Europeans impressed with Texas

"We should have come directly to Texas."

That was an observation of an European farmer Friday, meaning his group of 18 had been able to see the American agriculture they had expected, rather than what they had seen earlier in the week in Virginia.

The group were guests of the Wichita County Young Farmers, and what they saw had their eyes bulging, their calculators clicking converting pounds to metrics, and their expressions of appreciation being made repeatedly.

The whirlwind tour was set up a year ago, when Iowa Parkan Barry

Mahler and a number of other American Young Farmers attended a conference in Europe which was followed by a tour of farms in various countries there.

A similar conference was held earlier last week in Virginia, at which time the tour to Texas was arranged by Mahler, with the help of his local members.

They flew into Dallas and were carried to Wichita Falls by charter bus, arriving late Thursday, but in plenty of time for a chicken fried steak dinner.

Early Friday, following breakfast, their first stop was at the Case farm

equipment dealership. That was their first exposure to the large, four-wheel drive tractors used commonly in this part of the country, and they could hardly believe their eyes and information concerning weight and power of the tractors.

In fact, they were so awed by the equipment, much of their schedule was thrown out of kilter the rest of the morning.

From the first stop, they visited Jack Ayres' cutting horse operation near Holliday. A couple were given the opportunity to ride horses.

They were two hours late arriving at Texoma Fertilizer, south of town.

There, they had the opportunity to see the operation of a fertilizer blending plant as well as grain storage.

But their eyes caught an oil well pump jack just east of the storage tanks, and they spent almost as much time seeing how oil is produced as they had used in viewing the rest of the operation.

Because time had slipped away and lunch was awaiting them at the Golden Distributing headquarters in Wichita Falls, their stop at Fred Daume's farm had to be aborted.

Their lunch consisted of charcoaled ribeye steaks with all the trimmings, and they apparently liked Texas cooking because more than half had second helpings of steak.

Following the lunch, a briefing was held during which area people were introduced to the visitors. There, also, film was shown on television of tractor pull competition, after which Jim Barbour cranked up his competition tractor for them.

The group departed mid afternoon to visit the Dimmitt area. They had to travel by bus, however, which was a change from the original plans. Because of bad weather in the Panhandle, they didn't get to fly as guests of the Texas Flying Farmers.

"I wish we could have come directly to Texas, instead of spending that time in Virginia. This is the kind of farming we had expected in the United States," commented one visitor from Portugal.

The group represented the nations of Portugal, Italy, England, Germany, Spain, France, Ireland, Belgium, Holland and Scotland.

City, school meetings scheduled next week

City aldermen will be discussing buying and school trustees discussing selling, at their meetings next week.

The city council is to meet at 7 p.m. Monday in council chambers, and the school board meeting is slated at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday in the administration building.

Aldermen will be asked permission to advertise for bids to purchase a Cushman truck, to be used by the meter reader, and also a mud pump for the water treatment plant.

The truck reportedly would operate at less expense to carry the meter reader on his rounds of the community than the small pickup now

in use, aldermen will be told. The mud pump would replace an old model for pumping mud from the settling basin.

The first of two required public hearings will be held Monday, with the second scheduled in January, which would increase the size of the city limits by 72.38 acres on the northwest side of the community.

A tract of land fronting the access road on the north side of Highway 287 and west of Park Tank Truck Service, is being proposed by developer Rip Smith to be annexed.

A resolution will be considered by the council which would deny a rate

increase requested by Texas Electric Service Co., and would give the responsibility of contesting the rate sought before the state Public Utilities Commission to the Texas Municipal League.

Also to be considered Monday is a request from John Bentley to purchase raw water from Lake Iowa Park. Since the city has no policy concerning such a request, administrator James Barrington has drafted an ordinance to be studied by the council, should it decide to sell the water.

TRUSTEES TO MEET

School trustees will consider proposals by developer Bill Swan concerning residential property owned by the school south of the nursing home.

The school purchased an entire block of land, on which one lot is consumed each year with construction of a home by the Building Trades class.

Swan has acquired land north of the block and is proposing developing of the street between the two blocks, or trading land if the school would not want to invest in property it would

not utilize for at least three more years.

Supt. Harold Cowley said yesterday he had not developed a recommendation at that time which he would give the board.

Also on Tuesday's agenda, the school's five-year plan for its vocation program, including adult courses, will be discussed, as will consideration of renewing its hospitalization insurance with the present carrier.

Cowley also said the 1982-83 school year audit will be ready for presentation to the board.

Parents become aware of abduction threat

Jim Popp, investigative consultant to Child Find, presented a program concerning criminally and parentally-abducted children and the precautions to take in order to prevent children from being abducted, Thursday evening at Iowa Park High School auditorium.

The program, sponsored jointly by Bradford and Kidwell P-TA groups, was held in conjunction with a fingerprinting session for local parents to have prints made of their children. Fingerprinting is still underway, with another session scheduled from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. at the A.S.C.S. Building (tax office) on Park Street, and all parents are urged to participate.

Popp, a former insurance investigator for 17 years, is now co-founder with Herb Smith of P.A.S.S. (Parental Abduction Search Specialists). He is internationally known in his work, and has been in the Wichita Falls area for six years.

Along with co-workers, the Philadelphia native has recovered 1,050 children in the last three years. Most of the children found had been parentally abducted. Although Popp deals mainly with parentally-abducted cases, he has taken cases concerning criminal abduction.

At the program Thursday, Popp said over 200,000 children are abducted each year with 50-75,000 never heard from or seen again.

The criminal abduction, according to Popp, is taking a child away from parents to be placed in the black market adoption in this country and abroad, overseas sales, and child pornography.

Children targeted most, according to Popp, are those ranging in age from three to five-years, blond-haired and blue-eyed, and mostly female. Seven of 10 criminally-abducted children are found either dead or abused. In overseas sales these children are sold for between \$10-\$50,000. Children taken for

pornography are in most cases found dead within a week of their abduction.

Popp explained that a parental abduction is a non-custodial parent taking a child away. This type of abduction is done in spite. The welfare, said Popp, of the child is not the concern in most cases. Six of 10 children are found dead or abused after parental abduction.

Precautions to take include: Fingerprinting, code word between

children and parents or anyone in charge of your child; teaching children their phone number, and how to dial it; having the child learn the city, county and state; reporting unfamiliar cars hanging around your neighborhood to the police department; and, mostly, according to Popp, realizing that there are no barriers in terms of economic, social or religious nature that will prevent any child from being abducted. It can happen to anyone.

Inspired by the approach of Christmas and what decorations mean to the season, she is sharing recipes for two decorative items, Soap Balls and Decorative Dried Bread, both of which sound like real conversation pieces. Digressing again from foods, she shares her recipe for making liquid hand soap.

Her food recipes include those for cookies and candy that are apropos not only for the holiday season but for any season of the year, and she also tells how to make sweetened condensed milk.

REFRIGERATOR COOKIES

3 cups sifted flour
1/2 tsp. baking powder
1/2 tsp. salt
3/4 cup butter or margarine
1 cup granulated or packed light brown sugar
2 eggs
2 tsp. vanilla
1 cup M&Ms, plain or peanut chocolate candies, finely chopped
Combine and sift flour, baking powder and salt. Cream butter or margarine well, add sugar and cream together well. Add eggs and vanilla and cream until light and fluffy. Stir in dry ingredients just until well blended. Divide into two equal portions. Chill until dough can be shaped into rolls about 8 inches long. Roll in waxed paper or foil, close ends; chill thoroughly.
Slice about 1/8 inch thick. Place on ungreased baking sheet. Sprinkle with chopped candies. Bake in moderate oven (375 degrees) 6 to 8 minutes. Makes 8 to 9 dozen cookies.

PARTY COOKIES

Made with M&Ms plain chocolate candies. Makes about 6 dozen.
1 cup shortening
1 cup firmly packed brown sugar
1/2 cup granulated sugar
2 tsp vanilla
1 1/2 cups plain M&M chocolate candies
2 eggs

2 1/4 cups sifted all-purpose flour
1 tsp. baking soda
1 tsp salt

Blend shortening, brown and granulated sugars in a large bowl. Beat in vanilla and eggs. Sift remaining ingredients together; add to sugar and egg mixture, blending well. Stir in 1/2 cup of candies (reserve remaining candies for decorating)

Drop from teaspoon on ungreased cookie sheet; decorate tops with remaining candies. Bake in moderate oven (375 degrees) 10 minutes or until golden brown.

Remove cookies with spatula to wire racks; cool completely. After baking, some cookies may be slightly cracked. This adds texture and interest to cookies - still the same flavor.

LASAGNE MEAT PIE

1 pkg. Hamburger Helper mix for lasagne
1 lb. ground beef
1/2 cup dry bread crumbs
1 egg

1 tsp salt
1/2 tsp Italian seasoning, if desired
1 cup shredded Mozzarella cheese (about 4 oz.)
1/2 tsp oregano
1 can (4 oz.) mushroom stems and pieces
1/4 cup slices pitted ripe olives
1 cup hot water

Heat oven to 400 degrees. Cook macaroni in 6 cups boiling water (4 tps salt) 8 minutes; drain. Mix 1/3 cup sauce. Mix the ground beef, bread crumbs, egg, salt and oregano. Press beef mixture firmly and evenly against bottom and side of ungreased 2-qt. casserole or baking pan 9x9x2 inches.

Sprinkle mushrooms with liquid and olives over beef crust. Mix macaroni, remaining sauce mix, water and Italian seasoning; pour over mushrooms and olives. Sprinkle with cheese. Bake uncovered 25 minutes. Yield: 6 servings.

SWEETENED CONDENSED MILK

3/4 cup sugar
1/2 cup water
1/4 cup margarine
1 cup dry milk crystals

In 2-cup measure, add sugar, water and margarine. Microwave on high 2-2 1/2 minutes until mixture boils, stirring 2 or 3 times. Combine in blender with dry milk; process until smooth. Refrigerate until needed.

Makes 1 cup. (Double recipe to substitute for 14-oz. can)

FANTASTIC FUDGE

3 cups sugar
5 oz. can evaporated milk
10 oz. jar marshmallow creme
1 tsp vanilla
3/4 cup margarine

12 oz. semi-sweet chocolate chips
1 cup nuts, toasted

Place sugar, margarine and milk in 2-quart glass measure. Microwave on high until mixture boils, about 5 minutes. Stir. Clip on microwave safe

candy thermometer. Microwave on high to 236 degrees (5-6 minutes). Stir in chocolate chips until smooth; blend in marshmallow creme and vanilla; stir in nuts. Pour into greased 12x8 inch pan; chill until firm. Variation: substitute 1 cup peanut butter for chocolate chips.

SOAP BALLS

Have you had little pieces of soap that are too small to handle so you throw them away? With your microwave oven, you can save the pieces of soap and melt them together to form a bar of soap. Just moisten the small pieces; place them in the microwave on a double sheet of waxed paper. Microwave on high about 45-55 seconds or until bubbles form on the soap. Cool 1 minute. Then mold together into a bar or ball, using the waxed paper to protect your hands. Cool completely before using.

DECORATIVE DRIED BREADS

Purchase or prepare rolls or bread conventionally. Allow to cool completely. Elevate on a bi-level meal rack or a bacon rack to prevent the moisture from becoming trapped on the bottom and making the bread soggy. Microwave three rolls on 20% power for 20-40 minutes, check every 10 minutes for the process of drying. One loaf of bread requires about an hour on 20% power. After completely cooled and dried, spray with varnish; sprinkle with poppy or sesame seeds if desired.

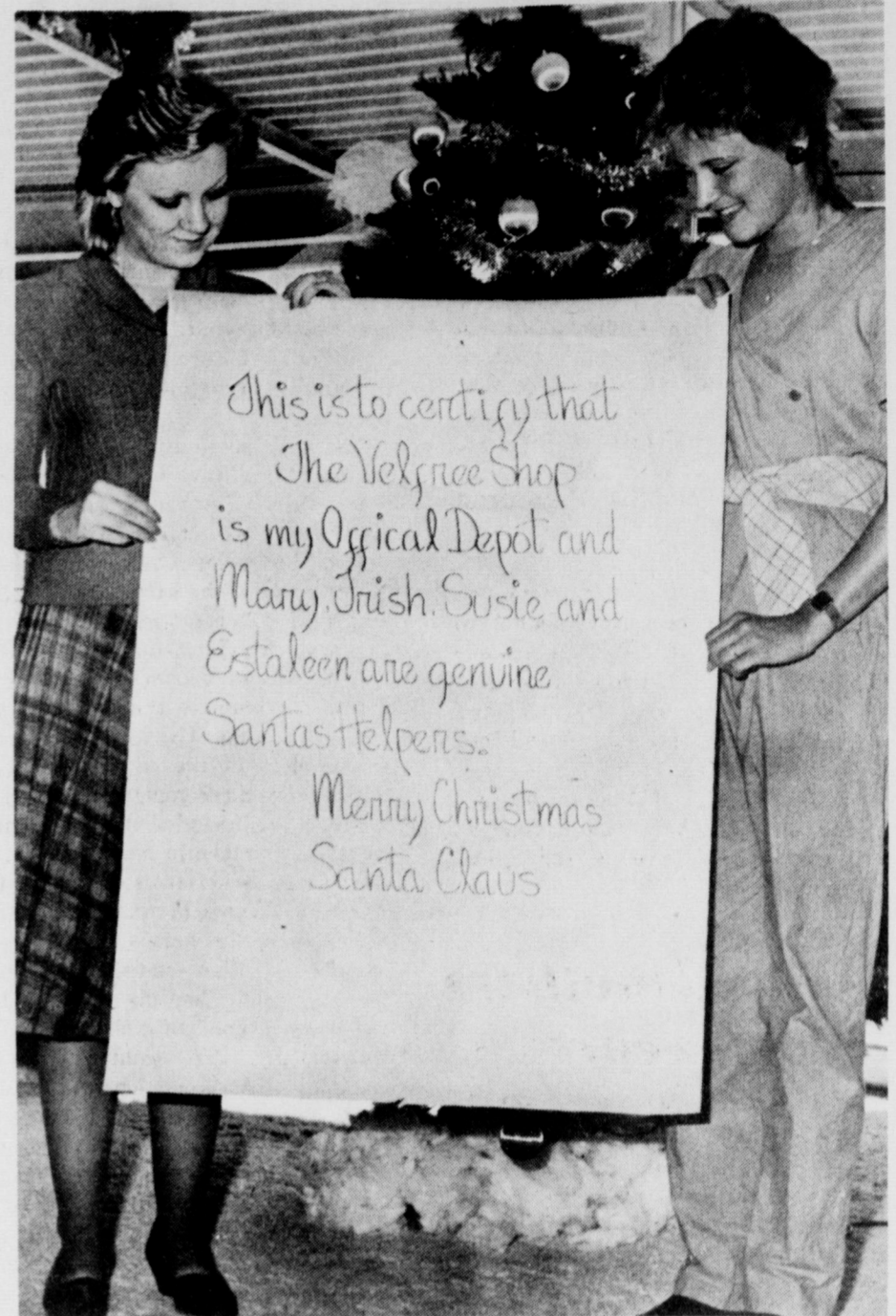
LIQUID HAND SOAP

One - 3 to 4 ounce bar soap
3 cups water
Using a food/cheese grater, shred soap into 2-qt. bowl; add water. Microwave on high 5-6 minutes, or until soap is dissolved, stirring every 2 minutes. Allow to stand several hours or overnight to cool and thicken. Fill soap dispenser. Yield: 3 cups.

As I See It....

"Where are all the Christmas decorations," the question is asked often, referring to the downtown business streets which have always in the past been decorated.

Well, they're taking up storage space and aren't worth the space in which they're stored, which is free.

It's a shame, but there are going to be a lot of changes in the future for Iowa Park streets to ever have Christmas decorations again.

This is not to say, however, that almost every business in town, retail and what have you, has done an outstanding job of fixing up their places inside.

The candy canes and wreaths which have been displayed on the light poles through the downtown area have been there courtesy of the Chamber of Commerce and its members.

As long as 12 years ago, Chamber officers started looking into replacing the old decorations. Those old decorations, by the way, were second and third hand relics when we got them.

We studied proposals of decorations sales people, and became ill when the prices were disclosed. Little bitty decorations you could hardly see from a block away would cost upward to \$500. Those pretty good ones were \$1,500 and up. . . way up!

Our Chamber of Commerce has operated on a shoestring as long as I've been here, and I understand way before my time. So there's no way the Chamber could afford decorations on its budget. Did you know six nice decorations would shoot the Chamber's entire annual budget?

One Chamber member attempted to get each individual merchant to buy his own ornament, which would be cared for and installed by the Chamber. But it quickly became apparent that wouldn't work, because not each store has its own pole, and then there were the empty buildings with poles which wouldn't have decorations.

So it became quickly apparent that

our town's Christmas decorations were on a very definite self-destruct course. And that time is now. They're in such bad condition that they're not worth patching the patches and putting up for display.

The idea of Christmas decorations in the downtown area is simply to give shoppers of retail stores the Yule spirit. There are side benefits, like enhancing the community's appearance and that sort of thing, but primarily the idea was to promote season sales.

The number of retail stores in the downtown business area of Iowa Park has constantly dwindled. And with the shrinkage of store numbers goes the shrinkage of ability to decorate the business area with the pretty signs of Christmas.

It's a shame, but a sign of the times.

IRS Tax Tips

TAX PLANNING CAN BE HELPFUL

The best way for taxpayers to ensure that they claim all the deductions, credits, and special tax benefits to which they are entitled and to avoid overpaying their taxes, the Internal Revenue Service says, is to plan their tax situations throughout the year.

Some specifics, the taxpayer who is considering the sale or purchase of securities, the scheduling of medical appointments near the end of the year, or the insulation of a home may be able to save some money by carefully considering the tax implications of these actions.

Taxpayers who change their names through marriage or divorce can prevent tax processing problems by notifying their local Social Security Administration (SSA) office of the change in name. The notification to SSA can eliminate possible delays in processing the return and speed up the issuance of any refund due.

Taxpayers who are age 55 or older and plan to sell their principal homes can also save because they may qualify to exclude up to \$125,000 of gain from their gross incomes.

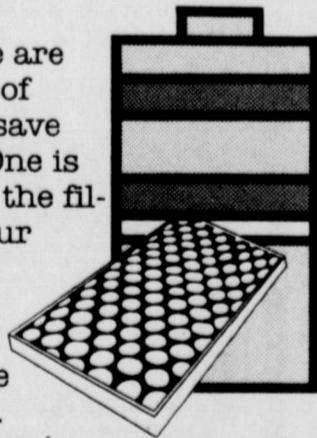

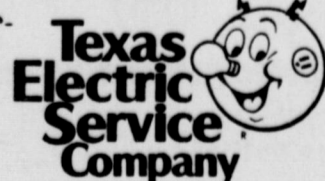

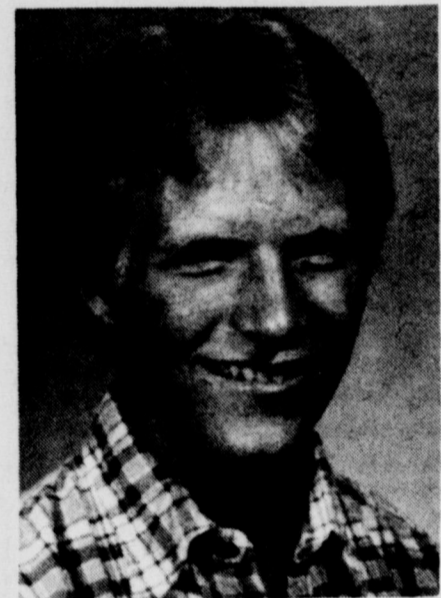
Lions official is visitor here Tuesday

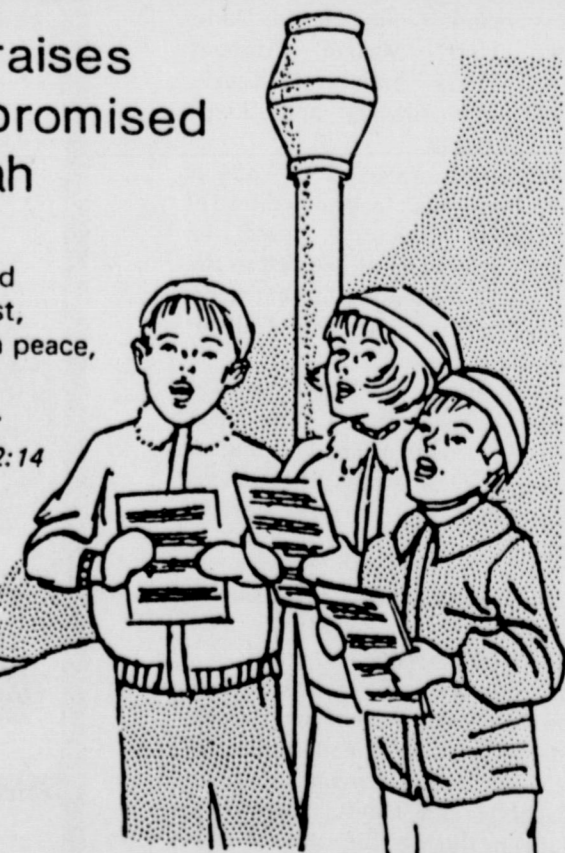

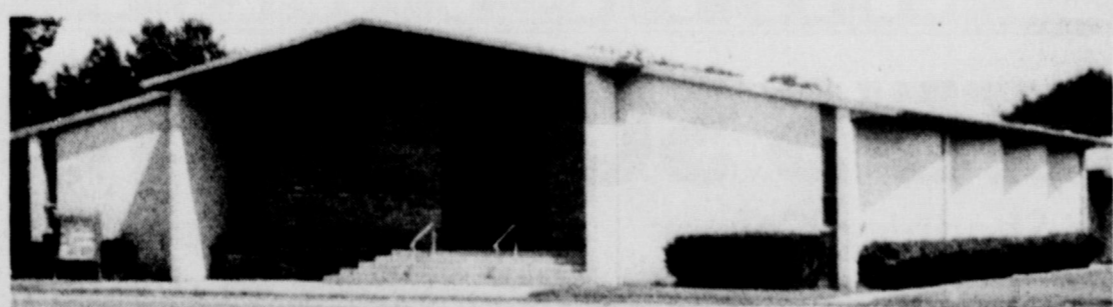

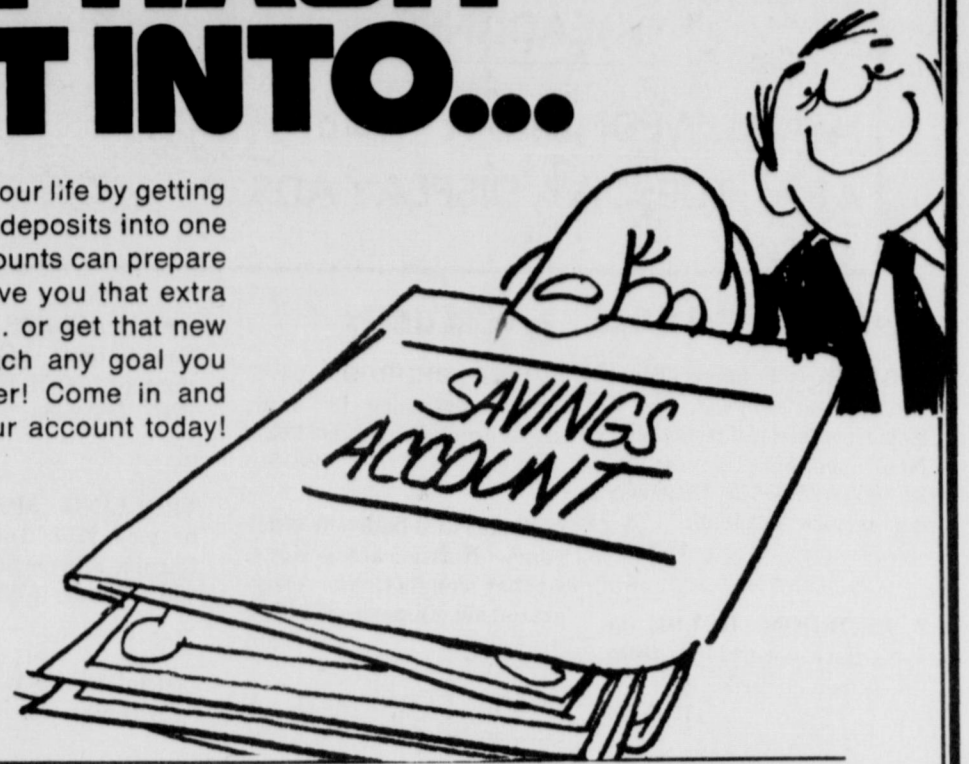

Compare cost and quality of convenience foods with those you can make from scratch. Some convenience foods are bargains but most frozen combination dishes, seasoned vegetables and dinners and ready-to-eat bakery products cost more than home-made counterparts.

Buying Vegetables and Fruits

Fresh ones are often cheaper when in season. Watch for specials on these. Plain frozen and canned ones are cheaper than those with butter and sauce.

Buying Breads and Cereal Products

"Dry old" breads are often available at a savings at supermarkets and bakery outlet stores.

"Instant" and quick cooking rice costs more than regular, enriched rice. The addition of seasoned and flavored mixes makes them much more costly.

Buying Meat

The best buys are cuts and types of meat, fish and poultry that provide the most lean meat for the money. To compare costs, divide the price per pound by the number of servings a pound provides. Servings will differ from four servings from a pound of meat with little or no fat or bone, such as flank steak, to one serving from meats with large amounts of fat, gristle and bone, such as spare ribs.

Eggs, peanut butter and dried beans and peas are good sources of protein and many other nutrients found in more expensive meat.
