<u>CONCERNING SPECIAL AUDIT</u> Trustees delay action after executive session

No action was taken by the Iowa Park school board following a 2:22 executive session Tuesday night, but board president Roy Boutwell issued a brief statement.

Tuesday's meeting was a called session, and Boutwell's statement merely announced the board's intentions to hold another special meeting at 7:30 p.m. Monday, eventhough the board intends to holds its regular monthly meeting the following evening.

"The board received a preliminary audit and Bill Steger's letter (of resignation). We decided not to take any action on either one. We'll meet Monday at 7:30 p.m. and have more input, and at that time we will take action," Boutwell said.

At issue is Steger's resignation and an audit being conducted by school district auditor Nayland Smith into the school's food service department. Boutwell announced also the appointment of Allen Shewmake as deputy, tax collector. Shewmake has been a full-time employee in the tax office since summer of 1970.

Steger, who was hired in 1966, has served as head of the tax office, as well as transportation department and food service department.

Numerous rumors have been flitting throughout the community the past two weeks concerning Steger and the food service department.

Meeting most of the executive session with board members were Supt. Harold Cowley, Smith and his son Randy, a partner in Smith's accounting firm, and Michael Spurgers, attorney for the firm of Fillmore, Purtle and Lee representing the school.

Shewmake was called into the meeting for a brief time, and left. Cowley and Spurgers left the room at 9:25 and returned just before the meeting was reopened to the public. The subject has attracted considerable attention from media in Wichita Falls. Seven persons connected with media from the neighboring community were present at the beginning of the meeting, but four left midway through the closed session.

Steger, who reportedly has been out of town, was not present at the meeting.

City, school meetings planned next week

After a lengthy delay, the annual city audit for 1982-83 will be received during a regularly-scheduled meeting of the council at 7 p.m. Monday in council chambers.

The following evening at 7:30, school trustees have scheduled their regular monthly meeting in the administration building, and will hear a report on last year's TABS testing. 30, and normally the audit is in the hands of the council by November. TESCo seeks 16.1% increase

Texas Electric Service Company will file today a request for a 16.1 percent systemwide increase in revenues.

The request will be filed with cities served by Texas Electric and with the Public Utility Commission in Austin. It would provide an additional \$195 million in revenues if approved as requested.

"We have worked hard through the years to give our customers reliable service at the lowest reasonable rates," said Jack Redding, TESCO manager in Wichita Falls.

For example, he said, the company saw in the late 1960s that natural gas would become much more expensive, and it began a program to build new

Vandals cause city problems

Vandalism was the major problem for the police department during the past week.

Between 1:10 and 2:23 a.m. yesterday, someone removed plugs from three fire hydrants, causing street flooding and reducing water in overhead storage to a dangerously low level, as well as damaging one power plants that could use cheaper fuels.

The company now has eight generating units fueled by lignite coal in operation.

"These lignite plants have saved our customers about \$750 million just since 1972, compared to what they would have paid for the same amount of electricity produced with marketpriced natural gas," Redding said.

"Our construction program has worked. Our customers now benefit from electric bills that are lower than they would have been otherwise lower than the national average and among the lowest in Texas. And these savings will continue to grow," he said.

"Because of these benefits to our customers, we want to make sure the construction program keeps moving



The company's major construction project, its Comanche Peak nuclear plant, is scheduled to begin producing electricity next year.

"This will be a milestone in energy production for a large part of Texas," Redding said. He noted that throughout Comanche peak's service life, customers will see the benefits of its cheap nuclear fuel – currently about 70 cents per million BTU, compared to \$3.65 for natural gas.

TESCO's 48-county service area is growing rapidly. The company has added more than 90,000 new customers in the past four years, more than 20,000 in 1982 alone.

"We are in a good position to handle this growing need for electricity, primarily because we began our program to build new power plants early." Redding said. "In addition to allowing us to use cheaper fuels, these plants are essential sources of reliable electricity for our customers."

"Comanche Peak and our lignite plants have been built efficiently and cost-effectively. he said. "Inflation has made all power plant construction expensive. But because we started early on our construction program, we're able to provide our customers with electricity from power plants that are much less expensive than those that will have to be built in the future."

Inflation in the three years since TESCO' last rate increase has had a dramatic impact on the company's operating costs, with the Consumer Price Index having increased by 22 percent nationwide and 26 percent in the Dallas Fort Worth area.

"Because of this inflation, and because of interest costs that have to be paid on money borrowed for our construction program, we can no longer postpone asking for a rate increase," Redding said.

Since 1980, the company has had to borrow about \$461 million for its program to build new facilities to serve its customers.


Vandals also caused considerable work and expense at two swimming pools sometime Saturday night.

These interest costs, like all operating expenses, eventually have to be part of electric bills, he noted. "If we can't recover these costs as we pay them by including them in bills, we have to borrow even more money, and this additional borrowed money also carries interest charges."

Therefore, Redding said, it's cheaper for customers if interest costs are included in rates as the interest comes due, rather than paying even higher costs after new power plants go into operation.

Any rate increase is not expected to take effect before next fall.

It is difficult to estimate the effect of a rate increase on customers' bills because historically regulators have granted a smaller increase than requested.

However, if the entire amount requested were granted, the typical residential customer whose bills average \$50 per month would pay about \$10 more. Two public appearances are on Monday's agenda. L.T. Kingcade is to seek an adjustment to his water bill and a request for the city to abandon 25 feet in the 500 block of North Park will be sought by Ithama Jolly and Sonny Fulfer.

Aldermen will take action on appointments to two boards: one to the Friends of the Library for a one-year term; four to the electrical board, two-year terms.

Authorization to purchase a pickup for the parks department, using a bid which was previously authorized, will be considered.

Also to be considered will be the annual leasing of grazing rights at the sewer treatment plant site, and a request to advertise for bids for remodeling a portion of city hall.

An executive session is on the agenda, during which council members will discuss salaries of personnel for the coming year, which is related to the upcoming budget

Getting to know 'Mr. Dawson'

Mr. Dawson has a marvelous dry humor when speaking of his 26 years in the Iowa Park school system. When asked if he really enjoys his job, he threw his head back and laughed heartily and said, "No, not really. Well, at least not all the time." He hurried on to say that there are enjoyable times, and that being around young people has kept him from going stale.

Dawson rubs elbows with our youth everyday, and he says the kids of today are not near as bad as people like to think. "Our kids have entirely, too much bad publicity, some folks, just like to fuss." Iowa Park High School has approximately 525 students enrolled, and, Bob says "They can't all be perfect all the time, but, they are not all bad by any means,"

Bob Dawson came to Iowa Park after serving as principal in Kennett, Missouri seven years. If you catch just a little southern drawl in his speech, it might be because he was raised along the Mississippi River in a little town called Hayti, Missouri.

Since graduating from high school Bob has had only one other occupation. One summer he worked for the Missouri Health Department on the exterminating crew. There had been a flare up of malaria along the Mississippi River that summer, so it was his job to go along all over the county and line up the houses to be sprayed the following day and advise the people when the crew would arrive.

When asked what he does in his leisure time. Dawson says he probably would be found reading or watching sports on televison.

A little note of loneliness in Dawson's conversation developed in his account of the closing of school for the summer. He explained that the administrative crew remains one week after the closing of school to record grades etc., then he remains another 10 days wrapping things up for the year. It's on this note he leans back in his chair, chuckles deeply again and says "Sometimes I just have to get up and walk, I just can't hardly stay with it."

Dawson is a true lover of sports, his account of the most interesting thing that has happened since he has been here was the victory over Gainesville in football in 1982.

He said, "I was at the game when we won the championship in 1969, I was also at the game when we tied for the championship in 1970, but neither of those games was as exciting as that Gainesville game, it's a time I'll never forget."

Dawson is a religious man. He is a deacon at the First Baptist Church, also a Sunday School teacher and member of the choir.

When asked for the single idea that he would like to instill in the minds of young people if he could, he thought long and hard, and said "I would just like for them to realize that everything in this life is not fun or entertaining. It seems like in the day we live, young people and adults alike look for amusement or entertainment in everything they do. But if it involves hardship or an inconvenience, they simply don't want to do it."

He then repeated as if to really emphasize his point, "I would just like for them to realize that everything simply cannot be entertaining and that there are places in life that will be quite to the contrary." Then with all his candor he said "Sometimes I feel like I am talking to a brick wall." At this point Dawson was asked, "If you had one last word to say to the

citizens of Iowa Park, what would you say?"

He became very serious and said "I just wish people could really appreciate what they have here in this school, with all the things that have been made available to them, and realize the sacrifices that some people have made to make it so."





Summer is the time for ice cream and homemade ice cream is a delicious and sumptuous dessert. The electrification of the old-time ice cream freezer has made the process of freezing it quite simple and is largely responsible for the current enthusiasm of homemade ice cream. In history, ice cream dates to the 13th century when Marco Polo returned to Italy from the Orient with tales of men eating ices flavored with exotic fruits. In the late 1700s George Washington and Thomas Jefferson popularized ice cream in America, and when Dolly Madison put it on the table as a dessert, it was considered a confection.

The first ice cream freezer suitable for family use was invented in 1846. and taking a turn at the crank allowed everyone to participate. The ice cream had its heyday in the Victorian era around the turn of the century, then interest dwindled for a while but was revived when the electric refrigerator with its freezing compartment was in common use during the 1930s and 40s, and recipes were adapted for its use.

- 1 onion, chopped
- 1 paste can water

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Cook 2 minutes and add 1 small can crushed pineapple, juice and all. Pour

over hot cake and punch holes in the cake for it to be moist.

DATE LOAF CANDY

- 3 cups sugar 1 T butter 1 cup dates ¹/₂ cup evaporated milk 1/2 cup water
- ¹/₄ tsp salt
- 1 cup chopped maraschino cherries
- 1 tsp vanilla

1 cup marshmallows 1 cup coconut 1 cup chopped nuts

Boil sugar, water, milk, butter and salt to softball stage; test in a cup of cold water. Add cherries and dates, boil to hard ball stage; then add coconut, marshmallows, vanilla and nuts. Beat until stiff. Pour on wet cloth and roll into a large roll.

Let stand in refrigerator until firm. Cut inpieces desired and wrap in foil or saran wrap.

SWEET PICKLE PEACHES

- Peel about 50 or 55 peaches. Mix in a pan large enough to boil this amount of peaches: 2 cups sugar
- 2 cups vinegar
- 2 cups water

Stir well and put on stove to let sugar melt. Add peaches to mixture and boil until peaches are tender. Put the peaches in jars, add a few whole cloves to each jar, then pour liquid injars to cover peaches. Seal tight.



There is no question, Americans are growing older.

Only a decade or so ago, someone released statistics about how young Americans were. If memory serves me correctly, they were saying 60 percent of the population was younger than 25 years of age.

While most of that group is still around, though 10 years or more older, the fact is, there are more senior citizens than school age people in our country now.

No, I have no statistics to prove it, but there are a number of points which would seem to support the claim.

First of all, enrollment in schools is down virtually every place you look.

Just like here in Iowa Park. Both in town and over the rural area, there are approximately 40 percent more residences and apartments than existed back in 1971. Yet we have 500 fewer students. The Friendly Door has more members than is enrolled in high school, and membership represents only a small minority of citizens in the school district who are 62 years of age and older.

But what really got me was an Associated Press story which ran in newspapers over the nation last week, that 32.000 Americans are 100 years old and older! That's amazing. Reminds me of the elderly lady who

lives alone but said she was never lonely; she had some men friends to keep her company.

"I wake up Charlie Horse, eat meals with Will Power, spend my days with Arthur Itis, and go to bed with Ben Gay," she said.

Then there's the guy who says things just aren't the same anymore. He reminds me of myself.

"It's twice as far to the corner, and they've added a hill. I've given up running for the bus. It seems faster than it used to be.

"It seems, too, that they are making stairs steeper than in the old days, and have you noticed the small print they use in newspapers nowadays? Even people are speaking in such low voices now, I can hardly hear them.

"People are changing, too. They are much younger than I used to be when I was their age. On the other hand, people of my own age are so much older than I am!

"I ran into an old classmate the other day, and he had aged so much he didn't even recognize me!

"And then, I was shaving the other morning and really got a good look at my reflection. Confound it, they don't even make mirrors like they used to."

Firemen control stubble blaze

Though he lost his pickup and his tractor suffered heavy damage, most of Lewis Sawyer's uncut wheat crop was saved by local and area volunteer fire departments yesterday.

Sawyer reportedly was driving through stubble to his tractor parked in a stubble field, when fire started under his pickup. Straw apparently collected around the muffler of the vehicle and ignited.

He did not notice the smoke until he stopped by the tractor. Stubble caught afire and burned around both vehicles, though Sawyer himself was not injured.

Combine crews had just finished cutting the field that morning.

Fortunately, only a light breeze was out of the south, because three large uncut fields were north of the harvested field, toward Smith Road. At least two homes would have been threatened if the uncut fields had caught afire. Volunteer firemen reported to the scene from Electra, Wichita West, Wichita East and Iowa Park, after an early call went out that the blaze was outrunning Iowa Park's two trucks.

However, two large tractors with plows were pressed into action and cut a fire guard, permitting firemen to mop up flames contained in the perimeter.

Council turned down an annexation request from Marjorie P. Gordon for approximately one-half acre of land located on the east edge of Holliday. Mrs. Gordon requested only a


portion of her 12.5 acre tract to be annexed, in order for a mobile home to be placed on the land and for it to receive city water.



James Cowley recognized


