Scheduled to be held in Hawk Stadium, exercises will be moved into the school's auditorium should weather prevent the traditional outdoor setting. Should it be held in the auditorium, each class member will be issued seven tickets and admission will be by ticket only, according to Bob Dawson, principal.

The commencement address this year will be given by Dr. Roy Boutwell, president of the board of trustees.

Presentation of the class will be made by Dawson to Supt. Harold Cowley. Presentation of diplomas will be made by Boutwell and Rex Wells.

Following the traditional presentation of the Senior Class Key by class president Robby Hausler, school counselor Herman Escue will make the presentation of honors.

The invocation will be given by Kevin Parker and John Henderson will offer the benediction. Special music, processional and recessional will be played by the Hawk Band.

Organizing library postponed two weeks

Due to a lack of a quorum at Thursday's meeting, the Friends of the Library postponed election of officers and adoption of by-laws until 7 p.m. next Thursday.

A slate of officers will be submitted next week by the nominating committee, composed of Tim Hunter,

In other business, aldermen approved abandonment of road easement in Block 75 on East Bank, and the advertisement for bids to purchase another pickup, but took no action on a request to provide water for a home west of the city.

In response to a petition of property owners on the south side of the 800 block on East Bank, the council abandoned 16 feet of road easement. The street is dedicated 75 feet wide, but only the north portion of the easement is paved and used.

Recommended by the Parks Board,

the city will advertise for a small-size pickup to be used by the parks department.

Richard Schroeder explained he was considering purchase of land on which to build his home northwest of the rest stop west of the city. He proposed locating the meter at the entrance of Quail Valley and extending his own line 1.5 miles to the site.

One alderman, however, pointed out that Quail Valley was not in the city limits and to comply with council policy the meter would have to be located at the city limits, which is on the west side of Park Tank Truck Service.

No further discussion was held on the subject.

Administrator James Barrington told the council of contact he had with representatives of the Texas Highway Department, informing him of 100-percent funds available for work on the urban transit system (federal) for street improvements.

He explained no specific amount of money was available, but the city could submit two project proposals, one "substantial" and the other "minor." ~~At a previous meeting, the council instructed Barrington to prepare the request. Streets mostly mentioned were Wall, Victoria, East Washington and Texowa.~~

The council approved a resolution upholding Barrington's decision to terminate Randy Russell as a police officer. Russell had been suspended earlier by Barrington and the resolution came following a hearing with Russell, Chief Tom Fenley and the administrator.

Provided with a list of items and projects sought for funding in the 1983-84 budget for the police and public works departments, aldermen discussed with the department heads the various listings. More discussion will be held when the items are listed by priority and estimated costs.

Bookkeeper arrested on charge of forgery

The bookkeeper of a local automobile dealer was arrested last Wednesday afternoon on a charge of forgery.

Jean Kelley, a Wichita Falls resident, reportedly remains in Wichita County jail in lieu of \$10,000 bond set by Justice of the Peace Arch Greenwood.

Bates-Barrios Chevrolet complained Mrs. Kelley was forging checks on the business, and officers took her into custody at 4:37 p.m. the day the complaint was filed.

Though investigation continued as late as yesterday by the Iowa Park Police Department, the amount taken is estimated as high as \$18,000.

Mrs. Kelley allegedly made the checks out to herself after they had been consigned by one of the owners, and would turn them in for cash at the bank.

She is said to have been involved in a similar scheme while employed some four years ago by an oil company in Wichita Falls. Discovery was not made of the loss until she had left employment there, but a charge reportedly was filed May 5 in that case.

Two other cases, one theft and one

criminal mischief, were reported to police during the past week.

A citizen reported seeing two individuals attempting to remove a red warning light at the Yosemite railroad crossing, and reported the vehicle was a 1976 Chevrolet with license number MXR 670. Two suspects have been named.

Genia Chaffin, 809 Van Horn, told police someone removed two valuable rings from her residence sometime between March and last week. Estimated value was not given.

Free swimming for pool opening

If the temperature is as hot as usual, there'll be a lot of smiling faces and wet bodies Sunday and Monday.

Iowa Park Bicentennial Swimming Pool officially opens Sunday, and no admission will be charged the public both that day and Monday, which is Memorial Day.

The pool will observe its regular hours of 1 to 6 p.m. It will be open seven days a week through the summer.

Admission this year will be \$1.50, with children five years of age and under admitted free if accompanied by a paid adult.

Season tickets are \$50. A book of 10 admission tickets will be sold for \$12.50.

Special rates are offered for child and day-care centers: 50-cents for children five and under; 75-cents six and older.

A special swim period will be available from 10:30 a.m. to noon each weekday. Admission will be \$1 per person.

The pool is available for private parties at \$20 per hour plus a lifeguard fee. Minimum rental time is two hours.

Two Red Cross certified swimming lesson sessions will be offered during the summer. The first will be June 13-24 and the second July 11-22. Both sessions are weekdays only. Choice of hours include 6-7 and 7-8 p.m. Cost will be \$10 per student.

The pool, located south of the west parking lot at the high school, is jointly operated by the school and city. It was built and dedicated during
