

# Council takes action on water service, street

Water pressure and service in the south part of town is expected to be greatly improved in the near future, and Fourth Street is to be completed and intersect with West Highway, as result of city council action Monday evening.

The council approved a proposal by the water department to "loop" the lines serving Garden Valley Addition, a project which had admittedly been long overlooked by the city.

In looping the lines, pressure is equalized, and slow-dripping opened faucets are to be a thing of the past, once completed.

The project, which will cost an estimated \$6,000, will also include valves which will permit workers to shut off only sections of that area when leaks are being repaired. As it is, the entire south side must be deprived of service when a major break is repaired, council members were told.

Three items on Monday's agenda were concerned with the extension of Fourth Street. They included approval of bids to do the paving, final payment on a house in the right of way, and a suit against an individual who contracted with the city to remove the house.

Lowest of three bids to build the street, from just south of Van Horn to West Highway, using concrete for street surface as well as curb and guttering, was submitted by McGrath Brothers Concrete, \$36,580. This is the same firm that has built two other streets recently in the city.

The house at 902 W. Highway was purchased a few years ago by the city, with plans to eventually remove it, allowing for completion of Fourth Street.

A balance of approximately \$14,000 is owed the owner, Mrs. Maureen Overbey, who reportedly has opted to take final payment rather than monthly payments. Aldermen voted approval of the lump sum payment.

Mike Knox of Wichita Falls, responding to an advertisement of the city to purchase salvage rights to the Overbey house, has failed to complete the project in accordance to the agreement.

In fact, Administrator James Barrington told the council, Knox reportedly has sold the rights to the house twice since entering the agreement.

Barrington requested and received council approval to file a suit against Knox to complete the demolition and removal, in order to permit construction of the street.

## OTHER BUSINESS

Other business attended to by the council included:

- \* reappointment of former mayor Charlie Lee as the city's representative on the North Texas Housing Finance Corp.;

- \* approved rezoning of the Burnett home from R-1 to P-1, an action required by the city's zoning ordinance since the structure is to eventually be used as a city library;

- \* approved a proposal by Barrington to advertise for proposals to improve the city's telephone system at the least amount of cost;
- \* voted not to share the cost with developer Ray Townsend to extend East Garden;

- \* and tabled for further study the purchase of additional equipment for the waste water treatment plant.

## CALLED MEETING

At a called meeting held Dec. 5, council members declined an opportunity to participate in a volume purchase of vehicles with Wichita Falls, which would have allowed the city to purchase a half-ton Dodge pickup for \$6,988.

The consensus of the council was that Iowa Park dealers should be given an opportunity to bid on all vehicles purchased by the city.

## News in Brief

### Christmas issue distribution Monday

### Christmas Eve service slated

For the fourth consecutive year, a special Christmas Eve midnight service will be held at Faith Baptist Church.

To begin at 11:45 p.m., the service will last approximately 30 minutes, according to Rev. Ken Cole, who

emphasized the event is informal and particularly appealing to the entire family.

Approximately 150 to 200 have attended the previous services, which includes seasonal music and a reading of the Christmas story.

A home burglary and theft by stolen check were reported during the past week to the Iowa Park Police Department.

Tex Pendergrass told police he sold a stereo set to a black male at the Wichita Falls Trade Market, taking a \$200 check on a Robert Brown of that city, and giving him \$70 in change.

But the check was found to have been reportedly stolen, Pendergrass told police, who referred him to the Wichita Falls Police Dept., since the offense allegedly occurred in that city.

A 19-year-old Iowa Parkan, Lee Randal Hughes, was arrested yesterday on a warrant charging him with indecency with a child. He was arraigned before Justice of the Peace R.L. Stewart.

### Food donated for the needy

The Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Department took in almost 17 full sacks of non-perishable goods at the Junior High and High School Choirs' Christmas Concert, held Sunday at the high school auditorium.

Admission to the choral group's night of music was a canned good or other non-perishable item. A spokesman for the fire department asked to extend a warm thanks to all the donors, and added that the impressive results might make this an annual affair.

The food was given to First Baptist Church in Iowa Park for distribution.

## Banquet, golf course key Chamber subjects

Plans for the annual Chamber of Commerce banquet are taking final shape, it was reported Monday at the monthly meeting of the Chamber's board of directors.

The Jan. 26 event will feature a speaker, Bob Jett who represents Lone Star Gas Co., presentation of awards to individuals for their outstanding efforts in the community during the past year, a steak dinner prepared by the MuleSkinners, and possibly some entertainment.

Dr. Erwin Soell, who will assume the presidency of the Chamber at the banquet, is chairman of the event. He said the directors had set the ticket price at \$8 this year, and all directors will be working with Keith Aulds and Wayne House, co-chairmen of the ticket committee, in selling tickets.

The event will be held at the high school cafeteria.

### GOLF COURSE REPORT

Developer Rip Smith told directors he was having second thoughts about building a golf course northwest of the city.

While he said he had no problem obtaining a permit from the state to use affluent from the waste water

treatment plant for irrigation, some of the restrictions and the term of the permit have caused him to "look at his hole card."

Smith has an agreement with the city to purchase the affluent from the treatment plant, and said the price was "no problem."

But the state's issuance of a permit to use the water for irrigating the course is for only five years. He said the uncertainty of a permit renewal after that time, after investing thousands of dollars in developing the course, has made him take a longer look before "jumping off the deep end."

Smith said he recognized, during his effort to promote a country club membership, that a lot of people wanted to see a course under construction before they would commit themselves. He had needed 250 to found the club, and had only 30 to put their names on the dotted line.

The country club approach was scrapped, and he decided to make it open entirely to the general public. But because the course would have to operate on revenue from green fees, the amount of participation was also a

concern, Smith said.

"Unless something happens to boost my confidence, I'm not sure the course will be built," he told directors. But he added that he has the five years of the state permit to make up his mind.

Chamber president, Dr. James Edwards, told the board of a discussion he had with Mayor Tim Hunter, that a meeting should be held of Chamber, city and business leaders in the near future to develop plans for downtown improvement and efforts to attract more businesses to locate here.

In response, Wayne House said "I think it's about time we, as a Chamber, do something like improving the downtown area."

Other board members expressed their concerns about the appearance of the business area and said they would welcome a meeting such as Hunter suggested.

Because their regular monthly meeting in January falls the same week as the banquet, the directors moved up that meeting to the second Monday of the month.

## Verna's to reopen

Verna's Apparel will be reopening this week, but in a new location.

The ladies store was so heavily damaged by smoke in the Dec. 8 fire on Park Street that the entire stock was totaled by the insurance company and sold for salvage.

Owner Verna Reid said she will open in Park West Shopping Center, in the space formerly occupied by Video Care.

"My suppliers have told me they would have merchandise to me by the middle of the week," she said Monday. "It will not be a complete stock, by any means, but we'll have lingerie, blouses, pants and cosmetics."

She said she will continue to operate from 9 a.m. until 6 p.m. through Monday, Christmas Eve, and then possibly change the hours until her stock is completed.

No plans for the future have been made definite by the owners of the two stores that were gutted by the fire: Preston Giles, Discount Food, and Peggy Potter, The Bee Hive.

A clean-up crew began work Monday morning to clear debris from Discount Food. Work was delayed until then because of bad weather.

# Handiwork enhances home Christmas decor

The Methodist parsonage, the present home of Rev. and Mrs. Jack Meyers and their children, Kristy, Kathy and Andy, is a true picture of Christmas joy prevailing the air, and the spirit of friendliness and warmth is everywhere. The decorations, for the most part, reflect the good taste, ingenuity and handwork of Mrs. Meyers.

"I like to be creative and this is one way that I can be creative," she said in referring to her Christmas decorations. Inspired by her grandmother who made sock dolls and other novelties for her 11 grandchildren, she took up crafts at the age of 16.

She has a special attraction for

dolls which figure prominently in the Yule decor, some of these she makes and dresses, others she buys and dresses. One point of special interest in the decorative scheme is where she pictures Santa and Mrs. Santa reclining in their living room.

Dressed in everyday clothes, they are sitting in rocking chairs on either side of a fireplace. He is reading a Christmas story to a mischievous boy who slipped and opened his Christmas present early, another boy in his pajamas lying on a rug in front of the fireplace, and a baby sucking its thumb in Mrs. Santa's lap. On the wall above the fireplace hangs an assortment of Christmas cards in a frame. Miniature wooden houses

suggestive of those Santa and his reindeer crossed over and a decorated tree add interest to the scene.

In the Meyers' living room, the Nativity scene reverently set up for the Holy Child born in Bethlehem has special significance because it was made by Mrs. Meyers eight years ago. All of the characters and animals are made of colorful felt and trimmed in metallic and the creche is made of burlap.

She conceived the idea of a felt Nativity scene for the pleasure and enjoyment of the children. They were delighted and fascinated with a beautiful ceramic set that Mrs. Meyers' mother had given to the family the year before, so instead of placing a "please don't handle sign" on that set she made one for them with unbreakable objects.

Other decorations that she has made to add to the mirth and pleasure of her family and friends include five sets of dolls, wall hangings, clothes pin dolls, and a Santa head made from half of a bleach bottle and beard of cleaning rags. The Santa head is part of a wall hanging which has pictures of the family in small frames.

Some of the most attractively-dressed dolls are those that were once used in Christmas decorations for Joske's Department Store. Mrs. Meyers was able to purchase them at a reduced price when they were relegated to the discard and they now stand out prominently in apparel designed and made by her.



Elsewhere in the living/dining area of the home are other original holiday decorations interspersed with traditional symbols of carolers, snowmen, Santa and his reindeer, and a candle and pine cone arrangement.

Last Friday evening, Rev. and Mrs.

Meyers entertained the church staff at a dinner. The place cards were crystal tree ornaments bearing the names of the guests written in calligraphy, another talent of the versatile minister's wife.

Mrs. Meyers' love for dolls goes far

beyond those that figure in Christmas decorations. In her bedroom, she has two porcelain dolls, one is a baby with three faces in a cradle which she made the body for and dressed, and the other lies in a neatly-trimmed bassinet.

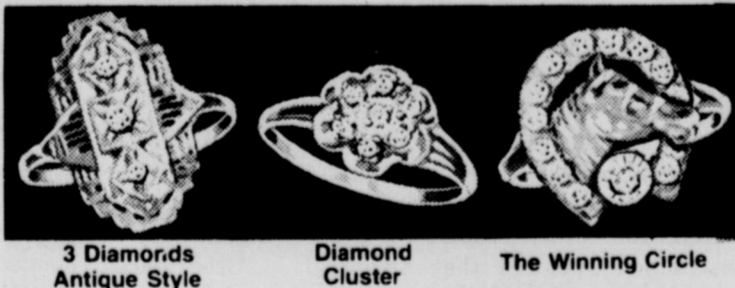

Rep. Charles Finnell told me the other day that one of the major budget items facing the legislature when it meets next month is the prison system.

He didn't say it, but you can credit one of my favorite whipping posts, federal judge Wayne Justice of Tyler.

I'll admit that I don't recall all the sweeping changes that have been dictated by the judge, concerning Texas' prison system, but they are

enormous and just as expensive.

It's my understanding that Texas is going to have to build several more prisons. We can't overcrowd them. Lordy no. And they've got to have their exercise areas, televisions, first-class medical care and all that.

The judge wants criminals to live as well as those who haven't been unlucky enough to be victims. In fact, his thinking is that inmates who can't have it as good should be turned loose.

Word is already out from Austin that hard-working state employees won't be getting much of a salary increase, if any. And the colleges will have their budgets cut to the bone.

But I sure haven't heard anything about cutting the costs of the prison system.

almost daily about stabbings among prisoners?

Credit Judge Justice.

He's the one who said the prisons couldn't use inmates as guard trustees. And since they aren't paid employees, they can't be given such responsibilities.

# Iowa Park School Scene

...All information prepared by Iowa Park School Counselors.

High school seniors, as well as their parents, are often confused by the great amount of college information that is presented in most college catalogs. Students are faced with important decisions concerning college; such as cost, size, entrance examination requirements, housing, course of study, etc.

Students who are contemplating college for the next summer or fall terms, should be making plans at this time to take the appropriate College Entrance Exam. Almost all colleges and universities require either the American College Test (ACT) or the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT). Information and registration packets for either test are available in the high school counselor's office. The

majority of colleges and universities accept either exam, but there are those few whose requirements are more stringent. Those schools demand that the prospective student have the proper high school subject selection as well as requiring the students to take care of registration steps at an earlier time in their senior year. Schools such as the military academies and other highly selective universities may even require that

preparation for seeking admission be done during the students junior year of high school. A wide variety of college catalogs and college information is available in the high school counselor's office.

Since college demands a greater responsibility from the student, it is very important that high school students assume that responsibility by investigating requirements and keeping track of important deadlines.

## NOTICE AFFORDING OPPORTUNITY FOR PUBLIC HEARING CORRIDOR [LOCATION] AND DESIGN [COMBINED HEARING]

The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation in cooperation with the City of Wichita Falls, is planning the improvements of Barnett Road (M.H. 175) in Wichita Falls, Wichita County, Texas. The total length of the project is 1.5 miles beginning at the Southwest Parkway (F.M. 369) and extending northward to the Seymour Highway (U.S. 277).

The proposed construction project will consist of grading, structures, base and surfacing. Some additional right of way will be required. There will be no displacement of people or businesses as a result of these improvements. Maps and other drawings showing the proposed location and geometric design, environmental studies and any other information about the proposed project are on file and available for inspection and copying at the office of the Resident Engineer, Mr. Ralph Self, Senior Resident Engineer for the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation. His office is located at 1601 Southwest Parkway in Wichita Falls. Also, drawings showing the geometric design have been placed on file with the City of Wichita Falls.

Also, Dr. Tracy Menard gave a speech on family stress and tension.

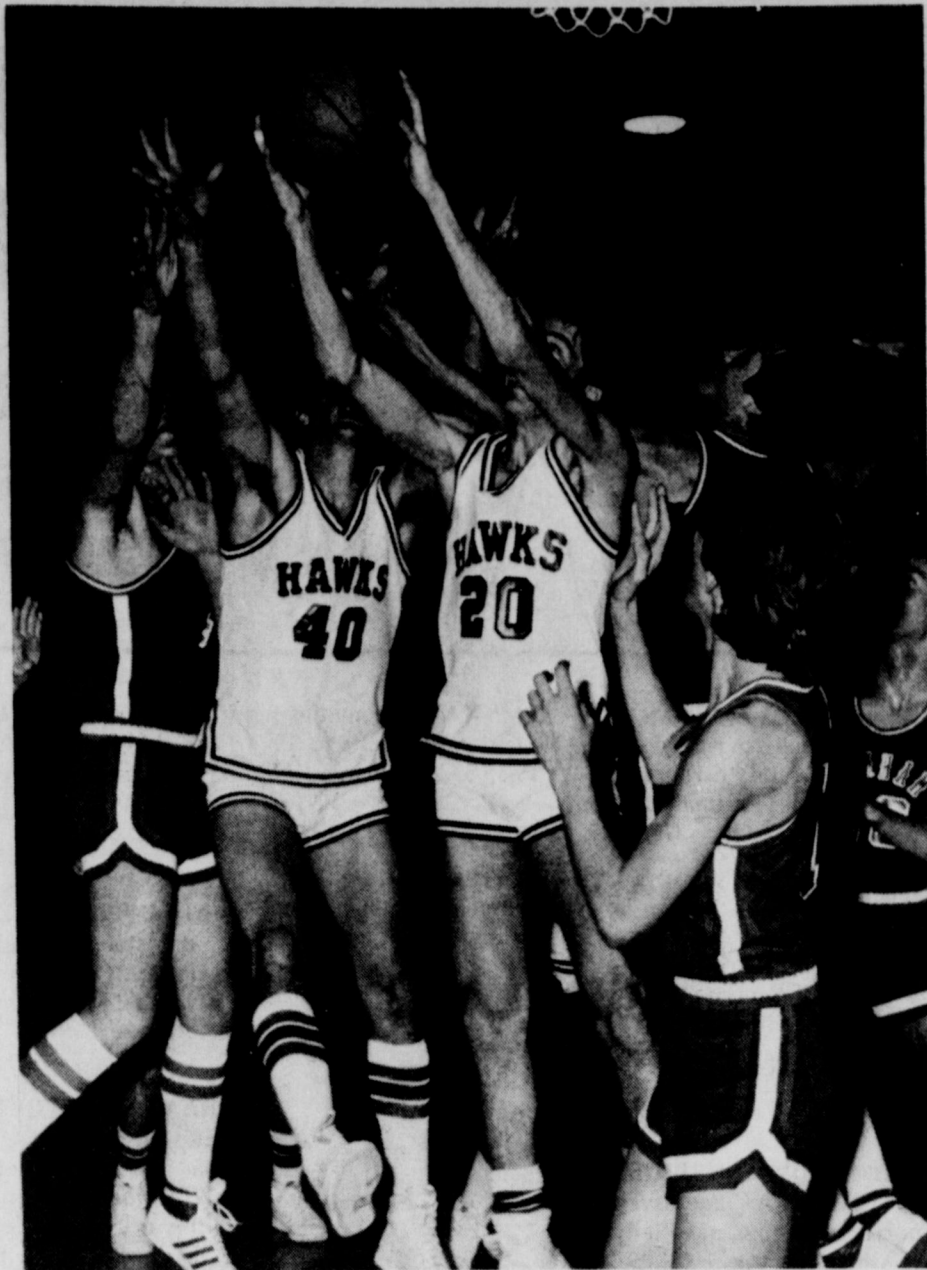

## Bugs in wheat patch

Several producers in Wichita County have become concerned with a small pest that is infesting their wheat. That pest is the winter grain mite, commonly called "spider mite" by growers.

Mites can be found in almost all wheat fields across the area. In the cases that I have seen, their numbers are too small to warrant control.

Donnie Peters and Bill Brockriede looked at some wheat near Punkin Center earlier in the week. The wheat had a few mites in it but not enough to treat. I have received calls and visits from some producers requesting information on the pest and what control measures they should use if high numbers become present.

Let me say a few words about what spider mites look like and how a producer can tell if they are causing damage.

The winter grain mite ranges in size from 1/32 to 1/16 inch in length. The adult has four pairs of reddish-orange legs, while the body is dark brown to black in color. The mites may also have a bluish cast to their body as well.

Their numbers are usually greater on land that has been in small grain production year after year. Therefore, rotation with crops like cotton or grain sorghum can aid in reducing mite numbers in those historically

heavily infested fields.

This pest feeds primarily at night, remaining around the base of the plant during the day. They are usually easy to find in the daylight hours by raising the wheat off the ground and looking under it. The mites will scurry along the ground and into the cracks when disturbed. Rains during the day, such as we had this past week, will help to reduce mite numbers.

The mites activity is retarded during period of hot, dry weather, and the greatest damage occurs during winter and early spring.

Mites cause leaf tips to turn brown and plants become stunted with a silvery-gray appearance. These symptoms and the presence of mites mean control measures might be needed.

As I said in the beginning, control measures are usually not needed for the winter grain mites. But, if they are, there are several chemicals labeled for use. Among these are Disulfoton (Di-Syston), Methyl Parathion (Di-Malathion). Be sure and note the grazing restrictions on these chemicals.

For Disulfoton, the label will say to not graze treated fields, do not repeat the application within 30 days, or do not harvest within 30 days of application. For methyl parathion, there is a 15-day waiting period for grazing and harvest. Malathion has a seven-day waiting period for grazing and harvest.

Check the fields closely for mites, but do not be too "trigger happy" when it comes to spraying them.
