A full agenda faces the city council for its meeting at 7 p.m. Monday in council chambers.

Some of the items, such as the proposed annexation of 73 acres into the city, have been considered at previous meetings and were tabled for changes or additional information.

The annexation proposal was first delayed for corrections on the legal description and then tabled for more information concerning utility ser-

Also back on the agenda from previous meetings is an ordinance changing speeds on streets in various areas of the city, appointing two members to the Planning and Zoning Commission, consideration of a policy on alley maintenance and naming charter commission members.

Some of the speed limit changes proposed in an ordinance considered earlier dealt with state-controlled thoroughfares. The state retains the responsibility establishing speeds in those areas, it was pointed out. Administrator James Barrington said he has two alternates for council consideration for Monday.

Three-year terms of David Padgett and Kenny Jones expire this spring on the Planning and Zoning Commission. Those positions are to be filled at the meeting.

At the Feb. 13 council meeting, former alderman Billy Gilmore asked the city to provide gravel for his alley and allow him to maintain it. The issue was tabled for drafting of a policy concerning such issues, and that will be presented for council consideration.

Should the proposal to change from a general law charter to home rule in the April 7 voting be approved, a

charter commission which would draft the new document would also be named on the same ballot. Names for the commission are to be offered by the council and also from the public. Because there will not be another council meeting before the filing deadline of March 7, the names are expected to be offered from council members Monday.

NEW BUSINESS

A request will be made Monday for the city to abandon right of way on certain streets which have not been developed in the east part of

A resolution to replat three lots in Garden Valley, where the city holds an easement, will be considered. Approval of the proposal was recommended by the Planning and Zoning Commission.

Aldermen will be asked to consider

purchase of a used brush chipper. This has been considered at various times over the past three or four years, but none has ever been approved.

Major street repairs will be suggested, including a portion of Third Street near Kidwell Elementary and about three blocks of North Wall.

Also to be considered is a proposal for construction of storage facilities at the sewer treatment plant.

FOR COUNCIL

Thompson candidate

Incumbent Bud Thompson filed Tuesday afternoon for another term on the city council, according to city hall records.

Thompson's filing leaves only one position still open for the April 7 city election, since George Hammonds has not indicated his intentions and no other candidates have applied for a

Alderman Tim Hunter was the first to file, but he is seeking the mayor's post. Charlie Lee has decided to step down after one term in that office.

It is not necessary for Hunter to abdicate his present position to seek the other office. If he is elected mayor, the council will appoint his successor for the remaining year he has to serve as alderman.

Both incumbents in the school trustee election, also to be held April 7, have filed. Rex Wells and Jerald Brown filled out their forms last week after the board officially called the election.

Candidates have until March 7 to file for places on the ballots. Absentee voting will extend from March 19 through April 3.

Banker warns public of bogus \$10 bills

An uncommon number of bogus \$10 bills have been showing up recently at State National Bank, according to vice president H.M.

He said he wasn't surprised that merchants had mistaken them for good, because they were superior quality to most counterfeit bills.

But the problem arises, that it's the merchant who comes out on the short end when such bills are accepted. There is no recourse and the amount is lost, once a bank identifies a bill as being counterfeit.

Many of the bills, but not all, have

the same serial number. The paper quality is better than usual counterfeit. Some even require a special light to detect the flaws,

"Four of five have shown up here," Nipper said. "Some are from Wichita Falls, but some were taken locally."

The first bogus bills started being detected about six weeks ago, but

some were detected this week. First suspician of a bogus bill is detected by feel. The suspect bill then is inspected further, with the special light the final determination. Nipper said federal-printed bills show

differently under the light when compared with bogus bills.

A merchant or individual who accepts a counterfeit bill loses the amount the bill represents, once it is turned into a bank, because of federal

The banker explained that banking institutions are required by law to send in bogus bills to the federal agency. Nothing is returned other than an acknowledgement of receipt, and the last owner is left without anything except a loss.

"If we accept a bill without

detection, and it turns out to be a fake, we suffer the loss ourselves," Nipper said.

Favorite places for passing bogus bills are supermarkets, convenience stores and service stations, he said.

Warrants 'don't just go away,' for those who don't go to court

The warrant file at the Iowa Park Police Department is getting crowded, a fact that has resulted in the police cracking down on people who have outstanding warrants.

"The file is bulging. Right now we probably have more warrants, including misdemeanor traffic warrants, and felony criminal warrants, than the department has ever had," said Chief Tom Fenley. "The situation has progressed to the point that we are having some officers work their days off, just in an attempt to serve these warrants."

Fenley said the department makes every effort to avoid arresting people on warrants. "We send out a letter within a day or two to everyone for whom a traffic warrant is issued, advising that person that a warrant has been issued, and that they are subject to arrest. If that doesn't get any response, we send out still another letter, only with somewhat more emphasis placed on the possibility of arrest, including the fact that they may be arrested at their

place of work, which is something that we try to avoid.

"Unfortunately, however, if the person ignores our letters, and we can't find them at home, then the only recourse in some cases is to arrest them at work. This is something that could be avoided if the people would just take care of their warrants," said

Fenley. He added, that eventhough his department sends out these warrant letters, a person is subject to immediate arrest after the warrant has been issued, and no extensions are possible.

"Once a peace officer sees a person

for whom he knows an outstanding warrant exists, State Law demands that the officer place that person under arrest, and either collect the amount of the warrant, or incarcerate the body of the offender. The officer has no choice in the matter, and must take action," stated the chief. "Nor can the department accept partial payment, either on a warrant, or on a traffic charge. Only the courts can authorize acceptance of less than the full payment," he said.

Chief Fenley added that warrants do not just go away, and that once a warrant is issued, it remains outstanding until paid.

Shrubs lost in freeze can be tax deductable

Tax deductions can be made for landscaping plants lost during the recent record freeze, but homeowners first must be aware of new tax laws concerning such claims, according to Marlene Gaysek of the Internal Revenue Service, Dallas branch.

In a telephone interview with the IRS supervisor recently, Gaysek said homeowners interested in itemizing such a claim can write for Publication 547, which deals with tax information on disasters, casualties and thefts.

The information may prove very helpful to area homeowners expecting to file for the deduction, because new tax laws have added stipulations that will make a number of claims invalid.

"It's all a part of the Tax Equity and Responsibility Act passed by Congress," Gaysek said. "In addition to the changes in deductions for losses to landscaping, similar changes have been made in medical deduction claims."

Gaysek said the homeowner must first determine whether or not it is a casualty loss, and that can be

determined by whether or not the loss was sudden, unexpected, or unusual. "I think the losses during the freeze would fall under a casualty loss," Gaysek responded.

She added the casualty loss must have resulted from an identifiable occurrence. An example of a sudden loss would be the freeze, Gaysek said, while a drought is not considered sudden.

The changes in the tax laws stipulate that the damage must total at least 10-percent of the homeowners average gross income, plus a \$100 deductible. Under the old tax laws, any loss could be claimed, with a \$2,500 limit.

Under that formula, a homeowner with an average gross income of \$20,000 per year must have damages amounting to \$2,100 for that year before even considering the loss as a tax deduction.

Gaysek also said the appraisal of such a loss cannot be determined by the actual replacement value, but rather the fair market value before and after the casualty loss.

"The best way a homeowner can ensure receiving compensation for a loss is to keep records, including photos, of all landscaping," said

Gaysek. "They can even pay an appraiser to evaluate their home and landscape before and after the loss, which is also tax deductible."

Gaysek added that a \$100 deductible amount must be accounted for each separate disaster, and a damage claim can only be itemized if the loss is uninsured. If insured, you have to deduct what you received in

Landscaping lost during a freeze is not insurable, according to Iowa Park insurance agent Phil Welch. According to the homeowners policy guidelines set by the state board of insurance, losses of trees, shrubs, plants or grass are not covered for freeze, wind, or hail damage.

"Losses due to fire, lightning, explosion, aircraft, vehicular damage, vandalism, malicious mischief and theft are covered under the homeowners policy," Welch said

Welch, who had suffered extensive loss to shrubbery at his residence. added that the landscaping coverage is an extension of the general coverage which the insured party doesn't pay for.

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


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

It may be too personal from my own standpoint, but I've seen it in my many years of observing school activities, there is a tremendous percentage of young people who continue their education years just because of extracurricular activities.

I know for a fact that I would have left school long befire I did (which was one semester after my athletic eligibility had expired) had it not been for athletics. I have seen dozens of young men who stayed in school, making their grades and learning, just because of athletics. And those I've kept up with are now productive citizens and leaders in their communities.

If there are to be drastic changes in public education, I only hope those responsible for the changes schedule them over a lengthy period.

Over reaction can be worse than the cause.



23 Study Club program topic is international

The 23 Study Club's International Affairs program Thursday afternoon was highlighted with a talk on "Advancing the Cause of Womanhood Worldwide" by Mrs. Sam Hill, and another "Nuclear Warfare Toward a Sane Defense" by Mrs. Travis Smith.

Mrs. Hill's discussion emphasized how the General Federation of Women's Clubs International Affairs program is all-inclusive and seeks to promote the cause of womanings. everywhere so that women can become informed and involved in the important issues of the day. She introduced her talk with a request of Juanita Bryant, GFWC president, "Let us pledge ourselves to work for a common cause the cause of womanhard around the world," quoting Mrs. Ellen Dietz who spoke the same words to a group of women almost a hundred years ago.

She continued by showing how GFWC's International Development and Awareness program is helping to improve the lives of impoverished women through sufficient nourishing food, sale drinkable water, adequate fuel for cooking and heating, educational and employment opportunities in five countries.

In Bangledesh, the program is helping women to increase self-esteem and become leaders in their communities. In India, women are learning better nourishment for themselves and families. In Peru, the program is helping women dig trenches, lay pipe, build roads and health centers, and in Bolivia, they are being trained to build water systems for drinking, irrigation and community health. In the tiny South Africa country of Lesotho, they are being taught to utilize the fleece of Angora goats to spin Mohair yarn.

Mrs. Hill further emphasized the interest GFWC has in International Affairs by reading an article written by Mrs. Don L. Shide, president of that department in which she described the work of club women in Germany, Canada, the Philippines, Hong Kong, Taipei, Taiwan and Hawaii in their efforts to advance the cause of womanhood.

Mrs. Smith chose "The Great Fear of the World We Live In" for the title of her address. As an introduction, she asked club members to think of the background of world conditions and world peace today, observing that seldom in recent years has there been more tension between nations and conflicting creeds in the world. As evidence she referred to the wars in the Mid-East, rebellions and massacres in Central America and southeast Asia, tribal and various strife in Africa and the terrorists attacks in all countries. She stated that all of the events are dominated by the great crisis between the two major nuclear powers in Washington

"No one knows the exact number of nuclear warheads that exist in the world today, but according to a recent authoritative U.N. report, it is probably in excess of 40,000 with their explosive power ranging from about 100 tons up to more than 20 million tons equivalent to high explosives," Mrs. Smith said.

In answer to the question "What would it be like if a nuclear war happens?" she quoted two scientists who gave their views at a conference in Nov. 1983. One reported that a nuclear war could easily destroy the northern hemisphere and destroy the southern hemisphere so that the surviving humans would starve, and the other said that the extinction of the human race was possible.

Mrs. Smith stated that at present all conferences between the U.S. and Russia concerning the common danger of the arms race are at a standstill, and the plan of the N.A.T.O. and the U.S. to locate cruise missiles in western Europe has driven the two countries further

Farmers establishing permanent pastures

By DAVID FINLEY County Agent

Several beef producers across Wichita County are establishing permanent pastures. A couple of weeks ago I visited the Bradley Ranch at Kadane Corner where Kleingrass is being put in. This past week I visited with their next door neighbor, A.W. Robertson.

A.W. lives in Abilene but has over 200 acres on the Wichita River at Kamay. He has a problem with soil erosion on the river and is wanting to plant a pemanent grass that will help with his erosion problem. He has chosen to plant coastal bermuda.

Coastal is an excellent permanent pasture grass that does well here in the North Texas area. It has a very fiberous root system that will hold soil, thus it is really good type of grass to plant in an erosion area.

I asked A.W. if he had taken a soil test and he said that he had not. It is a good idea to take a soil test on the land you are planning on establishing bermudagrass on. It is simple to do, and we have all the information a grower would need here at the office at 1626 Midwestern Parkway.

The only way I know of planting coastal bermuda successfully is by sprigging. In most years, growers dig springs when they are dormant and then plant. They can be planted 2 ways, and it depends upon who you are talking to as to which one's the

The first and most widely used is sprigging by a machine. This does a good job. Plants are spaced out into a trench and covered. The one draw back with this type of planting is that a grower needs to hire someone with a machine if he does not own one.

The second and easier method is to broadcast sprigs by hand out of the back of the pickup. After doing this, disk them in with a tandem. This will cover them up and, believe it or not, an excellent stand will be obtained most of the time. When broadcasting or planting in rows, use 20 or more bushels of sprigs per acre.

Again, coastal bermuda is an excellent permanent pasture grass for Wichita County. For further information on this, contact the County Extension Office at 766-0131 and ask for MP-980, "Keys to Profitable Permanent Pasture Production."

For those commercial peach, pecan and vegetable growers, mark your calendars for Thursday night, Feb. 23, for a Drip Irrigation Seminar.

Leon New, irrigation specialist from Amarillo, will talk on drip irrigation systems for commercial growers. Producers will receive information on selection, design, and use of drip systems.

Be sure and mark your calendars for this event. It will begin at 7 p.m. at the 4-H Auditorium on 1626 Midwestern Parkway.

made under a new procedure enacted by the 1983 Social Security amendments.

The new procedure, called the "prospective payment system" sets fixed rates of payment for hospital care: that is, the amount payable for any single stay in the hospital is pre-determined and is based on the diagnosis of illness or injury in each case. Previously, costs were billed by the hospitals and then paid, subject to certain limitations, by Medicare carriers.

The new system is expected to have a long-reaching effect toward reducing the expense of in-patient care for Medicare beneficiaries. Hospitals will receive the prospective payments even if they are able to hold their actual expenditures below the level of payment. This gives them an incentive to keep costs down.

If there is any cost overrun, the excess cannot be billed to the patient. Patients will be billed, as before, only for any deductible and co-insurance that apply.

The prospective payment system is being phased in over a three year period that began October 1, 1983. It applies to all hospitals that participate in Medicare, with a few exceptions - such as psychiatric, long-term care facilities. Only payments for non-physician in-patient care are affected.





(For thinner chili, add more tomatoes and water). Serve with hard rolls or crackers. Note: For very hot chili, add dash of







The Hawks sank more field goals than their visitors, 22-19, and had a respectable night at the charity line, converting on 16 of 22 attempts.



Peeling paint to be removed by scrubbing or wire brushing. If any bare wood is exposed it should be primed with proper Tru-Test house paint primer. Any cracks or open joints between boards or around windows should be sealed with Tru-Test Caulk.

"Dry" means the surface should be dry when painting and no rain predicted for the next 12 to 24 hours.



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


