Pat Hannah releases copy of resignation

Former Iowa Park Police Department officer Pat Hannah this week continues to deny allegations which led to her suspension from the force and states "I was framed."

She was suspended April 8 by Chief of Police Tom Fenley and April 19 submitted her resignation.

The city's first female officer, after serving 24 months in the department, said she has no future plans and admitted she did not know what she was going to do. "My future, at least in this part of the country, as a police officer is apparently ended," she said.

An agreement was reached at the time of her resignation that the city would pay her two weeks severance salary, plus an additional two weeks salary in return for promising she would not in the future attempt to bring any legal action against the municipality or city official.

Hannah released a copy to the Leader of her resignation, which

"On April 8, 1983, I was suspended without compensation by Tom Foley, (the correct name is Tom Fenley) Chief of Police for the City of Iowa Park, Texas.

"As reason for my suspension, it was alleged that I had acted in a manner inappropriate to my office as a police officer for the City of Iowa Park. Texas.

"I have categorically and emphatically denied the allegations made against me and, I do so today.

"I will readily admit that I have been a vocal member of the police department. I would not, I could not stand silently by and watch what was happening within the police department. Perhaps I was too outspoken, perhaps not, but I offer no apologies for my action.

"I am sure that I have detractors within the City of Iowa Park, and I know equally that I have supporters.

"To my detractors, I say: that you have little of which to be satisfied. You have not harmed me nor will you ever hear me say that you have

"To my supporters, I say: thank you for continuing to have faith and belief in me. I did the best that I could

"Since my suspension, I have been under great stress. My family has been subjected to the results of my

"Therefore, in the interest of my family, myself, the police department, and the City of Iowa Park, I am, effective as of this date, resigning my position with the police department of the City of Iowa Park, Texas.

"I am hopeful that the problems within the department can be resolved so that no other officer is forced to endure that which I have

Library progress rapid

'Friends' charter approved; fund balance climbs

Progress on the Tom Buranett Memorial Library has begun to take shape rapidly during the last two

Articles of incorporation of the "Iowa Park Friends of the Library" have already been approved in Austin, and \$51,851.32 in cash and pledges have been received for renovation of the Burnett home.

Headed by a \$10,000 pledge from Texas Electric Service \$18,646.32 was contributed April 17, during the open house and fund-raising program kickoff.

Members of the Friends of the Library are planning to put up a permanent plaque on which names of those who contribute \$1,000 or more. Additionally, a book is planned to be kept in the library in which all memorials will be kept for a permanent record.

Estimated funds needed for the total renovation of the structure was set at \$262,000. However, the initial phase of the project, which basically would be the first floor and bracing for use of the second floor, is estimated in the neighborhood of

"We're well on our way after such a short time," Tim Hunter, finance committee chairman, said. He indicated several other large-dollar pledges are being discussed

Slashings were reported the previous week at 602 S. Park, 602 S. Bond and 811 S. Wall.

A heavy metal piece was reportedly thrown through a double-glass door and struck a desk, causing heavy damage, about 7:52 p.m. Wednesday of last week at 1609 Yucca. Loss of the door was set at \$148 and an estimated \$400 in damage was inflicted on the desk, according to the report filed by Sherwood

City council considers water request

discussed methods through which water service could be extended to Dennis Brooks' property west of the high school.

Monday's meeting was unusual, in that it took less than 27 minutes to complete the agenda.

Brooks' property lies between the Van Horn property and the creek. He explained he was unable to obtain an easement to lay his water line over the private property, and was looking to the city for an avenue along the state right of way along the expressway.

State policy prohibits granting easements to individuals for such projects to parallel state roadways, but municipalities can request and receive such easement.

Brooks asked that the city obtain the permission, and he will pay all expenses for the two-inch line, which

will be metered at the city's edge in front of the high school. He also agreed he would be responsible for

the line after it is laid. Brooks also said he would not allow

anyone to tap the line in the future. City Administrator James Barrington was instructed by the council to have an agreement drafted by Jay Cantrell, city attorney, for approval at the next meeting.

Two resolutions were approved by the council.

One came after a required public hearing concerning use of federal revenue sharing funds to pay for the resurfacing project on West Park.

The other approved replating of lots on Coleman, changing the width of lots on the south side in Block B from 75 feet to 70.

Appointment of Charles R. Brown to replace Herman Escue on the planning and zoning commission was approved by council.

Three bids were submitted on a pickup being sold by the city, ranging from \$150 to \$339, with E.L. French making the highest offer. It was accepted.

Council members took official action to accept resignations of two police department personnel: officer Pat Hannah and radio dispatcher Linda Pendley. Replacement of Pendley by Rick Casper was approved.




Friendly Door News

She has remained free while her case is supposedly being appealed. Saturday night, a man reportedly

came out of 1014 Foley, walked across the street and eventually struck a 15-year-old boy. Statements have been made that

the man is 27-year-old Ricky Dean Alexander, who has had his problems with the local police, and is in fact on parole after serving time for burglary in Wichita Falls.

Alexander is alleged to have been offended by noise made by the youth, Jerry Don Allen Jr., as the latter was talking with a girlfriend between 10:30 and 11 p.m.

Alexander apparently continued to vent his anger after leaving the scene and returning to 1014 Foley, because

early Sunday morning, Wilson called the police station to tell them he had beaten her, broken some ribs, and she didn't want him around any more.

She told police she was calling her attorney to file a restraining order against him. But she did not file a formal complaint with police.

We just don't need this kind of thing in our community.

I fault no one individual, but I do fault the slowness of the courts and the ability of lawyers to have things drug out months on end.

The citizens can complain, the law enforcement people can act, but it is all for nothing unless the courts do their part.

Foley, like all neighborhoods in Iowa Park, is a nice, clean, friendly area inhabited by good families. But it cannot tolerate the lawlessness of the past 16 months.



Cook of the Week

This is the season for fresh strawberries, one of the world's most delectable fruits. Cooks are using them generously as the chief ingredients in cakes, pies, for toppings and ice cream. Some are preserving them to eat with hot biscuits, toast or pancakes now and during the winter months.

This week, Linda (Mrs. Alan) Pfeffer shares her Fresh Strawberry Pie recipe with the Leader readers and many of them will no doubt use it to build up their recipe repertoire.

For ages, many have sung the praises of the strawberry. William Butler wrote Circa 1600 "Doubtless God could have made a better berry, but doubtless God never did." This seems to be the general opinion today; yet it was not until the second half of the last century that it was found readily in the market. The problem was perishability.

There are conflicting accounts of the origin of the strawberry. Prehistoric and historic man may have considered the wild fruit not worth much since it grew on a plant which hugged the ground, was hard to spot and hard to pick. Most of the time, people ate the fruit where it was picked. However, now that they are cultivated, some feel that the domesticated berry does not equal the wild berry in taste. In luxurious restaurants all over the world. gourmets pay premium prices for wild strawberries.

Roger Williams reported in 1643 from Rhode Island "This berry is the wonder of all fruits." Farther south, the Natchez Indians called one of the 13 months into which they divided the year the Strawberry Month. In the early 1800s, they were raised in Philadelphia suburbs close to a concentrated market capable of making it possible to supply the short-lived fruit. It was fashionable for people to frequent the strawberry gardens to eat the delectable fruit; elsewhere strawberries were still a

The availability of the fruit for more people got on its way when the Erie Railroad began to operate in 1847, facilitating the delivery of perishable products. Now with speedy and refrigerated transportation, strawberries are within everybody's reach, and frozen strawberries are available the year round.

- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup water
- 3 Tbsp. cornstarch
- 2 cups sliced strawberries

4 Tbsp. strawberry or raspberry Jello Cook water, sugar and cornstarch until thick. Remove from heat, add Jello and cool. Stir in strawberries and spread in baked pie shell. Chill thoroughly. Served with plain or whipped cream. A graham cracker crust can be used, if preferred.



Bake at 350 degrees 30 minutes or until it bubbles a bit. This can be prepared a day before and refrigerated. Longer cooking time about 40 or 45 minutes.

2-EGG THIN COOKIES

- cup margarine, at room temperature, or half margarine and half butter
- 1 cup granulated sugar
- 1 cup plus 2 tablespoons all-purpose
- flour 1/2 tsp vanilla
- 1/2 tsp lemon extract

Cream the margarine and sugar together until light and fluffy. Beat the eggs until they are light and lemon colored and then mix with the margarine and sugar. Add the flour, vanilla and lemon extract and mix thoroughly.

Using a teaspoon, drop on a well greased cookie sheet. Bake at 375 degrees 8 minutes or until the edges are just beginning to turn brown. Makes 8 dozen thin cookies.

SALMON LOAF WITH EGGS

- 1-1 lb. can salmon
- 3 eggs 1/2 cup milk
- 1/4 tsp salt 1/8 tsp pepper
- 1 Tbsp. onion, finely minced

- 1 tsp lemon juice 3 cups Special K cereal
- Sauce:
- 1/4 cup butter
- 1/4 cup all-purpose flour 1 cup milk
- 1/4 cup salmon liquid 3 (additional) hard-cooked eggs, peeled and finely chopped
- 1 Tbsp lemon juice 1/4 cup parsley, finely chopped

Drain the salmon and reserve the juice. Remove any skin and then flake

the salmon quite finely with a fork. Beat the raw eggs until they are light and lemon colored. Add the eggs to the flaked salmon along with the milk, salt, pepper, onion and lemon juice. Mix all thoroughly. Add the cereal and mix again. Place in a lavishly-buttered loaf pan and bake at 325 degrees one hour.

Melt the butter in a saucepan; stir in the flour and cook over low heat until the mixture begins to bubble. Add the milk and salmon liquid. Continue to cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until mixture has thickened.

Remove the sauce from the heat and stir in chopped eggs and lemon juice. Loosen the salmon loaf with a sharp knife and invert on a heated platter. Pour the egg sauce over the loaf. 





McMurry easy choice for Iowa Park athlete

Marc Klinkerman, a starter on Iowa Park High School's football team the past two years, has it set in his mind that he wanted to try and play college football. But Klinkerman also had a few other criteria he wanted met before accepting the first nibble that came along.

Marc wanted a small school, "a place where I could get along better," he says. And, he wanted a college with a strong academic program where he could concentrate on his anticipated major in computer science and applied mathematics.

And, he wanted some financial aid. .. which he got, and then some, when McMurry College in Abilene selected Marc as one of the first eight recipients of its new William Fletcher McMurry Scholarships, a four-year full tuition and fees package based solely on academic achievement.

"I couldn't believe there could be

such a good deal," says Marc, who passed up football offers from Panhandle State Univ. and several junior colleges. "McMurry had just about everything I wanted. And, with this scholarship, it didn't take me long to accept."

Marc says, aside from the lucrative scholarship, the primary reason he chose McMurry was because he wanted to find a school he liked where he could get in and stay. "I didn't think it would be a very good idea for me to be moving around after two years," he explains.

Then, of course, there's the opportunity to continue his football career. McMurry is a member of the non-scholarship Texas Intercollegiate Athletic Association (TIAA), a league which has enjoyed enormous success since its formation in 1976.

"I really wanted an opportunity to keep playing," Marc admits. "But the academics was the most important thing to me. I was just happy to find a way that I could find both the opportunity to play and a strong academic program."

Marc is looking forward to life on the McMurry campus, also. "Aside from the size of the classes, the thing that impressed me the most was the friendliness of the people there. They really seemed concerned about you. They had a real interest in other people," he says.

Marc first learned of McMurry through Iowa Park basketball coach Earnie Reusch, a McMurry graduate. "I'm really looking forward to it," he

In order to be eligible for the scholarship, which was given to just eight of several applicants, students had to be in the top quarter of their high school graduating class, and have scored exceptionally well on the ACT or SAT tests.

But the applicants were judged on more than just their academic abilities. The McMurry Scholarship Committee looked at the students for signs of leadership ability, strong moral character and other qualities. The students were asked to write a short essay describing themselves, then had to meet with the Committee for a personal interview.

McMurry plans to award eight such scholarships each fall to incoming freshmen. The scholarships are named after former United Methodist Bishop William Fletcher McMurry, after whom the college was named

upon its founding in 1923. McMurry is a four-year liberal arts college located in Abilene, and is owned and operated by the Northwest Texas and New Mexico Conferences of the United Methodist

SOCIAL SECURITY TIPS

EARNINGS REPORTS DUE. MAY AFFECT BENEFITS

Earnings reports are due by April 15 from Social Security beneficiaries who worked last year and earned over the annual earnings limits. The limits were \$6,000 for people 65 and over and \$4,440 for people under age 65. People 72 and over all of last year do not have to file a report of their earnings. Starting in 1983, the age at which the earnings

test does not apply drops to 70. Social Security officials cautioned people to take the time to complete their report as carefully and as accurately as possible. The information which should describe how much a person earned last year and how much he or she expects to earn this year, is used as a basis for determing the benefit amounts due. Benefits are reduced by \$1 for each \$2 in earnings over the exempt amount.




