Trustees approve salary increases

All professional personnel in the Iowa Park school system got a \$500-above state base salary increase during Tuesday's meeting of the school board.

Trustees decided to build the increase into the payroll rather than giving a bonus as they had the past few years.

But the wording of the motion actually gave a salary hike for all

employees, because it was tied to a formula used for distribution of a bonus given earlier this year. Non-professional were awarded a "proportionate" increase.

The increase raises next year's budget about \$70,000 greater than it would have been without the increase, Supt. Harold Cowley estimated.

Actually the "proportionate" in-

crease was the second raise of the evening for maintenance, custodial and bus mechanic, all of whom had already been given a 15-cent per hour hike.

Throughout the discussion, which was lengthy, teacher salaries were the only ones discussed. But when it came time for the motion, Ray Hicks moved and Jimmy Howell seconded to raise the salaries throughout the system on the "proportionate" basis. Newly elected trustee Marilyn Hale initiated the discussion on salaries, but she was seeking \$1,000 plus elimination of the \$300 paid to teachers residing in the district. She proposed to finance the increases with excess money carried over, estimated to be at the end of this fiscal year \$1.7-million.

Mrs. Hale found a general agreement with the rest of the board, that teachers should be paid more. But some trustees expressed a fear of giving the raises by salary rather than bonus, feeling the tax base might lower in the future and salaries be lowered.

Chairman Roy Boutwell pointed out Vernon was the only school in the area paying less above state than Iowa Park, and said that point could make it extremely difficult to hire new teachers.

He said most of the teachers had been here several years, but as they

retire, hiring equal quality people would be next to impossible at the local salary base.

Rusty Rusk agreed with Mrs. Hale on one issue, the amount of money carried over from one year to another. He said he had been trying to get the amount cut several years, but through lowering of taxes rather than spending it.

A major portion of the carryover, Cowley pointed out, is to pay salaries and expenses the first two months of each new year, until state and tax money starts arriving.

OTHER BUSINESS

Trustees approved purchase of 11 computers and two printers, \$9,930 worth of new band instruments, and told Cowley to proceed with having plans drafted for construction of a music room at Bradford Elementary.

Though bids for some computers were lower than those selected by the board, members said they wanted to stay with one brand, Apple, throughout the system.

Six of the Apple II-e computers and one printer are to go to the junior high for the newly required computer literacy course, and the others will be used in a high school math course. Computer Store had the low bid for the Apples, at \$11,917 total. Other bids ranged from \$6,871 to \$24,950.

A music room for the Bradford campus has been the subject of discussions several years. At one time it was planned as part of the physical education building, but cut due to building costs.

The new structure is to be located between the main building and the gymnasium. Estimated cost is \$58,000.

At the recommendation of Cowley, the board tabled the annual Region Nine Education Service Center Media contract, because of a new formula which doubled the cost for films used as teaching aids.

"I'm not convinced it's worth it," Cowley said. He is to look into purchasing the same materials with the money which would be paid out if the contract were approved.

ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT

Trustees approved a proposal to hire an assistant for Cowley, after the superintendent said the work has grown to a level more than he could handle.







Granted, some mistakes do get into print. But I'd ask you to compare the Leader with most other newspapers. Including "Brand X" to the east.

Manhard is fed up with such errors as "it's" for "its," "their" for "there" and "between you and I" for "between you and me."

I cringe when I read or hear someone mix terms, such as referring to business as "they" and discussing something that happens somewhere else while using the term "come."

"When you're in Dallas you should eat at Bill's. People who come there know they can get a good meal."

That would be fine if the speaker is in Bill's. But if the speaker is in Iowa Park, talking about Bill's in Dallas, the reference should be "people who go there. . .

Some of the most common and flagrant errors which keep cropping up in the print and broadcast media, Manhard says, are:

* Misuse of personal pronouns -- "I, me, he, she, him, her, we, us" -- and the growing use of "myself" to avoid deciding whether to use "I" or "me";

* Misuse of apostrophes -- "it's" when it should be "its" and vice versa, and in plural words (ads reading "Tomato's 49c a lb.") and

* Confusion between homonyms such as "sight" for "site"; "tail" for "tale"; "capitol" for "capital"; "pedal" for "peddle" and "breaking" for "braking."

I see the same mistakes as the expert grammarian. And I feel as he, that the letdown is at home, in the school, and the runaway misuse of words in the print and air media.

I don't believe parents correct their children around the home. I don't believe non-English teachers support the English teachers, either on written works or oral usage. And I've already commented o media is lacking.

The activities Saturday morning will start with a team session followed by coffee groups led by team members in the homes of local church members throughout the city.







Cook of the Week

We are fortunate to have Paula (Mrs. Wayne) Evans for the Cook of the Week because she shares some of her good-sounding German recipes with us. She and her husband, who is a major and nurse in the Air Force, have recently returned from a four-year stay in Germany.

German foods have a tremendous influence on American cooking. The United States national favorite, the frankfurter, can be traced to the German sausage. Hamburger, a second United States favorite, was developed in Hamburg, Germany. Most German foods tend to be generally bland and are suitable to the American taste.

German lunches or dinners consist of several courses. Mrs. Evans said that she and her husband enjoyed eating in the restaurants where there was an elegant, formal atmosphere, the tables covered with linen cloths and set with fine china and silver.

Each region of Germany has its culinary specialties. Pork, fresh or cured, is the number one meat favorite and veal is second in populartiy. The country has 300 different kinds of sausages, a wide assortment of variety meats, and different kinds of fish. Sauerkraut is typically German and other vegetables widely used are potatoes, cucumbers, asparagus, mushrooms and tomatoes.

The cakes and pastries of the country are unsurpassed, and the pastry shops offer a rich variety of fancy cakes; however, fresh fruit, a fruit compote, custard and pudding are popular desserts.

Many Germans eat five times a day. Breakfast is a hearty meal, and in midmorning a second breakfast is served. The noon dinner is the largest meal. In late afternoon coffee is served with little sandwiches, cakes or tarts, and a simple meal is served in the evening.

Mrs. Evans was graduated from Columbus, Ga. High School and

Columbus College. While she and her husband were in Germany, she worked at the 97th General Hospital in Frankfurt. Her main hobby is aerobic dancing.

KALBSSCHNITZEL NATUR MIT CHAMPIGNONS UND RAHMSSOSE [Veal with mushrooms and cream sauce]

6 veal cutlets, a little more than one pound each

pound fresh button mushrooms, simmered in butter, lard or vegetable

1 rounded teaspoon flour

- 1/2 pint sour cream
- 3 lemons
- 2 bunches parsley

Preheat oven 150. Wash and dry cutlets; pound ten times on each side with tenderizing hammer. Salt and pepper and squeeze lemon juice on both sides. Melt lard in pan and fry schnitzels until done; as they are done place in oven to keep warm. Just

well-drained mushrooms and flour to pan, stirring flour well into melted lard so that it browns. Remove schnitzel from pan. Turn fire very low: stir sour cream into pan, stirring well to dissolve crust from bottom of pan. Bring to a simmer; the sauce will be very light brown. Place schnitzels on pre-warmed plates garnished with lemon wedges and parsley. Pour sauce with mushrooms over schnitzels.

WIENER SCHNITZEL [Breaded Veal]

6 veal cutlets - 3/8" thick 2 eggs 3 cups bread crumbs

2 lemons

3 small firm tomatoes

2 bunches parsley

Wash and dry schnitzels. Pound about 10 times on each side with tenderizing hammer; salt and pepper both sides. Beat eggs in bowl, salt and pepper and beat well with fork.

Heat lard in pan. Dip schnitzel in egg on both sides, then in bread crumbs until thickly covered. Fry in pan on medium high heat. When outside is golden brown, reduce heat and continue frying until done. Garnish with tomato, lemon wedges and parsley.

KARTOFFEL SALAT [Potato Salad]

3 lbs. potatoes

- 1¹/₄ cups soup stock
- 1 large onion
- 4-6 strips bacon
- 1/3 cup salad oil (not olive oil)
- 2 tablespoons vinegar
- Salt and pepper

Wash and cook potatoes until done but still firm. Peel and mince onion; fry bacon until crisp and drain. Peel potatoes while still warm and slice 1/8" thick. Add bacon, minced onion, oil and vinegar, hot soup stock, salt and pepper to taste. Let marinate one

HAMMELFLEISCH MIT GRUNEN BOHNEN [Lamb with green beans]

2.21/2 lbs. tender lamb 6 strips bacon 1 medium onion 3 lbs. green snap beans or three #2 cans cut string beans 2 lbs. potatoes

4 tablespoons fresh savory, chopped 1 garlie clove

Wash meat and cut into 1" cubes. Cut bacon crosswise into 1" long strips; dice onion. Fry onion and bacon with garlic clove until brown; remove from pot. Discard garlic and fry lamb cubes until brown on all sides, adding lard if necessary; remove from fire. Peel potatoes and cut into large chunks. Clean beans and cut in 11/2 lengths. Add all ingredients to pot and add 11/2 pints cold water; bring to a boil. Cover and simmer slowly 1-11/2 hours. Salt and pepper to taste.

KARTOFFEL PUFFER [Potato Pancakes]

2 lbs. large potatoes

1 onion

2 eggs

Peel potatoes. Finely grate the potatoes and mix with other ingredients. Drop by spoonsful into hot fat. Form thin cakes and fry until



Pat Capps won't have any trouble finding the jumping pit in Memorial Stadium at Austin Saturday morning. He's been there before.


Capps was awarded first place in the high jump Saturday at the regional track and field championships at Stephenville, defeating his old nemesis Bill McChessney of Nocona.

The loss of Baylor County didn't effect the outcome much, because Caussey polled 1,100 votes to Finnell's 1,036.




