## City still leads county in gain

Iowa Park was the only community in Wichita County showing an increase in sales tax collections through September, according to information received from

the state comptroller office. The city received a check for \$7,750.25 for sales in the city during the previous month. That was slightly larger than the \$7,529.81 check received the same month last year, and raised the year's total to \$97,264.08.

Iowa Park's sales taxes are 22.72 percent above the same nine-month period in 1982, according to state office. Wichita Falls is a minus 5.43 percent, Burkburnett minus 2.17 and Electra minus 24.21.

# Two starters missing for homecoming game

Iowa Park's Hawks, already thin in depth, will be missing two starters and a reserve for tomorrow's big homecoming game against the Gainesville Leopards.

Quarterback Dale Hayley and Greg Untalon, runningback and defensive lineman, have been sidelined, Hayley for the season and Untalon for an undetermined period. Also missing will be reserve tackle Kevin Haney.

Hayley, a senior, has been the starting quarterback all season. However, he has shared time on the field in most of the games with backups junior Van Hedrick and sophomore Ray Sefcik, so neither will play tomorrow without varsity experience.

During practice Monday, Hayley complained of being ill and was determined at the doctor's office to have a hernia in the lower abdomen. He reportedly underwent surgery Tuesday.

Untalon, another senior, has been a mainstay on the defensive team the past two years, injured a knee and has it in a walking cast. How long he will be sidelined will be determined by his physician.

The big Hawk is one of two main ball carriers this year, averaging five yards on each of his 67 carries. As a junior he averaged 8.1 yards on 27

Haney, who will be missed even more since Untalon is out of the defensive line, is suffering a back ailment. His sideline time also is undetermined.

LEOPARDS LEARN LESSONS The Leopards were taught a lesson last year: don't take the Mean Green lightly.

When the two clubs met in Gainesville last season, the Hawks had a respectable 5-1 record. But the Leopards, who were undefeated and ranked second among all the class 4-A schools in the state, had scheduled them for their homecoming opponent.

The Hawks "upset" the Leopards 7-6 and shook not only everybody in that stadium, but sent a shock across the entire state. Iowa Park was probably chosen as a homecoming opponent because the last time the two had met was in 1975, and the Leopards pleased their backers with a 46-6 triumph.

A lot has changed since 1982. The Leopards are no longer state ranked, having been defeated in three of their six starts, two of them to Dist. 3-AAAA opponents.

But the Hawks aren't riding as high as they were at this time last year,

Friday's home at 1326 Edgehill was heavily damaged from flame and smoke early Saturday morning. The fire was reported at 1:26 a.m., and was quickly brought under control by the Volunteer Fire Department.

The family had returned home about 11 p.m. from the Wichita County Fair in Wichita Falls. It was well after midnight before Farley

went to bed, he said. Being a light sleeper, he awakened when the smell of smoke reached his bedroom from down the hall. Searching for its source, he opened the door of his son's bedroom, and found it full of smoke, the top of the

David, six, was still asleep, Friday recalled, eventhough he was only three or four feet from the fire.

Friday was forced to crawl to his son's bed, because of the smoke. He called to the rest of the family -- they have two daughters, Shawn, four, and Amber, three - and with the assistance of his wife, all left the structure through the front door.

As he was putting his son to bed, Friday remembered the youngster had asked that his oscillating fan be turned on. The fan was atop the

Fire marshall Bud Thompson said he believes the fan shorted, set the wooden surface on which it sat afire, melted the plastic base and fell to the carpet where it continued to short and set the carpet on fire.

Two trucks from the fire department were used in extinguishing the blaze, which was primarily confined to the bedroom in the northeast end of the home.

Assessing his damage the next morning, which was fully covered by insurance, Friday said the livingroom furniture purchased new last month, and a \$2,400 waterbed purchased in April had all been heavily damaged by heat and smoke.

No one was injured.

Thompson estimated firemen probably would not have been able to save the house had they been called three to five minutes later.

# Cole, Crombie nuptial vows are solemnized here Saturday afternoon





Mrs. Skiles ended by encouraging


membership and to talk federation to gain members because "We do make a difference in our community, our state and our nation."



# Cook of the Week

The Pound Cake has been a popular dessert in America for many years and its popularity seems to increase each year. Many of the recipes for the cake call for almond extract, derived from the edible nut, which definitely enhances the flavor.

The almond is probably a native of Asia Minor. We hear of it early from Anatolia, Babylon, Hittite chronicles and the Bible, one of only two nuts mentioned, the other is the pistachio. It started the march westward before historic times, for it has been found at the Neolithic level under the palace of Knossos in Crete and in the Bronze Age storerooms at Hagra Triada, on the same island.

The Romans were fond of it and called it the "Greek nut." Charlemagne ordered almond trees planted on his domain, and the first French cookbook written about 1300 gives much attention to the almond milk. The American almond country is Calif. There are many luscious uses of almond, such as in marzipan, nougat, extracts, and in French tart amandines, possibly the only piece of pastry to have its recipe transmuted into verse and proclaimed from a play of world renown, Edmond Rostand's Cyrano de Bergerac.

Bonnie (Mrs. Robert) Illingworth inspired a bit of research of the almond by including the extract in the Pound Cake recipe for this week. The former Bonnie Porter, she was graduated from Cross Plains High School. She and her husband, who is retired from Arcadia Refining Co. and works part-time at Gilmore Inc., and their family moved to Iowa Park about 1964 where they lived for seven years. He was transferred to East Texas and they stayed there seven years before moving back to Iowa Park five years ago. They are members of the Iowa Park Church of

#### POUND CAKE

- 1 lb. butter or margarine
- 1 lb. carton powdered sugar
- 1 powdered sugar carton full of sifted flour
- 1 tsp. lemon juice
- 1 T vanilla extract
- 1 tsp. almond extract

Have eggs and butter at room temperature. Cream butter, add powdered sugar gradually and blend well. Add eggs, one at a time and beat well after each addition. Sift flour three times, add gradually to batter. Add flavorings and mix well. Bake in greased and floured tube pan at 325 degrees 1 hour and 15 minutes.

# 7 turnovers doom Hawk hopes

What happens when a team turns the ball over seven times to its opponent? It loses, big. And makes the opponent look better than it really is.

And that's exactly what happened Friday night. The Hawks couldn't hold onto the ball and made the Lions look like worldbeaters with a 42-0 win before a jam-packed Vernon homecoming

Iowa Park turned over the ball twice in the first quarter, including the first time the Hawks had the ball, once in the second, three times in the third and once more in the fourth.

Five of Vernon's touchdowns resulted directly from the turnovers. The Lions were able to mount only one scoring drive on their own, but that was a 77-yarder.

The Hawk defensive platoon had its back to the ball almost the entire evening. Those Iowa Park fumbles were at the Hawk 29, 27, 32 and 23, while the interceptions were on the Hawk 29, 30 and 39.

The Mean Green defense pretty well held its own against Vernon's yet-undefeated crew, allowing the Lions only 279 total yards for the evening. That kind of yardage does not usually indicate a 42-0 routing.

Except for that one long drive, the Lions had a tough time against Iowa Park's defense. The Lions had to punt four times, twice just inside Hawk territory, but the other two times from their own 18 and 29 yard lines.

Vernon committed one turnover the entire game. It was a fumble late in the second quarter. The Lions had advanced to Iowa Park's 29 yard line, late in the period. They were passing, trying to score once more before the halftime break.

That's when Greg Untalon hit the quarterback so hard, he not only lost the ball, which was covered on the 35 by Rowdy Robinson, the Lion also lost his shoe because of the impact.

Darin Whitman advanced the ball farther than any Hawk during the game. That was on the last play of the first quarter, when he was called on to quick kick the ball, and he punted it 50 yards to the Lion six yard line.

The tone of the game was set early in the game. Vernon was forced to punt without picking up a first down on the Lions' first possession.

Jerry Allen fielded the ball on his own 21. But he was hit at the 38 on the return, the ball spurted loose and the Lions covered it on the 29. Seven plays

Two plays after the ensuing kickoff, Dale Hayley's pass was picked off at the Hawk 29 and returned for another score, less than a minute and a half after the initial Vernon TD.

Vernon's long scoring drive required only six plays and a Hawk penalty. A 42-yard run and 14-yard pass accounted for most of the advancing of the ball to the Hawk eight, from which the score was made.

Four plays after the next kickoff, a handoff was fumbled and Vernon covered the ball on the Hawk 27. A pass on the next play was all it took for more lighting on the scoreboard.

Down 28-0 and lacking only two yards for a first down, the Hawks were held shy of the first by a mere couple of inches. Vernon took over at the Hawk 27 when the gamble failed, but punted from the Lion 37 after a couple of major penalties.

A Ray Sefcik pass was intercepted at the Hawk 30 and returned to the 16. But the Hawks took over at the 22, when the Mean Green defenders really got their backs up. Rocky Martin was credited with a 14-yard sack in that series.

But on the second play after taking over possession, Lee Roach fumbled at the 32, and eight plays later Vernon scored again.

The Hawks picked up a couple of first downs on the next series and were at their own 43, when a Sefcik-to-Untalon pitchout failed to connect and Vernon covered at the Hawk 23. A frustrated Hawk was charged with a personal foul on the play and Vernon, all of a sudden, was only 13 yards from the goal line. That disappeared three plays later when the Lions scored on a one-yarder.


Van Hedrick took over at quarterback after Sefcik was shaken while trying to cover a fumbled snap. On the first play Hedrick's pass attempt was intercepted at the Vernon 39. # Eagles please homecoming crowd with victory

Eagle runningback Jay "Bucks" Burks avenged a drive-killing fumble early in Friday night's District 11-AA contest against Petrolia by scoring both Holliday touchdowns as the Red Machine downed the upset-minded Pirate squad 14-12.

The homecoming win for Holliday upped its record to the .500 mark in conference play and respectable 4-3 for the season, while the previouslyonce-defeated Bucs dropped to 3-2 in district, 4-3 for the season.

Burks, the Eagles' top back in terms of yardage production, lost the

handle on the pigskin at Petrolia's two during the Big Red's initial drive of the game. Taking 16 plays and covering 66 yards, the drive may have taken some wind out of Holliday's sails, but only for as long as it took the Red defense to turn the ball back over to the offense.

At 9:32 in the second quarter, Burks drove in from seven yards out on a third-and-goal situation to secure a 6-0 Eagle lead, which soon was upped to 7-0 as Kelly Carver's kick found its mark.

The Pirates, showing a salty-brand

of defense throughout the night, found some amount of success on the quick dives on their next possession. Driving from its 29 for two first downs close to midfield, Petrolia was soon stopped by a saltier Eagle defense at the Eagle 41.

However, the Pirate punter's punt was mishandled by John Smyers in the endzone which was covered by a Petrolia player for the touchdown. With over four minutes remaining until halftime, the Pirates attempted a two-point conversion pass which never quite developed to its fullest, instead handing Holliday a slim 7-6 lead it carried into the lockerroom at intermission

#### SECOND HALF

An inspired Pirate team answered the second-half bell with an early touchdown, capped by Tony Lopez's two-vard plunge five minutes into the third quarter. The run ended an eight-play drive following the kickoff, giving Petrolia a 12-7 lead. The second two-point conversion attempt was a model of the first try in every way, including the incompletion.

Holliday waited patiently for the right opportunity to go back ahead, and that time finally came late in the third quarter and early in the final period.

Starting from its 40, Holliday drove the length of the field for the go-ahead score, with just under 11 minutes left to play in the game. Burks capped the drive with a 14-yard run, but the play that highlighted the winning drive came just before the Big Red offense even touched the ball.

Smyers, who had lost the punt to Petrolia earlier in the game, intercepted a Pirate aerial, returning it to the Holliday 49. A 15-yard penalty, contested by the Eagle coaches, set the ball back to the 34.

The Eagles failed to record a first on the following possession, but punter Donnie Long's kick set the Pirates back at their 18. Also failing to record a first, Petrolia punted to the Eagle 40, setting up the game-winning drive.

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




