## Absentee voters mostly absent

Voters are showing almost as much interest in the May 7 city and school elections as did the candidates in filing.

With the deadline for voting absentee just around the corner, Tuesday, one absentee vote has been cast in both the elections.

When the city hall and school administration offices close Tuesday,

that will end voting in person by absentee.

Each election has only one contested race, and incumbents are running unopposed for the other posts.

In the school election, Sheri (Mrs. Pat) Kennedy and Jerry Gholson are vying for Place 3, which has been held by Martha Dudley, who is not seeking re-election.

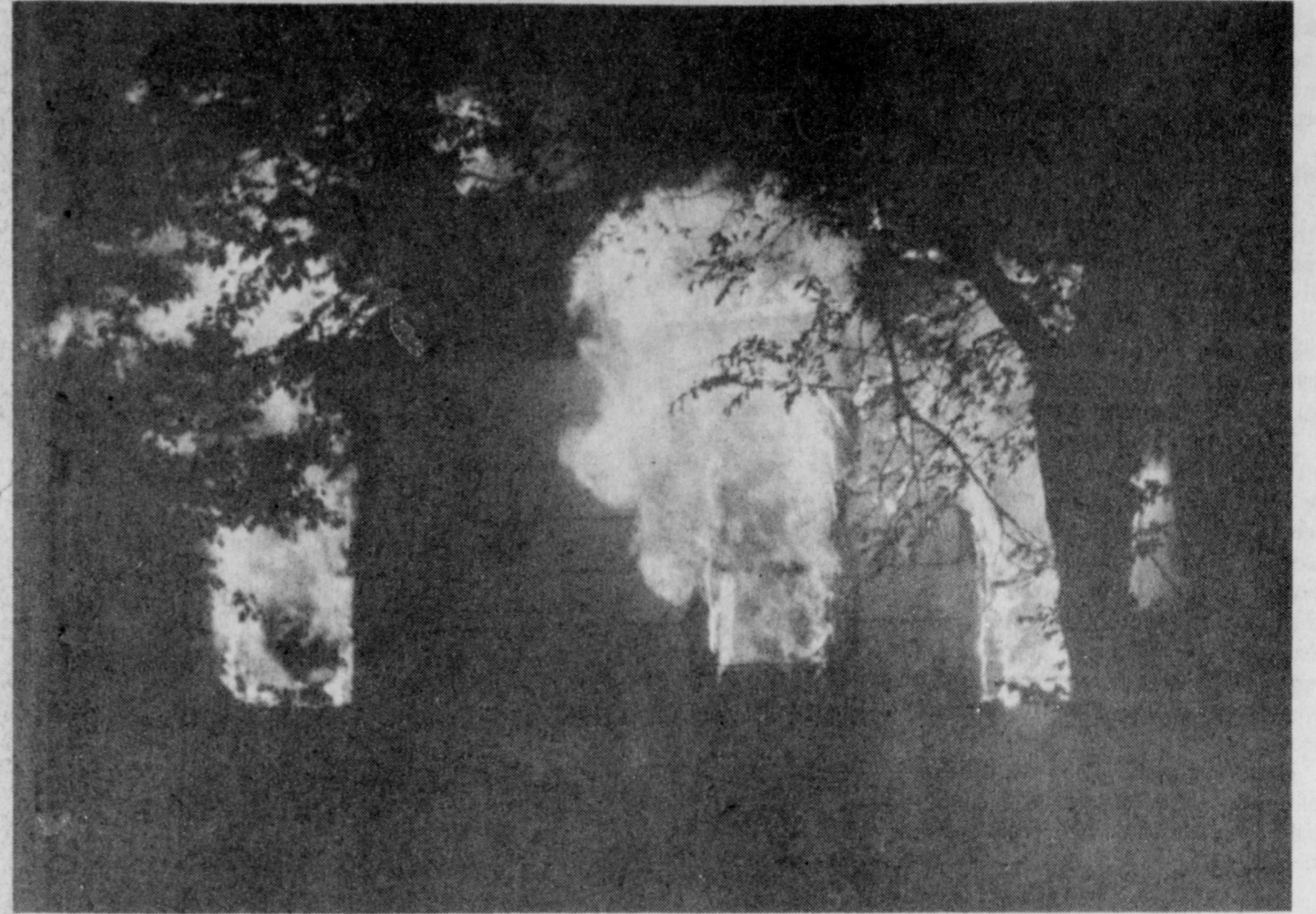
Trustees John Sibley, Place 1,

## City's senior employee retiring after 17 years

After having served under nine chiefs of police and six mayors, Delores Vestal is ending her tenure Friday as Communications Supervisor with the Iowa Park Police Department after some 17 years of service.

Delores, who has the greatest tenure of any current city employee, has seen the department grow from three or four officers and four dispatchers in 1971 to nine officers and five dispatchers today.

Her title isn't limited, however, to Communications Supervisor. She is also a certified police officer and the Municipal Court Clerk.

When Delores joined the police department in 1971 her duty was to train dispatchers.

Just one year after she began her job, with some persistent prodding from the late Dr. Gordon Clark she became a certified police officer, an event that she says is one of her proudest moments while with the police department.

Although she isn't seen on regular patrol, her training has come in handy with rape victims, female prisoners and in working with juveniles that are brought in.

"Women (who have been assaulted) and children usually have an easier time talking to a woman (about the incident) than to a male officer," she said.

She must keep her certification current and reports to the firing range like any other officer.

While she was attending police academy, she kept a family, worked and also became certified to administer first aid.

Anyone who has gone to court for a traffic ticket in Iowa Park during the past eight years would probably recognize Delores as the

woman sitting next to the municipal court judge. Delores' duties in this capacity include the keeping of records in the court docket.

Of all her duties during the work day, Delores commented, "You have to love it."

One event in all her years of working for the IPPD sticks out in her mind like none other was something that occurred after an attempted bank robbery here just before Christmas in the early 1970s.

Delores said she was on dispatching duty when a call came over the radio of the attempted robbery at the State National Bank.

The fact that the would-be robbers used a Volkswagon as a getaway car, and the driver couldn't get the car in reverse would be funny enough, but the events that followed made memories for a lifetime.

After the culprits drove down the sidewalk in their getaway attempt, they ended up behind Davis Laundry, where Iowa Park police apprehended the suspects.

While frisking one of the suspects, assumed to be a man, Delores said the officer backed up and yelled, "Whoaaaa, it's a woman!"

It was, in fact, a woman dressed as a man.

She said that particular event has

given her and the other dispatcher on duty at the time, Herman Kight, a story to pass down from generation to generation.

The former DeloresLangford is well-known around town, having grown up in Iowa Park and graduated high school here.

The first job she ever held was with Berry's Drug Store, located on West Cash Street.

While she was a freshman in high school, she met the man she was to marry, James Vestal. After 32 years of marriage, they have a daughter, Elaine Jones, and a grandson, Ashton.

Delores figures there will be plenty to do after her last day of city work, saying her days will be filled with exercise, yardwork, travel, catching up on housework and spending time with her grandson. She also collects carousel horses.

"I feel like a part of me is up here," she said, adding that "her girls," the dispatchers, will be the hardest to leave.

Tomorrow certainly won't be an easy day for Delores. She'll be saying goodbye to her working relationship with her co-workers, who think as much of her as she of them. But the friendships she has grown in years past will remain.

## STUDY RESULTS SAME:

### Burning trash too expensive

Incineration of garbage is not economically feasible, according to a study made by a consultant and presented Monday night to the city council.

Terry Winn, who had earlier told the council his study on incineration accompanied by production of steam to be sold as energy was not feasible, reported on an extended study he made, which was for burning only.

While the costs of construction and operation were considerably less for burning only, Winn said, "In my opinion, it's not an economically feasible facility."

He tempered his recommendation, however, by saying it would be more feasible is more non-commercial trash, accepted from other sources on a commission basis, was taken to offset operating costs.

His comment was made after he told the council the cost of burning only Iowa Park's trash would be \$206,000 annually, and \$154,000 if Electra's trash were included (for a fee).

No comments or discussion were made following Winn's appearance.

The council unanimously (two aldermen, Johnny Coker and Diane

Robnett were absent) approved a resolution requesting the state to change the US 287 access roads within the city limits to two-way traffic.

The topic has been discussed many times by councils over the years, but this is the first time a council has gone so far as to put the request into resolution form.

Seeking to change access road traffic from one-way to two-way is a project being undertaken this year by the Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce.

The resolution points out that "...the flow of traffic within the city...is severely handicapped by the imposition of one-way access roads adjacent to US 287" and "...efforts to develop the land with frontage ... for industrial and commercial use to enhance the economy...and hampered by the restrictive traffic flow patterns created by the one-way access roads..."

After hearing a comment from Administrator James Barrington that he was disappointed with the turnout at last week's excess property auction, and that four items should be withdrawn from the list, bids received

were accepted by the council.

Only 17 bidders responded to an

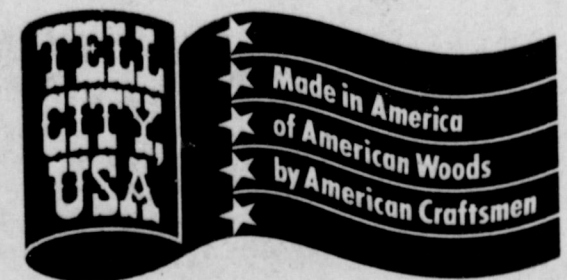

# As I See It...

Texans who have been having a hard time paying their increasing tax bills during the economic slump over the state are taking a slap in the face by spokespersons of the Texas State Teachers Association.

The slap comes in the form of a speech made Friday in Dallas by the president of the organization, Charles Beard, and another talk last week in East Texas by Olivia Besterio, TSTA vice president.

An Associated Press story carried by papers over the state stated: "Texas teachers will ask the Legislature for a pay raise next year to combat erosion of advances the sweeping education reform put in place four years ago," and attributed the statement to Beard.

If I'm not correct, I understand that teachers over Texas have received an annual salary increase of \$1,140 since the passage of House Bill 72.

With that kind of raise each year, I don't understand how Beard says the state has fallen from 21st ranking in the nation for teacher salaries to 27th. I wish the story had quoted him on which states have been increasing salaries faster than Texas.

I'll bet my watch that none of those passing Texas in salaries, if it did occur, were oil-producing states.

To make his call for higher wages sound with more fury, he quoted from a survey made by a Sam Hous-

ton State Univ. professor's survey that pointed out 29 percent of the teachers surveyed hold summer jobs.

What's new? Most folks want something to do after a couple of months vacation.

The same survey also said one in five teachers hold second jobs to make ends meet. Could it be that most of those were in their early years of their profession? Many of us held second jobs in similar circumstances. Not just teachers.

Besteiro, speaking at a banquet in Atlanta (Tex.), said both the funding and philosophy behind public education will face critical junctures when legislators reconvene.

"And in the end, it will affect every Texan's pocketbook," she is quoted saying.

As if it already hadn't? She is also quoted as saying in a presentation about tax equity: "We do not propose that money be taken from the rich districts. We propose funds be raised to give to the poor districts."

From outside Texas? Every inch of this state is in one school district or another. From where would she propose the extra money come?

Beard pointed out that the average Texas teacher salary is \$25,655, and it was \$2,400 below the national average. That Texas average, by the way, amounts to almost \$140 per day of teaching.

There's a bunch of couples who filed joint tax returns who made less than \$20,000 last year. A big bunch. Now isn't a very appealing time for someone with that kind of income, who has a built-in annual increase, to gripe about pay?

Beard, in the AP story, also said school districts have been stingy in dealing with teachers, pointing out 745 districts froze their "local" share of salaries, while 111 districts cut pay.

Those freezes and cuts in local contributions to teacher salaries were mostly caused by all the increases in cost of public education mandated by House Bill 72. And the TSTA was a mighty big supporter of that bill, as I recall.

School districts over the state are being strapped to finance construction of additional space to meet the 22-1 pupil-teacher ratio in elementary grades.

Districts learned that the bill that built in teacher salary increases did not fund any increases for administration and other support personnel.

Very few, if any, districts in this part of the country realized any increase in state funding. In fact, money from Austin is shorter than it was before all the additional costs were put into effect.

Where state funding was about 70 percent of Iowa Park's needs a few short years ago, it's down to 50 percent now, and predicted to be even lower in the coming years.

Many school districts have been forced to increase their local tax rate greater than eight percent in one year, and have been turned back by a roll-back vote of the public.

advertisement announcing the auction.

After removing the items from the approved list, because of low bids offered on them, all other bids were accepted, amounting to \$2,824.25.

Items on which bids were rejected, and the bids, were: a 500-gallon fuel tank, \$60; a 1,000-gallon fuel tank with electric pump, \$25; a 2,000-gallon fuel tank with electric pump, \$170, and an iron wheel roller, \$50.

While more time is needed in the city's effort to obtain land for a new Senior Little League ballfield, Barrington said, it was recommended the city purchase and install lights for the girls' softball fields on Atlantic.

Alderman Bud Mercer said the old lights from the Little League fields on Magnolia were not satisfactory for continued use, aldermen accepted a recommendation to purchase new lights, for a maximum of \$5,000, and be installed by the city.

Also approved was a proposal to have the facilities at the sewer treatment plant painted, at a cost of \$3,475.

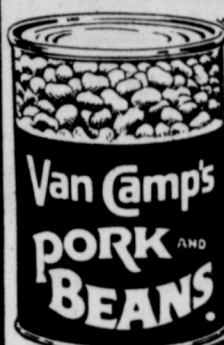

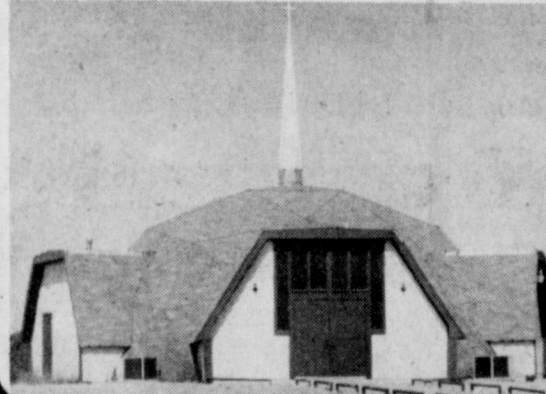

## Touts classes in vocations

Sandra Marvel, director of the vocational program of the Wichita Falls Independent School District, spoke to the Evening Lions Tuesday and described vocational education as the "centerpiece for the dropout problem in schools throughout the state and nation."

She said that House Bill 72 had some good reforms but one of the worst things about it was that it took away the desire to learn and achieve from many students who did not rank in the higher intellectual groups. She said that the desire to achieve in vocational work was an incentive to learn academics in order to be more proficient in the chosen trade.

Mrs. Marvel said that the vocational program in the WFISD was encouraging teenage parents to go back to school and finish their high school education, as well as adults who have a desire to prepare themselves for better paying jobs.

"Because the program is helping to eradicate the dropout rate it is the most popular program on the block,"

she said. She was introduced by Jim Sligar.

## Bulls frustrating Hawks

Iowa Park hasn't had any luck in controlling a bunch of Wise County Bulls.

The Hawks, defending Dist. 6-AAA baseball champions who were expected to have little if no difficulty in maintaining dominance this year in the conference, have two more shots at Bridgeport.

Bridgeport leads the district at the midway juncture, with a perfect record over both Iowa Park and Bowie, and will be in Hawkland at 4 p.m. Friday to start the second half of the district schedule.

After losing their conference opener 7-6 to the Bulls April 8 at Bridgeport, the Hawks were shut out by the Wise team Friday, 9-0.

The loss left the Hawks in second place among 6-AAA teams with a 2-2 record, and 14-5 on the season.

A loss tomorrow would virtually restrict Iowa Park to the runner-up slot, because Bowie hasn't shown any indication of beating either Iowa Park or Bridgeport.

Iowa Park had little success at the plate Friday, collecting only three hits, all singles, off the bats of Billy Kenyon, Jimmy Nicholson and Jerry Flesner.

Bridgeport scored one run in the first inning, and then knocked starter Jimmy Duggins off the mound in the third, scoring five runs before Craig Rickman took over in relief.

Rickman gave up one more run before earning the third out to retire

the side, and maintained control until the seventh, when the Bulls scored twice more.

Coach Daryl Frazier is expected to start his ace hurler, Kenyon, tomorrow. Bridgeport hasn't seen him yet this season.

The Hawks travel Tuesday to Bowie, and will host the Jackrabbits May 10 before closing out the regular season May 13 at Bridgeport.

## Tracksters improve on times at Dallas

Iowa Park tracksters apparently found the facilities and competition to their liking at the North Dallas Dr. Pepper Regional Qualifiers' Meet Saturday.

Almost every one of them had better times than they posted in the Dist. 6-AAA meet the week before.

The Lady Hawks posted a pair of first places, a pair of seconds including a relay, and a third to finish fourth with 50 points.

And had the baton not been dropped in the 800-meter relay, that finish would have almost certainly been higher.

Kristy York won the hurdles with a 15.81 clocking and her 16-8 in the long jump placed second. At the district, she was clocked in 16.10 and jumped 16-5.

Stacy Boren's 26.62 won her first place in the 200-meter dash, the same event she was clocked in 26.92 at Bridgeport.

Kerri Dörner placed third in the 100-meter dash in 12.75. She won the district sprint event in 12.95.

Boren and Dörner were joined by Shonna Weaver and Angie Turner on the 400-meter relay and were timed in 50.76. Their 51.76 at Bridgeport was second to Breckenridge's winning 51.25.

The same foursome competed in the 800-meter relay, but was disqualified for dropping the baton. They were allowed to fill an empty space when the Class AAAA girls ran and placed fifth. Dallas Carter won that race in 1:39.27.

Sean Rowe's 11.17 in the 100-meter dash was second behind Jimmy Jenkins of Cayuga (11.11). Rowe's time at district was 11.38, but still placed first.

Rowe didn't qualify to compete at region in the 200 meters, but still ran the event at Dallas. He placed sixth in 23.01, an improvement over his 23.13 at Bridgeport.

Scott Goodknight ran a personal best in the 1600-meter run, an event he also failed to qualify for region. He broke the 5-minute mark for the first time, 4:57.90.

However, Goodknight's time in the 3200-meter run, in which he will compete at Odessa, was only 11:40, well above his 11:14.06 at district.

Goodknight actually placed third in district, but was qualified when the

second-place runner was later found to be scholastically ineligible.

Region One will be held Friday and Saturday at Odessa, from which the first and second place individuals and relays will be qualified to compete May 13-14 at the state UIL meet in Austin.

**Eric Birk recital held in New York**

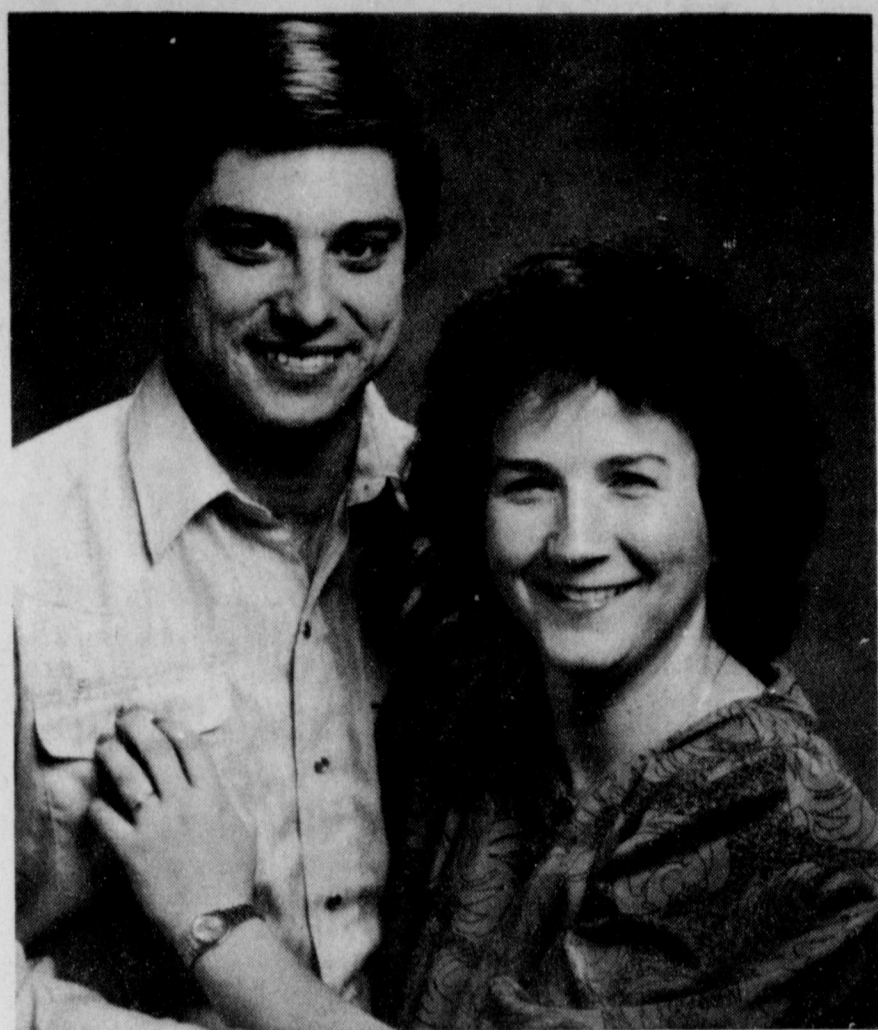

The Red River Federal Land Bank Association will be holding its 1988 annual meeting of stockholders Saturday evening in Iowa Park High School cafeteria.

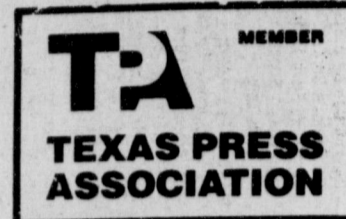
To begin at 6:30 p.m., dinner will be served with special entertainment, followed by the business session and election of expiring director positions.

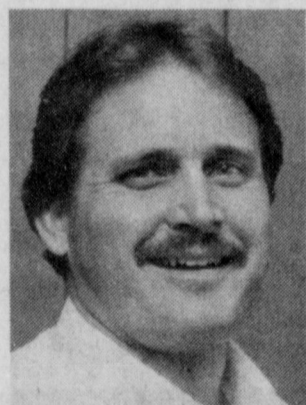

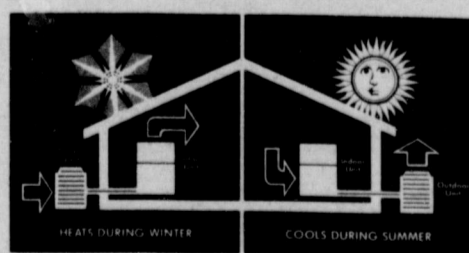

# Cook of the Week



Nancy Henderson

Anyone who cooks as well as this week's Cook of the Week, Nancy Henderson, is bound to have her recipes as well as the finished product in high demand.

And she does. Family functions as well as club meetings demand Mrs. Henderson's cooking expertise, as those who have tasted her cooking before won't settle for less.

Among those who enjoy the pleasure of eating her cooking include her four children, Sammy, Billie Shook, Pat Trantham and Virginia Catlin, as well as her 8 grandchildren and 12 great-grandchildren.

She also prepares many dishes for the Christian Women's Fellowship of the First Christian Church and the Park Area Home Demonstration Club, both of which she is a member.

As for her secret, she did say some of her recipes are a little different than others, but on most of them she just isn't satisfied until she adds her own special touch - an extra ingredient here and there.

Her recipes will speak for themselves, each using a variety of ingredients insuring a good dish.

### STUFFED CARROTS

- 12 med. carrots
- 1/2 c. cooked rice
- 1/2 c. bread crumbs
- 1/3 cup (1 1/2 oz.) shredded cheese
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/8 tsp. pepper
- 1 tsp. finely chopped onion
- 1 tsp. finely chopped green pepper
- 2 Tbsp. melted butter
- Carrot curls (optional)
- Fresh chopped parsley (optional)

Cut carrots three inches from top, small end not needed. Cook in a small amount of water 20 minutes until tender but firm. Let cool. Slice in half, scoop out center with spoon. Combine rice and rest of ingredients, toss and mix. Stuff carrots with mixture and place in 13X9 baking dish. Cover and chill overnight. Bake uncovered at 350 degrees 15 minutes or until carrots are hot. Serves six.

### BLUEBERRY JELLO

- 2-3 oz. pkgs. black cherry jello
- 2 cups boiling water
- 1 can (15 oz.) blueberries
- 1 can (8 1/4 oz.) crushed pineapple
- 8 oz. cream cheese, softened

Dissolve jello in boiling water. Drain blueberries and pineapple reserving juice to make one cup. Add water if needed. Stir juice into jello mixture and add blueberries and

pineapple. Stir in cream cheese until dissolved. Pour into a 2 quart flat pan, cover and refrigerate. Yield: 10 to 12 servings.

### TOPPING

- 1/2 c. sugar
- 1 c. sour cream
- 1/2 tsp. vanilla
- 1/2 c. chopped pecans

Combine all ingredients except pecans, spread over congealed salad. Sprinkle with pecans.

### HUNGRY JACK CASSEROLE

- 2 cans Hungry Jack Biscuits
- 2 1/2 to 3 lbs. hamburger meat
- 2 onions
- Cheddar cheese
- 5 Tbsp. chili powder
- 1 can green chilies
- 2 cartons sour cream
- Garlic salt to taste
- Salt and pepper
- American cheese

Cook meat, onions, chili powder, green chilies, salt, pepper, garlic powder until meat is done or loses its pink color. Drain well. Blot meat with paper towel to remove excess fat. Fold sour cream into meat mixture. Take Hungry Jack Biscuits and pull apart. Each biscuit should make five when pulled apart. Line 9X13 pan with one can of biscuits. Use half the meat mixture. Grate cheddar cheese over meat. Put other can of biscuit over meat mixture. Use remaining meat mixture on top and cover with American cheese. Bake at 350 degrees 30 to 40 minutes. Cheese should be golden brown. This is good the next day warmed in the microwave. Can be halved for small families.

### CANDIED YAMS

- 6 lbs. sweet potatoes
- 2 cups sugar
- 1/2 small bottle white Karo
- 1 stick butter

Cook potatoes in jackets. When cool, peel and cut in half. Put in a 12X13 pan that has been sprayed generously with Pam.

Cover potatoes evenly with sugar. Pour Karo and butter over each potato slice. Bake at 350 degrees until syrup is thick, about 1 hour and 25 minutes. Nuts can be added if desired. Can be halved for a small family.

A program on lawn care was presented by Don Decker to members of the Iowa Park Garden Club at a meeting Friday morning in the TU Electric Reddy Room.

Decker, who was a county extension agent 30 years, and holds a masters degree from Texas A&M Univ., told the group that in order to have a beautiful lawn, they must first control the weeds.

He suggested using Balan granules twice a year, March 1 and September 1. He stated that timing is very important when treating weeds, and that the Balan must be applied on these dates in order to get the best results.

The next step is to fertilize the lawn. He suggested fertilizing at least twice a year, on April 1 and Sept. 1, using a fertilizer with a 3-1-2 ratio of nitrogen, phosphorous, and potassium.

The third step toward having a beautiful lawn, is proper watering. Decker said that large applications of

water, adding from one to one and one-half inches of water to the ground every seven to 10 days, is better than watering more frequently and adding less water to the ground. Shallow watering develops a poor root system.

The fourth step is proper mowing. He said that you should mow every five to seven days. Bermuda grass should be cut about one and one-half inches in height, and St. Augustine grass, two inches.

Bernice Compton, president, presided over the business session, and Mrs. Jim Gilmore gave the thought for the day "It's Such A Busy World," by Helen Steiner Rice. Seventeen members answered roll call by naming their favorite bulb.

Mrs. Oscar Wells, corresponding secretary, read an invitation from the Wichita Falls Garden Clubs to attend their flower show and luncheon at 11 a.m. today, at the Woman's Forum.

It was reported by Mrs. Jim Gilmore that over 200 litter bags

were passed out at the club's booth at Wal-Mart last Saturday. The display, which promoted National Garden Week, contained past year's scrapbooks and yearbooks, along with a dried flower arrangement made by Lavena Harlin, and a fresh orchid arrangement by Mrs. Joe Kennedy.

Mrs. W.A. George, community service chairman, announced that members would meet at 8 a.m. Tuesday to weed the flower beds at Tom Burnett Memorial Library.

Hostesses for the meeting were Mmes. Billy C. Gilmore, Vern Mikkelson, and Jim Gilmore. They served from a beautifully appointed "Country Look" table. A wooden wagon filled with fresh bedding plants and spagnum moss served as the centerpiece, and was designed by Mrs. Mikkelson.

Baker & Taylor Drilling of Amarillo is conducting a developmental workover at a five year old producer, the No. 2 Diane "4" four miles southwest of Medicine Mounds, Hardeman County.

Baker & Taylor will be seeking production at a depth of 8,030 feet.

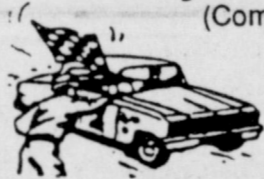
Wichita County Sheriff's Department took one report of a burglary of a habitation this week in the area surrounding Iowa Park.

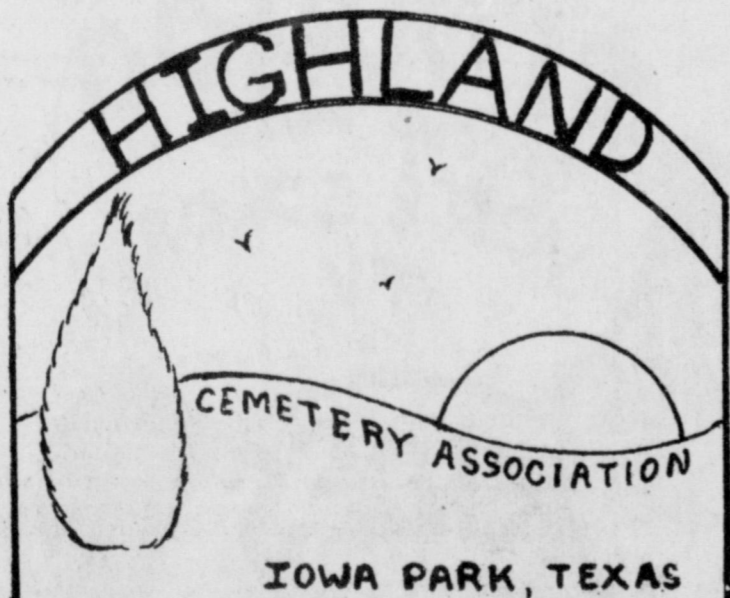

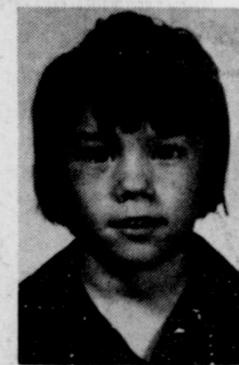
