### GORMAN PASSES AWAY

Distinguished Marylander Breathes His Last Monday.

#### LONG TIME SENATOR.

Manager of Cleveland's First Campaign For President, Minority Leader and Ever Champion of the South.

Washington, June 4. - Senator Ar thur Pue Gorman of Maryland died at 9:05 o'clock Monday morning.

Deceased had long been a notable figure in the senate. He first took his seat in 1881 and served continuously for eighteen years, and most of that time was a leading Democrat, win ning early a reputation for sagacity and keenness of judgment in congressional affairs. He was prominent throughout the Union a i by many was considered the most available man in his party for the presidential nomi-nation in 1904. Mr. Gorman, in 1884, was chairman of the Democratic executive committee and managed the campaign that resulted in the election of Grover Cleveland to the presidency

The most notable contest in Mr. Gorman's congressional career, and one which attracted to him wider attention than anything else, was when he led the senate minority in 1890-91 and defeated the Federal elections bill. To his sagacious leadership and adroit management of the party his friends attributed the defeat of the measure, which was so obnoxious to the south.

Nihilists Said to Have Designs on Chief Executive.

#### PLOT AT PORTLAND

Arrest of a Pole on Another Charge As Declared to Have Unearlied a Conspiracy That Was to Be Attempted.

Portland, Ore., June 2 .- As the outcome of the arrest of a Pole in this city for assault upon several Russian local detectives it was learned of the existence here of a large body of Russian nihilists, who are alleged to have been plotting the assassination of President Roosevelt and simply awaiting the accumulation of sufficient funds before sending a deputation to Washington to carry out the scheme. The Pole, who claims to have been threatened with death by several of the plotters, and who was arrested for assault, was acquitted and then the detectives learned the alleged true purpose of the organization. Friends of the police informed the latter of the doings of the nihilistic group, of their eulogistic praise of Czolgosz, the assassin of President McKinley, and finally of their desire for the death of President Roosevelt. Greene, General Manager Dwight was fired upon and sus-tained a slight scalp wound. Women and children took refuge in the Presbyterian church and residence of Col

At midnight Friday night over 100 men, armed with Winchesters and revolvers, and equipped with canteens and camping outfits, left here on a special train.

eGorge Metcalf, in charge of the greene under business of the Greene ompany, was one of the first killed. A trainload of refugees has arrived, hey said the trouble had just started then they left.

One report is that forty Americans

One report is that forty Americans were killed.

The trouble arose over the demand of the Mexicans for an increase in wages from \$3.50 to \$5 per day. Parties who left there at 10:30 p. m., Friday, said that Colonel Greene was addressing the entire population of the camp in an effort to pacify the excited Mexicans. However, between 4 and 5 o'clock Friday afternoon the Mexicans opened fire on the Americans, and a number were killed.

Colonel Greene wired at once to Bisbee for all the armed men that could be sent to project the Americans and their property at Cananea. The population of Cananea is 23,0000, of which 5,000 are Americans. The family of Colonel Greene arrived here Friday afternoon, but the colonel remained with his property.

Will Cost Four Million Dollars and Be

Places Same In the Hands of Governor of Kansas.

Topeka, June 5.-After a conference here Monday with friends Senator Burton placed his resignation in the hands of Governor Hoch.

REYNOLDS- NEILL REPORT.

With a Message President Transmits It to Congress.

Washington, June 4.—With a message President Roosevelt Monday transmitted to congress the Reynolds Neill report, in which the results of these gentlemen's investigations of conditions at Chicago stock yards are given. The chief executive suggests a thorough inspection of the Federal government of all packing houses and their products, so far as thel atter enters into interstate or foreign com merce. He declares a short inspection of the Chicago stockyards shows re volting conditions, and that it is im peratively necessary that they should be reemedied. The expense of inspec tion, he thinks, should be paid by a fee on each animal slaughtered. This, he

con each animal slaughtered. This, he says, will not exceed \$ cents per head. The Beveridge amendment is favored. Following is the report in substance: The report says that two and a half weeks were spent in the investigation in Chicago, during which "we went through the principal packing houses in the stockyards district, together with a few of the smaller ones. A day was spent by Mr. Reynolds in New York City in the investigation of its leading slaughter houses." The report says that in many of the rooms, where water is used freely, the floors are soaked and slimy and the dark and dingy rooms are naturally not kept suitably clean. An absence of cleanliness was found everywhere in the handling of meat being prepared for the various ment food products. The paris that are sent from the cooling room to these departments, where various forms of meat products are prepared, are handled with no regard whatever for cleanliness. The workers climb over heaps of meat, select the pleces they wish and frequently throw them down upon the dirty floor beside their bench. "In a word," the report adds, "we

any meat or meat 1000 products not inspected and labeled, now exempt from inspection intended for foreign or interstate commerce, in the list subject to the inspection of the bureau of animal industry, and that they should be equally controlled by the regulations of the secretary of agriculture, urges considering the question of special labeling of all carcasses sold as fresh meat, which, upon examination after slaughtering, show signs of disease, but are still deemed suitable for food, and recommends a study of inspection standards of other countries.
