TESCO seeks 16.1% increase

Texas Electric Service Company will file today a request for a 16.1 percent systemwide increase in revenues.

The request will be filed with cities served by Texas Electric and with the Public Utility Commission in Austin. It would provide an additional \$195 million in revenues if approved as requested.

"We have worked hard through the years to give our customers reliable service at the lowest reasonable rates," said Jack Redding, TESCO manager in Wichita Falls.

For example, he said, the company saw in the late 1960s that natural gas would become much more expensive, and it began a program to build new

power plants that could use cheaper fuels.

The company now has eight generating units fueled by lignite coal in operation.

"These lignite plants have saved our customers about \$750 million just since 1972, compared to what they would have paid for the same amount of electricity produced with market-priced natural gas," Redding said.

"Our construction program has worked. Our customers now benefit from electric bills that are lower than they would have been otherwise -- lower than the national average and among the lowest in Texas. And these savings will continue to grow," he said.

"Because of these benefits to our customers, we want to make sure the construction program keeps moving

forward."

The company's major construction project, its Comanche Peak nuclear plant, is scheduled to begin producing electricity next year.

"This will be a milestone in energy production for a large part of Texas," Redding said. He noted that throughout Comanche peak's service life, customers will see the benefits of its cheap nuclear fuel -- currently about 70 cents per million BTU, compared to \$3.65 for natural gas.

TESCO's 48-county service area is growing rapidly. The company has added more than 90,000 new customers in the past four years, more than 20,000 in 1982 alone.

"We are in a good position to handle this growing need for electricity, primarily because we began our program to build new

Trustees delay action after executive session

No action was taken by the Iowa Park school board following a 2:22 executive session Tuesday night, but board president Roy Boutwell issued a brief statement.

Tuesday's meeting was a called session, and Boutwell's statement merely announced the board's

intentions to hold another special meeting at 7:30 p.m. Monday, even though the board intends to hold its regular monthly meeting the following evening.

"The board received a preliminary audit and Bill Steger's letter (of resignation). We decided not to take any action on either one. We'll meet Monday at 7:30 p.m. and have more input, and at that time we will take action," Boutwell said.

At issue is Steger's resignation and an audit being conducted by school district auditor Nayland Smith into the school's food service department.

Boutwell announced also the appointment of Allen Shewmake as deputy tax collector. Shewmake has been a full-time employee in the tax office since summer of 1970.

Steger, who was hired in 1966, has served as head of the tax office, as well as transportation department and food service department.

Numerous rumors have been flitting throughout the community

the past two weeks concerning Steger and the food service department.

Meeting most of the executive session with board members were Supt. Harold Cowley, Smith and his son Randy, a partner in Smith's accounting firm, and Michael Spurgers, attorney for the firm of Fillmore, Purtle and Lee representing the school.

Shewmake was called into the meeting for a brief time, and left. Cowley and Spurgers left the room at 9:25 and returned just before the meeting was reopened to the public.

The subject has attracted considerable attention from media in Wichita Falls. Seven persons connected with media from the neighboring community were present at the beginning of the meeting, but four left midway through the closed session.

Steger, who reportedly has been out of town, was not present at the meeting.

City, school meetings planned next week

After a lengthy delay, the annual city audit for 1982-83 will be received during a regularly-scheduled meeting of the council at 7 p.m. Monday in council chambers.

The following evening at 7:30, school trustees have scheduled their regular monthly meeting in the administration building, and will hear a report on last year's TABS testing. The principal member of the firm which audits the city's books forced the delay in completion.

Two public appearances are on Monday's agenda. L.T. Kingcade is to seek an adjustment to his water bill and a request for the city to abandon 25 feet in the 500 block of North Park will be sought by Ithama Jolly and Sonny Fuller.

Aldermen will take action on appointments to two boards: one to the Friends of the Library for a one-year term; four to the electrical board, two-year terms.

Authorization to purchase a pickup for the parks department, using a bid which was previously authorized, will be considered.

Also to be considered will be the annual leasing of grazing rights at the sewer treatment plant site, and a request to advertise for bids for remodeling a portion of city hall.

An executive session is on the agenda, during which council members will discuss salaries of personnel for the coming year, which is related to the upcoming budget

preparation.

Administrator James Barrington is to report to the council that the county proposes a weight limitation for trash hauling vehicles to the proposed new sanitary landfill.

School trustees, other than studying the TABS report, will consider resignations and elections of personnel. University Interscholastic League, Interscholastic and Region Nine service and circulation fees.

Youthful vandals invade building

Vandals, including at least one small child, Monday night invaded the metal building on the Valley View school campus which headquarters the West Wichita Cooperative, according to John Sibley, director.

Damage was considered light, but realization of potential damage has caused considerable concern among school personnel.

Initial entry was made through an eight and one half inch wide opening. That, plus the fact the subjects made hot chocolate to drink while consuming donuts from the refrigerator, is why a small child is suspected.

A small amount of change was missing from desks, but no major cash was taken, nor was any damage inflicted to records or equipment.

Some papers were burned, apparently for light by which to see, and numerous unusual-sized burnt matches were left behind.

Vandals cause city problems

Vandalism was the major problem for the police department during the past week.

Between 1:10 and 2:23 a.m. yesterday, someone removed plugs from three fire hydrants, causing street flooding and reducing water in overhead storage to a dangerously low level, as well as damaging one street.

Hydrants were expelling water at peak capacity at the intersections of Cash and Bond, Magnolia and West Highway and Access Road and Cornelia.

Vandals also caused considerable work and expense at two swimming pools sometime Saturday night.

Lawn chairs, hoses and a lawnmower were thrown into the Woodbriar Apartments pool. It cost an estimated \$175 just by polluting the 65,000 gallons of water in the pool with gasoline and oil from the mower.

Considerable damage was done at the city pool at high school, though no report was available. The same evening as the Woodbriar pool was hit, someone threw numerous items in the city pool, as well as damaging the dressing room building, according to one source.

Someone broke a Lone Star Gas Co. meter at 306 W. Lafayette between 7 and 7:30 p.m. Tuesday. Cost of repair was set at \$75.

Mrs. E.C. Smith, 404 W. Lafayette, said someone took a \$169 Sears lawnmower sometime Monday night.

Getting to know 'Mr. Dawson'

Mr. Dawson has a marvelous dry humor when speaking of his 26 years in the Iowa Park school system. When asked if he really enjoys his job, he threw his head back and laughed heartily and said, "No, not really. Well, at least not all the time." He hurried on to say that there are enjoyable times, and that being around young people has kept him from going stale.

Dawson rubs elbows with our youth everyday, and he says the kids of today are not near as bad as people like to think. "Our kids have entirely too much bad publicity, some folks, just like to fuss." Iowa Park High School has approximately 525 students enrolled, and, Bob says "They can't all be perfect all the time, but, they are not all bad by any means."

Bob Dawson came to Iowa Park after serving as principal in Kennett, Missouri seven years. If you catch

just a little southern drawl in his speech, it might be because he was raised along the Mississippi River in a little town called Hayti, Missouri.

Since graduating from high school Bob has had only one other occupation. One summer he worked for the Missouri Health Department on the exterminating crew. There had been a flare up of malaria along the Mississippi River that summer, so it was his job to go along all over the county and line up the houses to be sprayed the following day and advise the people when the crew would arrive.

When asked what he does in his leisure time, Dawson says he probably would be found reading or watching sports on television.

A little note of loneliness in Dawson's conversation developed in his account of the closing of school for the summer. He explained that the administrative crew remains one week after the closing of school to record grades etc., then he remains

another 10 days wrapping things up for the year. It's on this note he leans back in his chair, chuckles deeply again and says "Sometimes I just have to get up and walk, I just can't hardly stay with it."

Dawson is a true lover of sports, his account of the most interesting thing that has happened since he has been here was the victory over Gainesville in football in 1982.

He said, "I was at the game when we won the championship in 1969, I was also at the game when we tied for the championship in 1970, but neither of those games was as exciting as that Gainesville game, it's a time I'll never forget."

Dawson is a religious man. He is a deacon at the First Baptist Church, also a Sunday School teacher and member of the choir.

When asked for the single idea that he would like to instill in the minds of young people if he could, he thought long and hard, and said "I would just like for them to realize that

everything in this life is not fun or entertaining. It seems like in the day we live, young people and adults alike look for amusement or entertainment in everything they do. But if it involves hardship or an inconvenience, they simply don't want to do it."

He then repeated as if to really emphasize his point, "I would just like for them to realize that everything simply cannot be entertaining and that there are places in life that will be quite to the contrary." Then with all his candor he said "Sometimes I feel like I am talking to a brick wall."

At this point Dawson was asked, "If you had one last word to say to the citizens of Iowa Park, what would you say?"

He became very serious and said "I just wish people could really appreciate what they have here in this school, with all the things that have been made available to them, and realize the sacrifices that some people have made to make it so."

McIlroy, Guyette recite nuptials here Saturday

The sunlight streaming through the stained glass windows mingled with candlelight to accentuate the beauty of the altar decorations at First Baptist Church for the Saturday afternoon wedding of Miss Meri Lynne McIlroy and Russell Mark Guyette.

The altar space was centered with a brass arch interwoven with fresh sprengeri fern dotted with pink starburst mums and baby's breath. On either side tall cathedral candles glowed in fan-shaped candelabra. At the extreme right and left sides of the altar the tapers burned in spiral candelabra. Each group of candle holders and the face-to-face white cushioned prie dieu in front of the arch were decorated with sprengeri fern and baby's breath. Potted palms provided low accent in the main altar.

On each side of the steps leading to the altar stood tall white baskets that served as containers for artistic arrangements of pink gladioli and carnations, white spider and starburst mums, asteria lilies and Boston fern.

In the outer altar, seven-branched brass footed candelabra held cathedral candles banked with flowers duplicating those in the basket arrangements. These were placed in front of the organ and piano. The sacredness of the marriage was emphasized in the three-branched candlestick also in the outer altar that held the unity candle for the couple to light after the minister had introduced them as Mr. and Mrs. Russell Mark Guyette.

Complementing the altar decorations were the votive cup pew markers throughout the sanctuary, each arrayed with pink and white

As guests arrived for the wedding, they registered at a round table covered with white lace draped with pink net accented with pink silk bows centered with white starburst mums and baby's breath. Interest in the appointments centered around the couple's wedding invitation that had been hand painted with delicate flowers, framed and placed on a gold easel. The table also held the wedding book and pink plume pen. Miss Dana Hicks directed signatures of the guests and Gregg Carpenter, the bride's cousin, handed the couple's wedding scrolls to them.

The music impressed guests and wedding participants as one of the most memorable parts of the service. Mrs. Bill Bates, organist, introduced the prelude music with organ selections to include "To a Wild Rose," "Arioso," "Liebestraum." She and Mrs. Glenn Schell, pianist, were featured in two duet numbers, "The Swan" and "Pan Angelicus." Mrs. Bates furnished accompaniment for a trumpet solo, "We've Only Just Begun" by Rusty Stowe, then played "Prelude in Classic Style" for the professional.

Perhaps the part of the music most worthy of remembering was when the bride and groom knelt on the prayer bench after her father had presented her in marriage for her parents and sang a duet "The Wedding Prayer," a surprise to all except the minister and organist. Miss Jane Dickey sang "The Lord's Prayer" when the couple knelt again at the close of the ceremony, and Mrs. Bates played "Recessional" for the exit of the wedding party.

The bride shone in an aura of beauty as she walked down the aisle to the altar with her father, pausing by her mother's pew to say "I love you" with a long stemmed red rose.

The gown that she chose for the special day in her life was a romantic impression of white Chantilly lace detailed with rich reemboirdered Alencon lace sprinkled with seed pearls and iridescents at the Queen Anne neckline and over the fitted bodice. The two-layered sleeves featured tight English net sleeves overlaid with three quarter length sheer embroidered sleeves bordered with wide scalloped ruffles. From there, tight embroidered sleeves extended to the wrists.

A satin sash hugged the bride's tiny waistline and tied in a soft bow in the back to lend itself to a deep sheer yoke below the neckline and enhance the delicacy of the gown. The skirt was delightfully nostalgic with

Cook of the Week

Summer is the time for ice cream and homemade ice cream is a delicious and sumptuous dessert. The electrification of the old-time ice cream freezer has made the process of freezing it quite simple and is largely responsible for the current enthusiasm of homemade ice cream.

In history, ice cream dates to the 13th century when Marco Polo returned to Italy from the Orient with tales of men eating ices flavored with exotic fruits. In the late 1700s George Washington and Thomas Jefferson popularized ice cream in America, and when Dolly Madison put it on the table as a dessert, it was considered a confection.

The first ice cream freezer suitable for family use was invented in 1846, and taking a turn at the crank allowed everyone to participate. The ice cream had its heyday in the Victorian era around the turn of the century, then interest dwindled for a while but was revived when the electric refrigerator with its freezing compartment was in common use during the 1930s and 40s, and recipes were adapted for its use.

Mrs. Reba Snow's Banana Split Ice Cream recipe this week is sure to find

its way in the dessert files of many homemakers.

Mrs. Snow, who resides on Farm Road 369, has lived in the area a great deal of the time since 1940. After moving back to Iowa Park, she owned the Country Acres Restaurant, specializing in cat fish, for three years.

BANANA SPLIT ICE CREAM

4 eggs, beaten
1 1/2 qts. half and half-milk and cream
2 cups sugar
Pinch salt
1/2 tsp. vanilla
1 cup mashed or chopped bananas, sprinkled with 2 tbs. lemon juice
1/2 cup pecans
1/2 cup chopped maraschino cherries
1/2 cup frozen strawberries
1/2 cup crushed pineapple
If freezer isn't full as you like, add a little milk. Freeze.

DELICIOUS SWISS STEAK

2 lbs. round steak, 1-inch thick
1/4 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. seasoned salt
Pepper to taste
1/4 cup flour
3 T oil
2 cups canned tomatoes
1-6 oz. can tomato paste
1 onion, chopped
1 paste can water

Cut meat into serving pieces. Sprinkle with salt, seasoned salt and pepper and pound in flour. Brown meat in hot oil in heavy skillet. Add tomatoes, tomato paste, onion and water. Cover and simmer for 2 hours or until done, stirring occasionally. Yield: 6 servings.

FRUIT COCKTAIL CAKE

Mix:
2 cups flour
2 cups sugar
2 tsps. soda
Add one number 3 can fruit cocktail to flour mixture. Add 2 eggs and mix well. Bake in large loaf pan at 350 degrees about 50 minutes.

ICING:
1 1/2 cups sugar
1 stick oleo
1 cup evaporated milk
Cook 2 minutes and add 1 small can crushed pineapple, juice and all. Pour

over hot cake and punch holes in the cake for it to be moist.

DATE LOAF CANDY

3 cups sugar
1 T butter
1 cup dates
1/2 cup evaporated milk
1/2 cup water
1/4 tsp salt
1 cup chopped maraschino cherries
1 tsp vanilla
1 cup marshmallows
1 cup coconut
1 cup chopped nuts
Boil sugar, water, milk, butter and salt to softball stage; test in a cup of cold water. Add cherries and dates, boil to hard ball stage; then add coconut, marshmallows, vanilla and nuts. Beat until stiff. Pour on wet cloth and roll into a large roll.
Let stand in refrigerator until firm. Cut in pieces desired and wrap in foil or saran wrap.

SWEET PICKLE PEACHES

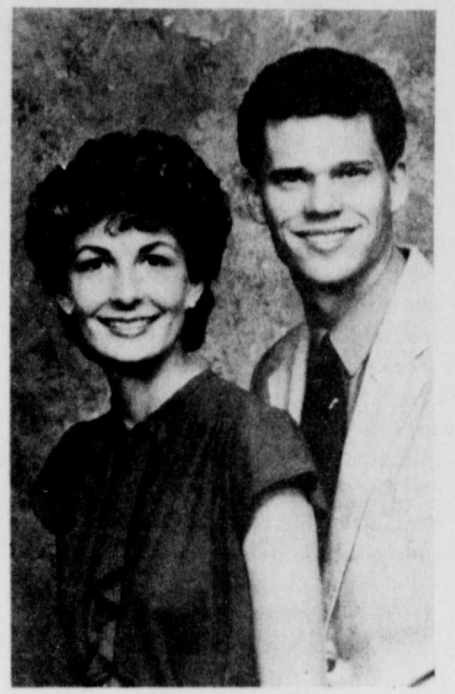
Peel about 50 or 55 peaches.
Mix in a pan large enough to boil this amount of peaches:
2 cups sugar
2 cups vinegar
2 cups water
Stir well and put on stove to let sugar melt. Add peaches to mixture and boil until peaches are tender. Put the peaches in jars, add a few whole cloves to each jar, then pour liquid in jars to cover peaches. Seal tight.

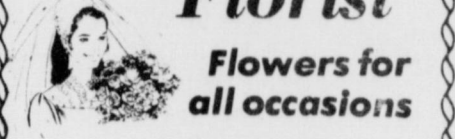

As I See It....

There is no question, Americans are growing older.

Only a decade or so ago, someone released statistics about how young Americans were. If memory serves me correctly, they were saying 60 percent of the population was younger than 25 years of age.

While most of that group is still around, though 10 years or more older, the fact is, there are more senior citizens than school age people in our country now.

No, I have no statistics to prove it, but there are a number of points which would seem to support the claim.

First of all, enrollment in schools is down virtually every place you look.

Just like here in Iowa Park. Both in town and over the rural area, there are approximately 40 percent more residences and apartments than existed back in 1971. Yet we have 500 fewer students.

The Friendly Door has more members than is enrolled in high school, and membership represents only a small minority of citizens in the school district who are 62 years of age and older.

But what really got me was an Associated Press story which ran in newspapers over the nation last week, that 32,000 Americans are 100 years old and older! That's amazing.

Reminds me of the elderly lady who lives alone but said she was never lonely; she had some men friends to keep her company.

"I wake up Charlie Horse, eat meals with Will Power, spend my days with Arthur Itis, and go to bed with Ben Gay," she said.

Then there's the guy who says things just aren't the same anymore. He reminds me of myself.

"It's twice as far to the corner, and they've added a hill. I've given up running for the bus. It seems faster

than it used to be.

"It seems, too, that they are making stairs steeper than in the old days, and have you noticed the small print they use in newspapers nowadays? Even people are speaking in such low voices now, I can hardly hear them.

"People are changing, too. They are much younger than I used to be when I was their age. On the other hand, people of my own age are so much older than I am!

"I ran into an old classmate the other day, and he had aged so much he didn't even recognize me!

"And then, I was shaving the other morning and really got a good look at my reflection. Confound it, they don't even make mirrors like they used to."

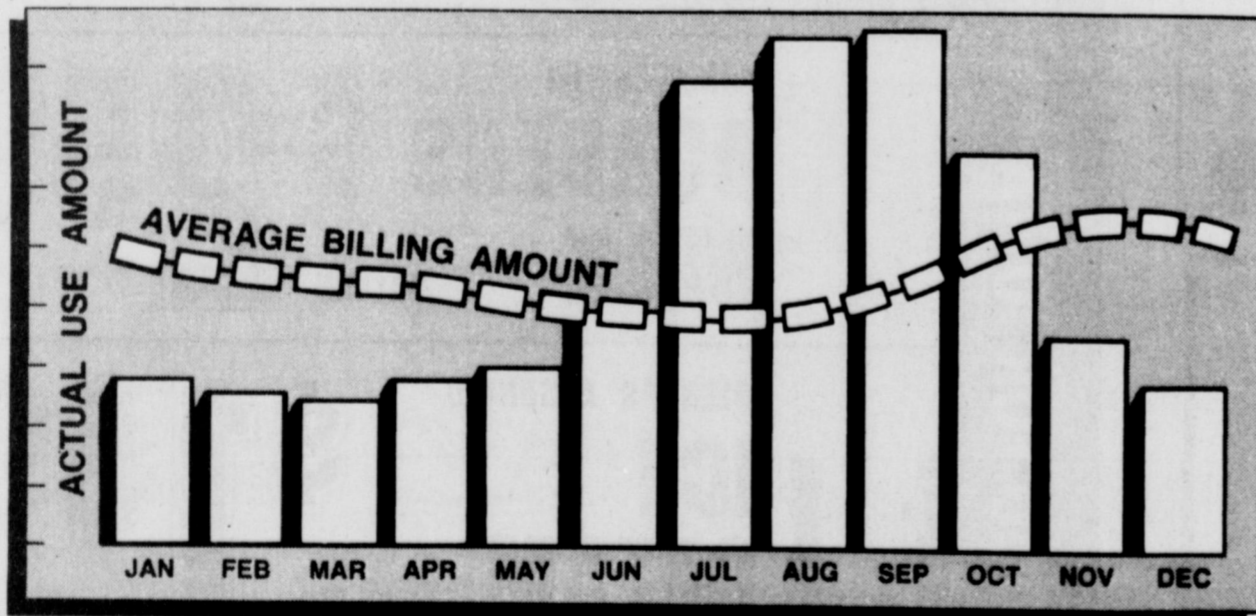

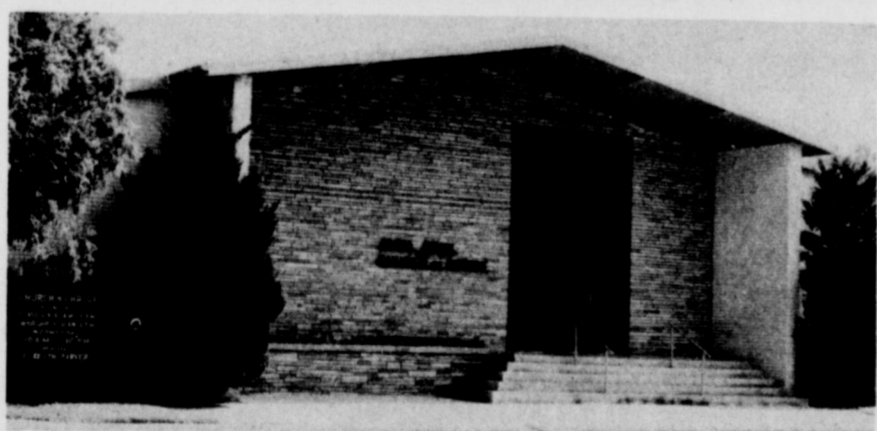

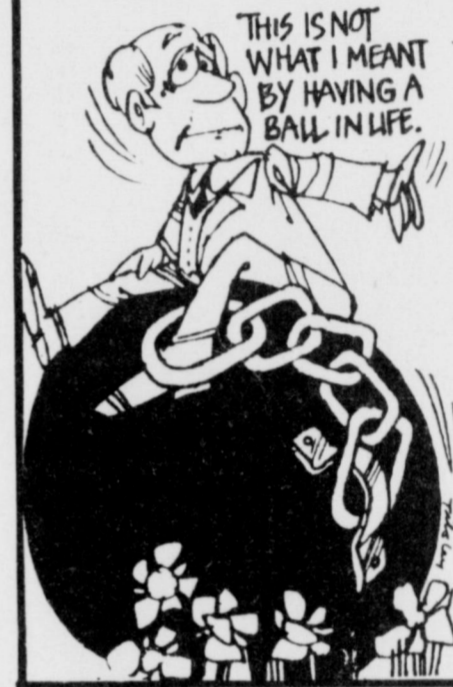

Council approves equipment purchase

Holliday City Council Tuesday night included the purchase of a new pickup and copy machine in the 1983 revenue sharing budget.

A public hearing on the revenue sharing budget was held 30 minutes

prior to the regular council meeting. Only public officials and council members were present.

The revenue sharing budget, totalling \$19,407.58, includes \$643.58 leftover from the previous year's budget, and a transfer of \$3,000 from

the general fund. The transfer was to return the amount paid out of the revenue sharing budget the previous year to pay for street resurfacing.

Payments from the federal government already received amounts to \$15,764, according to city

administrator Jim Hamill, and \$5,240 will be paid to the city before the federal government's fiscal calendar ends September 30.

A new desk copier costing \$2,249.10 was installed at city hall early Wednesday morning. Bids for a

one-half ton pickup with automatic transmission will be advertised in the Wichita Falls newspaper. Council budgeted \$7,500 for its purchase.

OTHER BUSINESS

Council turned down an annexation request from Marjorie P. Gordon for approximately one-half acre of land located on the east edge of Holliday.

Mrs. Gordon requested only a portion of her 12.5 acre tract to be annexed, in order for a mobile home to be placed on the land and for it to receive city water.

J.L. Stone discussed the development of a subdivision on the east side of Holliday in Block 16, just north of the Las Brisas addition. Stone indicated he wanted to find out what the city would expect from him if the project was finalized.

Rudy Molina was granted permission to install a curb on the southside of the 300 block of W. China. Council tabled action on the request at the last meeting to ascertain whether other owners would be in agreement to have the street guttered.

Council also discussed the proposed budget for Archer County Tax Appraisal District, which will be detailed more in next week's edition of the Leader. The proposed budget for next year totals \$64,554, as opposed to last year's \$63,750. Council questioned an increase of \$7,500 for a computer terminal, which is supposed to reduce time spent on work done by hand according to the budget, when no reduction in personnel is noted.

Also, council agreed to spend \$1,100 in repairs to the city's refuse truck.

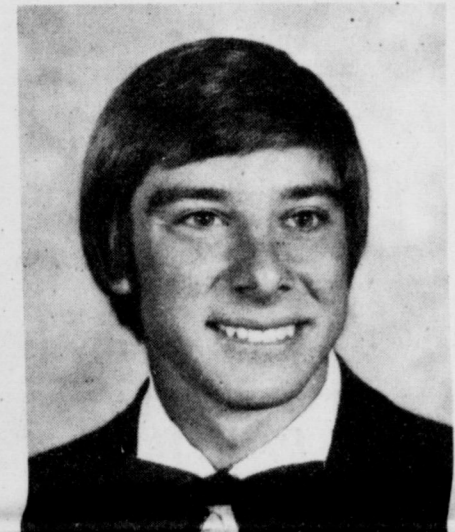
