The city council Monday night passed a resolution indicating its intent to place the home rule charter issue before the voters once more.

"At the appropriate time in calendar year 1984 an ordinance be presented to the City Council for the purpose of calling an election to determine the interest of the citizens of Iowa Park in selecting a charter commission for the purpose of framing a charter for the home rule of the City of Iowa Park, Texas," states the resolution.

The council indicated the issue would be on the same ballot as the annual council election, in April. At that time, voters will be asked to name a charter commission to draft a home rule charter, which would be

voted on by the citizens after its completion.

When the vote on the proposed charter is held, it will be the fifth time for residents of Iowa Park.

They turned down the proposed charters: 449-326, in April, 1970; 149-108, May, 1974; 306-256, July, 1975, and 562-369, April, 1977.

Mayor Charlie Lee and Alderman Tim Hunter both expressed opinions that public interest in a new charter was "not overwhelming." Each said they would like to have indications of interest through petitions.

However, Alderman Bud Thompson, who had asked that the issue be brought before the council, said the interest would not be indicated so much by a petition as it would at the

ballot box, after the public is educated about the benefits of home rule.

Following a lengthy discussion, all five aldermen voted for the resolution, not requiring petitions.

Another resolution, it dealt with the city's agreement to allow Texas Political Subdivision Worker's Compensation Joint Insurance Fund to carry the city's compensation insurance.

HOTEL SITE FOR SALE

Council members decided to offer the old hotel site, across Cash north from city hall, for sale with the proceeds to be used on the library. The city will reserve the right to reject all bids.

Also concerning the library, aldermen approved payment of \$9,390 to Cool-Temp Siding Co. for work done at the Burnett Memorial Library.

Aldermen delayed taking any action on a project to change the front doors of the Recreational Activities Center to meet the fire code, because only one bid was received and they felt the bid \$1,340 was higher than needed to be.

Administrator James Barrington's

proposal to put both office posting machines which were displaced by the new computer up for sale bids.

No comment was made following a 21-minute executive session of the council, other than by Mayor Lee that the session was "information to the council only" concerning personnel.

Lee, before closing the regular meeting, said the next meeting would be Dec. 12, but the Dec. 26 date would be disregarded as a regular meeting date.

Teams to play in tournaments

Iowa Park's Hawkettes will carry their 2-0 record to Seymour's tournament tomorrow, hoping to improve on last year's runner-up finish in that same event.

Meanwhile, the Hawks will be looking for their first win of the young season when they travel to Graham for a three-day tournament there.

The girls haven't been tested in their back-to-back games with Rider, but are expecting some tough competition this weekend. They drew a first-round bye, and will play at 8 a.m. Friday against the winner of today's game between Throckmorton and Haskell.

The Hawks are to meet tough Class A Graford at 5:30 this afternoon in the first round of Graham's tourney. Other teams in their bracket are Wylie and Stephenville. In the other bracket are host Graham, Brecken-

ridge, Diamond Hill and Jacksboro.

Also playing in the Seymour tournament will be the Hawk Junior Varsity, which sees its first action at 9:30 Friday morning. A loss would put the JV back in action at 1 p.m., and a win at 9:30 p.m.

In their season opener here last week, the Hawkettes clobbered Rider, 75-33. Lisa Sefcik led scoring with 15, Lisa Holloway had 13 and Michelle Smith scored 11.

Coach Ray Sefcik pulled his starting lineup for the entire fourth quarter of that game.

It was a little closer in Monday's return match, this time played at Rider. Iowa Park won, however, 61-42. Holloway finished with 21 points, Sefcik had 13 and Dana Trantham nine.

Playing their season opener last week at Rider, the Hawks were edged 69-67 by a field goal with only

four seconds remaining in the game. Robert Harper had 19 points and Lee Birk 14.

Tuesday night, their record dropped to 0-2 with an 11-point loss, 58-47, to Graham. Harper finished with 10 points in that game and Birk had 13.

The game's outcome looked much worse in the early part of the game than it finished, however. When Birk scored a field goal with 4:16 remaining in the first half, the Hawks were trailing 19-2.

They narrowed the score to 17-21 by the half, but fell behind 27-42 by the end of the third quarter.

The Hawk JV beat Graham 36-33 after trailing several times by as many as 10 points. They lost to Rider, 57-53.

Graham also won the freshman game, 52-42.

The Hawkettes JV defeated Rider

50-32 and 60-27, while the freshman girls lost both games with Rider, 46-31 and 54-42.

Iowa Park hosts Holliday Tuesday, when games between the boys and girls junior varsity and varsity teams will be played, with the first tilt slated at 3:30 p.m.

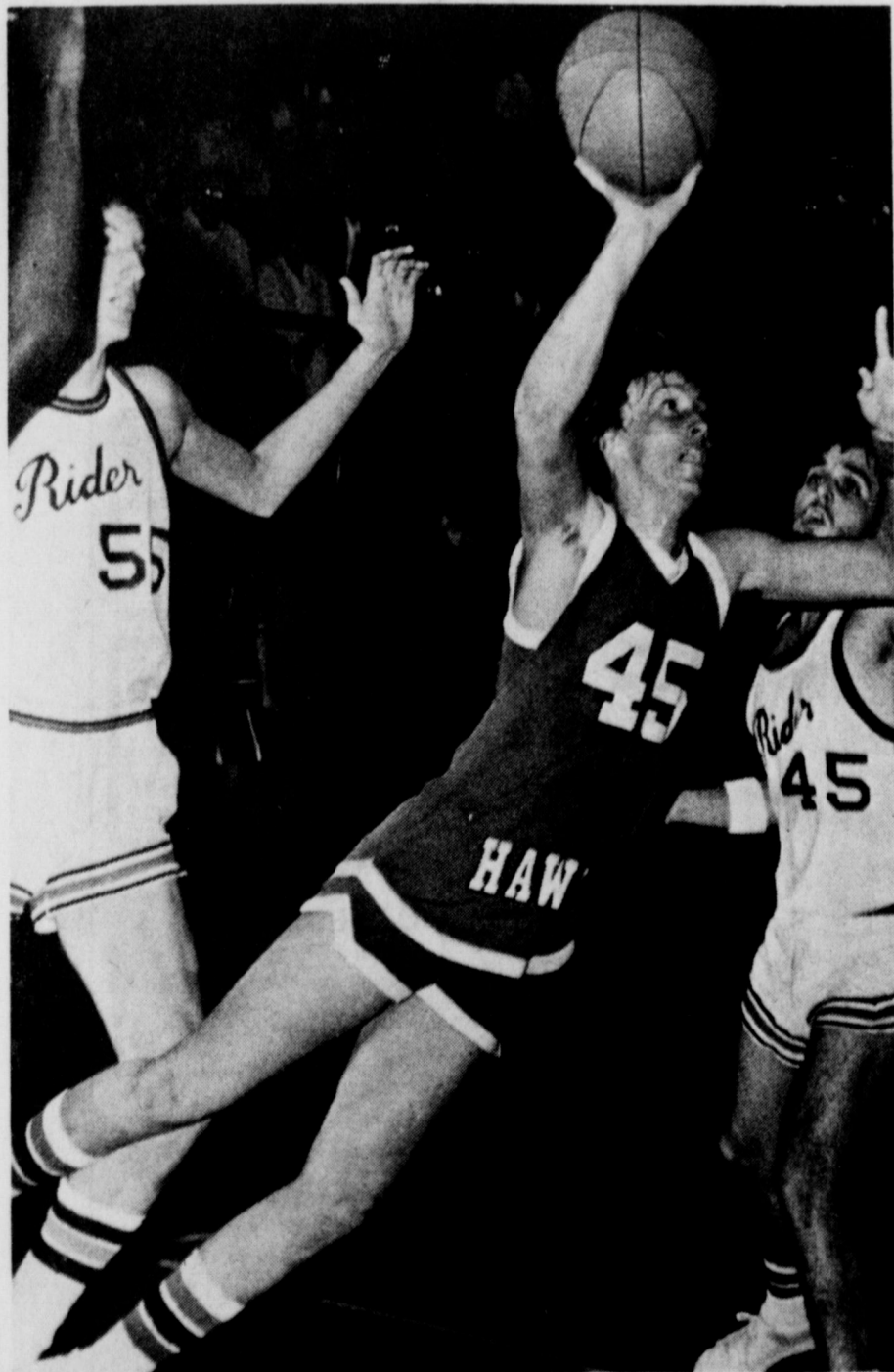
Dogs attack two persons

Wells, Farnsworth vows are solemnized here Saturday afternoon

At the invitation of Mrs. Danial Cullers and J.C. Wells, parents of the bride, and Rev. and Mrs. Howell Farnsworth, parents of the groom, a host of relatives and friends assembled at the First Baptist Church Saturday afternoon to witness the solemn recitation of marriage vows by their children, Miss Cynthia Jean Wells and Phillip Layne Farnsworth. The groom's father was the officiant for the formal double-ring ceremony.

The Bible theme chosen for emphasis was so effectively carried out in every detail for the service that a hushed reverence pervaded the atmosphere in the church sanctuary. The red, white and black colors of the Bible combined admirably in decorations, appointments and costumes, the black being reflected in the formal attire of the male participants and minister.

The formality of the occasion was stressed when Allen Henderson and Robby Hausler, U.S. Marines, who had first acted as doormen, rolled out the white aisle runners for the bride to walk the aisles to and from the altar. Gene Shawver, uncle of the bride, escorted her to the altar pausing on the way for her to present her mother, who later gave her in marriage, with a red rose of love.

The altar was centered with a brass crown arch entwined with boxwood and accented with a plaque of white silk stephanotis, lilies of the valley and greenery tied with a white satin bow and topped with a row of votive candles. Linked to the arch on either side were slanted seven-branched candelabra holding tall white tapers. The altar extremities were marked with heart-shaped votive candelabra. A white-cushioned prayer bench that was a meaningful part of the setting was placed in front of the arch. The choir rail was swagged with boxwood topped with votive candles at intervals. Each candelabra and the prayer bench were traced with boxwood dotted with white stephanotis.

The floral accent to the decor was provided by two silk arrangements of palm fronds, white gladioli and starburst mums lifted by brass footed stands on either side of the steps leading to the altar. Church pews were decorated with tall white candles sheltered by clear hurricane globes atop tall brass posts trimmed with white silk bows.

An impressive part of the ceremony was the lighting of the unity candle. To complete the service, the bride and groom proceeded to the candlestick in the lower altar that held three candles, two of which had been lighted by mothers of the couple when they were ushered into the sanctuary and had burned during the ceremony. They each took a candle, and together they lighted the center candle, extinguished the ones they were holding and left the center candle burning as a symbol of their having been united as one.

Miss Lisa Sefcik and Miss Tracey Lawson presided at the wedding book in the church foyer and again at the reception securing names of guests who attended the wedding. The long table in the foyer was covered with sheer candlelight cloths edged with matching lace achieving the popular layered look. The table was appointed with two tall brass holders supporting pillar candles, white plume pens and the book.

The music for the wedding helped to create and complete the solemn mood of the occasion. Mrs. Gilbert Davis of Dallas gave a prelude concert of appropriate organ selections. At four o'clock, the hour of the wedding, the bell tones on the organ were sounded as mothers of the bride and groom were seated to the tune of "Twelfth of Never," then Miss Lisa Dietrichson, vocalist, accompanied by Bob Stewart, pianist, sang "My Tribute."

The attendants of the bride and groom, flower girl and ring bearer

took their places in the nuptial space while the organist played Gordon Young's "Prelude in Classic Style." Bryan Fowler, accompanied by the pianist, sang "I Might Be You" while the aisle cloths were being pulled. The bride and her uncle came to the altar to the strains of the traditional processional. After the bride and groom took their places together and stood on either side of the face-to-face prayer bench, he took her hands and sang "The Love She Found in Me" to her. The music was completed by Gilbert Davis of Dallas singing "The Lord's Prayer," and Mendessohn's recessional by the organist. As the bridal couple were leaving the church, she presented her new mother-in-law with a red rose of love.

The bride was an enchanting picture in her lovely wedding gown suited to the essence of dignity and refined taste. Fashioned of white silk organza over peau de soie, the bodice with its natural waistline featured a demure V yoke ruffled with alencon lace in both front and back. An insert of the lace extending from the shoulders to ruffled cuffs at the wrists added a special felling of delicacy to the long tight sleeves. The full skirt captured attention with an overlay of pleated Chantilly lace that started at the waistline and formed an apron effect in front. The skirt was bordered with alencon lace and extended to full chapel length.

The pearl-sprinkled lace was beautifully repeated on the bride's camelot cap that held her illusion blusher and fingertip length veil. She carried a bouquet marked by unusual delicacy on a white Bible that Mrs. Howell Farnsworth had given her at her first bridal shower. The bouquet

was a silk creation of white roses, red rosebuds, lilies of the valley accented with loops of white lace intertwined with silver ribbon, and cascading white satin picot ribbons.

To keep traditions of the day, the bride chose pearl earrings that belonged to her grandmother, Mrs. Garvin Shawver for "something old" and wore her pearl necklace for "something borrowed." She used her white Bible for "something new" and a garter for "something blue."

Miss Crystal Holder, cousin of the bride, the flower girl, carried a white straw basket filled with red and white silk roses, tiger lilies, gypsophilla, baby's breath and petals. She wore a long white organdy dress enhanced with ruffles, lace and red ribbon bow trim and wore a complimentary floral headpiece.

Micheal Holder, another cousin of the bride, carried the rings for the service on a white satin lace-trimmed pillow. He wore a formal black tuxedo duplicating the style of the groom's attendants' attire.

The charming quintet of bridal attendants wore identical red taffeta gowns, their romantic appeal noted in illusion front and back yokes with Schiffli embroidery accents, elbow length sleeves above wide cuffs, slightly raised waistlines with bow trim. The beauty of the gowns was enhanced with their silk nosegays backgrounded with white lace threaded with silver ribbon composed of red and white roses, white lilies of the valley and stephanotis, with red and white satin ribbons tied in love knots providing the finishing touches.

Miss Heather Hausler had the role of maid of honor in the wedding. The bridesmaids were Miss Holly Farnsworth, sister of the groom, Miss Michelle Evans, Miss Jan Hale and Miss Melissa Wells, sister of the bride.

The groom wore a white tuxedo with classic tailcoat with satin peak lapels accented with side buttons, a designer pin tuck shirt with pearl colored studs, matching cuff links, bow tie and cummerbund. For a boutonniere, he wore an open red rose centered with a white rosebud combined with a green leaf and touch of baby's breath.

The groom's attendants wore black classic full dress tails, the coats featuring self top collars and velour face peak lapels and suspender buttons on the front. They wore designer white shirts with tiny pin tucked pleats and wing tip collars, red bow ties, matching cummerbunds and white gloves. The ushers wore identical suits except for tails and the minister was dressed like the attendants except for wearing a striped ascot instead of a bow tie.

Bill Cribbs served as best man. Groomsmen were Mark Henderson, Kent Roberts, Robert Harper and Troy Linthicum. The ushers were

The bride's mother wore a dusty rose gown of lustrous polyester knit designed with a V-neckline, gathered empire waistline, pleated skirt, the gown accented with a separate sheer chiffon capelet featuring a rolled neckline and attached belt with sequin trim in front. She wore a corsage formed of silk roses the color of her dress, silver baby's breath and satin picot ribbons.

The groom's mother wore a corsage of red and white silk roses accented with silver ribbon and baby's breath to complement her long designer gown by Sylvia Ann of silver polyester chiffon over taffeta fashioned with flowing panels on the front bodice and skirt.

The bride's mother was hostess for the reception following the wedding in the Fellowship Hall of the church where the decor followed the formal styling of that in the sanctuary.

Upgrading forage trial successful

Good quality forage is at a premium this year. We do, however, have a lot of lower quality hay on hand. Some Wichita County producers are trying a brand new method to increase the quality of their hay at a relatively low cost.

One that's found this to be very successful and economical is Ronnie Waters at Hilltop Angus Ranch, Iowa Park. He treated four 1,200 pound bales with anhydrous ammonia and got some excellent results.

Crude protein was increased from 6.5 percent before treatment to 21.03 percent after treatment. The four bales were put end to end and covered with six mil black polyethylene. Edges were sealed with soil and the anhydrous pipe placed underneath. Approximately 40 pounds of ammonia by weight was put under the polyethylene for each ton of feed.

Ammonia costs about 11 cents per pound, thus you would spend 4.40 dollars for ammonia. Polyethylene

costs run about \$3.65 per ton of feed treated. Therefore, you can actually treat a ton of low quality forage for around \$8.05.

The particular type of hay that Ronnie treated was low quality wheat hay. Research has shown that you cannot significantly increase the quality of higher grade forage.

In addition to hay ammoniation increasing the quality of forage at a low cost, it is also one of the most available sources of protein available.

You can buy it at almost any feed dealer or fertilizer house.

Ronnie also hopes that by treating his hay he will increase the uptake by his cattle and also the digestibility of the hay.

He will be watching Ronnie's test as the days go on and will have a report on what happens to the crude protein level after a longer period of time.

We finally got our wheat demonstrations planted on County

Line Road near Electra. After so much rain and trouble, Bill Lalk and I put the 22 wheat varieties, 4 seeding rate tests, and 9 fertilizer plots out.

The Lalk's had an excellent test at the same location last year. It was viewed on the farm tour. This coming year will be no exception because we plan on touring it along with the test put out by Freddie Daume on Rifle Range Road. The tour, if you're interested, will be held on May 8.

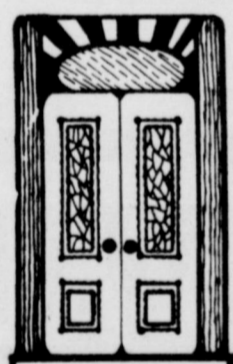

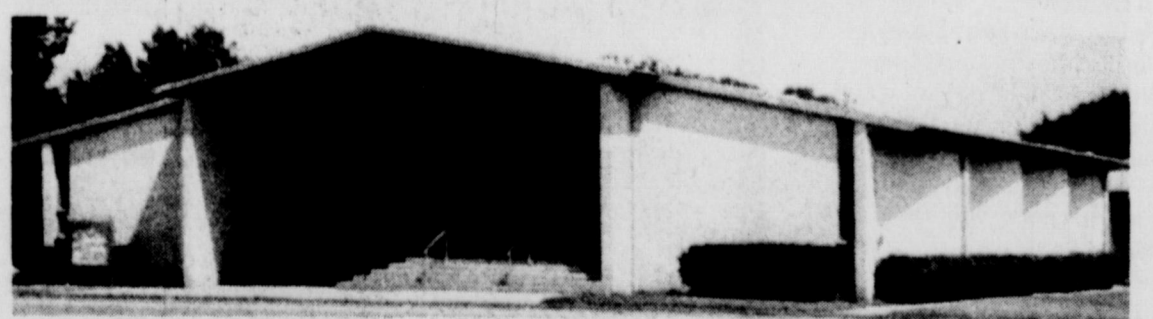

Cook of the Week

Most cooks like dessert recipes that look extremely elegant and ones that are easy to make. The Cherry Jubilee that Mrs. Ronald Woods shares with us today sounds like it will delight the hearts of many cooks. Angel Food cake is the main ingredient in her recipe.

The first known version of this "heavenly morsel" (Angel Food cake), according to Great Recipes of the World, is a recipe published in an 1883 cookbook, whose anonymous author offered the following account of it's origin.

A family from Atlantic City, N.J. moved to a picturesque spot on the Hudson River and operated a boarding house. There, one of the ladies of the family was given a "valuable receipt" by a friend who had received it from a lady in India. When the family returned to Atlantic City, the lady began to sell the cake, which was made with the greatest secrecy behind closed doors. Finally in the 1883 book, the secret was revealed for the first time for the cake "which has excited greater curiosity and interest than any other that was ever presented to the American public," according to one source.

Bobby Woods, wife of the assistant principal of the Iowa Park High School, a native of Kansas, was graduated from Junction City High School. She and her husband moved to this area in Sept. 1973 when he was stationed at Sheppard Air Force Base. She worked for six years as a sales clerk at the base.

The Woods are members of First Baptist Church. They have one daughter, Cari (Mrs. Tony) Di Marzio of Burkburnett, and one son, Ronald Jr., a medical student at Texas Tech. Mrs. Woods is a part-time student at Midwestern State Univ., and her hobbies are sewing and reading.

CHERRY JUBILEE

Angel Food Cake (store bought)
1/2 pint whipping cream
2 boxes instant vanilla pudding
1 can cherry pie filling

Cut angel food cake into thin slices, then prepare instant pudding, following directions on box. Place cake slices first in a pan or bowl, then cover with pudding, alternating with a layer of cake slices and layer of pudding. Finish with a layer of pudding. Beat cream until stiff and spread over top of pudding. Then spread the cherry pie filling over top of whipped cream. Best if made the night before or at least 3 hours before serving.

CROCKPOT PEPPER STEAK (Overnite)

1 1/2 to 2 lbs. round steak, cut in strips
1 T paprika
2 cloves garlic, crushed
1 cup sliced green onions with tops
2 green peppers, cut in strips
2 large fresh tomatoes, diced
1 can beef broth, ready to serve
4 cups water
4 T cornstarch
4 cups hot cooked rice
Sprinkle steak with paprika and allow to stand while preparing other ingredients. Now add remaining ingredients except cornstarch and rice into pot. Cook overnight until you are ready for it the next day. About 30 minutes before serving, add cornstarch and serve on rice.

BABY FOOD CAKE

2 cups sugar
2 cups flour
1 tsp nutmeg
1 tsp cinnamon
1 cup oil
3 eggs
1 cup pecans
2 small jars of plum baby food
1 tsp soda
Mix all ingredients together and beat. Bake at 350 degrees 30 minutes.

SPICY SPANISH RICE

1 box Spanish Rice Roni
1 cup diced bell pepper
1 large can tomatoes
1 clove fresh garlic, chopped
Romano cheese, grated
American cheese, grated
Follow directions on box of Rice Roni, adding diced bell pepper, tomatoes and garlic. After simmering 15 minutes, sprinkle the mixture of cheeses on top and cook for a few

minutes longer until cheese melts. Makes 6 servings.

ROCKY ROAD SQUARES

1 pkg. Betty Crocker super moist devil's food cake mix
1/2 cup margarine or butter, melted
1/2 cup water
1/4 cup packed brown sugar
2 eggs
1 cup chopped nuts
3 cups miniature marshmallows
3/4 cup Betty Crocker chocolate ready-to-spread frosting
1/4 cup coarsely chopped nuts.

Mix half of the cake mix (dry), the margarine, water, brown sugar and eggs in large bowl until smooth. Stir in remaining cake mix and 1 cup nuts. Spread in pan (13x9x2). Bake 20 minutes at 350 degrees. Sprinkle marshmallows evenly over top. Bake until marshmallows are puffed and golden brown, 10 to 15 minutes. Heat frosting in 1-quart saucepan over medium heat, stirring constantly, until of desired consistency. Spread over top, sprinkle with 1/4 cup nuts. Cool completely and cut into squares.

CHICKEN SUPREME

1 can condensed cream of celery soup
2 cups water
1 tsp salt
1/4 tsp Worcestershire sauce
Dash of pepper
1 1/2 cups minute rice
1 1/2 cups diced cooked chicken or turkey
1 1/2 cups cooked cut green beans
3 T diced pimiento

Combine soup, water, salt, Worcestershire sauce and pepper in saucepan; bring to a boil over medium heat. Remove from heat and add remaining ingredients. Pour into buttered 2-quart casserole. Heat at 450 degrees 15 minutes. Makes 6 servings.

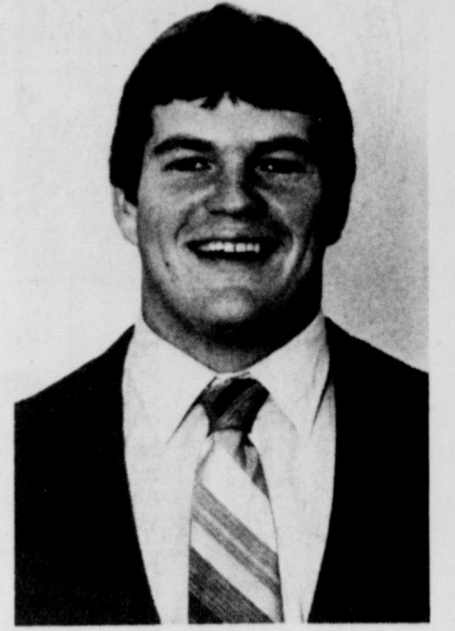

But the pass was intercepted and returned to the one-yard line. That set up the game's first touchdown, and Paradise's only TD of the evening.

In fact, it was pretty much Valley the rest of the game. The Patriots allowed Paradise only five first downs the entire game, 39 yards rushing and 101 passing.

Valley, on the other hand, picked up 20 first downs, primarily on 264 yards amassed rushing and 50 additional yards passing.

All three Valley touchdowns were scored in the second quarter. The first was set up by a pass interception on the Paradise 37, the second on a fumbled pitchout at the Panther 10, and the third capping a 66-yard drive.

Paradise quarterback, junior Chris Lowery, had completed 56 percent of his passes during the season, 29 of them for touchdowns. But he was allowed to connect on only four of his 15 attempts against the Patriots.

Turnovers were also a big problem for the Panthers, losing the ball four times on fumbles, plus one interception.

The championship trophy was presented following the game by Chamber President Linda Merrick. The trophy was purchased by the Chamber and State National Bank.

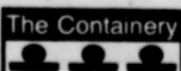
