Police start program to curb rash of crimes

Following a rash of criminal mischief cases and two daytime burglaries last week, the Iowa Park Police Department has begun a special program to curb crime in the city.

Between 1 and 5:15 p.m. Wednesday of last week, someone broke into the Otha Ray Brookshire home at 504 E. Pasadena, and reportedly carted off \$1,350 worth of guns.

Listed as taken were a 12-ga. Westpoint shotgun, 12-ga. semi-automatic Remington shotgun, 30.06 Remington rifle, .22 cal. Winchester rifle and .410 Savage shotgun.

Sometime between Mar. 9 and 13, Loyd Thompson said someone burglarized his home at 811 Van Horn, taking a .38 cal. five-shot pistol valued at \$250, and \$150 in cash.

The criminal mischief cases all took

place Tuesday and Wednesday of last week. All consisted of glass breakage on vehicles.

Charlotte Yoder said both headlights of her car parked at 200 W. Highway were kicked out, costing \$24.

J.C. Wells said the left rear window of his car parked in the street in the 1100 block of Mary Drive was broken, the loss set at \$75.

Bob Aulds said the rear glass window of a camper on a pickup was broken while the vehicle was parked at 300 E. Bank. The loss was set at \$78.

Another camper window was reportedly broken when a pickup belonging to J.W. Manning was parked at 1305 Mary Drive. The loss was set also at \$78.

Chief Tom Fenley said the special

program was initiated over the weekend.

Called Special Tactics Against Crime (STAC), the program consists of three times as many officers patrolling the streets as normal.

"We hope that this increased police presence will stop the increase in crime that routinely seems to happen about this time of the year," he said.

He explained that the officers are each working one of their regular days off, to help provide the additional coverage.

"The officers will be looking for any and all kinds of criminal activity, but will be concentrating on the more serious violations," Fenley said. "We hope these efforts will result in less crime and more criminals in jail."

He added that the program will be carried on several weeks, but declined to specify how long.

New contracts approved for classroom teachers

Contracts for 90 Iowa Park classroom teachers and nine West Wichita Co-op personnel were extended for the 1984-85 school year during Tuesday's meeting of the school board.

Two resignations were accepted, including Kidwell principal James Ward, who will retire at the end of the year. The other was from Danna Redclift, tax office secretary, who has been replaced by Vida Roberts.

No replacement has yet been named to fill Ward's position. Ward's contract was renewed at last month's meeting.

In other business, the trustees approved the lowest of four bids for building insurance coverage, accepted adoption of new textbooks recommended by the 15-member local textbook committee, and voted on directors for the Region Nine Service Center board.

Texas School Service Foundation, representing Texas Employer's Casualty, submitted the low bid for building insurance, \$58,563 for the next three years.

One-year premium bids ranged from \$19,521 to \$32,334. Supt. Harold Cowley pointed out the three-year bids were simply one-year premiums multiplied by three, with no deduction for the longer period contract.

Next lowest bid was \$21,222, trustees were told. Coverage of the buildings is for a value of \$12,429,621, Cowley said.

None of the three candidates for the Region Nine board represents this area, but all boards vote on all

candidates, Cowley explained. The candidates were from Burkburnett, Vernon, Scotland, Graham and Windthorst. Fred Parkey was elected last year to represent this area.

Chamber told golf course needs member support

"If you know anyone thinking about joining the Quail Valley Country Club, you might tell them the decision will be made about May 1 whether or not it will be built."

That was developer Rip Smith's opening comment Monday at the monthly meeting of the Chamber of Commerce board of directors.

Smith told the group his committee to register memberships was getting a lot of "wait and see" from prospects, and warned that without the memberships, this particular effort to get a golf course for the committee was in jeopardy.

Without saying how many memberships had been sold, he would say "Right now we have a long way to go... they're not standing in line to sign up."

Smith explained the golf course

entry would be off Johnson Road, north of Shiloh, and extend westward to Lake Iowa Park for the first nine holes of the golf course. He also said he has taken an option on land between Shiloh and Quail Valley Estates for the other nine holes of the course.

Besides the initial nine-hole course and a driving range, a two-story club house which will include two racquetball courts, storage and large lounge would be built.

Explaining why 300 memberships were important, Smith said the first phase of the club would cost slightly more than \$700,000. If a lending institution would consider a loan of \$500,000 to fund construction, they will want to know how the loan will be paid off, and that is where the monthly membership fees come in, he said.

Those signing up for memberships before May will pay \$600, instead of \$650, for initiation dues. If the membership is close enough to undertake the project, those joining after May 1 will be asked to pay a \$1,000 membership initiation, Smith told the Chamber directors.

OTHER BUSINESS

President James Edwards said the date for the annual city-wide Clean-Up Week would be announced sometime in the near future, after the date is coordinated with the city council.

He emphasized that the date would be set to not conflict with the annual Little League Baseball parade and season opening games.

Mayor Charlie Lee said a

suggestion to light the town's name on one of the water towers had been made. However, finding the cost to be \$1,250 and the council unwilling to spend that kind of tax money on such a project, he suggested civic organizations such as the Chamber might be interested.

No action was taken after the comment, nor did the board act on a suggestion that the Chamber sponsor a Bike-A-Thon to benefit St. Jude Hospital.

Lee and Dr. Erwin Soell said the second annual Wheels of Fortune, sponsored by the Rotary Club, would be held May 19.

Council to hear request for electric rate hike

The city council Monday night will receive a request for an eight-percent rate increase from Texas Electric Service manager Wayne House.

House is to explain at the 7 p.m. meeting in council chambers that the increase is being sought from all customers of TESCO, Texas Power and Light and Dallas Power and Light, and that the request has already been submitted to the Texas Public Utilities Commission.

Also on the meeting agenda is a resolution for whatever action the council takes on the request.

Other items on the agenda include:

* action on a proposal to abandon

part of South Park, as requested by Jim Isbell;

* consider replat of property owners by Eddie Richardson in Garden Valley, and moving a utility easement;

* action on a resolution which would seek a grant from the Texas Criminal Justice Dept. to fund a criminal investigator for the police department.

City administrator James Barrington said he will make a report on proposed changes of operation at the sewer treatment plant, and also report on a meeting he and Police Chief Tom Fenley attended today in Austin concerning police liabilities.

First amendment topic of study club program

Mrs. Earnie Reusch presented a thought-provoking program on "Freedom of Speech and What It Means to Each of Us," for members of the Amity Study Club Tuesday evening. The meeting was held in the home of Mrs. Jerry Denton, with Mrs. Randy Brown serving as co-hostess.

Mrs. Reusch stressed that freedom of speech and freedom of the press are guaranteed by the First Amendment adopted in 1791 must concern everyone. "As a citizen of a free world, you must realize that freedom of speech has only been a reality in America since the 18th Century (the age of reason). It came about because the masses were no longer largely illiterate, because the ideals of democracy were beginning to form, the power of church and state had begun to erode and because scientific inquiry characteristic of the period by its very nature requires freedom of thought and expression," she said.

She continued, dealing with freedom of the press in time of national security, press coverage of criminal cases, and the relationship between the government and the

press. She said newspapers and related organizations have started a group called the First Amendment Congress in an effort to overcome some of the negative feelings dealing with the media.

"Its' creed reads, in part: If we journalists voluntarily do our jobs in such a way that people respect us and our conduct, we'll see fewer threats to the public's right to know. We must rely on the public to continue to insist on a free press, but we must earn that support every day. If we fail, everyone loses," she said.

She concluded with a quote from Thomas Jefferson who said "Were it left to me to decide whether we should have government without newspapers, or newspapers without a government, I should not hesitate a moment to prefer the latter."

Mrs. Leo Thames gave the meditation "The Virtues of the Tongue," from the book "Growing Strong in the Seasons of Life," by Charles Swindall.

In the business meeting, Mrs. Philip Welch, president, announced that the club had won 11 awards at the Santa Rosa District Convention held last weekend in Wichita Falls. Mrs. Reusch and Mrs. Denton reported on the details of the convention.

Committees were named and tickets distributed for the annual book review and luncheon to be held May 5 at First United Methodist Church. Mrs. Pat Crenshaw of Dallas will present a "Humorous Musical Review," and five high school senior students will be honored, with one of them receiving a \$400 scholarship.

"James Harvey Rumph of Camden asked a young couple sitting nearby, 'Where are you folks from?'"

"It turned out they weren't from Wichita Falls."

"We just say that because nobody knows where Iowa Park is."

"In other words, James Harvey Rumph said, they were really from Iowa Park?"

"The woman said, 'We own the building.'"

(Editor's note: We've tried to determine when the conversation was held, and even when the article was

published. Tom Corridon, local historian of sorts, says he vaguely remembers the Gardenhire Hardware as being in the area now occupied by State National Bank.)

"Madness! Madness!"

Remember those famous words uttered by the British doctor in the Movie "Bridge Over the River Kwai" when he surveyed the final scene of British commandoes battling Alec Guinness, the British colonel who had built the Japanese bridge with British prisoners of war.

Those words "Madness! Madness!" seemed particularly appropriate for the news this week of the signing of Brigham Young quarterback Steve Young to a pro football contract with the USFL team, L.A. Express, for \$40-million.

The young quarterback is talented and will be a great asset for the fledgling team but no talent on this earth can be justified economically for \$40 million.

The pro contract, plus the news of Standard Oil of California to take over Gulf for \$13.1 billion, and the recent announcement of Texaco taking over Getty Oil, provide perfect examples of where graduated income taxes have taken us.

It's not talent nor takeovers that justify that kind of money--it's taxes.

The Young contract, the Social and Texaco takeovers are tax deals, pure and simple, and the loss to the federal treasury will be made up by you and me.

Young's talent on the gridiron, sports fans attendance in Los Angeles, the Express schedule or the possibility of winning the league - none of these are real factors in the \$40 million contract.

Sports contracts are depreciable

assets just like automobiles, factory machines, or a pumping unit. The young man is paid \$4 million up front and the owners can purchase an annuity for \$8.7 million, 11 percent, that will yield one million dollars a year for 32 years.

So the owners of the new franchise lay out \$12.7 million but can depreciate the entire \$40 million contract over the playing period of the quarterback or roughly, \$4 million a year in deductible expenses over a 10-year period. In other words, the owners are picking up \$40 million in depreciation for an outlay of \$12.7 million -- and the federal treasury is the loser. . . and you and I make up the difference.

The same thing is true of the oil company mergers. Nothing is gained economically -- no new jobs created, no new oil wells, no new discoveries -- but a deal economically justifiable because of the taxes involved.

The \$13.1 billion paid for Gulf Oil can be divided into the crude oil reserves of the company to come up with a "cost allocation figure" per barrel. And that cost per barrel is a fully deductible expense on federal income taxes.

In essence, taxpayers will ultimately pay for the Steve Young contract and the Gulf-Social, Texaco-Getty takeovers.

The three deals provide perfect examples of why the federal income tax laws are outmoded, out-manuevered, and out of hand.

We've argued in this space before that a flat rate tax of 12 to 14 percent on everyone -- individuals, corporations, foundations, co-ops -- without any loopholes or deductions, would yield more money to the federal treasury than the present cockeyed system.

Genealogy research fun, educational - Watson

Mrs. Earl Watson gave a program on genealogy for the Philia Study Club Monday evening. She was introduced by Mrs. Thomas Johnson.

Mrs. Watson said she started her own genealogy research knowing only five last names of her ancestors and showed club members of her current list that dates back to Civil War times. She said some ancestors might be hard to trace, especially if they were not raised by their own parents, and another problem commonly encountered is a change over the years in the spelling of names.

Mrs. Watson explained the change in spelling was sometimes due to the fact that the spelling did not fit the pronunciation of the name. Other names were changed by officials at Ellis Island when the immigrants reached America when names could have been translated from the mother tongue into the English counterpart, spelling changed to fit the pronunciation of the name, or immigrants were given their last names according to their occupations or skills.

Mrs. Watson stated that the 1790 census was the first taken in the United States, and only names of the heads of family were taken on the censuses until 1850. Even then, the women and children were listed by name, not numbers of each sex living with the heads of family.

The speaker remarked that a hereditary legacy is something to be shared only with siblings. Each name is unique and interesting to find out about, and it is very important for the sake of medical records. She suggested that club members write down things about their ancestors for preservation because it was like "writing your own history." She said that a good method would be to keep a complete journal of the family's daily activities.

Mrs. Watson said that Mormons are very good at keeping daily journals and preserving for the future. She mentioned that their work had been very helpful to others who are interested in genealogy and that they have microfilmed many county records all over the world. The microfilm is preserved in Salt Lake City in a mountain, but there are copies of the original microfilms available in the library in Salt Lake City. She stated that when they film Texas county records it is a requirement that they leave one copy in the state, and that these could be borrowed on inter-library loan without going to the county.

"Genealogy enables you to find a new family-people you didn't know existed. It is fun to share your

information with other interested family members, and you might make a lot of new friends in genealogy," Mrs. Watson continued.

She said that tracing the family tree is fun and increases the power of concentration; also that it is a tremendous learning experience. She stressed that history would have more meaning through tracing ancestors and the roles that they played. She said that a great challenge lay in tracing ancestors

back to their arrival in America, through pension papers from military service.

In closing, Mrs. Watson told how people interested in genealogy could gain help from a local group of about 70 members whose purpose it is to have programs that are of interest and help. She suggested books at both Kemp and Midwestern State Univ., excellent genealogy libraries at Lawton, Fort Worth, Dallas and Houston, where the Clayton Library

boasts over 30,000 volumes devoted to genealogy.

She showed members a book entitled "Handy Book for Genealogy" and a magazine "Genealogy Helper." Some of the most interesting things that she has found during her search were displayed. These included: picture of relatives circa 1800s; Republic of Texas Land Grant Papers 1836-45; brand book registered in 1860; marriage license 1857; census 1900; a will written between 1806-08.

The meeting was held in the home of Mrs. David Padgett with 16 members attending.

Mrs. Vern Horsky presided during the business. Mrs. Herman Escue presented the meditation. The club voted to continue monetary support for the district scholarship, and Mrs. Harold Cowley, Santa Rosa District chairman, announced that this year's recipient of the scholarship was a Philia Study Club member, Mrs. James Rinehart.

Mrs. Johnson reported on the awards that the club won at the Santa Rosa District Convention which included: first on president's report, creative arts, home life consumer concerns; second on Americanism program, Federation Day program and yearbook cover.

The new federation cookbook "The Pride of Texas" was reviewed by the club members. The next meeting will be held April 16 at "Under Construction" in Wichita Falls.

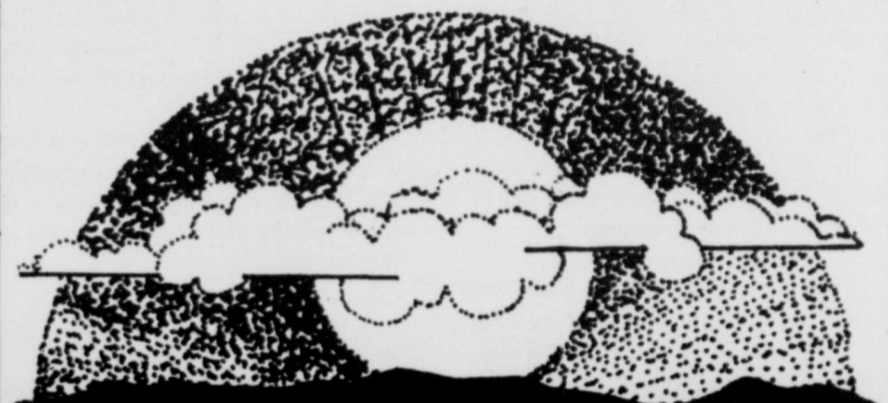
Miller, a Grace employee 36 years, retires the final day of March. Sturgis, a 23-year veteran, is presently vice president of marketing.

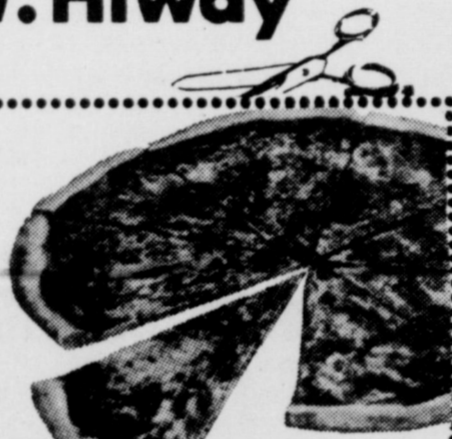

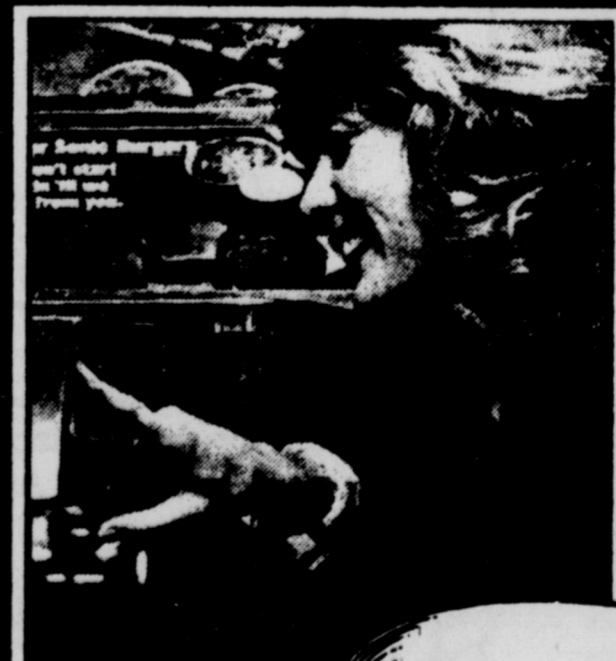
