# Library receives \$200,000 grant

Foundation's gift assures renovation project

Iowa Park will have the fine library residents have long sought.

The Tom L. Burnett Memorial Library was virtually assured recently by a \$200,000 grant from the Ann Burnett and Charles Tandy Foundation, headquartered in Fort

Money available to convert the Burnett home into a library is now in excess of \$400,000, according to Mike Dodd, president of the Friends of the Library, a non-profit group organized to undertake the project.

Iowa Park received \$100,000 earlier from the state to match money raised locally through donations and pledges.

An architect, Don Daugherity, has already been commissioned to draft the plans for the renovation project.

Monday, the library group approved contracting with a master librarian to serve as a consultant with

was stipulated when the state grant was accepted.

Linda Allmand, director of Fort Worth Public Library, was named consultant to the project. She and another librarian from Oklahoma City applied for the position.

Allmand's fee is two percent of the renovation cost, according to Linda Escue, secretary of the Friends of the Library. Her services will include

working with the architect, assisting in the bidding process for equipment, and moving from the present library into the new facility, as well as other helpful acts of assistance.

She has served as consultant on 10 similar projects. Through her years as a librarian, she has also taught the subject at North Texas State Univ.

Though consulting assistance was offered by the two librarians at Midwestern State Univ., at no cost,

the majority of the library board voted to hire Allmand because of her experience and availability.

A contract is still to be drafted and agreed upon by both the consultant and local board, it was noted.

The next meeting of the board will be at 7 p.m. April 5, in the council chambers.

The Burnett home, which occupies the entire block of West Alameda, was donated in December of 1981 to the city for use as a library by Anne Sowell, granddaughter of the late Tom L. Burnett.

Built by Tom Burnett about 1922, it was his home until his death in 1938. In 1941 it was purchased by his cousin, Will, and remained the home of his widow, Maggie, who died in October of 1981.

The donor purchased the property

## Tuesday deadline for absentee voting

Interest in the April 7 city and school elections is beginning to build, according to absentee votes being

Absentee voting will continue in both elections until the close of business Tuesday. Absentee voting polls are the city hall and school administration building, for the respective elections.

Six votes had been received at city hall early yesterday morning, and three more had been requested by mail but had not been received. Five votes had been received at the administration building, but none

were in the mails. At issue in the two elections are the offices of city mayor and two aldermen, and two school trustees.

Two candidates for mayor are on the ballot, but a write-in campaign has begun for a third man.

Seeking to succeed Charlie Lee. who declined to run for a second term as mayor, are Tim Hunter and Freddie Simmons. A group is pushing to have former county commissioner Buck Voyles elected as a write-in candidate.

Four candidates are running for the two alderman seats, which will be decided on an at-large basis, with the two receiving the most votes

Two candidates, Bud Thompson and George Hammonds, are incumbents. They are being challenged by Bud Mercer and Don Decker.

Candidates for the two school trustee positions, which also will be decided at-large, are incumbents Jerald Brown and Rex Wells, and Virginia Klinkerman and Marilyn

Also on the city ballot is a referendum asking voters if they desire "a commission. . . to frame a charter."

Voters will mark "Yes" or "No" to that question. Below is a list of 15 charter commission candidates who were nominated by the city council.

Charter candidates are Dolores Hamilton, Susan Streich, Faye McAllister, Jerry Williams, James Edwards, Don Decker, Terry Davis, Margaret Soell, John Brown, Donald Hill, L.W. Teel, Virgil Woodfin, Annetta Reusch, Johnny Crawford and Buck Voyles.

Should the majority vote approval of having a new charter drafted, the commission would then begin to function. Its final draft would at a later date be submitted to the voters for approval or disapproval in another

# City council denies **TESCO** rate request

The city council Monday evening rejected a rate increase request by Texas Electric Service Co.

Wayne House, local TESCo manager, explained his company is requesting an across-the-board eightpercent rate increase.

An indication of the company's need was reflected in the recent downgrading of the firm's credit rating from triple-A, which means the cost of borrowing money will be greater and thus the cost of doing business will be higher, House said.

A resolution to deny the request was passed by the council, in order for the city to be represented along with others by the Texas Municipal League when TESCo appeals to the Public Utilities Commission.

Aldermen approved an application to the Texas Criminal Justice Division for a grant to assist in funding a criminal investigator for the police department.

If approved, the grant would fund 100 percent of the additional officer's salary the first year, 80 percent the second year, and continue a 20-percent decrease over a five-year period after which the complete salary would be paid by the city.

One stipulation was put on the council's vote of approval, however. Alderman Bud Thompson injected he was voting for the proposal if the city is not locked into a full-period contract. He explained the city might not be able to complete the full period, or any period after the five years, and did not want to obligate future budgets.

An ordinance was approved, abandoning 25 feet on the west side of South Park, between Emerald and

## Iowa Park man killed when struck by auto

A young Iowa Park man was struck and killed by an automobile shortly before 10 p.m. Monday near Pleasant Valley Estates.

Tony Alexander, 26, stepped into the path of a car driven by Gordon Bohannon, also of Iowa Park. He was declared dead at the scene at 10:41 by Robert Marsh of the Wichita Falls Police Dept.

According to the investigating officer, Ronnie Miller of the Department of Public Safety, Tony and his brother Ricky, 28, were driving west on the old highway when an argument began between them.

Just east of the east entrance to Pleasant Valley Estates, their car ran almost head-on into the ditch and stopped. The two men got out of the car and began fighting.

The fight was reported by a woman driving west, who reported to Iowa Park Police that she had narrowly missed them while they were scuffling in the roadway.

Ricky later told officers that Tony had broken away and stood for a while on the grassed median. And when he started back to his original side of the road, he stepped into the path of Bohannon's car.

Tony was struck by the left front fender, and knocked over the hood into the windshield on the driver's side, caving it in.

Bohannon stopped his car approximately 170 feet beyond the point of impact, and went to the man's

Miller said.

The Plumlee Ambulance arrived at 10:19, but did not transport Tony's body until Marsh arrived and pronounced his official finding.

As the ambulance drove away, Marsh told Ricky he would take him to the same hospital where they were taking Tony's body. However, Ricky began cursing, and he was taken to Wichita Falls Police Department for

An autopsy was ordered to be performed on Tony's body.

Tony was a 1977 graduate of Iowa Park High School. For details of his funeral and survivors, his complete obituary is on page six of this issue.

Miller said no charges would be filed on Bohannon.

# Cook of the Week

Chess Pie - According to Great Recipes of the World, no other dish is as quintessentially Southern as chess pie. It is incredibly rich, with a lingering, almost mysterious sweet-

How the pie got its rather curious name reveals its checkered history. Though it is now a staunchly Southern dish, it originated in England, making its way first to New England and then on to Virginia before finding its home in the Deep

The early version was called cheese cake though it never contained any real cheese. When the dessert finally settled in America before the days of refrigeration, the pies were stored in cold rooms in lovely pie cupboards to keep them fresh; they soon became known as "chest" pies in New England homes. As the pie moved, local dialect changed chest to chess. Eventually, it became known everywhere by its current name.

The recipes for the dessert today have changed considerably from the ones used by housewives in earlier days. Nancy (Mrs.) Larry Thompson found a recipe for chess pie in her grandmother's cookbook that was published in the 1920s, and we asked her to share it with the Leader readers this week. It sounds like a Blue Ribbon winner in the 1980s.

The former Nancy Cashion was graduated from Irving High School. She attended West Texas State Univ. at Canyon for three years and received a bachelor of music degree from Midwestern State Univ. She is now in her fourth year the music teacher in the Iowa Park elementary schools. She and Larry, who is a designer for Ciba-Geigy, are active members of First Baptist Church. They have one son, Andrew Michael, one year old. Nancy is a member of the Modern Music Study Club. Her hobbies are reading and ceramics.



local elections. There are only hundreds, instead of millions, of ballots cast and so the odds are better for that one vote.

Some might not remember it, but we had a dead-even vote count for a city election here a few years ago. You should have heard all the people who said "I should have voted, and it wouldn't have tied."

They weren't thinking about the cost to their tax dollars, because a special runoff election was held to finally determine a winner.

It seems like there's got to be a big problem for people to turn out in large numbers for local elections. Whenever there are people upset with the way things are going, by golly they will mark those ballots.

But let things run smoothly, and

they don't turn out.

Elected officials like to know they have the public's attention and support. They have a real excuse to get careless or sloppy with business, if they feel like the public isn't too concerned with what and how they are doing.

Coffee talk these days is primarily about who will be the next president.

I'd suggest we start turning our attention to the local offices, for the next few days. Talk about the issues and what we think about our city and

program currently in use by the city of Denison were initiated.

The process consists of pumping the sludge onto open pasture, rather than in drying beds, allowing for faster handling and drying. The process is considered safe by the state and odor is hardly more than exclusive use of drying beds, he said.

The prime emphasis of the Austin seminar was to "make sure your people are well trained and to be well insured," Barrington said.

During an open discussion, held after the formal end of the meeting, problems of people dumping trash, trimmings and furniture at undesignated places and slowness of cleaning the burnt remains of Jim's Market were topics.

They are planting about 50 pounds of seed per acre which produces a small stalk with a lot of leaves.

Pasture clearing and seeding is in progress by Dan Spruiell on his farm east of Iowa Park. He is seeding Kleingrass 15, side oats grama, and KR Bluestem. His seeding rate is slightly more than one pound of pure live seed

Warm season vegetables which can be planted now include beans, cucumbers, squash, cantaloupe, watermelon, tomato, peppers, egg plant, sweet corn, and all of the cabbage type plants.
