## Al Reed Named to Oil Industry Group

W. H. Wright, chairman of the Oil Industry Information Committee of the North Texas district, and H. I. McMillan of Wichita Falls, county chairman, were in Iowa Park, Wednesday visiting with Al Reed, who has been appointed a member of the Oil Industry Information Committee and local chairman.

Mr. Wright said that the committee program was educational and that it was worthwhile for the citizens of Texas to know the important part the oil industry plays in our economy. He said that nearly 45 per cent of the nation's crude oil production comes from Texas.

About 183,000 Texans with wages and salaries of \$700,000,000 annually are employed in the Texas petroleum industry. He said that the state government receives about 57 per cent of all its business and property tax revenues from the oil and gas operators.

The first district meeting will be held in Wichita Falls the last week in May, at which time plans for the year will be made. Mr. Reed has been invited to attend the initial meeting of the committee.

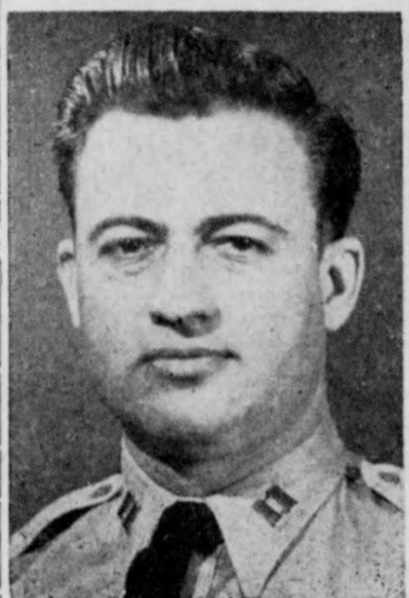

## Sheppard Officer To Be Memorial Day Speaker Wednesday

Captain Leonard L. Holloway, assistant Wing Public Information officer, Sheppard Air Force Base, will be the speaker for the Memorial Day Services held at 8:00 p.m. on the Methodist church lawn in Iowa Park. He has a B.A. degree from Oklahoma Baptist university at Shawnee, and the M.A. degree from the University of Oklahoma at Norman.

During World War II, Holloway flew as a bombardier in the European theater of operations. Before being recalled to active duty he was a college professor and church pastor. He also did production and public relations work for the Southern Baptist Radio Commission in Atlanta, Ga. He is now on extended military leave from Wayland college, Plainview, Texas.

Buglers for the service will be Donald Newman and William J. Meyers Jr., both from Sheppard. The choir will be made up of choir members from the local congregations. Rollins Woodall of the Christian church will direct the music and Mrs. Otis Gay of the Methodist church will be pianist for the memorial service.

## Lions Get Information On Road Plans

Presentation of the need for relieving traffic congestion on Wichita Falls business streets was made Tuesday at Lions club luncheon by a delegation from the county seat.

Russell Willis, who headed the group, introduced Col. C. L. Stratton of Sheppard Air Force Base. Stratton gave figures to show just how many automobiles were on the base and how many personnel are affected by the need to get to and from Wichita Falls, and other localities in Wichita county.

The Sheppard access road cutoff is designed to take traffic off Scott street and throw it out into the residential districts of Wichita Falls. Mr. Willis brought out that additional taxes for roads and bridges would be allocated to the four commissioners districts, and that Iowa Park area money would be allocated to this area for use on roads and bridges.

Ralph Milburn, Henry Grace and Ben Blanton, all of Wichita Falls, accompanied Col. Stratton and Mr. Willis, and spoke in behalf of the needed road improvement.

Preceding the program, members of the Lions club showered little Miss Sally Sawyer, new daughter of Lion and Lioness Bill Sawyer, with gifts of toys.

Taylor George made clear to the members that a storm warning signal has been worked out for Iowa Park. "If you hear the fire whistle give forth three thirty-second blasts then you will know it is time to hunt a storm cellar," Taylor said.

## Changeover to New Lake Iowa Park To Come Soon

Iowa Park folk are getting their last shot of hard water before the new supply from Lake Iowa Park is put into the mains. There is still plenty of water in the lake north of town, but the change from the old settling basin to the new and larger one will take several days.

Recent heavy rains have raised the level of Lake Iowa Park to within about seven feet of the spillway, which various estimates place at one-third capacity of the lake. This means that there is probably a full two-year supply on hand this week is as follows:

Schedule of events as announced now without further rainfall.

Mayor Fenton Dale announced this week that work on Iowa Park's sewer system is now completed. He asks that all residents not tied on to the sewer do so immediately before warmer weather sets in. This move is in the interest of sanitation and the health of the entire community will be affected by failure of some to have safe sewage disposal.

Mr. Dale invites the public to make an inspection trip to the new sewage treating plant in the extreme southwest corner of town, and of the sewage lift system completed about a block north of the football stadium.

Within two days Clyde and Tena were roaming the streets of Morrisstown. Later they took trips on every form of transportation: bus, taxi, train, airplane, and even took a boat trip.

Mr. McDonald described their final examinations, which consisted of a trip through the heaviest traffic New York City has to offer. If the team makes a good grade on this test, it is ready to be graduated and sent home.

Clyde says that Tena is of course still unaccustomed to Iowa Park and will require careful handling for some time. She is a well trained dog of good breeding for the work she has to do.

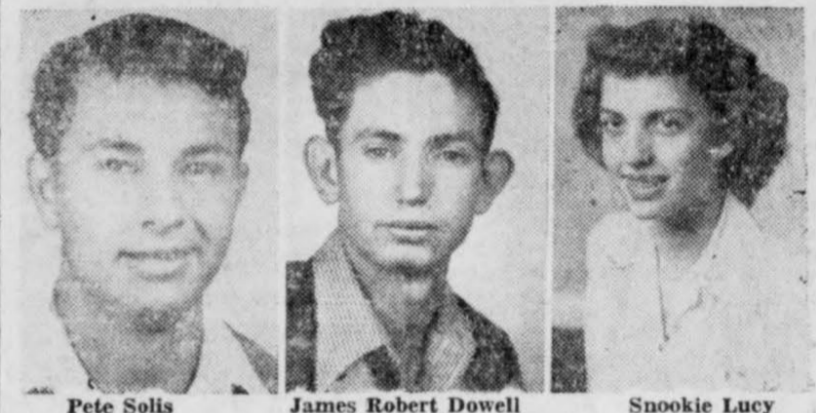
Ribbons and prizes will be given in the poultry division for Grand champion bird Grand champion pen Six heaviest birds and for six places in each breed in individual bird and pen.

Polio Precautions Listed By Noted Medical Pioneer

Oklahoma City—(Special)—When Dr. W. W. Rucks, one of the founders of the Oklahoma City Clinic and staff member of Wesley hospital here, gives advice concerning polio, you can depend on its soundness. Dr. Rucks, who is also Medical Director for the Home State Life Insurance Company, began a brilliant medical career in 1897. Today, 54 years later, he lists some precautions which can help ward off Dr. W. W. Rucks

First, do not over-exert or become chilled during warm weather. Second, keep foods especially clean, and practice personal cleanliness at all times.

Third, postpone tonsil and adenoid operations when polio is widespread.

Fourth, pay prompt attention to headaches, sore throat, upset stomach, sore muscles or fever, all of which can be the first signs of polio. More definite symptoms include stiffness of the neck and back, and difficulty in swallowing or breathing.

If polio is suspected, put the patient to bed, keep others away, and ask your doctor's advice at once.

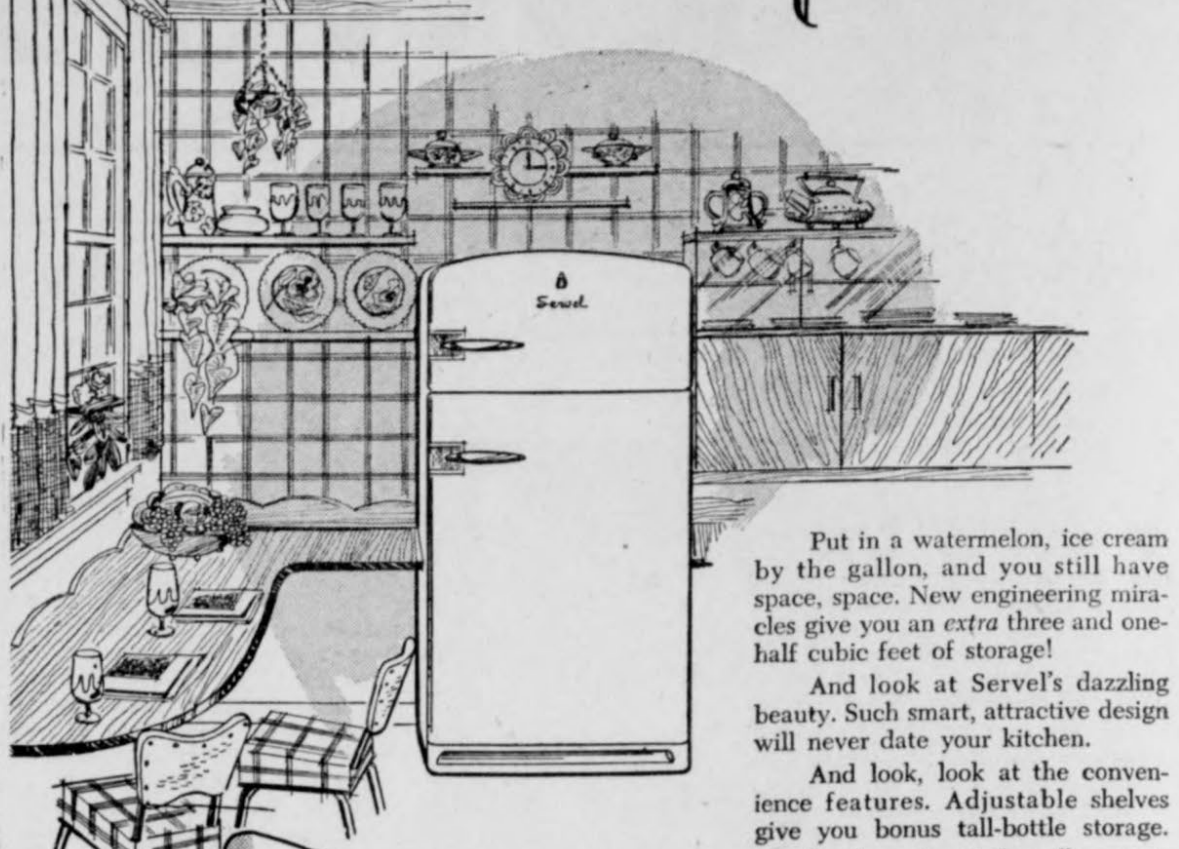
