He surrendered only a mob had threatened to burn the building. He was lodged in the village jail, and Sunday night a mob dynamited the jail fired into Smith's cell, badly wounding the negro. A crowd of negroes gathered while the jail was being stoned and fired in the mob. Overy 500 shots were exchanged. During the exchange of shots D. M. Clark, a white man, was fatally wounded, and several negroes are believed to have been shot.

Late Monday afternoon 200 armed white men patrolled the streets.

Texas Railroad Commission Proposes to Bring About Reduction.

Austin, Nov. 6.-The Texas railroad commission proposes to regulate and reduce sleeping car fares. but first

reduce sleeping car fares, but first proposes to assume jurisdiction over sleeping car service.

It has issued notice of a hearing for Nov. 27 to require railrioads to contine their present sleeping car service in Texas, unless authorized to distontinue same by the commission, and add such other service as the commission may direct; also to reduce the present charges 20 per cent, which would make the rate \$1.60, where \$2 is now charged.

Supreme Court Affirms the Decision of the Court of Claims.

Washington, Nov. 5.—The supreme court of the United States has affirmed the decision of the court of claims in the case of Daniel Redbird, the Cherokee nation and others vs. the United States, known as "the white man's case." The case involved long-pending claims of between 2,000 and 3,000 white persons to participate in distribution of lands and funds of the Cherokee nation because of marriage with members of the tribe.

BOLDLY ENTER BANK

Two Masked Men Hire Livery Rig and Driving to Another Town Hold Up Official and Return Vehicle.

La Salle, Ill., Nov. 6 .- The Farmers and Miners' bank of Ladd, a mining town, was held up and robbed Monday afternoon. The assistant cashier. J. J. Hurley, was alone in the bank when two men entered and asked for some pennies. The next moment, covering Mr. Hurley with revolvers, they ordered him to throw up his hands, and marched him to a back room, where they bound him hand and foot. After taking a quanity of money the men escaped. The amount of their booty is about \$7,000.

Ladd was thrown into a state of excitement by the daring holdup. One. of the two masked robbers guarded H. H. Ramsey. the street door while the other scoop the street door while the other scooped up the cash. Some reports say that the amount stolen is \$20,000. It was mostly in currency. The robbers had been gone an hour before the robbery was discovered and the imprisoned bank officers released. The robbers hired a livery rig at Peru to drive to Ladd. In about three hours they came back and returned the rig to the liveryman, who, having heard of the holdup, tried to procure the assistance of citizens to surround the robbers in of citizens to surround the assistance of citizens to surround the robbers in the livery barn, but the robbers drew revolvers and shot at every man who appeared near the stable, and kept up a running fight for an hour, finally escaping in the direction of La Salle after eluding the Peru police.

GONE TO HIS REWARD

Noted English Philanthropist Succumbs to Operation.

HERRING IS AT REST

Assisted Salvation Army In Colony Scheme, Maintained Sonp Kitchen and haven of Rest and Did Many Other Acts.

London, Nov. 2.—George Herring, the noted English philanthropist, who, in the course of his life, contributed large sums of money to hospitals and charitable enterprises, died Friday after an pperation for appendicitis. He made his first money on race courses and

operation for appendicitis. He made his first money on race courses and subsequently became identified with a number of large business enterprises. George Herring was chairman of the City of London, Electric Lighting company, the Electric and General investment company, Municipal Trust company and several mining companies. In December last he donated \$500,000 to the Salvation Army for use in its home colonization scheme, the Army engaging to repay this sum in twenty-five annual installments to the king's hospital fund. The plan was to purchase tracts in England, giving five acres or thereabouts to each settler, building cottages, providing seed and implements and supporting settlers until the lands became productive. Each settler was to repay in annual installments. In this manner the Salvation Army hopped to provide for those who for various reasons were unable to leave England under the emigration schemes of the Army.

Mr. Herring conducted a soup kitchen in Camdentown, London, built and endowed an institution known as the Haven of Rest for Gentle Folk, brought to poverty through genuine misfortune, and furnished a number of Salvation Army shelters for the homeless.
