Council retains fee for landfill dumping

No change was made during Monday's city council meeting in the landfill dumping ordinance, but a policy concerning permit expiration was revised.

The council considered alternatives to the dumping permit, from increasing the amount to discontinuing any fee charged.

In the end, after a lengthy discussion, no change was made in the ordinance, which requires a \$2 fee to dump at the landfill for a year.

The policy revision amounted to not having the permits expire on June 30. Rather, the permit stickers will have a color coding to indicate the month of expiration, which depends on the month the permit is issued.

Administrator James Barrington told the council the city's order of 500 permit stickers was completely exhausted last year, and 1,000 have been ordered and received to use this fiscal year. Colored stickers to

indicate month of expiration have been ordered.

Aldermen approved a proposal to increase the number of lots platted for the north part of 700 block of Louisa from eight to nine. Requested by developer Bill Swan, the proposal was opposed only by Alderman Don Decker, who explained he felt the homes would be too crowded to permit desired landscaping and therefore would not be an attractive neighborhood.

Only four items offered by the city for bids received offers, while numerous other items, including a trash collection truck, went unnoticed by buyers.

Items approved to be sold were a mud-hog pump without motor, assorted junk metal, and an ice maker, bids by John Sibley for \$12.50, \$5.50 and \$1, respectively, and a bicycle, \$10 from James Barrington.

Aldermen instructed Barrington to

offer for sale to junk dealers everything except an NCR billing machine, the garbage truck and garage doors, which will be advertised once more for sale.

Also approved was the transferring of the city's liability insurance coverage from an out-of-town firm to R.W. Hill Insurance. Aldermen noted the new premium offer was competitive, and they want to do business locally whenever possible.

A resolution formally involving the community's participation in the state's 150th anniversary celebration was approved.

During a discussion about build permit fees, Barrington pointed out the city has always accepted the estimate given by the applicant, and has no formula for basing the fee accurately.

Council members instructed the administrator to study the policy of other cities and have a proposal for a new policy at the next meeting.

A visitor, Eddie French, referred to the city's policy of "shopping at home," as was indicated during the topic of insurance, and suggested the council do the same thing in selecting a new police chief. He proposed they select Robert Dean, who is now serving as temporary chief.

Mayor Hunter commented, "If we have the man in the department who is the best for the job, I feel we will offer it to him."

City receives June sales tax

Time, information scarce for school administrators

Administrators of virtually every public school district in Texas are battling the calendar and seeking interpretations of the new school bill passed in special session by the legislature.

Time is their major problem. They've all got to finalize their annual budgets for the coming year, working with formulas concerning funds anticipated to come from the state, making room for classes with fewer students, changing their policy books, completing contractual agreements with personnel, and even trying to get information as to how much to pay their employees the first of August.

From the special legislation came 81 different category changes which are now into effect, according to Assistant Superintendent Robert Palmer.

Copies of the final bill have been made at the local administration office for distribution to all administrators and school board members. Superintendent Harold Cowley is slated to attend a briefing session the first of next week in Austin, and a called meeting of the local school trustees is expected to be held soon after his return to implement the changes.

The local office had to telephone Austin Tuesday to obtain an interpretation concerning salary increases, because the district's

People, space, heat impress Swiss couple

The people are friendlier, there's so much open space, and it's hot.

Those are the major observations of the United States, and Texas in particular, of a young couple from Switzerland who passed through Iowa Park Friday.

Dell and Charlotte Hamby, of Munchenstein, a suburb of Basel, are touring America by rented car. Arriving in New York City June 23, they are taking the southern route to California, follow the Pacific coastline north to Washington and return to their point of origin by Aug. 10 to return home.

The couple stopped at Shirley's Kuntry Kitchen for lunch Friday and later submitted to an interview.

Their apparent high point en route here was at New Orleans, where they spent some time at the World's Fair. They anticipate their next major

highlight to be the Grand Canyon in Arizona, and possibly stopping at Las Vegas, before continuing to the Pacific Ocean.

Dell, 29, is a classical guitarist by profession. He performs in concert as a soloist and also with string ensembles. He also teaches private lessons. He studied the Spanish six-string guitar in a musical conservatory in Switzerland, then in Spain and in Boston, Mass.

His 24-year-old wife is a legal secretary.

Dell speaks fluent English and Charlotte speaks the language well, but often has to have her husband interpret some words or terms for her.

Swiss public school students must learn two languages, and English is the most popular. The primary language of the Swiss depends on what part of the country they live. Dell and Charlotte speak German primarily and French also, because Munchenstein is located on the Rhine less than five miles from the borders of both countries.

Basel, with 213,000 population, is the third largest city in Switzerland.

"The people (in the United States) are very nice... more open, especially with strange people," Dell commented. Europeans aren't as friendly as Americans, tending to shy from strangers.

Comparing Europe (the couple has toured almost every nation there), with the United States, Dell flatly said the U.S. is "very large."

"In Switzerland, if you drive three hours, you are in another country," he said.

The 100-degree heat Friday also impressed the ski enthusiasts.

The Hambys hope to return to the United States in a couple of years. They said they want to repeat visits to some cities and areas, and see other parts of the country they miss on this trip.

Anniversary plans made

Members of the Iowa Park Sesquicentennial planning committee held their first meeting Friday to outline tentative activities which will be held here next year to celebrate the 150th anniversary of Texas.

Some 37 activities were selected, most of which will be centered around the annual Whoop-T-Do, Burnett Memorial Library and relating to the schools.

A list of activities, along with information of committee members who were appointed by the city council and Chamber of Commerce, will be submitted to the state Sesquicentennial committee by July 19 for approval and sanctioning.

Among the tentative activities selected were collecting information about pioneer families, recording the voices of living early-day residents while reflecting recollections, involving students concerning the history of the community and county, putting emphasis on family reunions to coincide with Whoop-T-Do and the school's homecoming, holding an outdoor "brotherhood service" at the football stadium, parades and publishing of historical stories and pictures in the newspaper and book.

Cook of the Week

We were fortunate enough to corner one of the busiest women in Iowa Park long enough to be our cook this week.

Annetta (Mrs. Earnie) Reusch is definitely not one to sit back and watch - she's either making or helping things happen. To list a few of her activities, she is president of Region 9 Association of Professional Educators, member of the Benson Iris Society for which she was 1984 Show Chairman, secretary of the Iowa Park Charter Commission, secretary of Amity Study Club, teaches journalism at Wichita Falls High School where she is sponsor of the annual, newspaper, and press club, attends First United Methodist Church where she is Sunday school chairman, and teaches a senior high Sunday school class.

To relax, she enjoys needlework and gardening.

A native of Quannah, where she graduated high school, she said she has been cooking since she was old enough to stand on a stool. In a family with three older brothers, it was her responsibility to help her mother with the cooking.

This is the second time the Reusches have lived in Iowa Park. From 1969 - 1972, her husband, Earnie, was head boys basketball coach and junior varsity football coach.

Annetta was one of the first employees of the Iowa Park Leader when it began publication in 1969. After that, she attended Midwestern State Univ., receiving her degree in 1973.

The family moved to Andrews for a few years where he was a coach and she taught school. They moved back to Iowa Park in 1978 and her husband is again head boys basketball coach, line coach for the varsity football team and teaches math. He was named Educator of the Year in January by the Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce.

Annetta taught school at Holliday High School two years, then went to Wichita Falls High School.

They have two children, Ronnie, an honor graduate of Iowa Park High

School, who graduated on the Dean's List from the Military Academy at West Point this spring, and Roxa, a 1983 graduate of Iowa Park and is employed as a cosmetologist at Regis International at Sikes Senter in Wichita Falls.

After football games played at home, Annetta sometimes helps prepare food for the players. Two of her recipes today "Teketas" and "Chocolate Ice Cream" are a big favorite and frequently requested by the boys.

TEKETAS

- 2 lbs. hamburger meat
- 1 lb. Velveeta cheese
- Seasoning salt to taste
- 2 pkgs. (64) corn tortilla shells
- 1 box toothpicks

Brown meat seasoned to taste with salt. Chop Velveeta cheese and mix with meat. Heat until melted.

Heat tortilla shells in microwave 30 seconds or in a skillet of hot oil just long enough that they will roll up without cracking. (Use caution and don't burn hands while rolling up).

Use 1 tbsp. of meat sauce in center of tortilla and roll tightly into a roll. Use a toothpick to fasten it together.

These may be sacked, 15 to a baggie, and frozen until ready to use.

When ready to serve, fry Teketas in hot oil until light brown. Drain and salt lightly with seasoning salt.

DIP [Optional]

Mix equal parts vinegar and catsup in a small bowl. Dip Teketas and eat.

TACO SALAD

- 1 head lettuce
- 2 tomatoes
- 1 onion
- 1 avocado
- 1 (15 oz. can) Ranch Style beans
- 2 cups grated Cheddar cheese
- 1 to 2 lbs. hamburger meat
- 1 pkg. Doritos
- 1 lg. bottle Catalina dressing

Brown hamburger meat and set aside to cool. Chop vegetables, combine in large bowl with beans. Mix well. At last minute grate cheese, crush Doritos, and add to salad, pour dressing over salad and mix well.

FRUIT SALAD

- 1 pkg. vanilla or lemon Jello instant pudding mix
- 1 medium can pineapple chunks
- 1 small can mandarin oranges
- 1 cup chopped apples
- 1 cup chopped pears
- 1 cup grapes
- 2 sliced bananas
- 1 cup chopped strawberries
- or use any fruit in season

Chop fruit and mix in large bowl. Save any juice from canned fruit. Add pudding mix to juice and mix well. Pour over fruit. The sauce prevents discoloring of the fruit. Serve chilled.

The salad keeps well and the flavor improves as it sits in the refrigerator (if it lasts that long).

CHOCOLATE ICE CREAM

- 5 eggs
- 2 cups sugar
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 3 (13 oz.) cans evaporated milk
- 1 (16 oz.) can chocolate syrup
- Milk

Beat eggs until light and fluffy; stir in sugar, vanilla, evaporated milk, and chocolate syrup. Pour into freezer can of a 1-gallon freezer. Fill to within 3 inches of top of can with milk. Freeze according to manufacturer's instructions. Let ripen at least

2 hours. Yield: 1 gallon.
Note: you must beat the eggs or they won't mix well.

COFFEE CAKE

- 2 cups sugar
- 1 cup butter
- 2 eggs
- Fold in:
- 1 cup sour cream
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- Add:
- 2 cups flour
- 1 tsp. baking powder
- 1/4 tsp. salt

Grease and flour tube pan. Add half of batter and half topping - repeat. Bake at 350 degrees 60-90 minutes.

TOPPING:

- 1 tsp. cinnamon
- 6 tsp. brown sugar
- 1 cup chopped nuts

SWEET RYE BREAD

- 1 1/2 cup rye flour
- 1 1/2 cup hot water
- 1/2 cup Grandma's molasses
- 1/2 cup soft shortening
- 1 pkg. dry yeast
- 1 cup warm water
- 2 tsp. salt
- 1 cup brown sugar
- 6 to 8 cups white flour

Mix hot water and molasses and add rye flour. Add yeast to 1 cup warm water. Add shortening, then add to rye flour mixture. Add brown sugar, flour and salt. Knead on well floured board until dough springs back and isn't sticky. Place in greased bowl and let rise until nearly double in bulk. Shape into three loaves, and let rise again. Bake 1 hour at 300 degrees and 15 minutes at 325 degrees.

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As I See It....

While the state legislature was deciding on how to improve our public schools and the education they are to impart in our children, then members also decided those who serve on school boards need some training as well.

That's right, anyone serving on a school board in Texas must be trained and hold a certificate of completion in their hot little hands. The legislature said so.

I quote:

"PART D. TRAINING OF SCHOOL BOARD MEMBERS

"SECTION 1. Subchapter B, Chapter 23, Education Code, is amended by adding Section 23.33 to read as follows:

"Sec. 23.33 MEMBER TRAINING AND ORIENTATION. (a) The State Board of Education shall appoint an advisory committee to develop statewide standards on the duties of a school board member. The committee shall consist of at least 15 persons knowledgeable in the management of the public schools of the state, and no less than five members of the committee shall consist of individuals currently serving as locally elected school board members.

"(b) Copies of the standards shall be sent to the president of each local school board on an annual basis, and local board members shall participate in training activities consistent with the statewide standards.

"(c) The State Board of Education may provide for a course to be offered by the regional education service centers and may approve private organizations to offer courses following the board's review of an outline of the proposed courses to determine its conformity with the statewide standards. Registration for a course offered through service centers must be open to any interested person, including current

and prospective board members, and the state board may prescribe a registration fee designed to offset the costs of providing that course.

"(d) Each accredited course must issue a certificate of completion to each person successfully completing the course."

This item is just one of the reasons H. Ross Perot and his paid legislative followers were so insistent on an appointed state board of education.

Isn't it something, that an elected body, the legislature, can cause to have other elected bodies, school trustees, to submit themselves to standards, when the same legislative members themselves have no similar standards or requirements?

To require someone seeking to work, for free in their community, to pay to attend a training course is subject to litigation, in my opinion.

You might be thinking about those "locally elected school board members" who are to serve on the advisory committee which is to draft the standards. Well, folks, not all members of boards across this state think the same way as others. And you can believe this state-appointed school board is going to load that committee with its own people.

This one part of the new bill can give you an idea of some other sticky sections to be found. I'll try to bring out some more of the changes, in the future, but time and space just won't permit it in one issue.

Legislators have been compared with cockroaches: it's not how much they eat but what they mess up when they get into something.

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GRINDING IN THE NIGHT

An estimated one in 20 adults and three in 20 children unconsciously grind their teeth at night. It is the sound of bruxism. While the noise may disturb spouses or children, it has a far more distressing effect on the sleeper.

Nocturnal grinding can exert thousands of pounds of pressure per square inch on the surfaces of the teeth. It can be rough not only on teeth but on the supporting bone, the gums and jaw joint.

For many years, bruxism was attributed to the release of tension from emotional stress. However, most dental authorities today agree that the causes exist in the patient's mouth. Night grinding is an unconscious effort to correct irregularities of the chewing surfaces of the teeth. Dentists term this a malocclusion. They grind away to eliminate a spot that is too high or to find a comfortable place to fit the upper and lower teeth together.

If you have this nightly grinding problem, be sure and discuss it with your dentist. It may be necessary for you to wear a plastic mouth guard at night to let the joint muscles relax.

Red ants like hot, dry weather, and they are thriving on our current weather conditions. We have a Spectricide Ant Bait which gives good control with 2 or 3 treatments. This is Diazinon added to a corn cob granule as a carrier. Frankly, there is no real effective control chemical available since all of the chlorinated hydrocarbons (chlordane, dieldrin, etc) have been banned for this use.

Ronnie Waters is trying Orthene for any control on his place north of Iowa Park. He reports good results from sprinkling this powder around the ant hills. Ant control is not on the label of Orthene.

Members of the houseparty were Mrs. Crawford, Miss Paula Mashburn and Miss Vanessa Koetter.

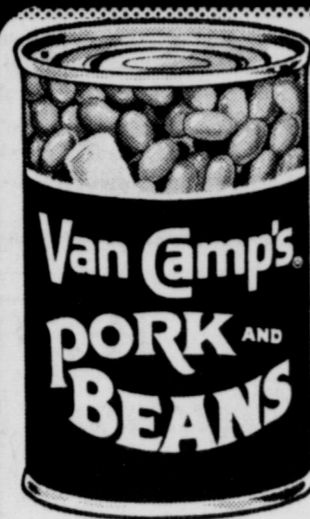

The Lightcrust Doughboys will play from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. at the Silent Auction from 4 to 6 p.m. before the regular auction.

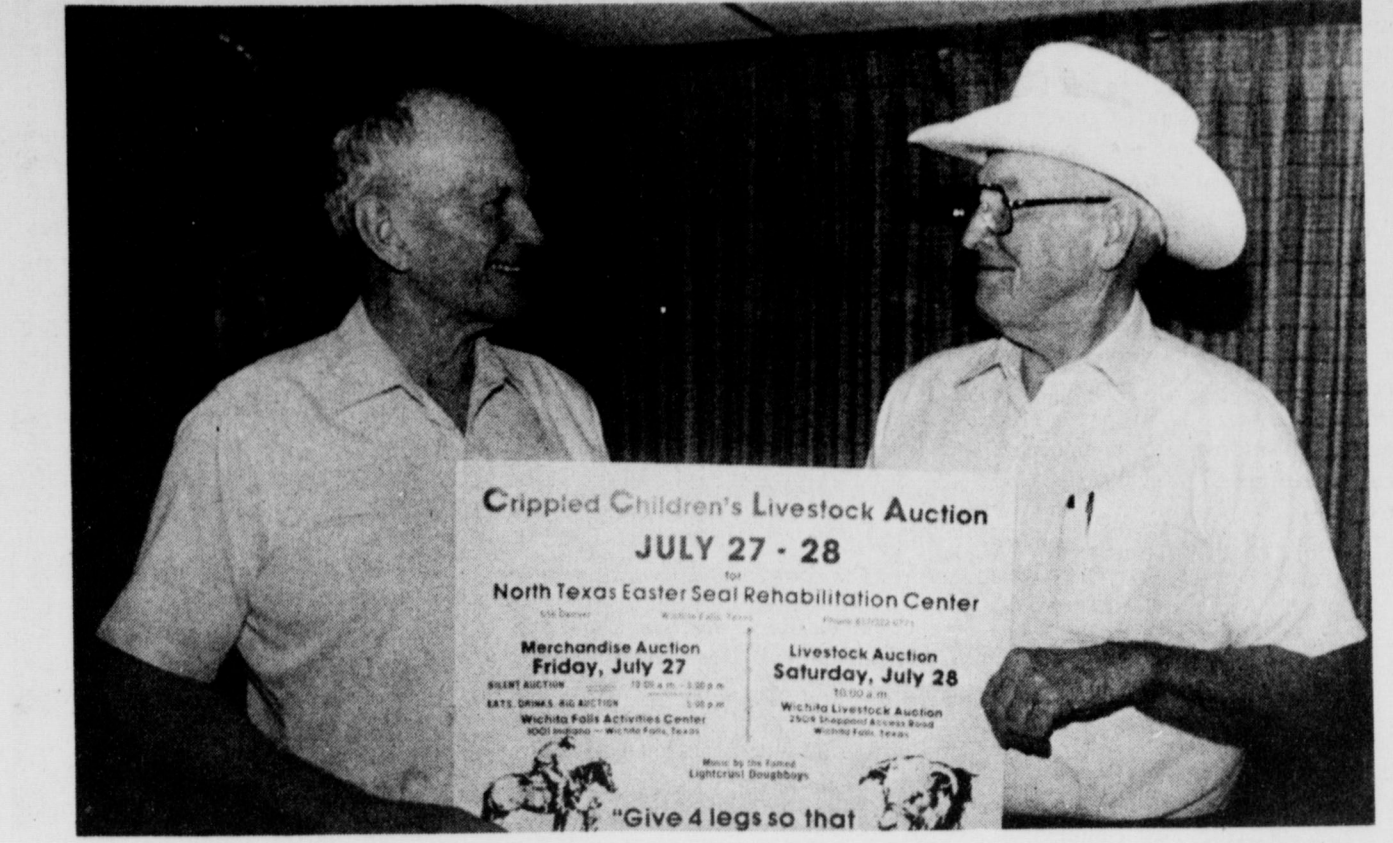
Auction committee members in the eight county area served by the Rehab Center already are contacting ranchers, merchants and others for donations to the auction.

AREA OIL & GAS NEWS

Pumping 16 barrels of oil and a minor volume of casinghead gas per day on an open choke, a new producer has been brought on line in the Wichita Regular Field four miles southeast of Fowlkes.

The well is designated as the No. 8 Waggoner "6". It is a drilling venture of Sauder Management Co. of Wichita Falls.

It was drilled to total depth of 1,956 feet and will produce from a set of perforations at 1,892 to 1,896 feet into the hole.

Wildcat drilling action is scheduled

in Wichita County three miles northeast of Electra by Spruiell Drilling Inc. of Iowa Park.

Designated as the No. 1 Williamson, the explorer well is in a 160-acre unit in the Waggoner Col. Subdiv. It carries permit for 3,700-ft. total depth. The well will be spudded 1,457 feet from the north line and 660 feet from the east line of the lease and survey.

Two new producers with combined potential to pump 82 barrels of oil per day have been finaled in the Wichita Regular Field three miles northeast of Electra.

Texaco is the operator. The wells are designated as the No. 115 and No. 116 W.P. and J.F. Bickley. They are located in a 333-acre lease in the SPRR Survey A-647.

The 115 bottomed at an even 2,000 feet and will produce from set of perforations ranging from 598 to 1,944 feet into the wellbore. Bottomed at 2,000 feet, the No. 116 will produce from a set of perforations 588 to 1,762 feet.

The 115 is 880 feet from the west line and 509 feet from the south line of the lease and survey. The No. 116 is

1,407 feet from the west line and 342 feet from the south line of the lease and survey.

Three developmental wells are slated in the Wichita Regular Field by John D. Swanson, independent operator from Electra. The wells have been designated as the No. 25 Waggoner "C," No. 27 Waggoner "A," and No. 28 Waggoner "A."

All three wells are in 80-acre units in Wichita County's A. Gibson Survey. The first two wells carry permit for 1,000 feet of hole, while the third is under permit for 1,500-ft. maximum depth.

The operation is located five miles south of Electra.

Members of Holliday's Art Association are still showing works at Olney Savings in Holliday, with Marilyn Cowan and Shirley Addison currently displaying works until July 13. J.W. Segler and Sylvia Thomas will be next to show their works, from July 16 to July 31.

Sales tax up

City sales and use tax allocation from the state comptroller's office for the Month of June looks good again for Holliday, with the city receiving approximately 33.99 percent more in refunds than a comparable period last year.

Holliday received a check for \$8,739.24, easily outdistancing any other entity in Archer County, including Archer City, which received a check for \$6,699.75. Holliday's check is over \$3,500 more than the check received for June in 1983, and the total amount collected by the city totals \$56,560.57 in 1984. That is an increase of over \$14,500 than the same period in 1983.

Board hired Jerald Davis, head girl's coach of Seward County College, Liberal, Kan. He has had prior coaching experience in this area, including Walters, Okla. Davis coached his college team to a 20-10 record last year, and missed the national tournament by one game.

The board moved to hold a special called meeting July 24th to discuss school finances. The move was made to give board members more time to gather information from the new bill passed during the recent special session of the Texas Legislature.

A group of Holliday citizens met with the Archer County commissioners during the court's June 25th meeting, to discuss appointment of a Justice of the Peace for Precinct 2 in Archer County, although no action

was taken. Commissioners did authorize plans for an elevator to be made available for the July meeting, for use by handicapped and courthouse personnel.

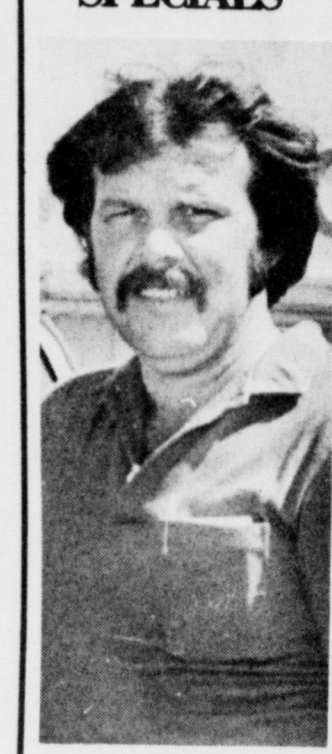
