
Al Reed Named to **Oil Industry Group**

W. H. Wright, chairman of the Oil Industry Information Committee of the North Texas district, and H. I. McMillan of Wichita Falls, county chairman, were in Iowa Park, Wednesday visiting with Al Reed, who has been appointed a member of the Oil Industry Information Committee and local chairman

Mr. Wright said that the committee program was educational and that it was worthwhile for the citizens of Texas to know the important part the oil industry plays in our economy. He said that nearly 45 per cent of the nation's crude oil production comes from Texas.

About 183,000 Texans with wages and salaries of \$700,000,000 annually are employed in the Texas petroloum industry. He said that the state government receives about 57 per cent of all its business and property tax revenues from the oil and gas operators.

The first district meeting will be held in Wichita Falls the last week in May, at which time plans for the year will be made. Mr. Reed has been invited to attend the initial meeting of the committee.

Lake Iowa Park To Come Soon

Iowa Park folk are getting their last shot of hard water before the new supply from Lake Iowa Park is put into the mains. There is still plenty of water in the lake north of town, but the change from the old settling basin to the new and larger one will take several days. Recent heavy rains have raised the level of Lake Iowa Park to within about seven feet of the spillway, which various estimates place at one-third capacity of the lake. The apathy, to whatever extent it exists, is accounted for in Washington, by the fact that there has been a general leveling off of many prices in the last couple months, although this is not true of all prices.

Administration spokesmen say this is due mostly to use of the controls. Many other persons say it's due to other factors, including a big boost in production of civilian goods since last summer. This leads many members of

Congress to wonder whether, barring all-out war, there won't be ample or at least nearly ample, production for both civilian consumption and defense. This coupled with judicious use of taxation. curtailed spending and certain credit controls, could head off serious inflation, they believe. Then the public wouldn't want price controls anymore.

How does the public feel about that? That's the question most members of Congress would like to have answered.

Congress may decide to extend the DPA temporarily, say for 30 or 60 days, take a recess, go home and find out what the constituents have to say about these controls.

It wouldn't be the first time Congress held off on touchy legislation until members had a chance to get home, gather around the modern version of the pot-bellied stove with the boys, and find out what's cook-


