

# Democrats, Republicans set primaries Saturday

The names of Democratic presidential contenders will not appear on Saturday's Texas Democratic primary ballot, but Ronald Reagan an "uncommitted" blocks will be included on the Republican ballots for a choice.

Democrats will have to attend the precinct conventions Saturday evening in order to make their choices known for the party's presidential

nominee.

The polls will open at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. for both the Democratic and Republican primaries. Precinct conventions for both parties will be held at the respective voting polls, at 7:15 p.m.

However, in order to attend either party's convention, one must vote either in person or by absentee. When voting, the voter registration card will be stamped Democratic or

Republican, depending on which poll the vote is cast, and that stamped card is the voter's "ticket" into the precinct convention.

At the Democratic Party precinct conventions, supporters of candidates will band together and elect delegates to the county convention, where caucuses will be held by the band of supporters.

Democratic Party primary polls in this area include: Precinct 32, county

agriculture building; Precinct 33, Fellowship Hall of Faith Baptist Church; Precinct 34, West Wichita Co-Op building at Valley View school; and Precinct 60, Valley Farms Community House.

Republican Party primary polls include: Precincts 10 and 42, City View school; Precinct 44, Smitty's RV Center; Precincts 32 and 33, First Christian Church in Iowa Park; Precinct 34, West Wichita County Co-Op; and Precinct 60, Valley Farms Community House.

Democratic Party voters in Precinct 32 are to elect 27 delegates to the county convention; Precinct 33 will combine with Precinct 53 to elect 11 delegates; Precincts 34, 36 and 39 will elect four delegates, and Precinct 60 will combine with 44 and 61 to elect five delegates.

Both parties will hold their county

conventions May 19. The Republicans will meet at 10 a.m. in Barwise Junior High in Wichita Falls. Democrats will be at 2 p.m. at Wichita Falls High School.

Democrats have a potential of 584 delegates to the county convention, and the county is eligible to send 51 delegates to the state convention.

## VOTING FRUSTRATION

Regardless of which primary voters cast their ballots, there'll surely be a certain amount of frustration.

If voting in the Democratic Party primary, they'll not get to vote their preference of who should be the party's choice for president.

Those voting in the Republican Primary won't be able to vote on some of the local races where no Republicans are involved, namely the

District Attorney, State Representative, County Sheriff and Commissioner Precinct 3.

Hottest of the four races appears to be for District Attorney, where appointee Harold Lerew is being challenged by former assistant Barry Macha, whom Lerew fired.

Four candidates are seeking nomination for sheriff: Bill Burrow is trying to hold onto the post he was appointed to by fighting off challengers Howard Davis, Jim Johnson and George Johnson.

Incumbent commissioner Gordon Griffith is in a heated battle with challenger Bud Reed.

And two Holiday residents are fighting a no-holds-barred campaign to represent the 80th District. Incumbent Charles Fimmel is being challenged by cross-town rival Durhl Caussey.

## Hammonds appointed to fill alderman post

Veteran city alderman George Hammonds was appointed to serve another year on the city council during Monday's meeting.

Hammonds, who has served two terms on the council but finished fourth in voting last month in his bid for a third term, will fill the unexpired term of Tim Hunter. Hunter vacated his alderman post when he was elected mayor.

Neither Hammonds nor Bud Thompson were re-elected in the election.

Approval of Hammonds' appointment was unanimously approved by the council, and Hunter administered the oath of office.

Hunter's appointment of three members to the board of adjustments was similarly approved. Johnny Crawford, Rip Smith and Donald Hill were named to one-year terms. Two appointments for two-year terms remain to be made.

Eleven members of the home rule charter commission were present to receive the oath of office. The group is to meet at 7:30 p.m. next Thursday to organize and determine frequency of meetings at which a charter is to be drafted for submission to voters.

Two resolutions were approved. One, proposed by the Texas Municipal League, is entitled "Pothe Bill" and encourages the legislature to double state tax on gasoline with a portion issued over a two-year period for street repairs. Based on paved streets maintained, Iowa Park's portion would be

\$109,000 under the proposal.

The other resolution follows a recommendation of the Friends of the Library to hire Linda Allmand of Fort Worth to serve as a consultant for the renovation of Burnett Library.

Aldermen approved lighting of the community name on the water tower at Gordon Lake, if the cost does not exceed \$1,250. Donations by clubs will be solicited for the project, which is designed to give a good impression to nighttime travelers on US 287. Alderman Bud Mercer abstained on the vote.

At the request of the Planning and Zoning Commission, a survey of Park Street, particularly the south side of town, was approved if the cost does not exceed \$2,500.

Confusion as to where existing property lines are in relation to the paved street has caused problems in the past, and the council is considering abandoning right of way to achieve a common property line.

No action was taken to request return of excess money held by the Wichita Appraisal District, thereby agreeing to allow the district use the money for relocation in the courthouse annex building sometime in the future.

The district has \$107,000 excess funds from last year, of which \$16,066 is from Iowa Park. The excess funds would cut future costs for housing the district offices, aldermen were told.

Aldermen instructed Administrator James Barrington to have the city attorney study the city ordinance

covering door-to-door soliciting, and determine if revisions are needed.

What brought the issue up is a group of Jehovah Witness members from Wichita Falls who approach residences, hand out printed material and then ask for donations to offset expenses.

"Technically, they are within the letter of the law," commented Barrington, but he said the ordinance might be worded to prohibit such solicitations.

Barrington was given permission to advertise for bids to open and pave the 700 block of West Louisa. Cost of

## Graduation credits on agenda

Iowa Park school trustees are expected to set the number of credits required for graduation, when they meet at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday in the administration building.

Changes in required credits are a part of sweeping changes in public schools now being required by the Texas Education Agency.

Starting next fall, high school students will attend seven classes instead of six. However, Iowa Park already requires more credits than the minimum set by state, so the actual number of credits for graduation may not be much greater under the new program than in the

past. A policy will also likely be adopted Monday on the three levels of accomplishment during high school careers, which will be indicated by various seals on the graduate's diploma.

Two subjects are to be discussed concerning personnel. One will be teacher salaries. The other will be contracts for all school maintenance, transportation and cafeteria personnel for next year.

Two reports will be made by Supt. Harold Cowley. One will be results of the "California Text" scores, and the other will be the accreditation report of the Southern Association.

Trustees will consider bids received for the purchase of additional computers to be used in the

classroom, and also bids received last month for the purchase of band instruments.

## Both drivers arrested in two-vehicle wreck

A two-vehicle accident late Wednesday night of last week on the old Wichita Falls Road resulted in crashes against both drivers.

Both vehicles were west-bound when one struck the other just east of the Rifle Range Road intersection. Neither was seriously injured, but damage to one vehicle was said extensive.

Bart Beavers, 19, whose residence is listed as Quail Valley Drive, was charged by the Department of Public Safety with failure to stop and render aid, and possession of marijuana.

Margorie K. Maddox, 28, of Wichita Falls, was charged with driving while intoxicated.

Beavers reportedly overtook Maddox, who was weaving over both lanes of traffic. His automobile smashed the left rear of her pickup. The Beavers vehicle stopped

immobilized in the outside lane of traffic and the Maddox pickup crossed the median and stopped crossways in the outside lane eastbound.

One witness at the scene said Beavers left his vehicle when "several other cars and pickups" had stopped and then continued toward Iowa Park.

Fire Department personnel, law officers and volunteers conducted a search of the area to make sure Beavers was not injured and lying nearby. Maddox remained in her pickup and was treated by Iowa Park Emergency Medical Technicians for what appeared to be a slightly injured left arm.

Beavers turned himself in to the Iowa Park Police Department shortly before midnight. He was taken before Justice of the Peace Virgil Hill where

he entered a plea of guilty of failure to stop and render aid. He was assessed a \$106 fine and, by state law, his license was suspended.

During a search of Beavers' car, officers reportedly found marijuana in the vehicle's ash tray, and other drug paraphernalia. He was taken to Wichita County jail on a charge of possession and held in lieu of \$1,500 bond.

Maddox was taken to the Wichita Falls Police Department where she submitted to a breath test. Results of the test, reportedly taken two hours after the accident, registered 18, well above the minimum limit of 10, according to the arresting officer.

She also was placed in county jail after her rights were read by Justice of the Peace R.L. Stewart, and bond set at \$500.

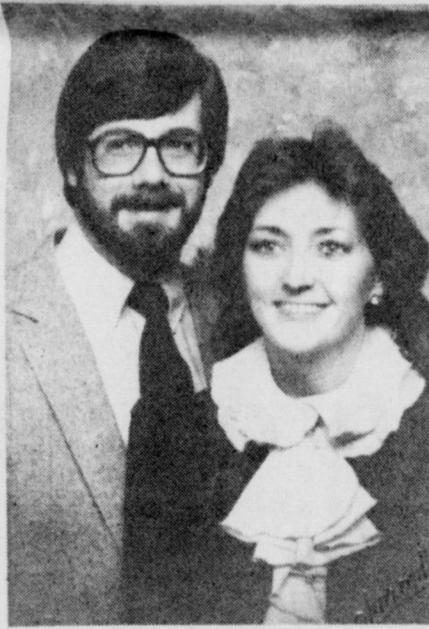

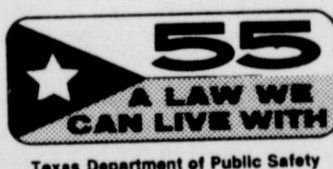
During her junior year, she was a member of the National Honor Society and varsity basketball team, the district winners. She belonged to FHA and played basketball in both her sophomore and freshman years.

the project would be shared equally by the school district and developer Bill Swann.

Aldermen approved advertising for bids to sell surplus equipment and materials, and also bids to lease a tract of land on East Jefferson.

If the city is determined eligible for grant funds to do major street work, the council set first priority as being Wall Street from East Highway to Valley Drive, and the second priority to widen West Highway, providing a turning lane from Yosemite to Johnson Road.

As a matter of discussion, Barrington said a study is being made into the feasibility of the city collecting its own taxes, and possibly doing the same work for the school district. The school has been collecting city taxes, under contract, about 10 years.

Part of the study, Barrington said, is the expense of upgrading the computer system to handle tax reports, as well as space required for the additional public visitations in city hall.

He emphasized, however, that the project was only a study at this time.

**As I See It....**

That was a wonderful rain we got Tuesday afternoon and evening, but we could have done without Sunday's dust storm and high winds.

The rainfall measurements varied considerably, as usual. Kamay got .25 of an inch, the Experiment Station 69, most measurements in Iowa Park were 1.5, but out north on FM 368, Richard Hill's gauge indicated 1.7. No one needs tell anyone else how much we were needing moisture. Primarily the farmers needed it for their wheat crop and pastures, as well as pre-plant moisture for cotton which will be put in the ground in a couple of weeks.

But the sprinklers were beginning to crank up in yards over town. It was so dry, you had to be sure you didn't put the sprinkler over one of those big cracks in the soil, or you could have lost it.

And needless to say, the lakes supplying Iowa Park were getting low. Tuesday's rain didn't do much to fill them, but it beat the dickens out of anything we've had this calendar year.

The winds did some damage over town, but not nearly what I had expected to see. No roofs were blown off, but lots of roofs were damaged by shingles leaving and probably winding up somewhere near Burkburnett or Nocona.

Dust got so heavy, I measured visibility less than a mile at one point late Sunday morning.

But the sky kinda cleared later in the afternoon, eventhough the winds seemed every bit as strong as they had been earlier. I figured that was because most of the loose soil out on the South Plains had already blown away, and strong as the winds were, they just couldn't blow the rocks this far.

The dust storms have been worse and more frequent out in the South Plains. My friend James Roberts, publisher of the Andrews County News, said one earlier in the week was as bad as any he had experienced in his lifetime there.

Of course, I don't know how bad it was there, but I've never seen any worse, or as bad as, the storms of the Dust Bowl Days of the late 1930s.

Once in Amarillo, I was riding from downtown to home with my uncle when one struck. Eventhough it was daylight, visibility was limited to lower than the hood ornament on his

car. We were three blocks from the house when it hit, and had he not known the neighborhood so well, we'd have sat out the storm right there in the street.

However, he drove with his right wheels rubbing against the curb, counted the driveways and intersections, and knew when we had arrived home.

Of course, you couldn't do that today. Then, no one had more than one car, if any at all, and everyone parked in the driveway instead of on the street.

Later, going to school at Hereford, it was not uncommon for a storm to strike and all teaching come to a halt. Those who were fortunate enough to carry handkerchiefs would tie them over their noses, mask-style, so they could breathe fairly freely.

All we could do was sit there and draw pictures in the dust with fingers on our desks, until the storm let up enough to go home.

Ironically, in Sunday's issue of the Dallas Morning News was an article about concern over land erosion in the Panhandle and South Plains, caused by winds and poor land management.

The Dust Bowl Days were caused by a combination of drouth and virgin grassland being broken to raise wheat. No rain, no crop, no crop, no ground cover, no cover, blowing dust, erosion.

Many farmers have stopped irrigating in the West Texas area, and many have reduced the acreage they farm. But the land that was broken to farm with irrigation has never been seeded to cover.

If this is a dry year, you can look for more heavy dust days.

But just be glad you're not living in that part of the country. What dust we got here Sunday was nothing. Compared to what they had around Brownfield and Lamesa, our storm would look like a sprinkle compared with an ocean.

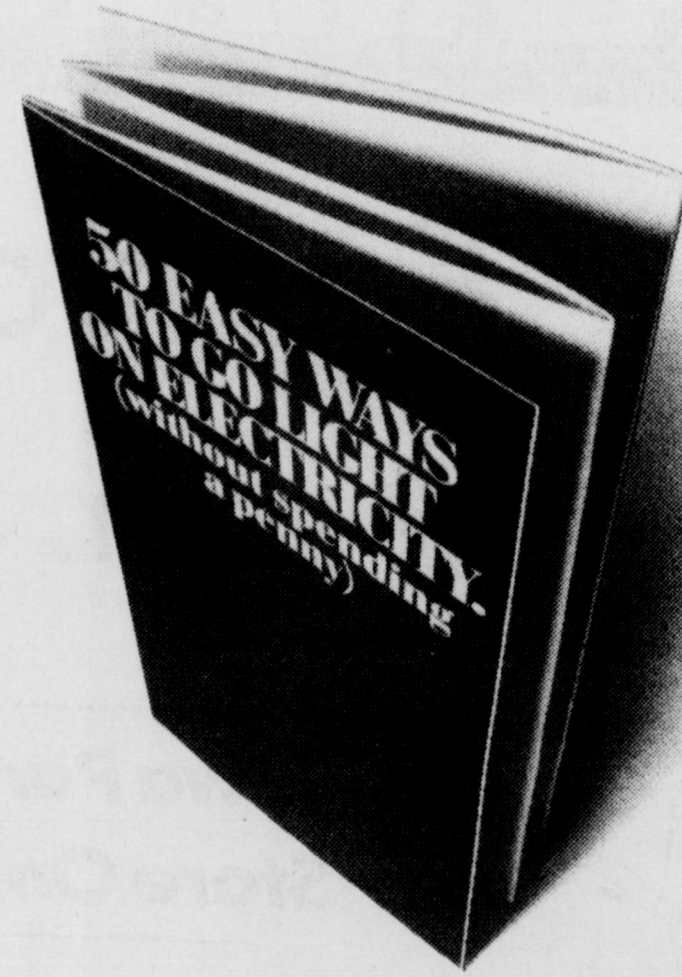

# Cook of the Week

How long have you been cooking? That question is often asked people who are expert cooks, and many of them answer with "As long as I can remember, or when I was a small child I stood on a stool and helped my mother prepare the food and cook it." Others say that their first experience with cooking was when they married or even later.

Some recent articles in Grit, have some stories about cooks who are interesting and fascinating people. Judge for yourself.

Allene Chase, 82, has been the school cook at Mountain View, Wyo. 36 years. She began her career cooking for 120 people on a coal-burning stove in the school basement. She now cooks 600 meals a day in a new school kitchen. She started cooking at the early age of five or six and remembers standing on a box to fry potatoes when her mother was sick. By the time she was 12 or 14 she prepared the dessert for a bunch of haymen while her mother cooked the meat and potatoes.

Peggy Armstrong Hess, 76, of Leucadia, Calif., remembers and has one of the Fannie Farmer Rumford (baking powder) Cookbooks released right before World War I because when she was a little girl of seven, a photographer in Denver, Colo. caught her sweet smile and she was chosen to be the cover girl for the cookbook. She still enjoys cooking and uses favorite recipes from that cherished cookbook.

Another interesting cook featured in Kitchen of Grit is Capt. Nancy Burton, the first woman to head the mess hall at the United States Military Academy, where she is in charge of feeding 4,500 cadets three hot meals a day. She confesses that she never cooked a meal until she joined the Army 11 years ago, then she started reading cookbooks and cooking for herself when she was off duty. Now when she leaves the mess hall she doesn't even want to look at a kitchen. Perhaps she will after she

has served her 20 years, retires from the service and joins her husband Ron in Hawaii, who operates an airline firm.

### QUICK CARAMEL COFFEE RING

1/2 cup Parkay margarine  
1/2 cup chopped nuts  
1 cup firmly packed brown sugar  
2 tbsp. water  
2 (10 oz.) cans Hungry Jack Refrigerated Flaky Biscuits

Heat oven to 375 degrees. In small saucepan, melt margarine. Coat bottom and sides of ungreased 12-cup fluted tube pan with 2 tablespoons of the melted margarine. Sprinkle 3 tablespoons of the nuts over the bottom of prepared pan. Add remaining nuts, brown sugar and water to remaining margarine; heat to boiling, stirring occasionally. Remove from heat. Separate dough into 20 biscuits; cut each biscuit in half and shape into a ball. Place 20 balls in bottom of prepared pan. Drizzle half of the caramel sauce over balls. Repeat layers.

Bake at 375 degrees 20 to 25 minutes or until golden brown. Invert immediately onto waxed paper and remove from pan. This nutty treat serves 10 and will make a meal special.

### CHICKEN DORITO CASSEROLE

2 or 3 pieces of chicken, cooked and chopped  
1 can mushroom soup  
1 can Old El Paso or Rotel tomatoes and chilies  
1/2 cup chicken broth  
1 lb. Velveeta cheese  
1 large bag of Taco-flavored Doritos  
1 can cream of chicken soup

Put chips in casserole dish. Pour 1/2 of the mixture over them. Top with cheese. Add remainder of chips and mixture and top with cheese. Bake 30-35 minutes at 350 degrees.

### BAKERY ICING

(For frosting and decorating cakes)  
1 lb. confectioner's (powdered) sugar  
1/2 cup Crisco  
1/4 cup very hot water  
1/2 tsp. vanilla  
Mix with mixer on low speed.

### LEMONADE PIE

Mix together:  
1 small carton of whipped topping  
3 oz. can pink lemonade concentrate  
1 can sweetened condensed milk  
Pour into a prepared graham cracker crust and chill.

### MINT COOKIES

Melt 1 bag of molding chocolate over very hot water (not on the stove)  
Add 3 to 5 drops of peppermint oil (to taste)  
Drop Ritz crackers in. Dip out with dipping fork. Lay on wax paper to harden.

### CHOCOLATE CHIP COOKIES

Mix one package of white cake mix with 1/2 cup brown sugar and 3/4 cup cooking oil. Add 2 eggs, 1/2 cup chopped nuts, one 6-oz. bag of chocolate and 1/4 cup peanut butter. Spread in jelly roll size baking sheet and bake 20 minutes at 350 degrees. Cut into bars while hot.
