1952 Has Been Good To Iowa Park, Much New Construction Completed

Another year has come and gone in our town of friendly living. As we drive over our town's streets and notice all the new homes and remodeling that has been done this past year in the business and residential sections, in the churches and schools, we are mighty proud to be a part of Iowa Park.

Some of the improvements have been extensive, some have been small, but it all lets the world know we are growing.

Many new families have moved into our community and we hope they all have felt welcome to take part in our community affairs, our churches and schools.

The merchants have welcomed newcomers with gifts after our hostesses have called on them.

Following is part of the improvements and changes made in Our Town during 1952:

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE
In March the Chamber of Commerce moved into the small white house in the city park, formerly used by the Texas Electric Service company.

A partition was removed to make more room for Board of Directors meetings. Wallboard was placed over the wall, and woodwork and walls painted an eye-see green. Celotex ceiling was added and new floor covering laid.

Shelves were put up for storage of unseasoned equipment, and a cabinet made for supplies. New screen doors were set and some outside repair done.

An air conditioner was purchased in July and in November gas pipe laid and a new connection put on the northeast side for the heaters needed to make the building comfortable for customers and personnel.

New folding chairs and shades are ordered to complete the headquarters.

PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH
This year the First Presbyterian church has installed two large air conditioners, adequate to keep the church cool during the extreme hot weather. The church is also looking forward to building an educational building. A substantial sum has already been raised, and when the goal is reached work will begin.

CHURCH OF CHRIST
The Church of Christ is now in a building program, with plans to construct an entire new church plant in the near future, according to Cleo Jones, minister.

ASSEMBLY OF GOD
Members of the Assembly of God have painted the inside of their new church, bought new pews and Venetian blinds, sanded and varnished the floors.

CHRISTIAN CHURCH
During 1952 the First Christian church has redecored all classrooms upstairs in moonglow, green mist and dusty rose; refinished the floors and carpeted the stairway. Project downstairs was decorating the nursery, which features four cribs built along one wall, and installing adequate heating facilities.

Labor for these projects was given by the men of the church working four nights each week for seven weeks under direction of E. L. Hartfield and O. R. Owens.

Plans for the coming year include creating a church parlor and redecoration of the pastor's study, to complete a four year program of remodeling which began with the fellowship hall, kitchen and sanctuary.

METHODIST CHURCH
The year 1952 has been one of continued progress for the Methodist church in its improvement of its property. Building of a new parsonage was started in the first days of the year. The new parsonage is brick veneer with eight rooms, two baths, a breezeway and a double garage. It has been estimated as a \$23,000 home though it did not cost that much because the church owned the ground and other property. The parsonage has been completely furnished at a cost of about \$4,900.

In midyear, a new hardwood floor was put in the church at a cost of about \$4,800. The sanctuary has been painted. Some work has been done on several class rooms and

the sanctuary has been remodeled by removing some French doors and making permanent walls.

The nursery and beginners rooms have had considerable repair in preparation for other work that is to be done. The junior department room has been reworked to make it into a visual-education room.

As the year comes to a close plans are that further work will be done on the church inside and out. All of this work has been done without any indebtedness except maybe some local accounts.

BAPTIST CHURCH
The extent of physical improvements at First Baptist has been minor in 1952. A tennis court on the west end of the property was built as a project of the Brotherhood. Curbing around flower beds and office storage space were engineered by members of the Fellowship Bible class. The junior department was redecored and the roof repaired.

FIRE HALL
The Volunteer Fire department is now in process of remodeling the Fire Hall. They now have housing for one truck, with meeting hall and kitchen downstairs and a game room upstairs in their building just west of the Herald office.

After completion of construction and decoration, the Fire Boys plan an openhouse, the date to be announced later.

CITY ENGINEER
Records of the City Secretary reveal there have been 81 new water meters set; 82 sewer connections; approximately 100 new residences constructed. Latest project in the north part of town is 3900 feet of sewer line. There have also been laid 11 blocks of new water lines.

PARK FEED STORE
George Lewis has joined in the modernization trend with liberal use of paint inside and out for his Park Feed Store. With all those colorful feed sacks and the new paint job, and with a nice new office and shelving, he has created an inviting appearance.

THE SCHOOL SYSTEM
Ward school building was redecored on the inside. The walls all received a new coat of paint in different colors and all blackboards were resurfaced. Floors were varnished with floor seal, also desks. The looks of the ward school is quite different from what it was before the face lifting took place.

The principal's, the superintendent's and the janitor's home were redecored as well as the home economics cottage.

New typewriters were added to the commercial department and a large typewriter to the office. Total cost of the new typewriters if they had been bought without a trade-in would amount to \$3,975. There has been added to the superintendent's office a new table and five chairs to match, and the room was redecored.

New blackboards have been added to most of the classrooms and 117 new desks have been installed. These new desks have replaced desks that were bought about 40 years ago. These old desks were bought by private donations. A. A. Brubaker, a member of the school board at that time, told the writer each patron or citizen was contacted and asked to buy at least one new desk. The cost at that time was about \$5. Now the same type of desk costs about \$17. These old desks went through a storm which blew down the old building in the spring of 1920, reinstalled after the building was rebuilt in the fall; then moved in 1923 to the present high school building.

A new \$4107, 64 passenger bus has been added as well as a new chassis replacing the 1946 Chevrolet chassis, which places these buses in pretty good condition. The buses are owned by the state, which allows a certain amount for operation and upkeep each year.

Added to our band department was about \$1200 of equipment, the agriculture department added \$500 to \$600 worth of equipment, and about \$1500 for athletic equipment.

Total amount invested in 1952 in all departments amounts to more than \$14,000.

Ted sells radios, television sets, records and record players, and performs repair work on most every type of small appliance. Associated with the Center is L. B. Jones, sewing machine and business machine repairman. He also is distributor for the Pfaff sewing machine.

Frankie's Apparel and the Ideal Beauty Shop moved a few doors east into a remodeled building with larger floor space and a more full stock of merchandise.

Fred Wright's Jewelry store is another new business on Cash street. Mr. Wright handles a fine line of merchandise and is an expert watch and jewelry repairman.

Jack Callon took over the Barbour service station location and has established an outlet for Firestone products and Texaco petroleum products. New name of the business is Jack's Super Service.

Curtis Sewell replaced Texaco products with Humble gasolines and oils.

A welcome addition to the scenery on Railroad street is the new John B. Barbour Trucking company office constructed this year.

Mrs. R. E. Van Horn has established the Holly Gift Shop in her home on North Park street.

Peeler Brothers Garage has done a good business in two locations this year and will begin the new year in the building just north of Curtis Sewell's Humble Station.

Kin of Parkan Dies In Airplane Crash Off Korean Coast

Mrs. I. F. (Sam) Payne has received word a nephew, John James, an aviation electronics man 2c, was one of 10 men killed in a big flying boat on night patrol that crashed last Friday night in the Sea of Japan. Only four aboard were rescued.

John was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Junius James of Dumas and formerly lived in Electra. The body will be shipped back to the States and funeral services will be under direction of Tanner Funeral Home of Iowa Park. Arrangements are no complete at this time.

The navy said the four engine craft hit the sea 50 miles off the east coast of Korea from Kosong. The destroyer Renshaw went to the scene and rescued four of the crewmen who had been in the icy waters two hours after their plane went down.

They were taken to the naval base at Yokosuka near Tokyo. Only two required hospitalization.

The plane was attached to a patrol squadron which had been operating with a task force in the Korean war zone.
