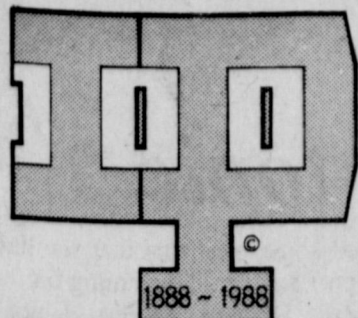

One candidate in trustee race

Eventhough the Iowa Park school board has not yet called its trustee election, applications are being accepted for the three positions to be filled.

The school election, as well as the city council election, will be held May 7.

The three school board positions to be decided are Places One, Two and Three. All are full, three-year terms.

Place Two is currently held by Wendall House, who was appointed to fulfill the unexpired term of Roy Boutwell after he resigned.

House has already turned in his application for a place on the ballot.

Neither of the other incumbents has indicated intentions to run for re-election. They are John Sibley, Place One, and Martha Dudley, the dean of the board in length of time, in Place Three.

All three incumbents on the city council have filed for re-election, plus one challenger.

Mayor Tim Hunter and Place Two Alderman Bud Mercer are as yet not challenged.

Place Four incumbent, Bud Burch, is being challenged by Cecil Yoder.

DEADLINE DATE NEARS

Deadline for candidates to file for both the school and city elections is Mar. 23.

Because the school administration office will be closed all of next week, for "spring break," potential candidates will actually have only five days to meet the Mar. 23 deadline.

Candidates for places on the city ballot can apply at any time during a weekday, during regular business hours, at city hall.

Prankster arrested

A 19-year-old man faces serious charges following an incident Tuesday that apparently was intended as a prank.

David Jack Godfrey is charged with disorderly conduct after reportedly brandishing a real-looking pistol at a school bus.

Godfrey is alleged to have followed an Iowa Park school bus as it took students home Tuesday afternoon.

As the students entered their homes, numerous calls were made to the police department about the incident, and gave a description of the vehicle.

Because the incident was taking place in the rural area, the sheriff's department was also notified.

When Iowa Park police stopped the suspected vehicle at 4:15 p.m. on West Highway, a backup police unit was close behind, and as the suspect was taken out of the car, two more patrol vehicles from the sheriff's department arrived, along with a Texas Ranger.

The cluster of law enforcement vehicles and a search of the suspect and his vehicle caused considerable interest among passing motorists, at the height of traffic on the busy thoroughfare.

A pellet gun closely resembling a .45 cal. automatic was confiscated. It was reportedly being carried in an under-arm holster, also adding to its authentic appearance.

Godfrey was released after posting a bond and promising to appear for a court hearing in Wichita Falls.

A "theft over \$200" report was filed by Pat Trantham, who said several pieces of jewelry had been taken from her 400 W. Diamond home.

Jerry Steward also filed a theft report, but a video game taken from

Homeowners warned in repair dealings

Residents of Iowa Park and area have begun repairing the damage caused by the Mar. 1 hail storm.

And with it comes warnings from city officials that home owners should observe when arranging for repairs to be made.

The preliminary estimate received by the city is that approximately 1,000 home roofs will be stripped of their old, beaten coverings and new coverings applied.

Tourism is speaker's topic

"Texas Tourism is the state's fastest growing industry," said Lisa Prothro, manager of the Wichita Falls Convention Visitors Bureau of the Board of Commerce and Industry, as she gave the program Thursday afternoon for the 23 Study Club's observance of Texas Independence Day.

Introduced by the leader, Mrs. Homer Blalock, she enthusiastically endeavored to show through facts and figures, and a video presentation that Texas, with her beautiful natural attractions and world famous hospitality, is fast becoming a major travel destination.

Mrs. Prothro said that the tourist industry caused the state to realize \$17.29-billion in total expenditures in 1986 and directly created 294,000 jobs. She observed that in recent times more attention has been focused on the travel industry as a means of helping to diversify the state's economy.

She said that the Texas Tourist Development Agency was created in 1963 to market Texas, both nationally and internationally, as a

travel destination when it became apparent that tourism was declining in the state while booming nationally.

She stated that the TTDA was merged into the newly created Texas Department of Commerce on Sept. 1, 1987 and designated as the Tourism Division. The Texas Legislature also passed legislation that for the first time dedicated a half percent of the state's hotel/motel occupancy tax specifically for travel marketing, indicating that about six million will be the Tourism Division share in 1988.

Mrs. Prothro climaxed her presentation by showing a video film of outstanding tourist attractions in Texas, and gave each one present a Texas-shaped pin.

In cooperation with the General Federation of Women's Clubs to encourage demonstration and instruction in heritage crafts, two members and a guest created a display of their works to generate interest in reviving heritage crafts.

Mrs. C. L. Metz displayed a treasure trove of her china paintings, explained the different types, and

showed some garments that she had done puff and acrylic painting on.

Mrs. Howard Marlar demonstrated candlewicking and allowed each one to put an embroidered knot in an unfinished piece of material. She showed a strikingly beautiful candlewick bedspread and pillows that she has done.

Mrs. Warren McDonald of Wichita Falls showed some lovely quilts that spoke of great-grandmother's art which is rapidly being revived. She pieced the quilts, quilted some of them, and showed one of her late grandmother's quilts that has been preserved. She also brought some of the lovely collars which she has crocheted.

The meeting was held in Texas Electric Reddy Room where the decor reflected the talent of the hostesses in carrying out a Texas theme.

The speaker's table was centered with a sesquicentennial scarf that held a Texas flag and a vase of native wildflowers. The refreshment table was covered with navy blue linen, centered with a white-iced Texas-shaped cake that was later presented to Mrs. Prothro, a hand-painted bluebonnet plate, and a vase of fresh white narcissus, kolachae, pandina and holly shrubs. The red and blue bandana napkins added further Lone Star state emphasis.

The hostesses were Mmes. Joe Singer, China B. Smith, Sam Hill, L.E. Brooks and D.O. James.

Mrs. Singer conducted a short business meeting when Mrs. Smith and Mrs. E.F. Soell were elected delegates to the Santa Rosa District spring meeting March 25-26, and it was voted to contribute to a gift for the retiring district president.

Mrs. James, federation counselor, announced National Library Week would be observed April 19-23 and urged members to visit the Tom Burnett Memorial Library during that week.

AIDS, drug abuse subject of program

A program of "Facts About AIDS and Drug Abuse" was presented Tuesday evening by Dee Dee Forney for Epsilon Eta Chapter of Epsilon Sigma Alpha in a meeting held at the Forney home with Jo Baumgardner serving as co-hostess.

She said that AIDS, acquired immune deficiency syndrome, first appeared in this country in 1981, and that it is a deadly disease caused by a virus. She stressed that Americans need to know the basic facts of the disease and how to avoid risk of infection. She said that the AIDS virus damages the body's natural immune defenses against diseases, and people with AIDS develop life-threatening illnesses that do not affect other people.

Mrs. Forney stated that half of the Americans who have developed AIDS have died. Approximately ninety eight percent reported to date have occurred in the following people: homosexual and bisexual men; present or past users of illegal drugs; persons who have had blood transfusions; persons with blood-clotting problems, men and women with permissive sexual habits, and infants born to mothers with AIDS.

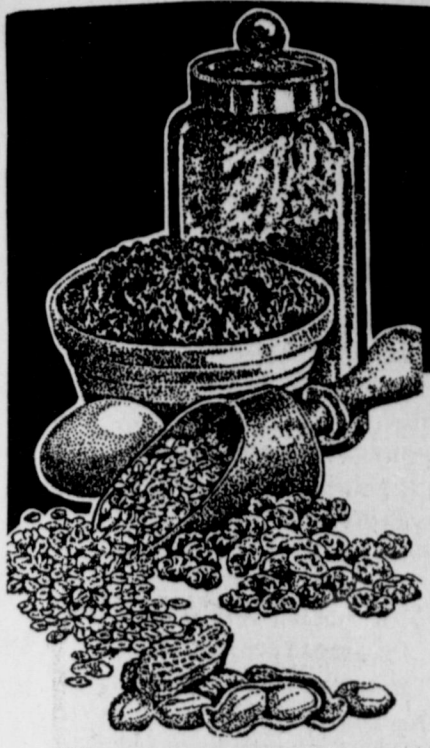

Cook of the Week



Many are the things that make a home a "homey" place, and one of the most treasured things that bring satisfaction and pleasant memories is the cookie jar. Cookies come in many shapes, such as logs, stars, flowers, hearts, and bars, and can be decorated according to one's taste.

Brownies are moist bars that have been an all-American favorite since the nineteenth century, reaching the peak of their popularity when the first brownie recipe appeared in an 1897 edition of the Sears, Roebuck catalogue.

Lana (Mrs. Alton) Gates may, or may not, have tried the brownie recipe that appeared in the Sears, Roebuck catalogue, but her Orange Slice Brownie recipe sounds like it will bring a lot of "ahs" and "ohs" that are sure to greet a particularly good bar, one that can be used for a dessert, an accompaniment for coffee or tea, or to satisfy a sweet tooth between meals.

Lana was graduated from Caddo Mills High School and from East Texas State Univ. with a BS degree in education and home economics. She was a member of Alpha Chi, Eta Epsilon and American Home Economics at the university. She taught in the Community High School near Lone Oak for several years before she and her husband, Alton, who is district superintendent for Lone Star Gas Co. and their daughter, Rachel, a junior at Iowa Park High School, moved to the area. They live on Horseshoe Lake Road. She is presently teaching homemaking for the seventh and eighth graders at Zundelowitz Junior High School in Wichita Falls.

The family are members of First Baptist Church. Lana's hobbies are snow skiing with her family, gardening, cooking, sewing and bicycling.

One of the family's favorite recipes is the one below. Alton got it from Aunt Fanny's Cabin in Smyrna, Ga.

AUNT FANNY'S BAKED SQUASH

- 3 lbs. yellow summer squash
- 1/2 cup chopped onions
- 1/2 cup cracker meal or bread crumbs
- 1/2 tsp. pepper (salt and pepper may be increased to taste)
- 2 eggs
- 1 stick butter
- 1 tsp. sugar
- 1 tsp. salt

Wash and cut up squash. Boil until tender, drain thoroughly, then mash. Add all ingredients except 1/2 of butter to squash. Melt remaining butter. Pour mixture in baking dish, then spread melted butter over top and sprinkle with cracker meal or bread crumbs. Bake in 375 oven for approximately one hour or until brown on top.

ORANGE SLICE BROWNIES

- 3/4 cup melted margarine
- 2 1/2 cups - 1 lb. brown sugar
- 2 tsp. vanilla

Cream above ingredients together in large bowl, then add: 3 eggs, one at a time

- Sift together:
- 2 1/2 cups flour
- 2 1/2 tsp. baking powder
- 1/2 tsp. salt, then add to creamed mixture

Fold in ingredients below that have been dredged in 1/4 cup flour:

PINEAPPLE DREAM CAKE

Bake 1 butter recipe yellow cake mix in 3 layers and allow to cool. For frosting, combine in order:

- 1 medium or tall can crushed pineapple
- 1 large vanilla instant pudding
- 1 large Cool Whip or 2 1/2-3 cups Dream Whip
- 1 tsp. vanilla

Stir till smooth and creamy. Spread between the 3 layers. Refrigerate overnight or several hours before serving. Will keep for several days in the refrigerator. Best flavor after the second or third day after making. Keep refrigerated and covered.

Don't let the cake get overbaked or dry. "We like the cake at room temperature, so take it out about an hour before serving."

PINK SALAD

- 1 can Eagle Brand Milk
- 1/3 cup lemon juice
- 1 large can crushed pineapple, drained
- 1-11 oz. can drained mandarin oranges
- 1 can cherry pie filling
- 1-9 or 12 oz. carton Cool Whip
- 1-2 cups mini marshmallows
- 1/2 - 1 cup chopped pecans

In a very large bowl, beat milk with lemon juice until thick. Stir in remaining ingredients, mix well. Chill several hours or overnight before serving.

- 1 lb. coarsely chopped orange slice candy
 - 1 cup chopped pecans
- Spread in a well greased 9x13" pan. May use a wet spatula to smooth to sides. Bake at 350 degrees 25-30 minutes or till lightly browned. Do not overbake. Cool before cutting.

BROCCOLI SOUFFLE

Cook 1 pkg. broccoli until tender. Stir in 1 can nacho cheese soup. Add 1 cup cooked rice, stir well. In a separate bowl, beat 3 egg whites to stiff peaks. Fold into broccoli mixture, mixing well. Pour into greased 2 1/2 to 3 quart casserole or souffle dish. Bake at 350 degrees about 30 minutes or until golden brown and puffed.

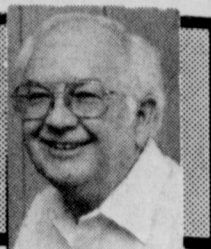

Iowa Park has been a hotbed of activity here of late, and no letup is foreseeable in the near future.

Incinerator study ready

The city council Monday night will hear a report it commissioned on a proposed incinerator that could replace its sanitary landfill operation, and take action on bids for purchasing several equipment items.

A study of costs and uses of an incinerator was approved several months ago by the council, to compare that operation with the costs of maintaining a landfill program.

Bids offered for purchasing of trash containers, a loader tractor and a mower tractor will be considered.

Aldermen will be asked for authority to hire a temporary employee for the street and sanitation department, because of the additional load of work expected to handle all the roofing materials as residents begin replacing their roofs damaged by the recent hail storm.

Use of the ballfield next to the Recreational Activities Center will also be a topic of discussion, a carry-over from the last meeting.

Aldermen will consider offering assistance to the Industrial Development Board, and also authorizing travel expenses for delegates to a seminar in Austin of the Texas Municipal League.

Kenyon hobbles Steer batters in 11-0 win Friday

Billy Kenyon, in his first appearance on the mound this season, struck out 11 batters Friday, and then hit a pair of doubles to score five runs, as the Hawks knocked off Graham 11-0.

Kenyon's had some problems with his control, however, walking eight Steers, but gave up only two hits.

The Hawks scored three runs in both the third and fourth innings, and added five more in the fifth and final inning.

Continued from page 1 of insuring homeowners the firm is accountable.

The firm must also have a performance bond, which is an additional guarantee that the work performed will be done and in good order, said Mike Price, public works director.

Once an agreement has been reached between the homeowner and the contractor, a permit to do the work must be obtained from city hall. The cost is \$3 per \$1,000-value.

Under no circumstance should a homeowner pay any money to the prospective contractor before work is done, Price warned.

Reliable contractors do not require "up front money."

The city has obtained a special permit to dig a separate pit to receive building materials caused by storm damage, Price said.

The pit, which will be located just southwest of the current sanitary landfill, will be used for building materials only.

Price had been concerned about receiving the special pit permit from the state, because it appeared early the city would have to use its regular pit for the debris.

The regular pit, built to meet state mandates, cost almost \$70,000 to construct. Intended for 12-months use, Price estimated the materials from damaged roofs would shorten the expected life of the pit by three months.

Entrance to the landfill is off West Smith Road, near the intersection with Johnson Road.

For residents planning to do their own work, Price said the city's policy of making available a dump truck, for a small fee, continues.

The truck, which must be parked but not operated, is available overnight and on weekends, but is available only to Iowa Park residents.

Building permits, however, must be obtained for roofing of homes, regardless of whether a resident is doing the work himself, or contracting for it to be done, Price emphasized.

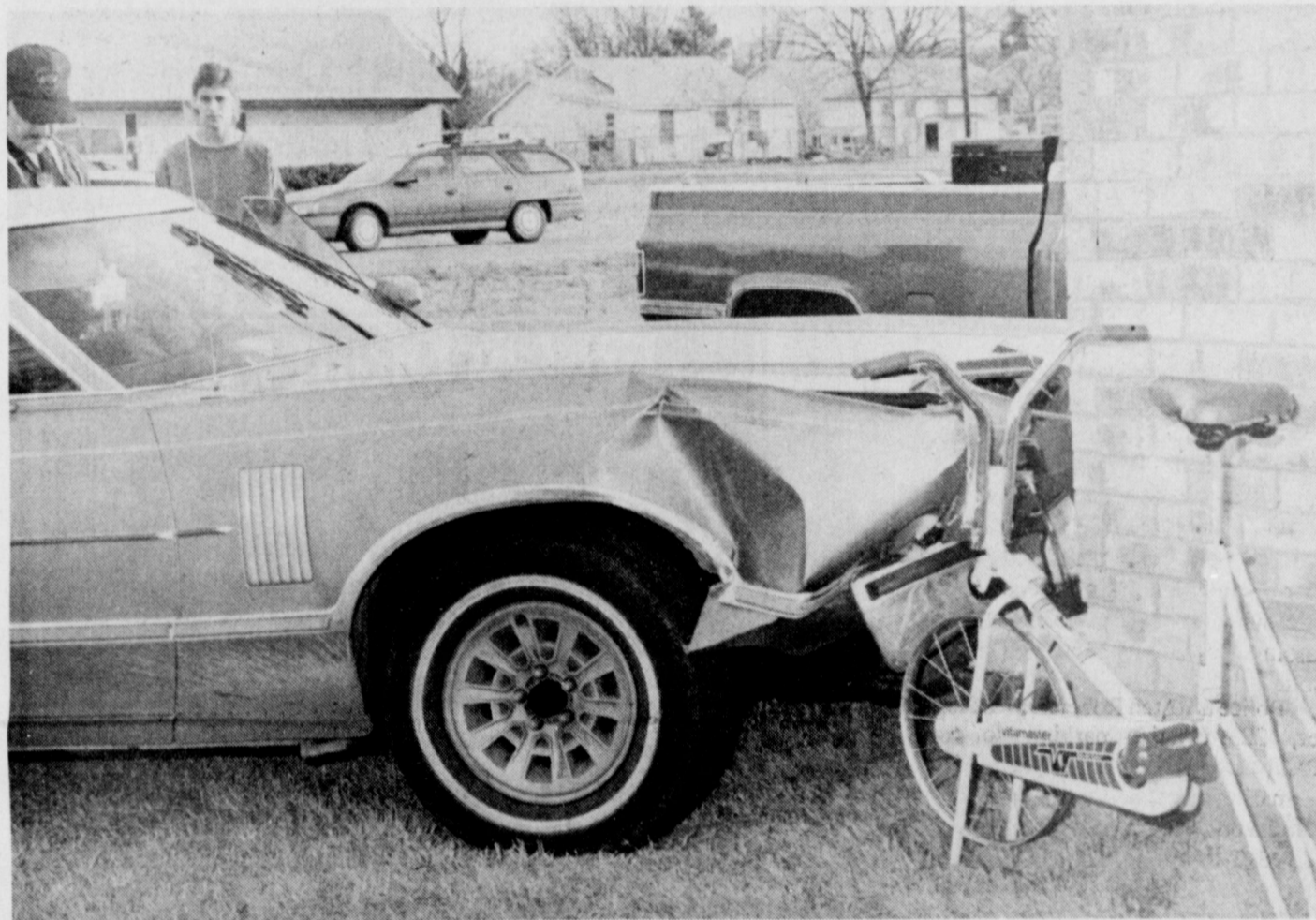
