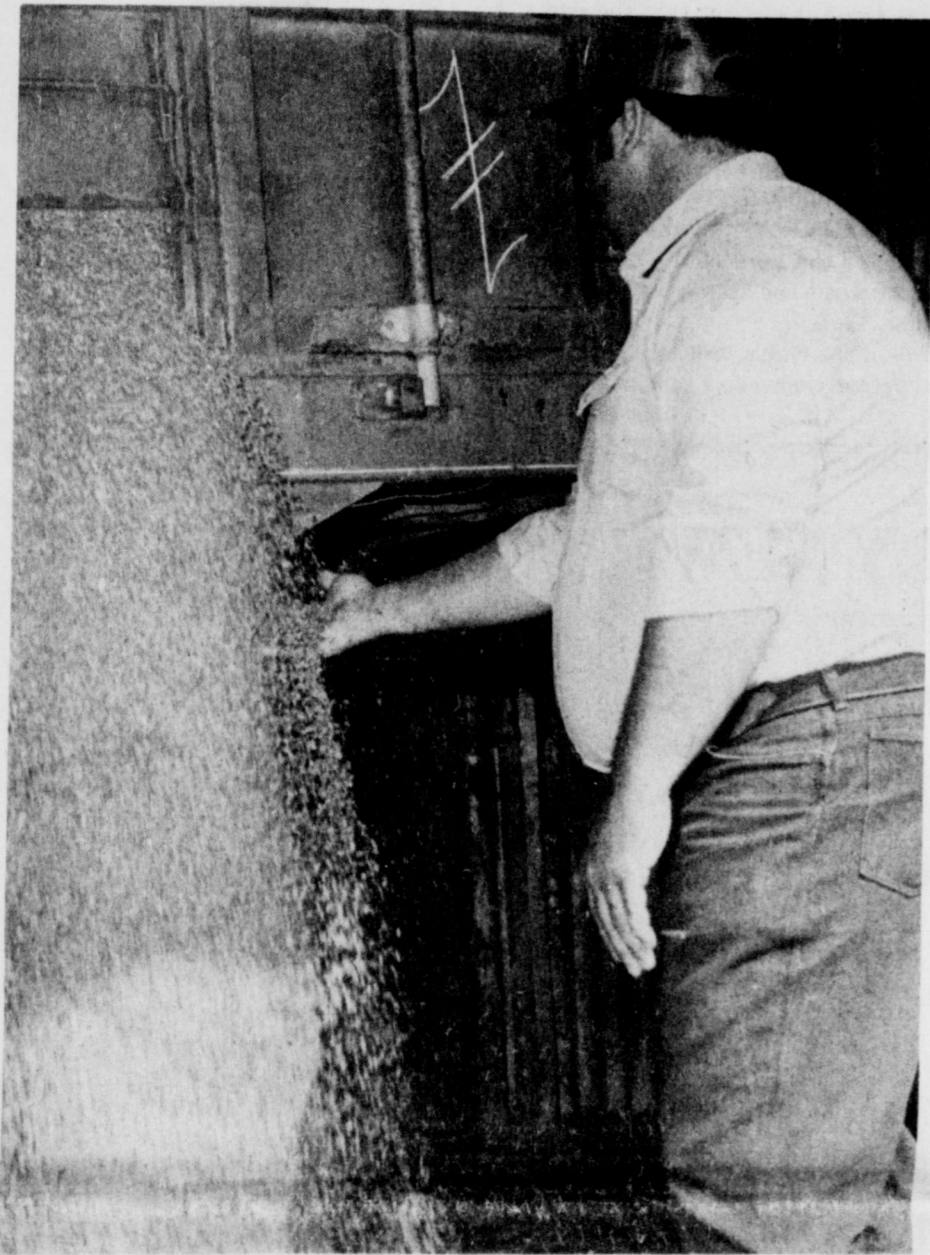

## Iowa Parkans plead guilty

Two Iowa Park men and one from Wichita Falls received prison sentences in federal court yesterday morning after each had entered guilty pleas.

Jim McClendon pleaded guilty to two counts of fraud by mail and was sentenced to four years in prison. Four of the six counts on which he had been indicted were dropped by the government.

Arthur Peevey received a two-year sentence after pleading guilty to "misprison of a felony." The term is used in a case when a person knows of a felony being committed, does not participate, but does not report it to authorities.

Steven McInturff of Wichita Falls pled guilty to one count of mail fraud and received a three-year sentence.

McClendon and Peevey are to report to a federal minimum security facility, yet to be designated, June 15; McInturff June 30.

The trial opened and closed yesterday morning in Wichita Falls federal court, at which the guilty pleas were entered and sentences assessed.

## School board sets meeting

The second called meeting in two weeks has been scheduled Tuesday evening by the Iowa Park school board.

Trustees met in an early-morning session Thursday, and are to meet again at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday at which the only item on the agenda will be "personnel," according to Supt. Harold Cowley. The board's regular monthly meeting is held the second Tuesday of each month.

At Thursday's meeting, all high school coaches, band director and choir director were given a \$500 salary increase for their 1983-84 contracts. Junior high coaches and band directors receive a \$250 salary increase.

Trustees accepted the lowest of two bids to cover the concrete floor of Bradford Elementary's physical education building.

Leago Inc. of Wichita, Kan. offered to cover the structure's floor with the same material as was used in the new gymnasium at high school, for \$15,850. Board members expressed relief, having heard estimates of at least \$17,000 to do the project.

Cowley confirmed an earlier report that an audit was underway of the school's cafeteria system, "as part of next year's budget preparation process."

## Watch program draws crowd

Interest in organizing a Neighborhood Watch Program in Iowa Park is apparently strong, according to the turnout at the initial meeting held Thursday.

Twenty-five persons, representing 17 families, turned out for the meeting at which Don Decker and Bill Curry were named co-chairmen.

Another meeting will be held in the near future -- in two or three weeks -- at which time block captains will be named, Police Chief Tom Fenley said.

The police department is assisting in the organizational process and providing materials to be used. Fenley said a film will also be shown at the next meeting.

### Church building dedication set

Dedication services for the new Pacific Avenue Missionary Baptist Church building will begin Saturday at 10:30 a.m. and the afternoon services will start at 1:30 o'clock.

Construction of the new facility, located at 1400 N. Pacific, was begun in March 1982. The major part of the construction was done by congregation members, and members of the sponsoring church, Unity Baptist Church in Wichita Falls.

Two former pastors of the sponsoring church, Revs. J.B. Reagan and John P. Jones, will be guest speakers during the dedication services. Luther Crawford, secretary/treasurer of missions for the Texas Missionary Baptist Association, will also take part in the services.

The public is invited to attend the services, according to Rev. Larry Washburn, pastor.

### Employees' purses reported stolen

Purses of two White Super Store employees were reported stolen between 2 and 3 p.m. Saturday afternoon, according to police reports.

The purses, left in the office cubical, belonged to Sondra Thomp-

son and Betty Reed. One contained \$15 cash and total loss was set at \$74, while the other contained \$180 cash and total value of \$216.

### Library officer election tonight

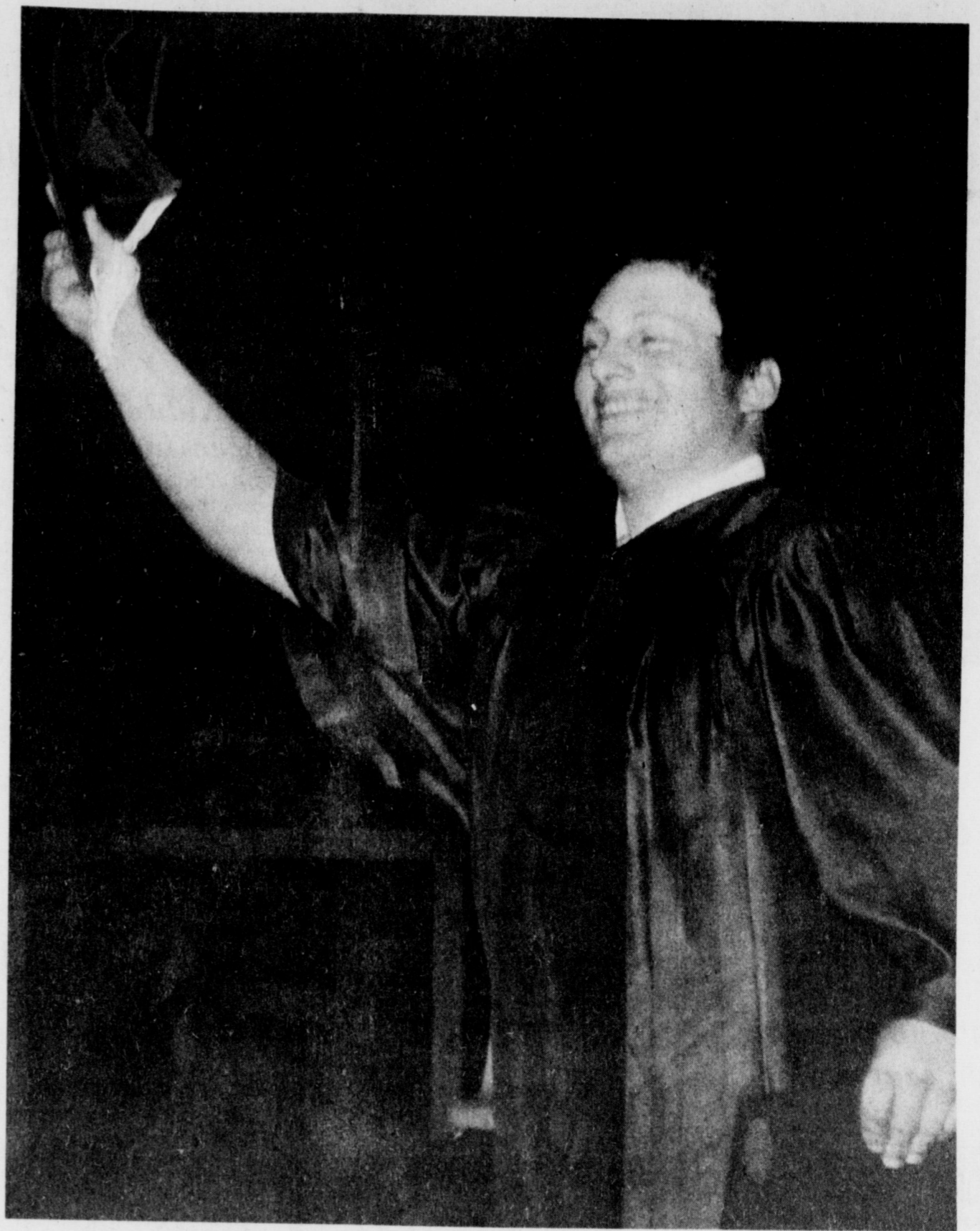
Election of officers of the Iowa Park Friends of the Library is scheduled to be held at 7 this evening in city council chambers.

## GRADUATION

### Speaker urges seniors to become 'dues-paying citizens'

"Tonight is the last time all of you will be together at the same place and the same time, the rest of your lives, and that's sad," Dr. Roy Boutwell told members of Iowa Park High School graduating class during commencement exercises Friday evening.

Boutwell, president of the school's board of trustees, gave the traditional commencement address. He said he spoke as a school official as well as being a graduating student's parent and longtime friend to many in the class.

With the cooperation of the weather, exercises were held in Hawk Stadium before one of the largest crowds to ever attend such an event in Iowa Park. Because the field was saturated from recent rains, class members remained on the all-season track, rather than the traditional filing across the field from the south side.

Diplomas were presented to 126 graduates. There was

actually 127 graduating, but one opted to not participate in the ceremony.

Boutwell's address, he pointed out, did not follow most traditional commencement talks during which graduates were "challenged to succeed in the uncertain future world as an adult."

He spoke on three primary topics, all of which are "dues-paying" obligations as good citizens: voting, serving when called and not drinking while driving.

He was interrupted at one point in his address when he said draft dodgers from the Vietnam era shouldn't have been given amnesty, but rather "permanent revocation of citizenship and permanent residency in Canada."

At another point, he said, "If you don't (vote), you are giving someone else the responsibility of determining your future by giving them your proxy."

He encouraged the class members to "be dues-paying members of society and be

active."

Reminding the group of a party planned following the exercises, he made the point "It is becoming socially unacceptable to drink and drive."

Herman Escue announced the top 10 scholastic members of the class, all of whom had a four-year average of 92.5 or above, and pointed out that 23 students in the class had averages of 90 and higher.

Top 10 students, in order, were James Cowley, Lori Barr, Kent Roberts, Robby Hausler, Jeff Lawson, Deborah Thomas-Darla Flick, Lisa Yeakley, Harlan Kidd and Lorraine Kirkhart.

During his portion on the program, Principal Bob Dawson made humorous reference to "blank certificates" to be handed out to the graduates. He later explained the certificates were exchanged for the real graduate certificates when the seniors turned in their rented caps and gowns.

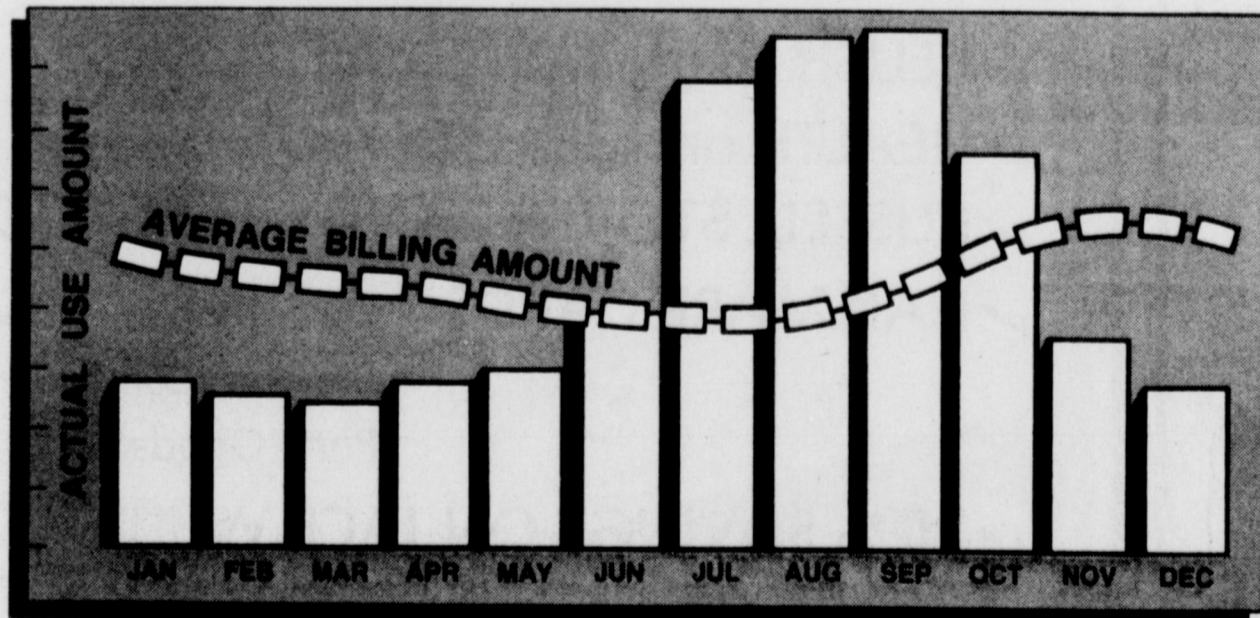

One of Danette (Mrs. Bob) Foley's recipes for this week is a \$10,000 winner, "Capital Chicken Casserole", which calls for artichoke hearts, an ingredient that has not appeared too frequently in the Cook of the Week recipes. However, artichokes have been a part of cookery for hundreds of years and are a very important part of modern day cuisine.

By 1400, the wild artichoke had been discovered and the globe artichoke was being cultivated in Italy. Moderate temperatures and the humid climate along the coastal areas of France, Spain and other Mediterranean and Near Eastern countries provided excellent growing conditions for the vegetable and row upon row could be seen for miles. It has been a favorite of kings and courts ever since.

Much to his delight, Henry VIII was introduced to artichokes on one of his European sojourns, and he brought back the gourmet discovery to his countrymen. Spanish explorers in Calif. discovered the ideal locale for artichoke cultivation in the area known today as Castroville, "Artichoke Capital of the World." Just south of San Francisco, the tiny town grows most of the nation's supply on 10,000 acres.

Danette was graduated from Atlanta, Ga. High School and received a degree in nursing from DeKalb College. She is presently working in ICU at Bethania Hospital. - 6 medium baking potatoes

  - 1/2 cup butter or margarine

  - 1/2 cup evaporated milk, or coffee rich
  - 1/4 tsp crushed basil leaves
  - 1/4 tsp. crushed tarragon leaves
  - 1 tsp salt
  - Butter or margarine
- Scrub potatoes thoroughly and rub skins with oil. Bake at 400 degrees for 1 hour or until done; allow to cool to touch. Slice skin away from top of each potato; carefully scoop out pulp, leaving skins intact. Mash pulp; add 1/2 cup of butter, onion, parsley, milk and seasonings to the pulp, mixing well. Stuff shells with potato mixture, and dot with butter. Bake at 350 degrees 30 minutes. Yield: 6 servings.

### FRESH VEGETABLE SALAD

- 1 tub cherry tomatoes
- 1 box mushrooms
- 3 bunches of broccoli

- 3 carrots, sliced
- 1 head of cauliflower, broken into pieces

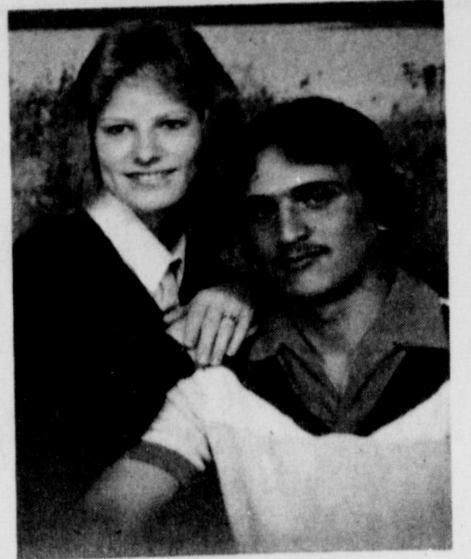
- Wash and put into bowl; add:
- 1 cup cider vinegar
- 1 cup salad oil
- 1/2 cup water
- 1 heaping tablespoon sugar
- 1 tablespoon accent
- 1 heaping tablespoon dill seed
- 1 teaspoon salt

- 1 teaspoon garlic salt
- 1 teaspoon onion salt

Mix together and pour over vegetables. Toss and refrigerate for several hours, preferably overnight. Toss from time to time until all vegetables are flavored and seasoned.

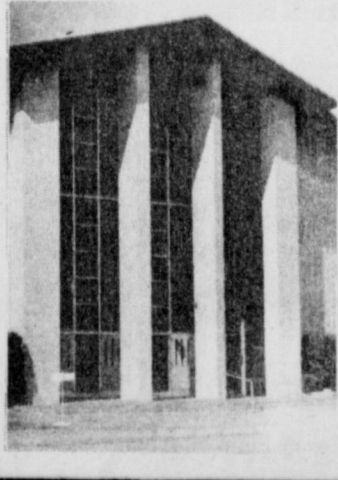

## SOCIAL SECURITY TIPS

### SSI REDETERMINATION

Each person receiving a Supplemental Security Income check is required, when notified by his local Social Security office, to complete a review of his eligibility. This review, or redetermination, is used by Social Security to determine whether the Supplemental Security Income payments have been correct for the past year, and how much the payments should be in future months.

An SSI recipient who has been asked to come into the Social Security office for a redetermination interview should be aware that this review is required if he is to continue to receive Supplemental Security Income

checks. However, the review can be completed by telephone if necessary.

To complete the redetermination, the Social Security office will need proof of all income—earned and unearned—that has been received in the last year. Some of the acceptable proofs are wage statements, W-2 forms, award letters, and cancelled checks. For many recipients, proof of the household expenses (rent or mortgage payment and utility bills) are also required.

# Spray this week for casebearer

The expected spray dates for the year-end casebearer is June 1-5. This information is based on the number of day degrees accumulated in the Jim Guthrie orchard, west of Waterloo Falls. Day degrees is a temperature unit. The first day entry is expected to occur when 2200 day degrees have accumulated.

Timing of the casebearer control application is critical. Treatment must be made after the moths have

deposited their eggs on the tips of the little nutlets, but before the worms enter the nutlets. After the worms get into the nutlets, chemicals can no longer reach them going little control.

Zelone is the chemical recommend-

ed for the control of the casebearer. However it is advisable to add 0.25% of 0.25% for some insects like defoliation and tentative (tentative) for some insects. All these materials can be mixed and sprayed at the same time.

Recommended rates for a 100 gallon mix is 1.5 to 2.0 parts of Zelone, 2 pounds of 0.25%, and 1/2 pound of tentative. On a one gallon basis, this figure one teaspoon of Zelone, 1 tablespoon of 0.25%, and one teaspoon of tentative.
