budding shortcourse is being hosted today and Friday by the county pecan and fruit committee.

The instructional session will be at 7 p.m. at the 4-H Auditorium, 1626 Midwestern Parkway, Wichita Falls. Field training will follow at 5:30 p.m., Friday, at the Iowa Park Experiment Station. The 5:30 p.m. until dark schedule will enable people to participate after their regular work hours.

Individuals can learn the skill of pecan propagation by attending both of these training events. Today's session will feature close-up slide pictures of grafting while Friday's field work will give everyone a chance to actually bud or graft a pecan tree.

Pecan grafting will be shown and explained by Tim Hunter and Wesley Davis. Budding of pecan shoots will be demonstrated by Virgil Woodfin. He will also show the collection and storage of pecan budding and graft wood, which is done in late February.

Pecan committee members serving as small group leaders at the field exercise include Bob Williamson, Ray Copeland, Hunter, Davis, Woodfin, Agent Don Decker. They will closely supervise as each individual actually buds or grafts a pecan tree.

Pecan propagation is performed while the bark is slipping on the

pecans. This period usually runs from early April until mid-May. When the bark begins to tighten in May, propagation has to be discontinued.

Pecan grafting and budding wood will be available at the field training from members of the pecan committee. This scion wood will be sold at a very nominal cost to those who wish to propagate their own trees.

IRS Tax Tips

COMMERCIAL TAX RETURN PREPARERS REGULATED

If you choose to have your tax return completed by a commercial tax preparer, the IRS notes that you should be aware of certain regulations. In brief, your paid preparer is responsible for providing a copy of the completed return to you when you sign the return. Preparers are required to keep copies of returns or a list containing taxpayers' names and identification numbers for three years. These records must be available for IRS' inspection during this period.

Paid preparers are also required to sign completed returns and to provide their employer identification number on the return.

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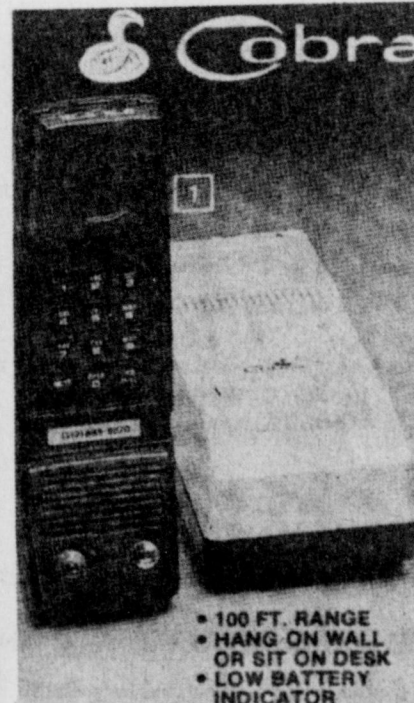

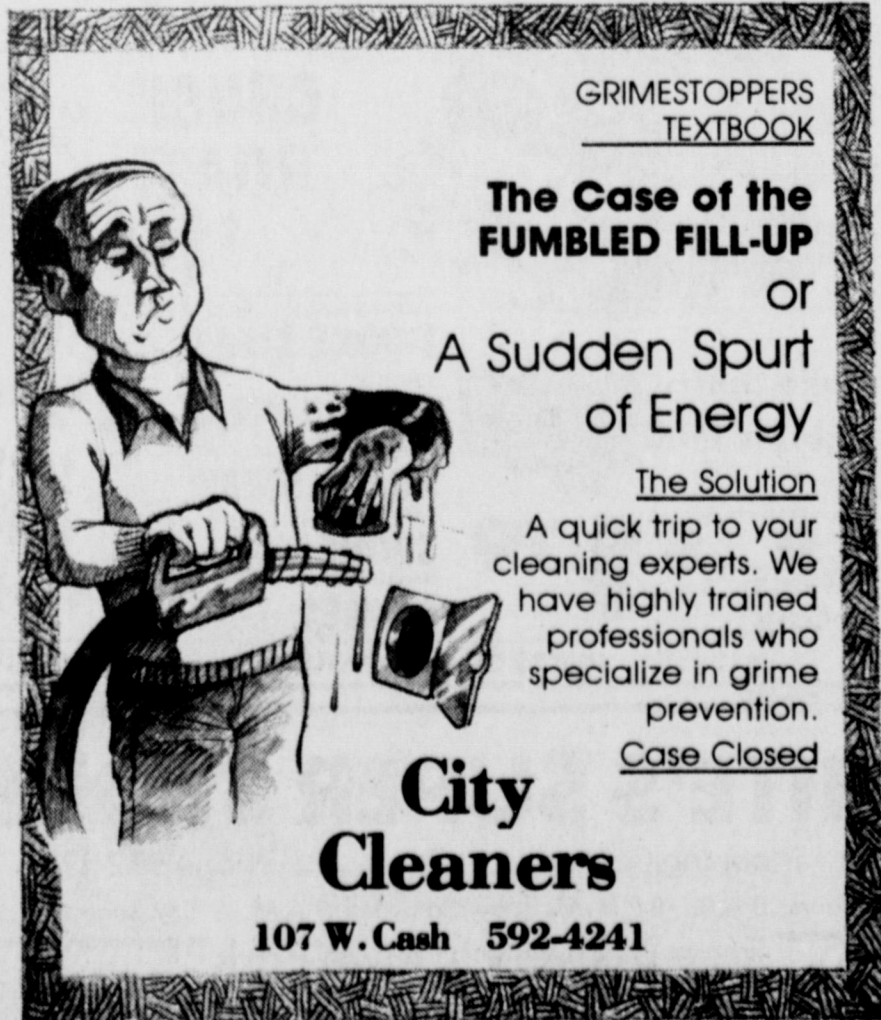
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Hawks win Holliday Relays

Iowa Park took nine firsts, including both relay races, to come away with the second team championship in as many weeks last Saturday at the Holliday Relays.

The Hawks outgained second place Holliday 167-99 in the eight-team meet. The Eagles finished second to Iowa Park a week earlier at the Tiger Relays in Electra. Finishing third was Henrietta with 79, followed by Petrolia, Nocona, Electra, Jacksboro and Archer City.

Steve Stewart, Kevin Parker and John Henderson from Iowa Park and Kevin Blankenship of Holliday were double winners. Stewart placed first in the shot put with a heave of 52-6, his personal best in competition, and first in the discus with a distance of 139 feet, over 10 feet further than the second place finisher.

Parker's 22.87 in the 200-meters was good for first, as was his 11.15 100-meter time, followed closely behind by Mike Toliver of Holliday. Henderson won both the 1600 and 3200-meter runs.

Blankenship, one of the premier hurdlers in District 11-AA, outran Wayne Hodges in the 110-meter high hurdles with a 15.22 clocking, and finished ahead of Francisco of Henrietta for another first in the 300-meter intermediates.

Other first place finishes for Iowa Park included the 1600 and 400-meter relay teams, and Jerry Fairchild in the 800 meter run. Holliday's other firsts came from Barry Hardin in the pole vault, Mike A. Parker in the long jump, and Bruce Bynum in the 400-meter dash.

The Hawks' Brant Baugh finished

second in the 800 meters, and Marc Klinkerman was second in the high jump.

In the junior varsity division,

Holliday placed third and Iowa Park sixth. First place went to Graham with 158 total points, 61 more than second place Petrolia.

Sefcik, Schweiss earn berths

Lisa Sefcik and Sherri Schweiss led the Hawkette track team to sixth place in the Dist. 3-AAAA championships at Gainesville Friday, and qualified for the regional meet.

Sefcik won the long jump and placed second in the hurdles to earn a repeat trip to the regionals, and hopefully again to the state meet.

Schweiss placed second in the 1600 meters, but she was edged by only five seconds at the tape.

Hirsi won the team title with 140 points, followed by Azle 86, Burkburnett 80, Vernon 68, Gainesville 63, Mineral Wells 60, Iowa Park 38 and Boswell 33.

Sefcik, who made it to state last year as a sophomore in the triple jump, scratched on three of her six jumps in that event and could place no higher than third in the finals. Practice had been hampered recently because the pit in Hawk Stadium has been standing in water.

The Hawkette Junior Varsity won its division, amassing 131 points. Boswell followed with 114, Vernon 95, Gainesville 74, Mineral Wells 72, Azle 56, and the other schools failed to field a team.

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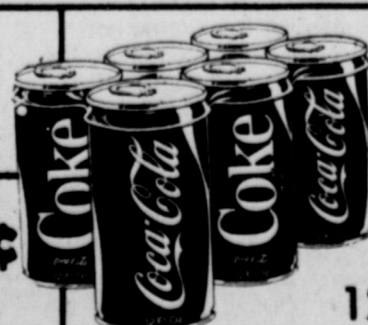

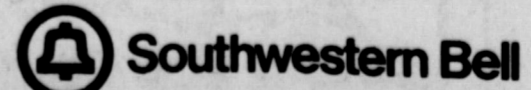
