City to seek grant Funds would replace old water lines With no dissenting comments

paving the way for the application. Iowa Park will seek \$100,000,

which the city expects to match from its own funds, to be used for replacement of water lines in the older part of town. Deadline for filing the application is Friday.

City officials have been aware of the deteriorated state of original townsite water lines since the early 1970s. During the drouth of 1970-71, numerous lines burst, caused by dry clay earth. Workers found lines in the older part of town to be corroded to the point of allowing as little as 20 percent of capacity.

In addition, Administrator James Barrington said while the line replacement project is underway, if the grant is approved, valves will be put into place to allow repair work on major lines without shutting down flow to the entire city.

The city's matching \$100,000 would come from an excess built in the sewer fund. This was created by a minimum fee being charged residents which was dictated by the state when the city borrowed money from the state to build additional ground storage water tanks. The money can be spent only on sewer or water

SPEED LIMIT CHANGES

Speed limits were increased in three areas of the city by the council. The changes were on Pacific, FM 368 and Atlantic.

The amended ordinances now reads speeds on those streets will be: P'CIFIC - 40 MPH Northbound and

limits and West Texas, 35 MPH Northbound and Southbound between West Texas and West Alameda. 30 MPH Northbound and Southbound between West Alameda and Loop 370.

FM 368 - Northbound and ette, and Colorado between Loop 370 and Emerald, 40 MPH Northbound and Southbound between Emerald and the south city limits.

ATLANTIC - 40 MPH Southbound between East Texas and a point 600 feet north of the intersection with East Washington.

Developer Rip Smith was not present during Monday's meeting, when the topic of the city cooperating with Smith in developing a golf course in the northwest part of town was discussed.

However, in his absence, council members approved Barrington initiating application for two permits from the Texas Water Resources Board which would concern the city providing affluent from the sewer treatment plant to be used to irrigate

has a permit to dump the affluent into Buffalo Creek, and an application is required to cease that process. The second permit would be to allow the affluent be placed on the surface, or sprinkler irrigated.

Public hearings are required for any permits, and the minimum time required is four months, aldermen were told. Though the hearings represent a delay, Barrington said he believed Smith would still be

Tornado approaches, residents take cover

Iowa Park's tornado warning sirens were sounded at 11:55 p.m. Saturday when threatening clouds approached the city.

Funnels had been observed moving out of Wilbarger County and in the Kadane Corner area, preceded by extremely heavy rain and high winds.

Members of Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Department set up their watch line along with police and sheriff's deputies, to the west and southwest, in order to alert the community should a funnel head this way.

At least two spotter units were at the "Y" on FM 368 when rains and wind obliterated vision. At the same time, sheriff's deputies from Wilharger County were trailing the clouds from the west and reported a funnel on the ground.

Because of the lack of vision, it was decided by authorites to sound the take-cover alarm.

Accompanied by a spectacular electrical display, lightning was blamed for knocking out the fire department's base radio at the police station. The police radio was

A temporary base radio for firemen was set up in the fire station and maintained until the other radio was repaired Monday morning.

Shortly after the storm passed to the east, firemen answered a call to assist in an oil field tank fire on Sisk Road. It was apparently set by

Iowa Park's official rainfall from the storm was 1.3 inches.

One injured Monday in spectacular crash

Mark Nichols said he didn't see the headlights until they filled his rear view mirror, and then "bang!"

The 22-year-old construction worker was driving west on U.S. 287 about 15 minutes until midnight Monday, returning to Cortez, Colo. His traveling companion was a year-old

His early 1970 model Oldsmobile was cruising along at between 55 and 60 miles per hour when it was overrun by a 1983 model American sports car driven by a Denton resident, Ali Khalil Ahmad.

The collision took place about 200 vards west of the highway rest stop, just outside Iowa Park.

Force of the impact demolished the front of Ahmad's car, and bent the frame of Nichols' to a point where both rear wheels were rubbing the wheel wells.

Ahmad, 19, lost a tooth when his mouth struck the steering wheel. His traveling companion, 17-year-old Melissa Hammonds, also of Denton, complained of leg, shoulder and neck pains. Her head had shattered the windshield. She was transported by ambulance to Wichita County

Nichols was uninjured, as was his

Ahmad was taken Wednesday morning from county jail before Justice of the Peace Virgil Hill, where he pled guilty and paid fines for three accounts: failed to control speed and striking another vehicle, \$56; no motor vehicle liability insurance, \$93.50; and possession of narcotics paraphernalia with residue of marijuana (cut glass pipe), \$106.

The Denton resident who reportedly speaks little English and appeared to be from a nation in the middle east, was also taken before Justice of the Peace R.L. Stewart on a charge of driving while intoxicated and placed in county jail under a \$500

The girl told Iowa Park emergency workers she wanted to be taken to Electra, where her mother lived, but did not give her mother's name.

Nichols said he didn't know how he would get back to Colorado. He had been visiting his mother in Dallas and father in Austin, worked a couple of weeks to finance his return trip, and repairs would be worth more than he



interested in continuing plans as had been discussed at previous meetings.

The council tabled action of approval or denial of the city participating in the course development with Smith, pending outcome of the permit hearings.

Concerning a model boat club's request to use Gordon Lake for its practice sessions and tournaments, the council gave permission to use the lake for tournaments only.

Concern for fishermen and family outings at the lake which could be conflicts when club members were practicing was expressed by Alderman George Hammonds.

However, since at least a year's notice is needed to schedule tournaments, during which time the city would have to post no fishing for a three-day weekend to allow for the competition, the council agreed to that proposal.

Alderman Johnny Coker pointed out economic and public relations benefits to the community by allowing tournaments. Such meets normally attract more than 150 participants, the council was told, not including crowds which would watch.

Also approved was a change in the city's ordinance which concerns establishing of employee salaries.

Barrington explained the present code allowed only salary increases depending on tenure. He asked that the change be made in order to pay some employees for work, effort and loyalty demonstrated, and at the same time cut some salaries for lack of the same reasons.

"This is designed to be a cost-saver for the city," Mayor Tim Hunter told the council.

Following a 66-minute executive session, Hunter explained the discussion was about salary schedules for some employees, which would relate to work on the new budget over the next couple of months.

Other business discussed included: * council approved leasing a tract of land on East Jefferson to D.A. Hill, allowing the first year's rent as Hill's expenditure for a survey and payment of \$1 each for the second and third years of the lease;

* council approved advertisement for bids to sells surplus property;

* members instructed Barrington to step up the city's mosquito spraying efforts, initiate notices of intent to demolish the burnt structure at 113 West Cash, and set a council tour of facilities for July 2.

Crabgrass or grass burs can be controlled in Bermuda lawns with DSMA or MSMA. These are selective chemicals which kill unwanted grasses without causing damage to the bermuda.

There is no need to "chop away" at crabgrass with a hoe when it can be "sprayed-out" with DSMA or MSMA. The rate of application is 21/2 ounces of DSMA or 1 ounce of MSMA per gallon of water. The bermuda is scorched slightly by this treatment but recovers quickly.

This same spray works on grassburs. However, the key to controlling grassburs is treatment before seedhead development. An application now followed with additional sprays early in August and late September gives season long control. Control measures for 2 successive years is needed in order to get rid of all the seed on the ground. We have a bargain on wheat for chicken feed or for baiting fishing holes. Mrs. Mark Elliott

At this season of the year with temperatures climbing, many cooks are going through their recipe files and pulling out their favorites for hot weather eating. Carolyn (Mrs. Mark) Elliott has done this, and one of the recipes she pulled out was for Pistochia Almond Ice Cream.

It is interesting to note that pistachio and almond are two nuts mentioned in the Bible which proves that they have been a part of man's diet for a long, long time. One historical reference to the pistachio plant calls it the "green almond," so the green food color in Mrs. Elliot's recipe probably represents the pistachio

The pistachio tree is probably a native of Persia, and it is still grown chiefly in this area, in a belt stretching from Afghanistan to the eastern part of the Mediterranean. Pistachio was eaten so long ago that its nuts have been found at the archeological site in Jarmo, dated 6750 B.C. in what is now eastern Iraq. It was grown in the hanging gardens of Babylon about 700 B.C. The only place it can be grown in the U.S. is in Calif., but most of the nuts consumed in this country come from Turkey.

The almond is probably a native of Asia Minor. We hear of it early from Babylon, Mittite and Anatolia chronicles and the Bible. It started its westward move before historic times for it has been found in the Bronze Age ecorerooms on Crete. Charlemagne ordered almond trees planted on his domain, and the first French much attention to almond.

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

The lanky young man may be quiet about his skills, but his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Scottie R. Mendez Sr. and his younger sister, Robin Michelle, are proud of him. On May 20 the family surprised young Mendez with an advertisement in the Reporter-News listing his accomplishments and declaring "We are proud of you!"

"I didn't know it was coming out," he says shyly. "My mom pinned it on my mirror and when I walked in I was

He grins sheepishly. "There are a

lot of students who do outstanding work and only get their names in a list in small print. I was really surprised."

He carefully lays out the drawings that won state and regional honors, including a solar house that won first in regional and second in state. His work is laid on the heavy drafting table which he designed and built "from scratch" and which also took state honors.

Mendez first became interested in architectural drafting when he took woodworking in the ninth grade at Madison Junior High. He worked under a student teacher named Bob

"My first year at Cooper I couldn't get into the drafting classes," he recalls. "But the second year Mr. Evans was teaching at Cooper, and I got into the class. I also took woodwork under Mr. Ronnie McQueen."

Once into the classes he moved quickly into the advanced drafting jumping from a 300projects, square-foot floor plan assigned to the class into a project of his own for an 1,800-square-foot house.

His red ribbon at state level came in on-site drafting competition, where students were given a floor plan on which they had to draw elevations within a specified time limit. He took blue ribbons for a presentation drawing of a house plan - exterior and interior - and in a welding drawing.

Mendez says he'll probably go into architectural drafting as a career eventually. But for now, he says he's going to work with his father in the family business, Triple M. Trucking Company, for a year.

"I want to work for a year driving a truck, to get settled and see what's

And he's had at least one offer for a possible drafting job. Mendez says he may do some individual drafting jobs too, as they come up, including a floor plan he recently completed for a man huilding a new home.


Some day, he says softly, he'd also like to design his own home. But for now he's working on a plot plan for a swimming pool his parents would like to build in their backyard.


