

Wind damage could exceed \$1-million

High winds, caused by the passing of a cool front early Monday evening, caused damage over the area that could reach well above \$1-million. Insurance claims adjusters are working throughout the city.

There were no injuries reported, however. The front edge of the storm, which had been forecast by the U.S. Weather Bureau, passed through Iowa Park at approximately 6:50 p.m. It was followed by a brief shower and small hail.

But the brunt of the storm cleared the area early enough that homeowners, business people and repairmen still had enough daylight time to do preliminary repair work before darkness fell.

Weather alert sirens blew in the city, warning residents of high winds. No tornadoes were sighted any closer than Vernon, however. Members of the Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Department were stationed to the west of the city, forming an early

warning observation line to view the on-coming clouds.

As the front edge of the storm passed over the city, small twisting formations, often called "dust devils," were observed. It was during the initial winds that most of the structural damage reportedly occurred.

One observer watched plastic sheeting and paper being sucked from a metal trash container at Singleton Communications and east into the air.

Seconds later, the roof of a home at 621 W. Washington was dismantled on the south part of the house. Debris from the roof was blown across the street into neighboring yards.

Blinding flashes of light caused by electrical wires snapping together, or breaking by flying debris or broken trees, were observed throughout the community. The police department received calls from citizens that lines were down in 24 locations.

The metal awning of Settle Drug was partially ripped from the front of

the building, while across the street, a small brick wall on the corner of First Baptist Church, fell to the sidewalk, the letter of the church's name hidden.

Windows, such as at the H&R Block office in the shopping center and at a home at 1005 S. Wall, were broken out.

Shamburger Lumber Co. lost two sheet metal walls on storage buildings.

Few trees in the entire community failed to suffer at least small branches being broken. Many trees were felled, the roots snapping below the ground's surface. Roofs suffered similar fate, ranging from a few shingles to entire sections.

Numerous carports and solid wood fences were damaged. Falling carports and trees or tree branches damaged several vehicles parked near them.

Residents in a mobile home at Crystal and Colorado were threatened when an electric wire fell atop

the metal structure. Firemen, alerted by a neighbor, evacuated the residents without mishap.

Several areas of the city were without electricity. Most for moments or a couple of hours, however at least one home was still without service Tuesday morning.

Numerous small metal storage buildings were destroyed by the high winds, which reportedly reached estimated velocity of more than 70 miles per hour.

City Administrator James Barrington said the sanitary landfill will be open to residents of Iowa Park, this week, if they want to haul broken tree limbs there.

Barrington said city crews are picking up debris and limbs as many hours as they can, but some residents might want to do their own hauling so they can restore their property to normal.

One story about how helpful friends can be came from the Velfree

Shop. Mrs. O.N. Newman said Oscar Singleton was driving past the store during the peak of the storm, saw one end of her sign had broken and the large plank banging into the plate glass window.

Singleton, since no one was at the store, stopped and secured the sign before it broke out an expensive window, and allowed severe wind

Public hearing today on proposed landfill site

A public hearing on the city's proposed new solid waste landfill will be held at 9:30 this morning in council chambers of city hall by a representative of the Texas Department of Health.

Chairing the meeting, which is required by law, will be Manik Naik, health department representative who is in charge of Iowa Park's application.

Purpose of the hearing is to receive

input from citizens concerning the proposed site, as well as answering questions concerning state laws on the operation of such a facility.

The proposed site is a tract of land leased from Mrs. Wilbur Karstetter, southwest of the city. Entrance road will be off Smith Road, approximately 2 of a mile east of Johnson Road.

Approximately two years of planning have gone into negotiations for the land, soil testing and applications to the state for approval.

But even after all that time, discussions during council meetings and notices published, the city has more roadblocks.

County Judge Tom Bacus has notified the state some sort of agreement with the city must be reached for maintenance of portions of Smith Road and Johnson Road, or a load limit will be placed on vehicles hauling to the site.

The newest bit of red tape was received in the form of a letter from

the Texas Antiquities Committee (TAC), headquartered in Austin.

TAC director J. Barton Arnold III informed the health department: "The Antiquities Committee has recently reviewed the plans for the development of a solid waste disposal site by the City of Iowa Park, under Department of Health permit application 1571. This project could potentially impact archeological deposits, therefore an archeological

survey under an Antiquities Permit will be required prior to development. The Antiquities Committee does not object to this project but its proximity to Buffalo Creek produces a high probability that this property may contain prehistoric archeological deposits.

"The City of Iowa Park should have a professional archeologist survey this tract under an Antiquities Permit prior to development. Their archeologist should contact us about the requirements and a permit can be issued in a day or two. Such a survey need not be a time consuming or costly project."

Administrator James Barrington said contact will be made with an appropriate professor at Midwestern State Univ. to determine if a member of that school's staff would be acceptable to the state to do such a study.

Time is becoming an important factor in determining if the proposed site is acceptable for use as a solid waste landfill. Comments made at council meetings indicate the present site has already exceeded by at least six months the intended period the

site would be used, and an alternate site must be developed in the very near future.

The city was informed approval of the proposed site could be put off at least six months if sufficient cause of concern is expressed by local residents, which would be determined by Naik.

Should the proposed site not be approved and the present site's space be exceeded, the city would have no alternative than go an exceedingly expensive route of using Wichita Falls' site until a new and acceptable site could be found and approved.

Barrington said this week two large wire screens are being constructed to be placed at the landfill to catch any debris blown out of the pit.

He added that the city is committed to build 10 such screens to be used at the new site.

The screens are eight feet tall and 20 feet long, made of angle iron and chicken wire. Similar screens are used by some cities on the plains, where winds are even stronger than are normally experienced here, to catch blowing paper.

REACHING OUT FOR \$1.2-BILLION TOUCH

Ma Bell seeks record increase

Southwestern Bell has filed a rate request with the Public Utility Commission that calls for an increase of \$1.2 billion in local rates charged to Texas customers.

The company's request for local rates basically is divided into three parts:

-An increase of \$502 million statewide to recover added costs of doing business, and to produce a reasonable return on Texas investment.

-An increase of \$450 million in depreciation expense and other capital recovery charges that are more consistent with today's rapid technological changes.

-Access charges of \$249 million to partially replace the subsidy provided by intrastate long distance revenues to local rates. Southwestern Bell will lose most long distance revenues at the end of 1983.

Another part of the subsidy for local rates will come from \$504 million in access charges to be paid by long distance carriers such as AT&T and MCI.

Paul Roth, vice president-revenues and public affairs, pointed out that about half of whatever increase is approved would go to pay federal, state and local taxes.

"To a large extent," Roth said, "our rate application reflects the combined effects of many decisions made in Washington by the courts, the Federal Communications Commission and the Justice Department. Those decisions are bringing about vast changes in the telecommunications industry."

"Southwestern Bell urgently needs this increase to assure that we will be a viable, stand-alone company able to provide quality telephone service in Texas when we spin off from AT&T on January 1, 1984," Roth said.

To produce the \$1.2 billion increase, Southwestern Bell is proposing substantially higher monthly local rates. One-party residential flat rate service would range from \$27.45 in the smallest towns to \$30.35 in Houston. One-party business flat rates would range from \$34.05 to \$37.75 per month.

The rates include an average access charge of \$4 per month for each line to provide the customers' portion of the long distance subsidy replacement.

Roth emphasized that this access charge is an average. "When the rates are finally set, the business line access charge may well be higher, and the residence charge lower," he said.

Roth pointed out that a paralleling decision by the Federal Communications Commission to reduce the local subsidy from interstate long distance would add an average of another \$4 to

local Texas line rates.

The access charges—both interstate and intrastate—are not additional dollars for Southwestern Bell, but rather they are designed to replace subsidies lost from long distance, Roth said.

"Universal service, which made phones available to almost everyone, has been one of the nation's proudest and most important accomplishments," Roth said. "We intend to do all we can in this changing

environment to make sure telephone service remains affordable for all our customers."

Roth explained that the company is researching and developing several lower-priced alternative offerings. Customers would pay for each call made, but their basic monthly rate would be substantially below flat rate unlimited service.

At the PUC's direction, the company is conducting a survey to determine customer preferences for these optional pricing plans. The survey results should be ready for the Commission's consideration later this year.

"With local rates rising to meet costs, it doesn't make sense for all customers to pay the same flat rate no matter how much or how little they use their line," Roth said. "People who use less should pay less. This is no different than rates charged for other utility services."

Roth pointed out \$699 million—or almost 60 percent—of the proposed \$1.2 billion increase in local rates results from federally directed changes in national telecommunications policy. The \$699 million includes customer access charges and capital recovery.

"With competition in the long distance market, it no longer will be feasible for long distance rates to subsidize local rates will have to go up, but it also means that long distance rates must come down."

The expected increase in depreciation expense is another major charge which impacts the company's filing. "Federal and state regulators are jointly considering our recommended

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Storm forces council to reschedule tonight

Monday's threatening weather caused the city council meeting to be re-scheduled for 7 this evening, in council chambers.

Mayor Charlie Lee, standing outside the building with other aldermen after the initial front passed through the city, made the announcement.

On tonight's agenda is a personal appearance by Wayne House, Texas Electric manager, who is to explain his company's proposal for a system-wide 16.1 percent rate increase.

A resolution will be considered,

following House's appearance, to suspend any action on the request up to six months.

Four citizens are to be appointed to boards, two each to the electrical board and the parks board.

Included under the administrator's report are: requesting of authorization to advertise for bids to purchase a teletype for the police department; report on inventory; manager's meeting report; progress on soccer fields in the south part of town; discussion of a substation for the fire department south of the railroad tracks; and discuss an ordinance concerning fire alarm systems.

SOCIAL SECURITY TIPS

CHANGES IN THE COST OF LIVING ADJUSTMENTS FOR SOCIAL SECURITY BENEFICIARIES

Legislation passed by Congress in April of this year to ensure the stability of the Social Security system will have its first effect on beneficiaries in July.

The cost of living adjustment beneficiaries expected to receive with their July checks will be delayed until January of 1984. The new law also provides that the cost of living raise will be made in January instead of July in all future years.

The amount of the cost of living adjustment for 1983 will not be affected by the delay in payment. Beneficiaries will receive a 3.5 percent raise based on the Consumer Price index, the most commonly used measure of inflation. The increase is modest in comparison to increases of the past few years because of the fact that inflation has declined.

Even so, delaying the effective date of the raise will save Social Security billions of dollars.

changes in depreciation schedules which will allow faster recovery of investment dollars," Roth said. "If approved, the depreciation changes and other capital recovery will increase Southwestern Bell's Texas expenses by \$450 million."

Roth said the \$502 million remaining is about what the company would have requested if it were not for the massive changes occurring in the industry. "The \$502 million comparable in make-up to our previous requests—represents our need to meet increasing costs of providing telephone service in Texas, and to assure that we earn a reasonable return on our investment," he said.

Southwestern Bell is requesting an allowed return of 13.57 percent on the company's Texas investment. For the test year involved in the filing, the company earned less than 10 percent on Texas investment.

Three students are recognized

Two Iowa Parkans were named to the Dean's Honor Roll and another earned "Distinguished Student" status at Texas A&M Univ.

Senior aerospace engineering student Norman Gwinn and Chris Jones, a senior majoring in petroleum engineering, made the honor roll by earning at least a 3.75 grade point ratio and registered for at least 15 semester hours.

Rose Soell, sophomore animal science major, earned at least a 3.25 gpa, the criteria for "Distinguished Student."

Our fire and police departments acted properly Monday evening in setting off the storm alert sirens. But I hope one day someone can come up with a refinement of the program.

The sounding of the signal is to alert people to take cover, either when a tornado or extremely high and damaging winds is approaching the city. The procedure has been discussed and approved by those who work on such situations and have the most knowledge of what is needed to be done.

But, hopefully, some sort of refinement can be accomplished so we can distinguish between a high wind and a tornado approaching.

I certainly have no suggestion, but possibly someone will.

The reason I bring it up is that there is a difference between the two. Certainly, we need a warning about high winds like we had Monday. Those living in mobile homes need that warning, especially, because such winds can give those structures a hard time.

But those of us who do not live in mobile homes need to be alerted in case of an approaching tornado, not high winds. If we, and many reportedly did, take cover in our bath tubs or in closets as we should when

the "take cover" alarm is sounded... and the storm is only high winds... we might not do it the next time the alarm is sounded.

When that alarm is sounded, as residents in Wichita Falls and Vernon learned three years ago, residents shouldn't take time to go turn on the radio to find out what is happening. Surely they shouldn't call the police station or weather station. They should take action immediately.

Because immediate action is needed, people need to know what type of action to take. And that can only be given by a signal apparently.

I cringe to think of families leaving their homes to take shelter elsewhere whether the alert is for high winds or tornado. The threat of flying metal and other debris is a great risk, especially in weather like we had Monday.

In fact, the people who made a study after Wichita Falls' tornado said residents of homes built on concrete slab floors are safer to remain in their homes, preferably in hallways, closets or bathrooms and away from windows.

Of course, the warning Monday of high winds was the first time since I've been living here. The others were for threatening funnels. So the

problem may not be as great as it may sound.

Concerning the proposed history-making, unheard-of record-setting rate increase being sought by Southwestern Bell Telephone, I can only admit the moneys sought, the figures provided and the bases for them all is too great for me to comprehend.

At early study, I must question the effect of losing long distance revenue would cause our home telephone rates to triple.

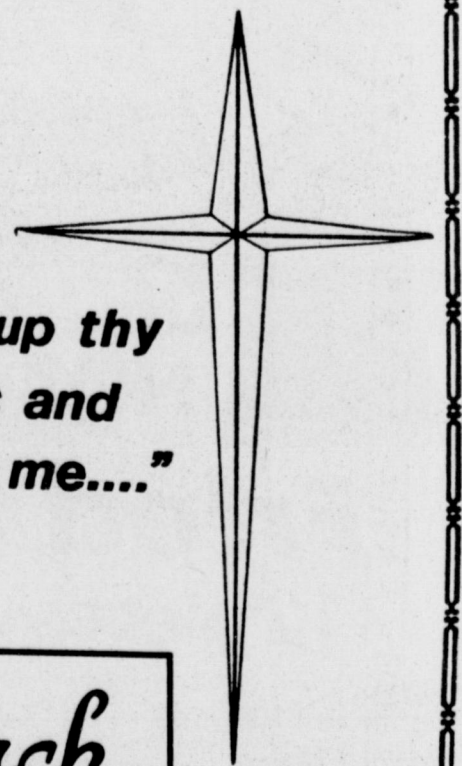

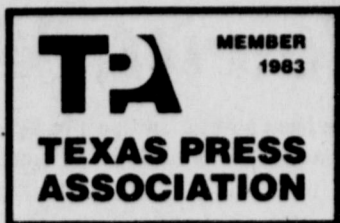

Area oil, gas report

Location has been staked by Curtis R. Inman of Midland for a 1,975-foot developmental probe in Wichita County's H. George Survey, seven miles southeast of Electra. The well is designated as the No. 174 J&J Waggoner "A". Drillsite will be in a 40-acre lease in the Wichita Regular Field.

H.L. Cox of Wichita Falls has staked location for the No. 7 Ashton, in Wichita County's C. Winters Survey. It is scheduled for 1,300 feet of hole making. The location is in a 40-acre lease in the Wichita Regular Field, about one mile southeast of Burkburnett.

A new oil producer in the Wichita Regular Field has been finaled by ABB Drilling Co. of Wichita Falls. Designated as the No. 2 Perkins & Cullum "A", the well indicated capacity to produce 16 barrels of oil per day on an open choke.

The location is three miles northeast of Holliday, in a 153-acre lease in the Denton County School Land Survey, Wichita County.

Bottomed at 1,830 feet, the well will produce from an interval of perforations 1,618 to 1,622 feet into the hole. The pay formation was first encountered at 1,618 feet.

Flowing at the rate of 72 barrels of crude oil per day on an 8/64 choke, the No. 1-62 Drieschner was completed in the Searcy's Field by Crawford Energy Inc. of Austin.

The well showed flowing tubing pressure of 200 PSI.

Drillsite is in a 320-acre lease in Wilbarger County's H&T RR Survey, A-1928, seven miles south of Chillicothe.

After entering the pay zone at 7,306 feet, the well went to 8,406 foot bottomhole. It was perforated to produce from an interval 7,306 to 7,312 feet into the wellbore. The well is 707 feet from the east line and 1,073 feet from the north line of the lease and survey.

The No. 3 Michna "B", a developmental well in the Wichita Regular Field, is scheduled to be drilled seven miles northwest of Burkburnett. Anderson Oil Co. of Burkburnett is listed as the operator. Location is in a 20-acre lease in Wichita County's F.W. Huseman Survey. Projected total depth is 1,750 feet.

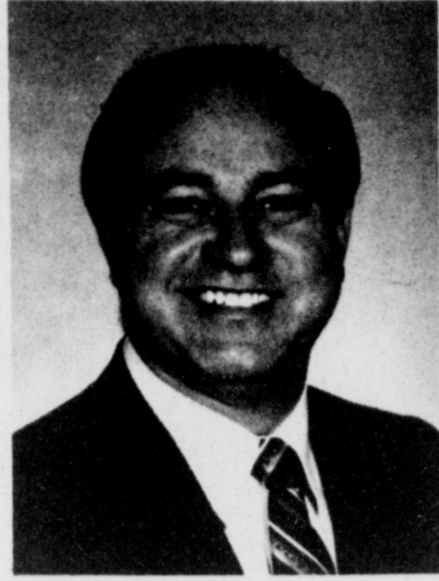
A friendly, familiar face around town is Reverend Howell Farnsworth, better known as "Brother Hal."

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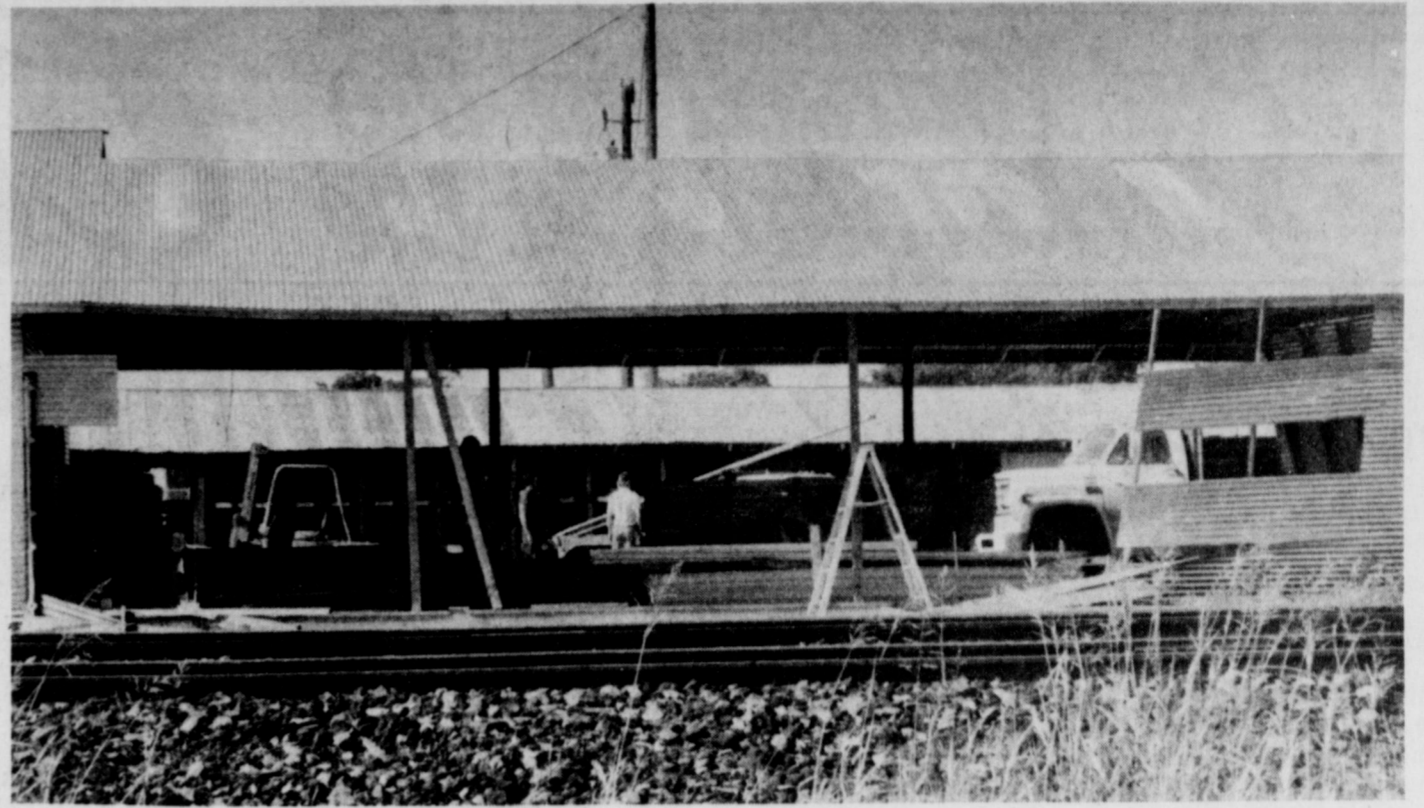
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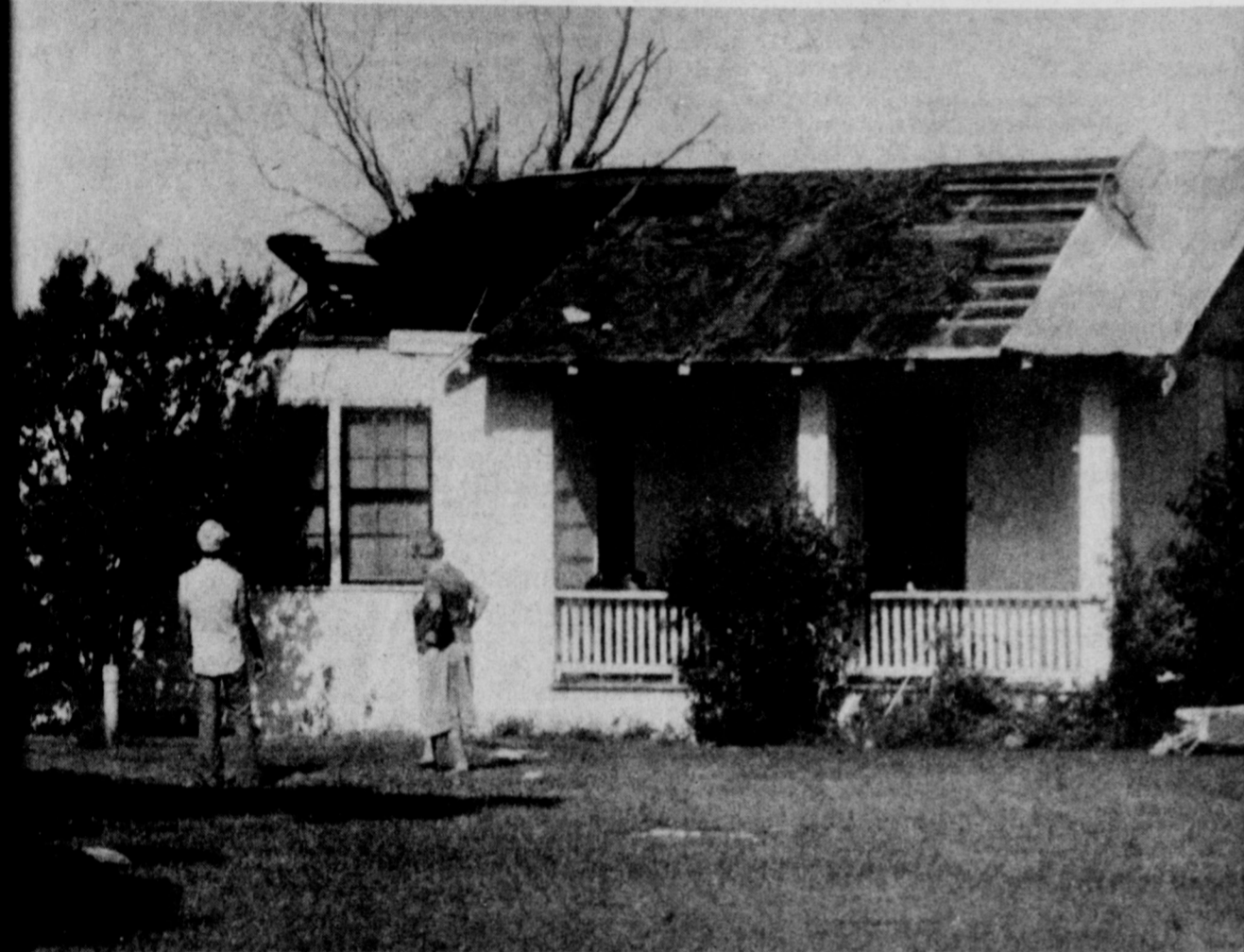

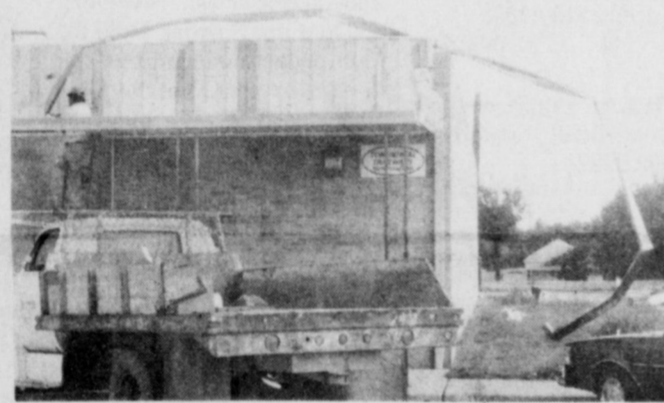
