business during that period is heaviest of any other time space during the day. And there are always several people who have business to attend to in the counter area, such as buying money orders, picking up or
mailing packages, buying stamps and
other time-consuming projects. ot her time-consuming projects.
Obviously, these people will use parking spaces available longer than those who just go inside to get mail out of their boxes.
Where the problem comes is from those who either park carelessly and
take up space for two vehicles, or ake up space for two vehicles, or
decide the time is right to do in-depth discussions with others, or don't feel like they can wait until they get home to read their mail.
It's not unusual, in fact it's more the rule than the exception, to see evidence of any or all of the three
problems taking place while people problems taking place while people
are parking along the curb and across the street. And often there'll even be a line of cars waiting in the street for a parking space to become available. Obviously, there's no plan by any of these people to disrupt the flow of
traffic or cause any hardships on traffic or cause any hardships on
anyone else. I think, rather, it's just that they aren't thinking about what they are doing.

Pecan trees need spraying

By DAVID FINLEY County Agent A critical time in the life of a pecan tree is upon us. That time is bud
break, and it not only signals the beginning of spring but also the time to begin spraying pecan trees. Home owners must remember that pecan trees require only two
nutritional elements to grow and nutritional elements the grow and
produce pecans. These two are produce pecans. These two are
nitrogen and zinc. Nitrogen can be applied to the ground under the drip line of the tree, but zinc must be applied to the foliage.
Many home owners are applying zinc to their trees now. One of these is Jackie de la Houssaye of Wichita
Falls. She told me that she's interested in getting her trees to grow and get some size to them. I told her the best place to start was with zinc applications to the foliage, starting now at bud break.
Bud break on pecans really has two
stages. Stage one is when the outer
stages. Stage one is when the outer
dried capsule covering the bud comes off due to the swelling of the bud itself. Do not spray trees at this stage because there are no leaves present to take up the zinc.
Stage two is what home owners
need to be concerned with. This stage of bud break can be identified easily as there will be a small mass of leaves and some terminal or end growth occurring. This growth will shoot out
quickly and will reach an inch or so in quickly and will reach an inch or so in
a couple of days. When home owners a couple of days. When home
see this, they should spray.

Zine does several things for the
pecan tree. Number one is that it pecan tree. Number one is that it promotes terminal growth by causing
elongation of the internodes. What this means is that if zinc is applied on schedule, terminal growth of the trees will be from 12 to 14 inches, depending on moisture levels. Zine will also prevent rosetle
Rosetting is caused by zine deficiency Rosetting is caused bey an the terminal
and can be identified on growth of trees. Leaves will be smaller than normal, yellow in appearance, and most of the time will be crinkled and shriveled.
There are two types of zinc I would recommend for pecan trees. These
are NZN and zinc sulfate. Either one are NZN and zinc suifate. Esther one owners should mix two teaspoons per gallon of water, depending on the strength of the zinc. Be careful and do not spray trees in high temperatures,
high winds, or high humidity as zinc can severely burn the foliage. One can severely burn
other point to remember is that zinc can also burn flesh, so be careful with
${ }^{14}$ Remember that zinc is really needed by the pecan tree. Do not be
lax with spraying trees. It will pay off lax with spraying trees. It will pay off
in the end with a large, healthy tree and a good crop of pecans.
