The "wall of honor" in the Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce office is missing four plaques today. That's because the names of the new recipients are being engraved for presentation Saturday night at the annual banquet.

To begin at 7 p.m. in the high school cafeteria, highlights of the banquet will include announcement and presentation of the awards, a humorous talk by Bob Cox, installation of new officers, and dinner.

## Overtimes needed to defeat Azle

Both varsity basketball teams defeated Azle in district play Tuesday night, but it was the way they won that made the trip back to Iowa Park shorter than usual.

The Hawks won 89-86 and the Hawkettes won 65-63. . . both in overtime periods.

And making the trip even shorter was the fact that both junior varsity teams won their games: boys 40-31 and girls 39-30.

The similarities of the varsity games didn't end with the overtimes. High point scorers for both teams, Lee Birk and Lisa Sefcik, didn't scratch the scorebook in the first quarters.

The win did a lot for the Hawks' record. It was their second victory in a row, raising their district record to

3-4 and season record to 6-12.

Trailing 41-35 at the half, the Hawks matched Azle's 24 points in the third quarter and pulled into a tie, 81-81, by the end of regulation play. They outscored the hosts 8-5 in overtime.

Birk had 18 points to lead the Hawks. Jerry Allen had 14, but four of those were in the overtime period. Ray Sefcik had 10.

The Hawks drew 41 personal fouls from the referees, sending the Hornets to the foul line for 58 shots and making 36 of them. Iowa Park canned 13 of 17 charity tosses, making an important difference in the outcome.

Coach Ray Sefcik had expected a close ball game for his Hawkettes, since his team had managed to edge

Azle by a narrow 34-33 margin here.

Azle jumped out to an 18-7 lead by the end of the first quarter, and held a 21-point lead with three minutes remaining in the half, which ended 34-23.

Iowa Park was cold at the start of the third quarter, failing to score the first 3:49 minutes, but pulled to within nine, 44-35, before the end of the period.

Regulation play ended with the teams tied 57-57.

Most of Lisa Sefcik's 26 points came in the fourth and overtime periods. Besides canning seven field goals in the contest, she converted 12 times on 19 free shot attempts. Dana Trantham had 10.

But she needed to score big in the latter stages of the game, as five team mates had left the floor via the foul route. She was the only starter playing during the overtime period.

Team-wise, the Hawkettes sank 29 of 45 free shots while Azle was 23 of 46. Iowa Park drew 36 fouls in all, and Azle had 30.

The Hawk junior varsity beat Azle 40-31 and Hawkettes JV won 39-30.

### HAWKETTES NEEDED WIN

The victory over Azle was especially important since they had been humiliated here Friday night by Mineral Wells, 74-52, and were in trouble in district standings.

Mineral Wells led throughout the game, 15-12 after the first quarter, 33-26 at the half and 54-38 going into the final period.

Sefcik had 14 points and Lisa Selby had 10.

It looked like the Rams were going to match their female counterparts until the final quarter. Mineral Wells was leading 24-19, 48-42 and 67-60 at each of the rest stops, but the Hawks applied pressure and got hot, finally winning, 84-82.

A pair of free shots by Stephen Bidy with four seconds left on the scoreboard clock gave Iowa Park a four-point lead. Free shots had been

as important in that game as they were Tuesday, as the Hawks sank 22 of 28 attempts.

Robert Harper scorched the nets with 10 field goals and wound up with 23 points. Jerry Allen had 11 and Bidy 10.

Junior varsity teams split their

games with Mineral Wells. The girls won, 37-24, but the boys lost, 56-47.

### PLAY TOMORROW

All four teams travel to Saginaw Friday for their second meetings with Boswell. Tuesday, they will host Hirschi and Feb. 3 they will travel to Gainesville.

## Culprits trying new ways to get prescription drugs

Someone has come with a new way to play doctor.

Monday and Tuesday of this week, one or more persons had a new way of trying to get prescription drugs. They were doing it over the telephone, according to Police Chief Tom Fenley.

The way it worked was, a man would call a local pharmacist, explain he was a physician from a neighboring community, and ask that a prescription be made out for a patient.

It also worked that someone would call a doctor, say he was a pharmacist who had lost the doctor's drug enforcement administration (DEA) number, and he needed it to fill a prescription.

No doctor reportedly ever gave out the number, however. They have

other ways of getting that information number to a pharmacist.

And there was a third way: someone representing himself as a pharmacist in a neighboring city's chain-operated drug store would call a local pharmacist, and ask him to fill a prescription for one of his customers.

The various attempts to gain prescription drugs was not peculiar to Iowa Park alone, Fenley said. Neighboring towns were having the same problem.

The chief said he figured the culprits would be moving on, if they hadn't already, because they can only operate a short period of time before word spreads about their activities.

Fenley said the charge, if one is caught, would be "attempting to, or either obtaining prescription drugs by fraudulent means."

## Teachers invite choir to sing

Iowa Park High School will be represented by the A Cappella Choir at the Texas Music Educator's Association state convention Feb. 2 in Fort Worth.

This is the first time a musical organization from the school has received an invitation to perform before the group, according to Allan Andrews, director.

For the public's benefit, the group will present the same concert at 7:30 p.m. Jan. 30 in the high school auditorium. In addition, the Madrigal Singers of Hirschi High will also perform.

Iowa Park will present the first concert of the convention, which will be at 8:15 a.m. in First Christian Church of Fort Worth.

The local group will be among five high schools and three colleges performing before the state association, which is expected to attract some 2,000 persons.

Because the concert is set so early in the morning, the A Cappella Choir is to leave at noon Feb. 1, and will return late in the afternoon after its performance, Andrews said.

# Study Club program by computer student

Jeff Woods, a computer science major at Midwestern State Univ. showed through demonstration and lecture how the computer is making old methods obsolete in this age of advanced technology at a meeting of the 23 Study Club Thursday afternoon.

Speaking on the programming and application of the computer in both home and business, he emphasized how, like other technology, it affects people's lives by offering them freedom through the access of information of every description.

Woods said that individuals and businesses should determine if a computer can help them with their interests before they invest in one. He remarked that some people are afraid to spend money on computers because they think that learning to use them is too difficult. He said, however, that their fear was probably because the machines are so new and "once you are around them you learn them quickly."

He spent most of the time explaining how computers can vastly supplement both home and business abilities in word processing, finance management, education, record keeping, entertainment, telecommunications and programming through their enormous data-crunching power to reach formerly inaccessible solutions.

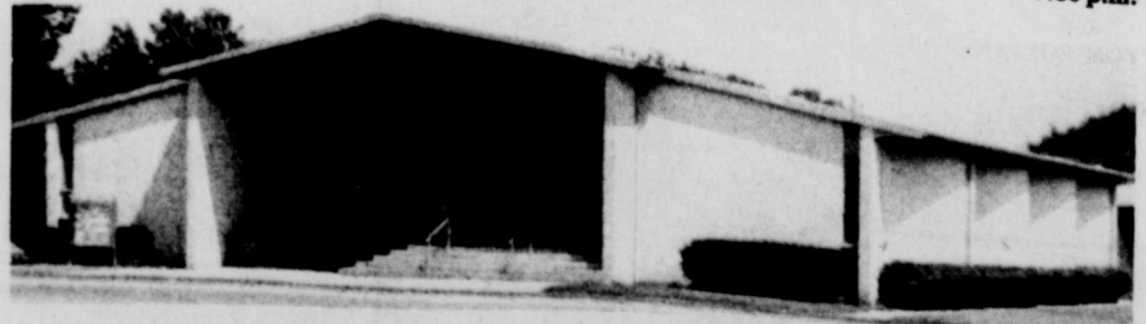

Cooking is a fascinating occupation because people can prepare foods their own particular way with their own particular flair. Considering the important role that cooks have, Meredith Lucille wrote "...We live without books; but civilized men cannot live without cooks."

...ola (Mrs. N.D.) Hodson has the reputation of being an excellent cook who has naturally gained high stature with family and friends. During the years that her husband served in the U.S. Navy, retiring as captain, she lived in many places in the United States, on Guam and in the Azores. She has a treasure trove of recipes in a file that are designed for all levels of culinary experience.

Her recipes today indicate that she uses milk, cheese, spices, sour cream and yogurt to the best advantage. Sour cream is the health-bringing gift of the Bulgarians to the Western world. Fermented milk resembling thick cream, was originally promoted in the West in the beginning of this century for its healthful properties. It was found to have added longevity to the Bulgarians. Its mild acidity and pleasant texture give it a forceful culinary appeal.

Mrs. Hodson was graduated from Huntington Park High School in Calif. and Occidental College in La., with a major in music and minor in education. She taught school for several years.

The Hodsons have lived in Iowa Park 13 years. She is a member of the Iowa Park Garden Club where she has served as president. She is the newest member of the 23 Study Club. Her hobbies are sewing, painting, swimming and fishing.

The Hodsons have two sons, Jeffrey, a major in the U.S. Air Force, stationed in Germany, and Michael of Iowa Park; a daughter, Barbara Hodson of Portland, Ore.; and seven grandchildren.

## CREPES RELLENO

Ingredients:  
1 cup milk  
1/2 cup flour  
1/2 cup corn meal  
1/2 cup chopped onion  
1 T oil  
1 lb. ground beef  
1 - 8 oz. jar taco sauce  
1/4 cup sunflower seed  
1/4 tsp ground cumin  
1/8 tsp. garlic powder

Topping:  
Guacamole, dairy sour cream, shredded sharp Cheddar cheese.

For crepes: Combine all ingredients, mixing until smooth. For each crepe, fill 1/4 cup dry measure half full. Pour into hot, lightly greased crepe pan or 6-7 inch skillet;

immediately tilt pan to coat bottom evenly with batter. Cook 45-60 seconds or until top looks dry. Turn and cook about 20 seconds. Stack crepes between sheets of wax paper. (These may be wrapped and frozen for up to 3 months.)

For filling: saute onion in oil. Add meat, browning lightly, drain. Stir in taco sauce, sunflower seed, cumin and garlic powder; simmer about 5 minutes. Heat oven to 325 degrees. Fill each of 12 crepes with 1/4 cup meat mixture; roll up. Place seam side down in 13x9 inch pan; or baking dish. Cover with aluminum foil and bake at 325 degrees 10-12 minutes or until heated through. Serve with guacamole, sour cream and shredded cheese, as desired. Makes 12 crepes. Chicken may be used instead of beef for the filling.

## LO-CAL MOCK SOUR CREAM

2 cups lo-cal cottage cheese  
1/4 cup plain yogurt  
1 egg  
1 T lemon juice  
1 T water  
1/2 tsp. dry mustard  
1/4 tsp white pepper  
1/8 tsp. hot sauce  
Put in blender and chill. 14 calories per tablespoon.

## COCONUT CREAM CAKE

1 pkg. Duncan Hines (new moisture type) white cake mix  
2 cans Angel Flake coconut  
1 can Lopez Coconut Cream  
1 pint whipping cream  
1 T granulated sugar  
Mix cake as directed on package. Add 1 can coconut to batter and bake as directed in 13x9 pan. Remove from oven and punch holes in warm cake. Pour coconut cream over warm cake. Cool cake completely and cover with the chilled, sweetened whipped cream. Sprinkle top with remaining can of Angel Flake coconut. Refrigerate.

## HIBERNIAN CHICKEN (IRISH)

1 frying chicken, cut up  
1-2 T butter or margarine  
Salt and pepper  
1 envelope gravy mix for chicken  
1 T minced onion  
1 cup apple juice  
1-2 T lemon juice  
1/2 cup light cream

Brown chicken in butter in large skillet; pour off excess fat. Season with salt and pepper. Move chicken to one side of pan. Add contents of gravy mix envelope, onion, apple juice and lemon juice to pan, stirring until well mixed. Rearrange chicken in sauce. Cover and simmer 30-40 minutes, stirring occasionally until tender. Stir in cream and heat gently.

## GERMAN CHOCOLATE PIE

1/2 bar (4 oz.) German chocolate  
1/2 cup butter or margarine  
1 tsp vanilla  
3 eggs  
1 cup sugar  
1/4 tsp. salt  
3 T flour  
1 cup chopped nuts  
1 cup heavy cream for topping (or whipped topping)

Melt together chocolate and margarine over low heat. Cool and add vanilla. In small bowl, combine eggs, sugar, salt and flour. Beat at high speed for 3 minutes. Fold chocolate mixture into egg mixture and add nuts. Pour into greased 9-inch pie plate. (It makes its own crust). Bake at 325 degrees 35 minutes or until done. Refrigerate overnight before serving. Top with whipped cream or whipped topping.

# Membership drive launched for club

An all-out drive to register members for a country club in Iowa Park is underway.

Rip Smith told an audience Monday night he had received enough encouragement to build a golf course and club house to launch the membership drive. He named Wayne House as drive chairman.

The facility would extend from Johnson Road to Lake Iowa Park, north of Shiloh and Quail Valley housing areas. Entrance would be off Johnson Road.

Smith and Dave Bisbee, professional golf instructor who will operate the club, showed a drawing of plans for the course and answered questions posed by the audience.

Workers on the membership committee will have until sometime in May to sign up a minimum of 300

members. Initiation fees, \$650 per family, will be placed in escrow. The money, should the project not be declared feasible for lack of participation, will be returned, with interest, Smith explained.

The 300 minimum would provide the foundation for a nine-hole golf course which will be designed and built by Buddy Pearson, who was responsible for the well-known greens of the Burkburnett course, according to Smith.

If the needed membership is acquired, Smith estimated the course could be open for play by mid-winter. Not until it is open, however, would members be required to start paying their \$55 monthly dues.

Smith said land is available to expand the course to 18 holes, should membership grow to some 450 or 500. Corporate memberships are also available.

Smith emphasized he has no plans for alcoholic beverages to be sold on the premises, and that the course would be petitioned for annexation into the city.

The developer is negotiating with the city to use effluent from the sewer treatment plant for irrigation of the course. He had explained to the council that treated water would be too expensive to use on a course, and an average of 500,000 gallons of effluent was being released daily into

a creek, benefiting no one.

While showing his drawings, he explained the water would be piped to the southeast corner of the course and released down a natural draw. The created flowing stream would enhance the appearance and be a course hazard, as well as making the

water move. He explained that the water, left standing, would develop an odor, but had no odor if allowed to move.

Smith confirmed he has plans to build some homes on the course grounds, similar to projects in other communities.

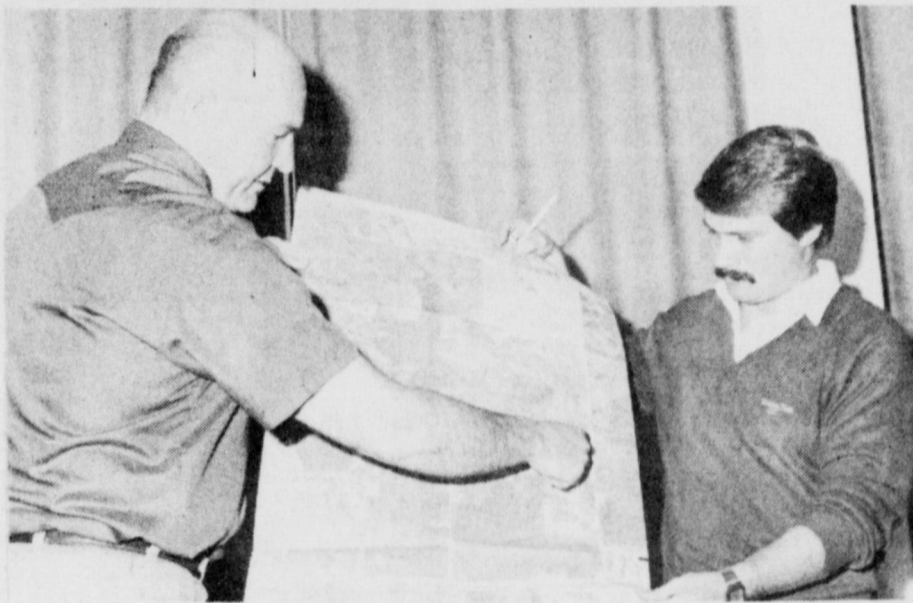

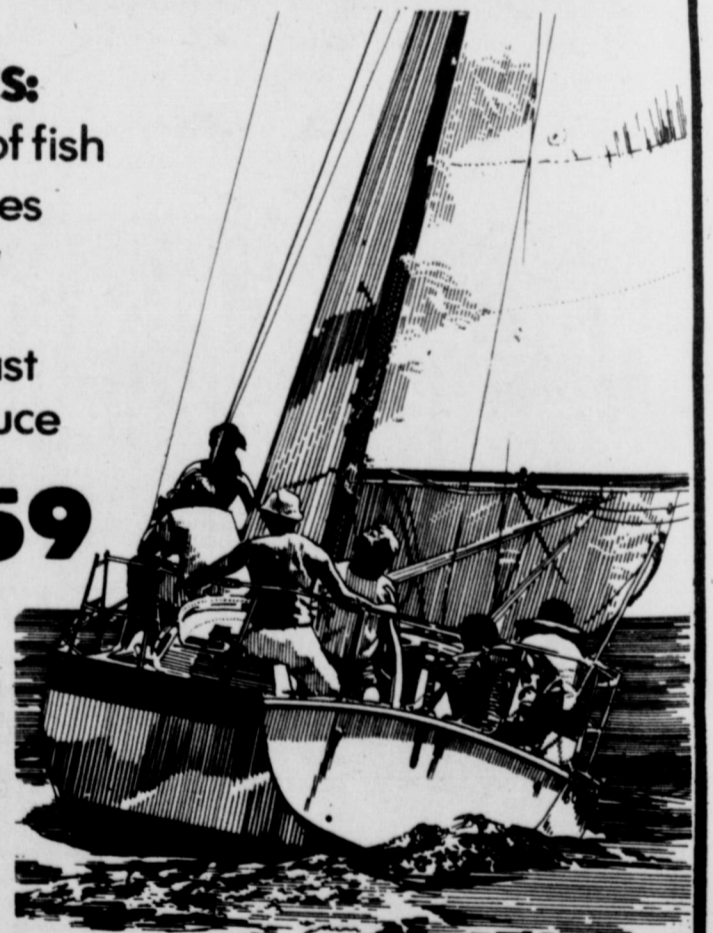
