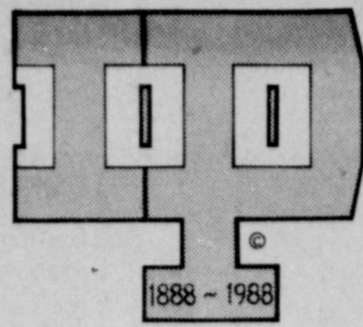

Locals arrested for 'crank' possession

The arrest of a man and woman on a charge of possession of a controlled substance Monday night was the result of some four months of surveillance by the Iowa Park Police Dept., according to Chief Alan Sheffield.

Charged with felony possession were Donald Ray Williams, 28, and

Cynthia Lynn Young, 27.

Armed with a search warrant issued by Justice of the Peace Bill Robinson, police entered a house at 1012 Van Yorn at 1:19 a.m. Tuesday.

They found amphetamine in syringes, called "crank," as well as a small amount of marijuana. Also a

vile of an undetermined type liquid was taken to be analyzed.

Chief Sheffield said the house had been under surveillance since about January, during which time an informant made purchases of crank at that location.

The couple was taken, a few hours later to county jail.

Two other men were also taken to county jail Tuesday morning, but not in connection with the Van Horn incident.

A patrolling officer stopped a vehicle in the 1300 block of West Magnolia at 4:14, according to the police blotter, when the tail lights on the car were not working.

Finding the driver, Kenneth Lee Rhodes, 19, had no drivers license, the officer ran a check on the car's license number.

Wichita Falls police confirmed the car was reported stolen in that city.

The passenger in the car, John West Rusk, also 19, reportedly was sitting on a hand gun, and was charged with unlawful possession of a firearm.

Rhodes was charged with unauthorized use of a motor vehicle.

Last Thursday afternoon, police arrested Woodrow Lloyd Blackerby, 33, at his 709 N. Yosemite home on

a charge of indecent exposure after two different complaints of a man standing nude in his doorway were reported to police.

Blackerby also was taken to county jail.

Two acts of criminal mischief are under investigation, both relating to breaking of windows.

Police received reports of a house window being broken Thursday in the 400 block of West Alameda and a vehicle window Monday in the 1000 block of North Fourth.

JIM JINKINS

Iowa Parkan named college vice president

Dr. Jim Jinkins, 1953 graduate of W.F. George High School, was named vice president for academic affairs at Carl Albert Junior College in Broken Bow, Okla.

Jinkins, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Wayland Jinkins of Iowa Park, is currently Broken Bow Schools superintendent, a position he has held since 1977, and will begin work at the college July 1.

When introducing Jinkins at the CAJC board meeting, President Joe E. White said, "Dr. Jinkins is known as a serious administrator who has started several innovative education programs at Broken Bow."

"In serving as superintendent he has been supervising more than 2,000 students and 150 employees and managing a multi-million dollar budget. That qualifies him to be an excellent administrator at CAJC."

After graduating from high school here, Jinkins worked as a farm and ranch hand and heavy equipment operator in north Texas until 1957 when he entered the U.S. Army.

After receiving an honorable dis-

charge in 1959, he returned to Iowa park where he was a foreman for an electric contractor two years before becoming a self-employed electrical contractor until 1963 when he enrolled in college.

Jinkins completed a bachelor of science in education at Southeastern Oklahoma State Univ. in 1966. The same fall he began teaching wood, metal, drafting and electronic courses at Eisenhower Junior High School in Oklahoma City.

While teaching in Oklahoma City, he also studied for his master's degree in education at Central State University. He completed his masters in 1969 and was promoted to assistant principal of Southeast High School in Oklahoma City.

Jinkins was assistant principal at Southeast High until 1973 when he became principal of Broken Bow High School. He took a one-year sabbatical in 1973 to concentrate on doctoral studies at Oklahoma State Univ.

In 1977, he returned to Broken Bow as superintendent of schools and

completed his doctorate in vocational-technical and career education in 1978.

His wife, Marge, is an elementary specializing in learning disabilities.

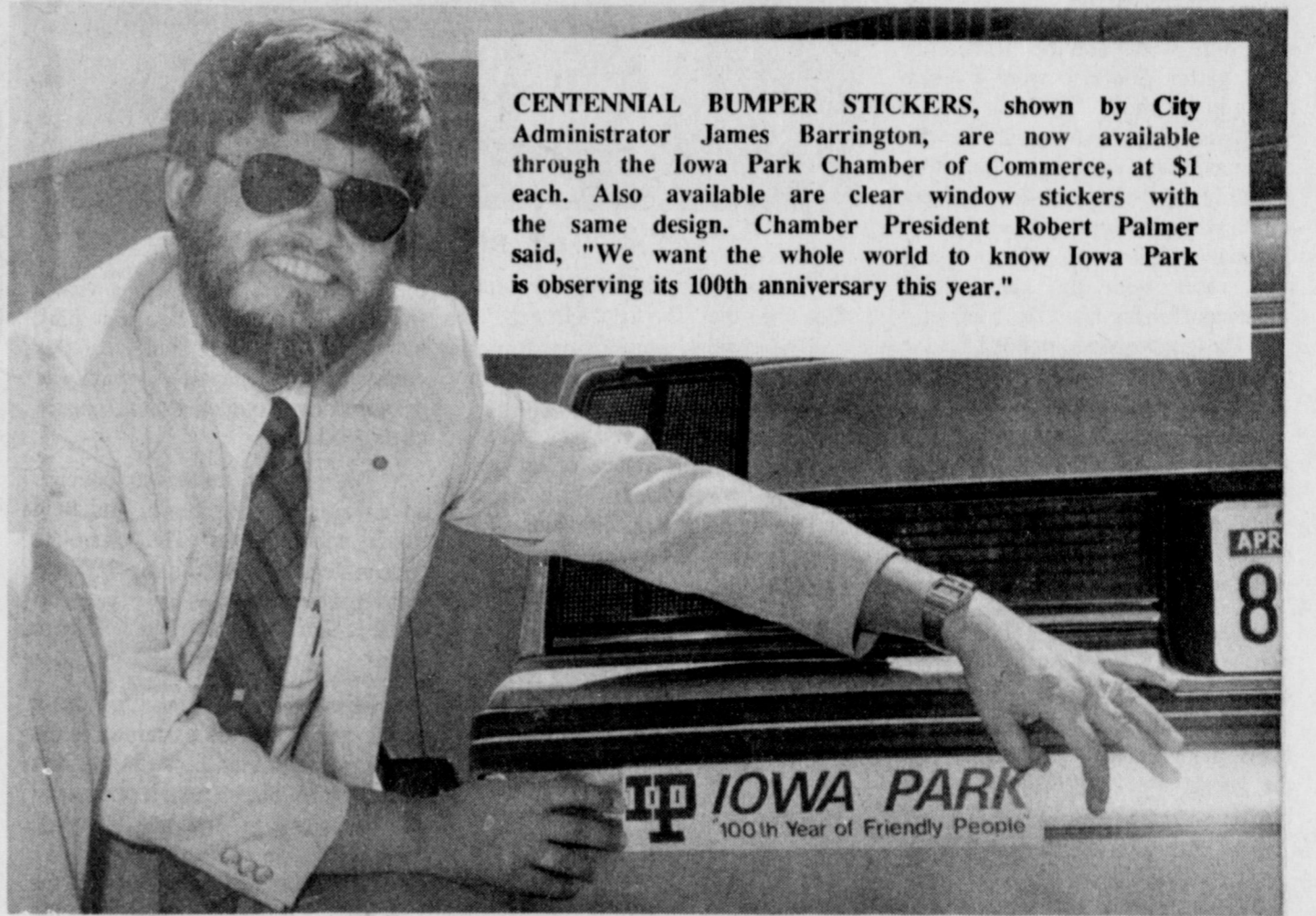
City, school meetings next week

When the city council and school board hold their respective meetings next week, the first order of business will be to canvass results of Saturday's election, and install the winners.

The council is to begin its meeting at 7 p.m. in council chambers, and trustees will meet Tuesday in the administration building, starting at 7:30 p.m.

Two "determination hearings" are on the city's agenda, the first step toward condemning structures.

One of the structures is the old "Sisk Bullet" building, owned by Burge Smith, and the other is a

house at 610 E. Bank, owned by John Paul Jones.

Mrs. Jake Jacobi has asked to appear before the council to discuss the condition of paving in the 700 block of West Clara.

Three bids will be considered by aldermen. One is on rebuilding of Third Street, another on the sewer lift station west of town on US 287, and the third on a gravity flow sewer line crossing the highway and rest stop.

Aldermen will hear a report from administrator James Barrington on a 10-percent rate increase for employee insurance requested by Blue Cross, Blue Shield.

Also to be discussed is a proposed contract extension for Lifeline Ambulance, and authorization for Barrington to attend a conference in June at Amarillo of the Texas City Management organization.

Aldermen will also consider setting a date and place to hold its annual goal-setting workshop.

Following its canvassing of the election results, school trustees are to present a plaque to board member Martha Dudley, who did not seek re-

election and has been on the board longer than any current member.

A reorganization of the board is the usual business following each election, and Mrs. Dudley has served as secretary a number of years.

Trustees will consider student transfers for the 1988-89 school year, as well as proposals for board policies concerning sick leave and student

dress code.

Also on the meeting agenda is the action on resignations and employing of new personnel.

Members will decide who will attend the Texas Association of School Boards convention, to be held in San Antonio, and hear reports on taxes, transportation, cafeteria and enrollment.

Two contested races for voters Saturday

From all indications, Saturday's city and school elections may draw the fewest number of voters to the polls than any local election in several years.

Only one position on each ballot is contested.

Probably attracting the most interest is the race between Jerry D. Gholson and Sheri M. Kennedy, for Place 3 on the school board.

One will take the place held by Martha Dudley, who has chosen to not seek reelection.

The other ballot's contest race is for Place 4, where incumbent city alderman Bud Burch is being challeng-

ed by Cecil L. Yoder.

Both trustee incumbents are unchallenged: John E. Sibley, Place 1, and Wendall House, Place 2.

Mayor Timothy W. Hunter did not attract a challenger, nor did Place 2 alderman Bud Mercer.

There will be three voting polls for the school election and two for the city.

The city and school will share polls at Kidwell and Bradford elementary buildings. The third school poll will be at the Valley View school campus.

Polls are to open at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m.

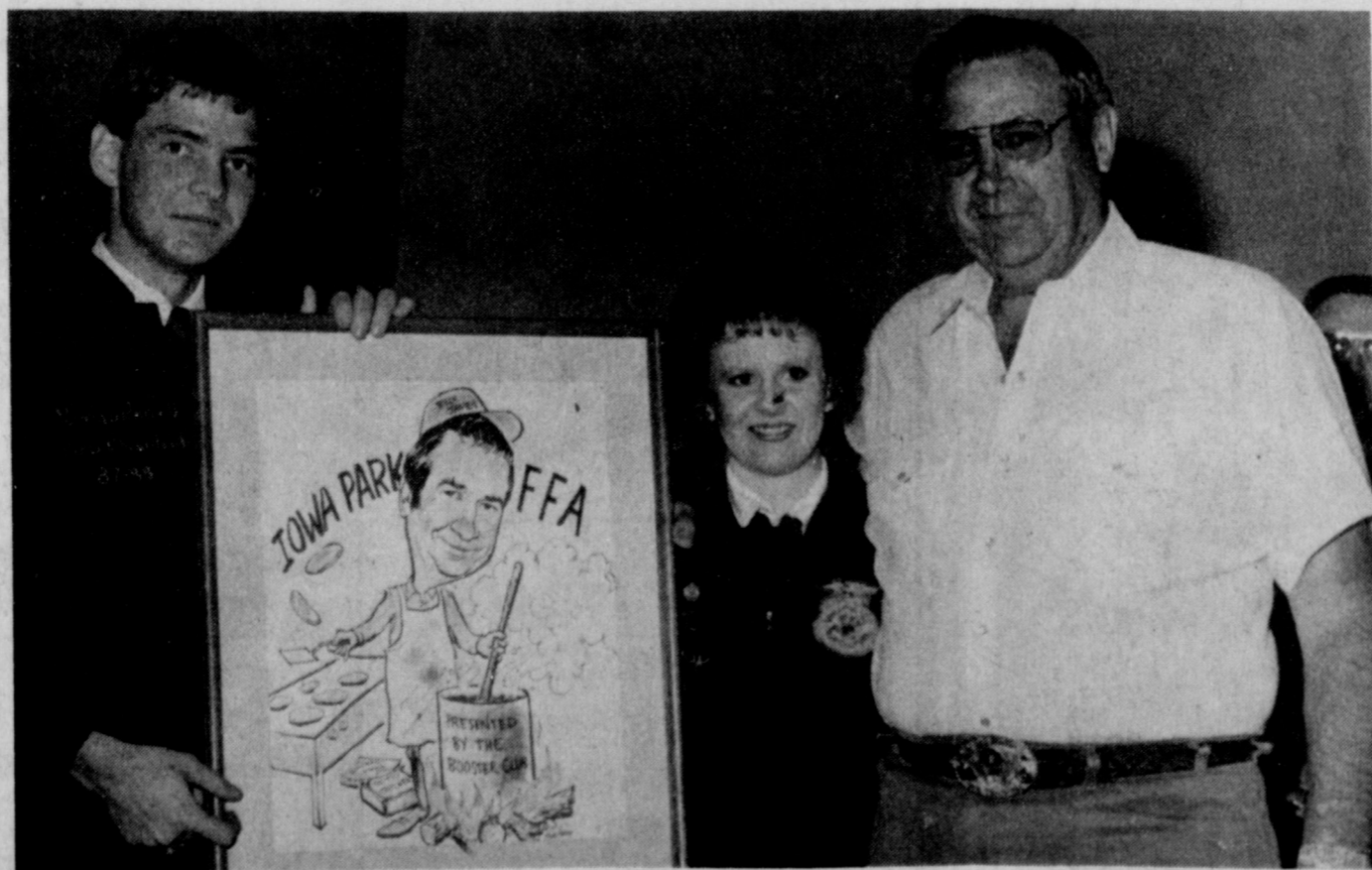
LaDonna Chandler was named Star Agri-Business Person and was the recipient of the Foundation Award in sheep production.

Patsy Burns was a special guest.

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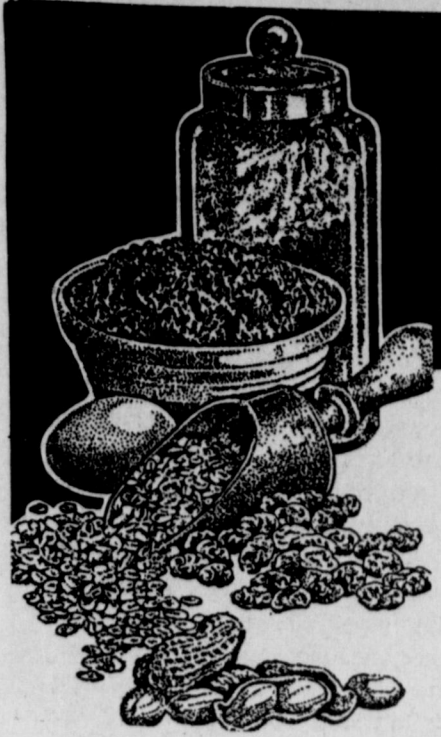

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Cook of the Week

Cooking for the fun of it and for the love it are what this week's cook, Kim (Mrs. Bobby) Heasley, thinks cooking is all about.

Both Kim and her husband enjoy cooking, experimenting with recipes and especially trying to cook the more difficult recipes when they've got spare time.

Spare time isn't something either of them has much of. Kim works at 3-M Cafe and is attending Midwestern State Univ. where she will graduate next May with a degree in business administration. Her husband is in the Air Force stationed at Sheppard Air Force Base.

She grew up in Alva, Okla., and graduated high school in Aurora, Mo.

Her hobbies are swimming, golfing and cooking.

Some of the recipes she submitted were given to the couple in a basket at their wedding two years ago, each with one of the ingredients attached.

HAM AND EGG SCRAMBLE (Microwave recipe)

- 1 cup cooked ham
- 2 T. butter
- 1 (3 oz.) cream cheese, softened
- 1/3 c. milk
- 5 eggs
- Salt and pepper

Heat ham and butter (covered with wax paper) on high 2-3 minutes. Combine cream cheese, milk, eggs, salt and pepper. Add ham and heat on medium 5-6 minutes, stirring twice. Let stand 3 minutes before serving. Serves 4.

SEVEN-LAYER BARS

- 1/2 cup butter or margarine
- 1 1/2 cups finely crushed graham crackers
- 1-6 oz. pkg. semi-sweet chocolate pieces (1 cup)
- 1-6-oz. pkg. butterscotch pieces (1 cup)
- 1-3 1/2 oz. can (1 1/3 cups) flaked coconut
- 1/2 cup chopped walnuts
- 1-14 oz. can (1 1/3 cup) sweetened condensed milk

Melt butter, stir in crushed graham crackers. Pat crumb mixture evenly in bottom of an ungreased 13X9X2-inch baking pan. Layer, in order, chocolate pieces, butterscotch pieces, coconut and walnuts. Pour sweetened condensed milk evenly over all. Bake in a 350 oven 30 minutes. Cool and cut into bars. Make 36.

CREAMY BON-BONS

- 2 sticks butter or margarine
- 1-8 oz. pkg. cream cheese
- 1 Tbsp. vanilla
- 2 1/2 boxes powdered sugar (sifted)
- 2 cups creamy peanut butter
- 1-12 oz. pkg. semi-sweet chocolate chips
- 1 section paraffin wax

Have butter, cream cheese and peanut butter at room temperature. Cream together (food processor may be used). Add vanilla and beat. Add sugar gradually and stir. When mixed well, shape into balls and place on pieces of wax paper on a cookie sheet. Insert toothpick in each ball and chill in icebox about one hour. Melt chocolate chips and paraffin wax in double boiler. Dip chilled balls into melted chocolate. Place on wax paper and remove toothpicks. Store in icebox until ready to eat.

LAYERED POTATO SALAD

- 6-8 medium boiled potatoes
- 1/2 onion, cut large in rings
- Seasoned salt
- 6 eggs, boiled and sliced
- 1 large carton (16 oz.) cottage cheese
- 2 cups mayonnaise
- 3 Tbsp. Wesson oil

Slice potatoes and layer in bottom of 9X13 dish, then layer onions, which have been spirkmed with seasoned salt, eggs, cottage cheese and mayonnaise combined with Wesson Oil. Garnish with dried parsley. Wishbone Italian is good added to the mayonnaise mixture.

CHICKEN TACOS

- Seasoned salt
 - Pepper
 - 1/4 to 1/2 bottle tabasco sauce
- Mix together to make marinade. Cut chicken in chunks, marinate in tabasco mixture. Cook chicken and onion in melted butter until almost done and squeeze lemon over all. Good served with refried beans, cheese and fried onions.

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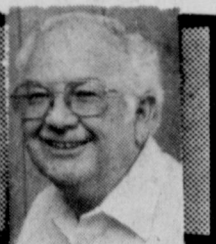
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As I See It...

I wasn't going to say a word about that column on the sports page of Monday's Wichita Falls newspaper until I was told it had developed phone calls questioning our school administrators' ability to control our students.

Now I can't let it pass without setting the record straight.

If anyone didn't know which school Paul English was writing about, they just don't follow Iowa Park sports. Our high school is the only one in that area that had nine talented tennis players to advance to the regional tournament.

I'll not repeat English's entire column, which I considered immature even for one with "three years" experience in covering the sport.

His tirade was both premature and uncalled for, because only a handful of people were acquainted with what he was talking about. But he called one of our athletes "overly sensitive," "self-centered" and "selfish."

The player was Darrell Franklin.

The "writer" and a photographer came over to do a story on a program that had qualified nine out of a possible 12 players for the regional tournament.

English, in his own writing, admitted he had been unaware of the outstanding tennis program here until Iowa Park almost completely dominated the district tournament.

In his wisdom, gathered over all three years of his experience on the paper, he chose to "represent" the nine-member delegation by three of the players, using them as a "focal

point."

He apparently didn't realize that those not in his "focal point" were having their feelings hurt while he was spending most of his time with the three players.

It's true, the three were deserving, because they were first-place winners. But there were three other first-place winners, as well as a runner-up, who also qualified for the regional who were being ignored. At least, that's the way they felt.

The "focal point" was girls' single champion Jenny Bowerman and boys' doubles champions Marc Johnson and Bill Chandler.

Darrell was not being selfish, when he refused to pose in a team picture...which was offered after a great number of pictures had been taken of the "focal point" trio.

He was, as he explained, trying to stand up for those other first-place winners who had been ignored, and was not trying to demonstrate selfishness, as he was accused.

Being virtually left out in the interviews were girls' doubles champion Peni Lee and Sheila Staggs, and boys' singles champion (who went to the region last year) Casey Rains. Darrell was the singles runner-up.

He was, in fact, being just the opposite of what he was accused. He took the brunt of criticism because he stood up for what he felt was right, that his teammates were being treated unfairly.

I make that last point in response to English's next-to-last paragraph:

"...I had thought that sports were

meant to develop generosity and teamwork and support for our fellows."

This young man faced being kicked off the team, possible sanctions in school, and ultimately the wrath of a sports writer who failed to understand not everything he does is perceived by others as being equal or the right thing to do.

The article, not the column, was attractive and it did give our program good exposure to the public. It's just a shame the column had to come out later, and as it did.

English was correct in his presumption of which three players would be most successful, and advance to the state tournament.

But he was wholly incorrect in his handling of both articles.

I only hope his wrath does not do permanent damage to the outstanding character of a fine young man, Darrell Franklin, who did what he could to stand up for his teammates.

Wichita County Commissioners' Notebook

Wichita County will be contributing \$25,000 to the Midwestern State University Small Business Development Center. According to Richard Noe, director of the center, they now have 114 current cases assisting small businesses of which 102 are in Wichita Falls, Electra, Burkburnett and Iowa Park.

Noe felt that this funding would help in assuring continued growth in the quality and quantity of the program. The commissioners want to participate in reducing the high failure rate of small businesses, therefore providing employment possibilities which should be the result of the program.

Donnie Peters, county Extension Agent, will be the new agent in Knox County (effective May 1). The commissioners court presented Peters a certificate of appreciation for his five years of service in Wichita County. A successor has not been appointed.

In an effort to better assist in the protection of county citizens, the commissioners have authorized Emergency Management Coordinator Jack Mezzo to expend funds totalling \$3,000 to recondition the county's

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Worth Quoting

With George Bush almost assured of the Republican nomination for President and the strength of that party in national elections, Texas was on the verge of returning to the national prestige not seen since the days of Lyndon Johnson and Sam Rayburn.

Bush in the White House, senior Senators Phil Gramm and Lloyd Bentsen in the Senate, and Rep. Jim Wright as Speaker of the House would prove to be a great combination for the State of Texas.

There is one problem with the Texas connection in Washington, Mr. Wright. In an article, printed in the April issue of "Bankers Monthly" entitled "The Speaker and the Sleazy Banker" a picture of Wright's dealings emerges.

Jim Wright controls the powerful House Banking Committee. All legislation that effects the savings and loan, and banking industries must pass through the committee. Also all funding for the FDIC (Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation), FSLIC (Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corporation) and other bank regulator bodies must be approved by the committee.

An old style pork barrel politician, Wright suggested to the FSLIC board that they go easy on troubled Texas savings and loans in return for his help in recapitalizing the FSLIC. In particular he wanted the regulators to lay off the Vernon Savings and Loan owned by Don Dixon.

Wright defended the action by saying that he was only trying to help a business in his district battle the federal bureaucrats. This is an interesting statement. Wright was elected to serve the people of the 12th Congressional District. Vernon is in the 13th Congressional District and the Dallas based parent of the S&L, Dondi Financial, is based in Dallas, which is in the 3rd and 5th Congressional Districts.

Dixon, a Dallas real estate developer, had purchased the Vernon S&L in 1982. At the time of the purchase the institution had \$86.6-million in assets and four branch operations. Since its founding in 1960, Vernon had never had a delinquent loan.

When the FSLIC declared the S&L insolvent in 1987, it was \$350-million in debt and 96 percent of the loans were in default.

What happened in five years, according to the FSLIC, is a tale of a lavish life style for Dixon, falsified financial statements, sham transactions and bogus profits.

As a result, the Federal Bureau of Investigation has launched an investigation into "Dixon's dealings and, according to the "Bankers Monthly" article, the Speaker of the House, Jim Wright, may be drawn into the investigation.

So much for Texas' chance for national political leadership. If Wright is indicted, all Texas representatives will be painted with the same brush and our cousins in the rest of the country will say "business as usual" in the Lone Star state.

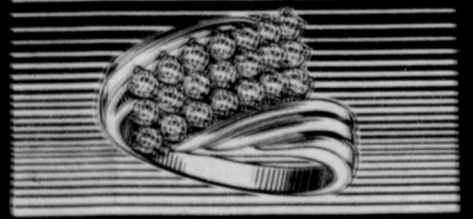

April building permits set record

Still recovering from the March 1 hail storm, Iowa Parkans sought a record 302 building permits from the city hall during April.

That was the greatest number of permits issued during a single month in the city's 100-year history.

There were 242 issued in March.

None of the permits were for construction of a new home, but two were for mobile home move-ins, and a few were for alterations and additions. But the vast majority were for repairs.

The April permit total was for \$454,036, as compared with the March total of \$417,798.

That brings the year's total to \$1,141,451, which is almost as much in permits as all of 1987, which was \$1,241,496, according to the records.

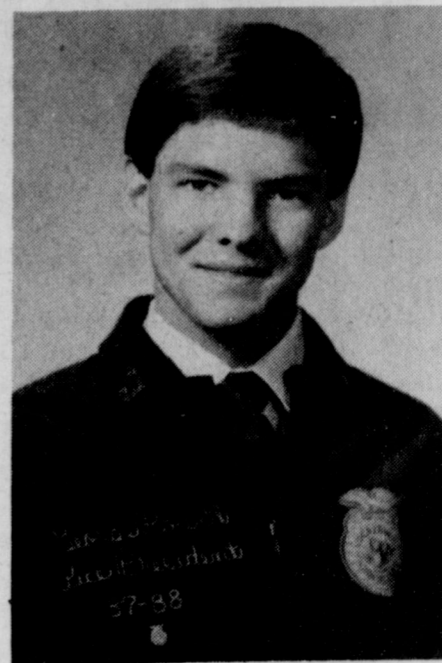
But Nancy Terrell of Marble Falls, who was unable to compete in the regional meet last year, shot down the Iowa Parkan 6-0, 6-0.

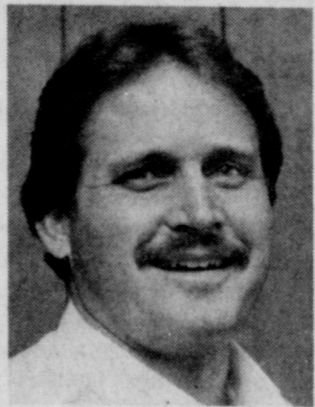

AREA OIL & GAS NEWS

Wichita County's K-M-A Field gained two new developmental producers when Marshall Energy of Dallas completed the Nos. 5-M and 6-M J.A. Kemp Estate wells two miles west of Kamay.

The operation is in a 100-acre lease in the F. Peterswick A-243 Survey.

The 5-M J.A. Kemp Estate was drilled to 4,250-ft. total depth and will produce 28 barrels of oil and 440 barrels of water per day from perforations in the Ellenburger Formation 4,170 feet to 4,178 feet into the hole.

Pumping 42 barrels of oil per day the No. 6-M J.A. Kemp Estate was bottomed at 4,266 feet with a plug back to 4,255 feet. The well also produces 320 barrels of water from perforations in the Ellenburger Formation 4,225 feet to 4,239 feet into the wellbore.

Tony Battista Operating of Wichita Falls has revealed plans to drill a 1,950-ft. developmental well in the Wichita County's Regular Field. The operator has a 104-acre lease, with drillsite in Wichita County's S. Anderson A-3 Survey, and has designated the venture as the No. 1 M.F. Clark "B". Drillsite is three miles southwest of Burkburnett 3,875 feet south of the south line and 813 feet south of the east line.

Drillsite has been staked for the No. 7 Clark, a 1,900-ft. developmental well in the Wichita County's Regular Field. The operation will be located three miles southwest of Burkburnett, 2,090 feet west of the north line and 970 feet west of the west line in a 142-acre lease in the S. Anderson A-3 Survey. The operator is DeFranco Oil of Wichita Falls.

Grover Investments of Holliday has perforated an undisclosed production interval at the No. 1-K J&J Waggoner "B", a wildcat venture in Wichita County. Located six miles south of Fowlkes in the M.A. Willis Survey, the well was drilled to a 3,900 foot bottom.

Drilling at the No. 2 A.B. Windfohr is nearing the 5,700 foot mark in Foard County. This wildcat was spudded Mar. 24, and carries a permit for 6,200 feet maximum drilling depth. Burnett Oil of Fort Worth is the operator.

Two new producers have been brought on line in Wichita County's Regular Field, with Williams Petroleum of Burkburnett as the operator.

Located two miles southeast of Fowlkes in a 160-acre lease in the SA&MG A-430 Survey, the wells are designated as the No. 5 Burnett Oil and the No. 51 Tidewater.

The No. 5 Burnett, bottomed at 400 ft. total depth, produced one barrel of oil and three barrels of water in the Cisco Formation 296 feet to 312 feet into the wellbore.

Pumping twelve barrels of oil and 43 barrels of water per day, the No. 51 Tidewater produced from a perforated interval in the Cisco Formation 890 feet to 908 feet into the hole. The well was taken to 2,000 feet and plugged back to 1,028 feet.

It is a developmental well in the Wichita County's Regular Field. Drillsite is two miles west of Clara. Location is in an 8-acre lease in the BS&F A-334 Survey.

Daily potential of ten barrels of oil and five barrels of water was posted with the Railroad Commission. The well went to 1,850 feet and was plugged back to 1,800 feet, and production will be from perforations in the Cisco Formation 1,780 feet to 1,790 feet into the hole.

Commonwealth Producing of Dallas has abandoned five developmental wells in Wichita County's Regular Field three miles south southwest of Fowlkes in an 184-acre lease in the HT&B Survey. The wells are designated as the Nos. 2-C, 3-C, 4-C, 5-C and 6-C Burnett-Tidewater.

The No. 1-E McCarty "A" has been given a "dry hole" label by L&J

Oil of Wichita Falls. Located two miles north of Kamay, the well had been spudded Mar. 1. It was located in the W.R. Eaves A-447 Survey, Wichita County, and had reached 4,200-ft. total depth.

Bar H Producing of Wichita Falls has revealed plans to drill two 1,000-ft. developmental wells in the Wichita County's Regular Field. The operator has a 66-acre lease, with drillsite in Wichita County's H&GN A-142 Survey and has designated the ventures as the Nos. 1 and 2 Sheldon.

The No. 1 Sheldon is one mile northwest of Fowlkes 2,300 feet from the south line and 1,400 feet from the west line.

Drillsite has been staked for the No. 14 Hugh Reilly "A", a 1,700-ft. developmental well in Wichita County's Regular Field. The operation will be located 2.5 miles southeast of Clara in a 140-acre lease in the J.B. Johnson A-169 Survey. The operator is Century Resources of Wichita Falls.

The No. 8 Burnside "E", a 1,000-ft. developmental well, is scheduled to be drilled in Wichita County's Regular Field. Joe McDonald of Burkburnett is the operator. The well will be spudded in a 148-acre lease three miles southwest of Iowa Park in the J.M. Sharp A-262 Survey.

A 1,000-ft. developmental well is planned by Williams Petroleum of Burkburnett at a drillsite three miles southeast of Fowlkes. The location is in an 80-acre lease in the SA&MG A-430 Survey. It is in the Wichita County's Regular Field.

Flowing 195 barrels of oil per day, along with 9,700 CF casinghead gas, the No. 3 Glenn Cato was completed in Hardeman County's Kadane Cato Field by Kadane Oil of Wichita Falls.

Drillsite is six miles south southeast of Medicine Mounds.

It was drilled to 7,836-ft. total depth and will produce from a perforated interval in the Mississippian Formation 7,830 feet to 7,836 feet into the wellbore. Production tests were run on a 7/64 inch choke, and flowing tubing pressure was 860 PSI.

The location is in a 610-acre lease in the H&TC A-1408 Survey

Atapco of Midland has suspended its efforts to make a producer out of the No. 21-A H. Reilly. It was a developmental try in Wichita County's Regular Field. The location was five miles southwest of Burkburnett in the J. Ellis A-75 Survey. Spudded Aug. 10, the well had reached a total depth of 1,750 feet and plugged back to 365 feet.

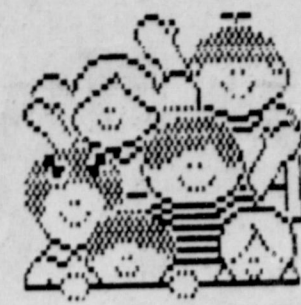

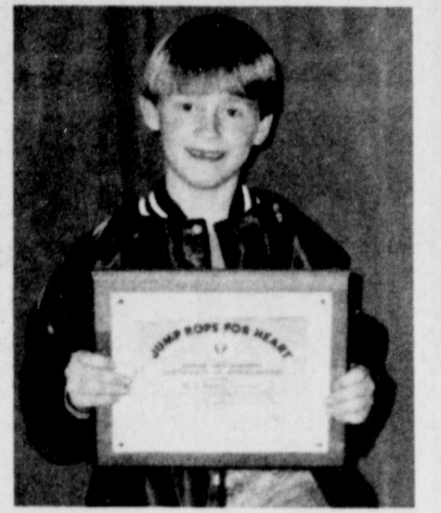
Braggin' 'bout Bradford Elementary
