

Absentee voting dates set for JP

Absentee voting in the April 12 Democratic Party runoff for Precinct Three Justice of the Peace will be April 4-8 at the Iowa Park School Tax Office, according to Allan Shewmake.

Voters residing in voting precincts 32, 33 and 60 will use the same absentee box, Shewmake said.

The top two among five JP candidates were Bill Robinson, who drew 495 votes, and Wendell Bean, 398.

Netters finish in 9th at state tournament

While the Iowa Park High tennis team returned home elated with ninth place in the group's first appearance in the state team tennis tournament at Austin, they were aware they almost placed fifth or sixth.

Iowa Park was among four teams from this region that qualified for the tournament, sponsored by the Texas Tennis Coaches Association, held over the weekend. There are four regions in the state.

After being knocked out Friday morning 10-5 by powerful Marble Falls, the team finished in a 9-9 tie that evening with Rockdale. That match was not decided until Saturday morning, because of a curfew imposed at night on the courts.

Officials had to go to their third method of breaking the tie, and had to use the number of sets won by the two teams during the first two rounds of play. Rockdale was determined the winner by virtue of having won 174 sets to Iowa Park's 160.

A win in the second round of the tournament assures a team to place no lower than sixth in the meet.

Iowa Park breezed through its competition in the third and fourth rounds, defeating Wills Point 10-4 and Van 10-2.

Mason won the title by defeating Cameron, Marble Falls beat Brownfield for third place, and Perryton won the losers' bracket, which is composed of second-round winners.

"Our boys won almost every match they played," Wineinger said, but the girls had a much harder time against very strong competition, winning very few matches.

Team tennis competition is made up of six boys' singles, six girls' singles, three boys' doubles and three girls' doubles. Points are awarded for each set win earned by team members.

Council wants more study on costs of incinerator

After hearing three different alternatives for using an incinerator to displace burying the city's trash, all of which were not recommended as financially feasible, the council sent the consultant back to the drawing board.

All three alternatives were based on a common plan to produce steam for sale to Cryovac, with the revenue offsetting the cost of the operation.

The three options were to burn only waste produced by Iowa Park; option two was to open the service to another community, such as Electra; and the third included the two communities plus waste produced by Cryovac.

Costs, including construction, operation and finances, however, proved to be more than estimated revenues, according to Terry Winn, spokesman for Kindle, Stone and Associates, a firm of engineers and planners.

Winn said the annual loss of option one would be \$317,000; option two, \$266,000, and option three, \$649,000.

However, because no figures were presented on the cost and operation of an incinerator that would burn only trash produced by Iowa Park, and not include everything necessary for the sale of steam, the council asked Winn to make one additional study.

The additional study, to be presented at the April 11 meeting, will cost \$1,000, Winn said. His firm did the initial study for a fee of \$8,000.

Administrator James Barrington said the cost of the study could be considered worthwhile, in that it kept the council from possibly making a \$2-million mistake.

OTHER BUSINESS

In other business, the council heard complaints about a car-sales business proposed in a residential area on North Pacific, approved bids for purchasing equipment, and held a discussion on a possible new location for a baseball field.

A group of residents complained about a variance granted by the board

of adjustments, concerning a commercial development on Pacific.

But since their appeal was made and any action was prohibited by the council because it was not on the posted agenda, the subject is to be on the Mar. 28 agenda for action.

At issue is a strip of frontage on the east side of Pacific, between Coleman and Rebecca, that is zoned for residential use only.

Classrooms boost permits

A building permit issued to the Iowa Park school district multiplied February's permits issued by city hall more than 10 times the total for January.

Construction of classrooms at Bradford Elementary required a permit for \$217,600, which was the major portion of February's \$269,617 total.

Mayor Hunter, in making the presentation, pointed out she had found several areas where improvements in operations could be made, as well as cost savings.

Additionally, the council officially set May 7 for the city election; discussed a joint meeting of council

Candidates have until Wednesday

Potential candidates for the May 7 city council and school board elections have until the close of business Wednesday to file for a place on the ballots.

Three positions on each government body will be voted on this year.

In the city election, Mayor Tim Hunter and Place Two Alderman Bud

Mercer are as yet unchallenged, but Place Four Alderman Bud Burch is being challenged by Cecil Yoder.

Information of filings for the school trustee election is unavailable because of "spring break," and the administration building being closed.

However, as of last week, only Place Two Trustee Wendall House had filed.

Neither of the other incumbents, John Sibley, Place One, and Martha

Dudley, Place Three, had filed.

Dudley, who has been on the board longer than any other trustee, had told the others in an open meeting she would not seek re-election. Sibley, at last contact, had still not made up his mind.

Applications for the school board election will be available Monday through Wednesday, when the staff returns to work from "spring break" vacation.

More money for streets

The City of Iowa Park has 13 percent more money in its street fund than this time last year.

Iowa Park's sales tax rebate check this month was \$8,914.21, which raises the calendar year's sum to \$46,012.46.

The city council has a policy of earmarking sales tax money for street repairs and building.

The fund is 13 percent greater than the \$40,717.85 received during the first three months of 1987, according to the state comptroller's office.

March's check represents taxes collected by monthly filers in January and reported to the comptroller's office by Feb. 22.

Iowa Park has the largest increase in sales taxes collected of the four Wichita County cities.

In fact, only Burkburnett is showing an increase over last year, 4.19 percent.

Electra is a minus 7.70 percent and Wichita Falls is minus 7.44.

Holliday is reporting a whopping 45.33 percent over this time last year, \$14,281.23.

FM 369 to close Monday

Area residents who commute to work in the south part of Wichita Falls, and shoppers who are determined to spend their money there, will find their trips the next four months will take a little longer.

FM 369 will close Monday, while the bridge over the Wichita River is being rebuilt and widened.

Residents and businesses on the closed portion of FM 369 will not be

restricted to and from their homes and business locations. The road-closing applies only to through traffic, according to the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

The bridge was built in 1956. When completed, it will be 44 feet wide from railing to railing. The deck will be replaced and new beams will be added.

Amarillo Road Co. is the prime contractor for the \$1,137,000 project.

FM 369 is already being made wider. Paved shoulders are being added to the roadway between US 82 and FM 367.

FM 369 carries about 3,300 vehicles per day in the area of the bridge.

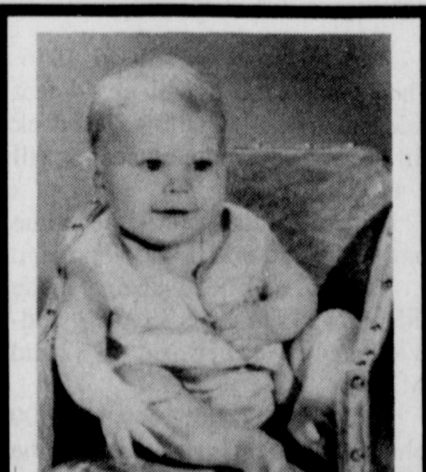

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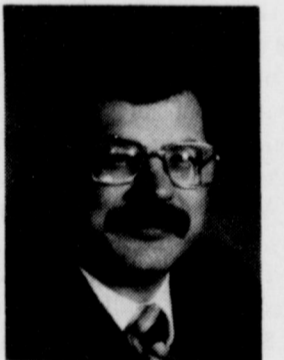
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Cook of the Week

THREE LAYER DESSERT

- 1 c. flour
 - 1 c. butter
 - 1 c. chopped nuts
- Mix this together and press into oblong Pyrex plate Bake 20 minutes at 325. Cool.
- 8 oz. cream cheese
 - 1 c. powdered sugar
 - 1 c. Cool Whip
- Mix this together and spread over first layer.
- 1 pkg. vanilla instant pudding mix
 - 4 1/2 c. milk
 - 2 pkgs. chocolate instant pudding mix

Mix together until thick and spread over second layer. Spread the rest of cool whip on top and grate a small Hershey bar on top.

BROCCOLI AND RICE DISH

- 2 c. rice
- 1 pkg. chopped broccoli
- 1/2 c. onions
- 1 c. sliced celery
- 1 can cream of chicken soup
- 1 can cream of mushroom soup
- 1 lg. jar Cheez Whiz

Put cooked rice in greased casserole dish. Cook broccoli as directed on package. Saute onions and celery. Heat and stir soups until smooth. Add broccoli, onion and celery to soups. Mix well and pour over rice. Top with Cheez Whiz and paprika. Bake 15-20 minutes at 350. (Can make in two dishes and freeze one.)

MEXICAN CASSEROLE

- 1 1/4 cups biscuit mix
- 1/4 cup sour cream
- 1 egg
- 1 lb. ground beef
- 1 tsp. salt

- 1/2 cup chopped onions
- 1 can Mexican Style chili beans
- 1/2 cup shredded lettuce
- 1 cup diced tomatoes
- 3/4 cup grated Monterey Jack Cheese

Blend biscuit mix, sour cream and egg to form soft dough. With floured hands, spread dough in bottom and up sides of a 10X6X1 3/4-inch pan. Brown ground beef; drain excess fat. Add salt, onion and chili beans and spoon into crust. Bake 20-30 minutes at 425 or until crust is browned. Top with lettuce, tomatoes and cheese. Let stand five minutes before cutting.

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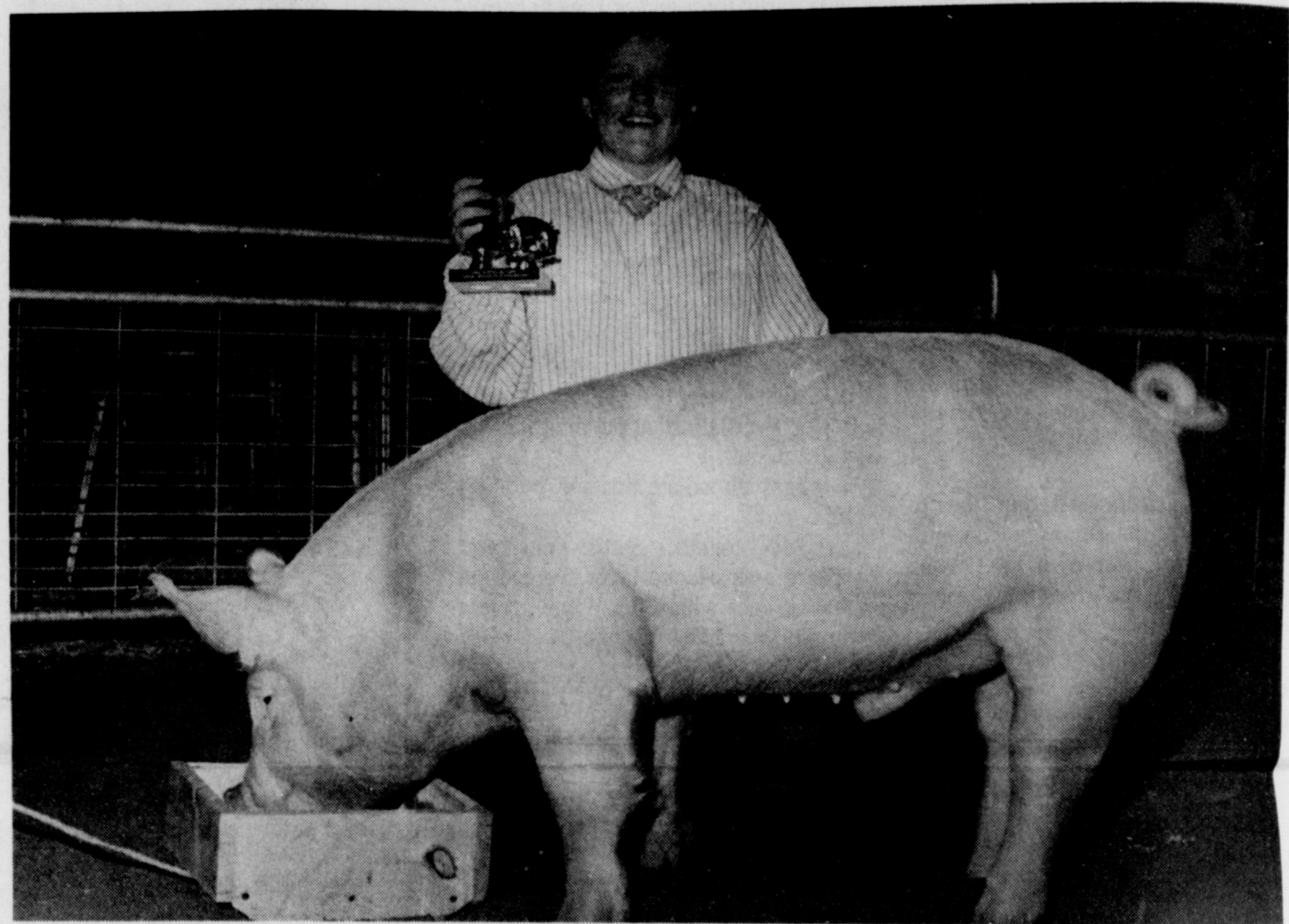

Actually, Farabee's resignation hasn't even been accepted by Gov. Bill Clements, nor has an election date been set.

I understand Clements will be out of Austin until about Friday. He is to sign the paper required to accept the resignation when he gets back to his office.

Helen Farabee is candidate

Helen Farabee, a Democrat from Wichita Falls, has formally announced her candidacy for the State Senate. She brings years of experience working with the legislature and a long list of awards and achievements to the race.

Voted "Texan of the Year" by Texas Business Magazine in 1985, Farabee was also runner-up for "Outstanding Texan" in 1985 in Texas Monthly Magazine. She was named to the "Texas Woman's Hall of Fame" in 1985.

She has also been honored by other state-wide groups, including the Texas Employment Commission, the Texas Mental Health Association and the Texas Hospital Association.

Citing the economy as the state's biggest challenge, Farabee says she is eager to put the clamp on overspending.

"All of us know we have to tighten our belts when funds are low," Farabee said. "I've had a great deal of experience in setting priorities and I'll do that with the state budget in Austin."

She went on to say that the legislature must use state dollars more effectively. "We don't need to spend

May 7. But that's not yet a fact. The governor has made no move toward setting a date, as yet.

And if he doesn't by early April, the election can't be held until Aug. 6.

Some state Democrats are accusing Clements, a Republican, of delaying so his party comes up with a candidate to run against Farabee and Holliday's Charles Finnell.

Since the state has demonstrated it's now a two-party place, as evidenced by the turnout in the primary, that may not be a bad idea after all.

more money; we need to be smarter about the money we spend.

"Providing health care for those who cannot afford it is essential. As chairman of a legislative task force, I led the fight to put together a more cost effective health care program for our state.

"Another priority is vocational education," Farabee continued. "Trained workers get jobs, and this boosts local economies and saves tax dollars."

Farabee has served and continues to serve on a variety of state and national boards including Maternal and Child Health Advisory Committee, the State Coordinating Council on Long Term Care for the Elderly, Select Committee on Medicaid, Child Abuse Prevention Foundation, United Way of Texas, Long Range Planning Group for Texans with Disabilities, and several mental health committees.

Farabee is running to fill the 30th District Senate seat vacated by her husband, Ray, who resigned to accept a position as Vice Chancellor for the University of Texas System.

A date for the special election has not yet been set by the governor.

Senate candidate visits local elementary school

State Representative Charles Finnell strongly defended the principle of local control of Texas school districts after visiting Kidwell Elementary Second Grade students Monday.

His visit gave emphasis on the Texas Public Schools Week observance.

"School boards, educators, parents and students form a local part-

nership that can best determine the needs and goals of our school systems," said Finnell, who has filed as a candidate for senator of the 30th District.

Finnell opposes a district court ruling handed down last year in Austin that the current method of school financing in Texas is inequitable. The ruling is being appealed by the State of Texas.

"Judicial activism of this sort could erode the influence of local people over their children's education," Finnell said.

"We must continue local programs of excellence that will prepare our students for competition in today's world-wide marketplace," he said.

Baptism is extremely important because the New Testament sets forth the following purposes: to enter the kingdom John 3:5; contact Christ's blood Romans 6:3,4; get into Christ Galatians 3:27; for salvation Mark 16:16, 1 Peter 3:21; for remission of sins Acts 2:38; wash away sins Acts 22:16; to get into the church 1 Corinthians 12:13, Ephesians 1:23.

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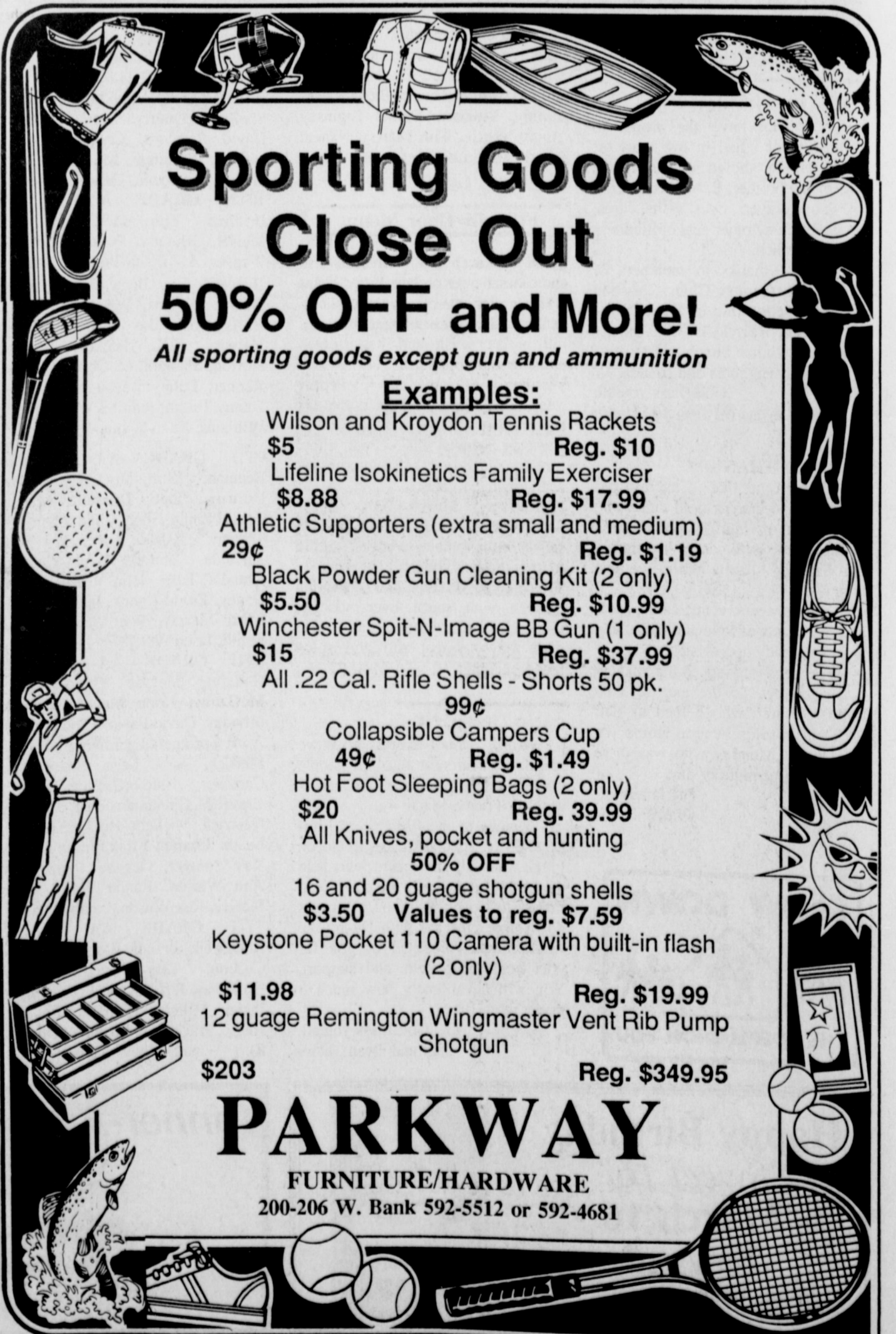
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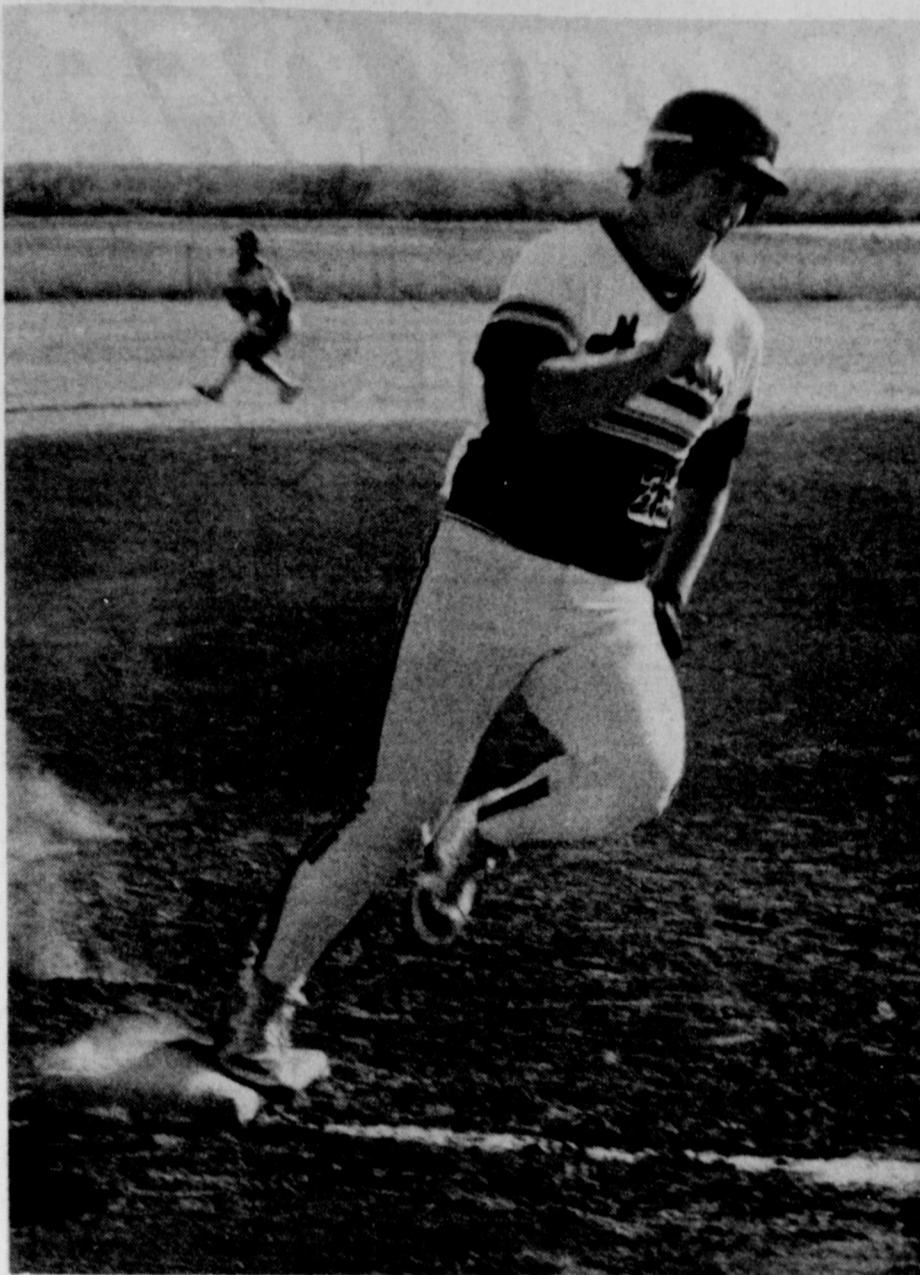

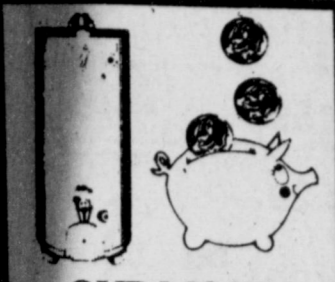
