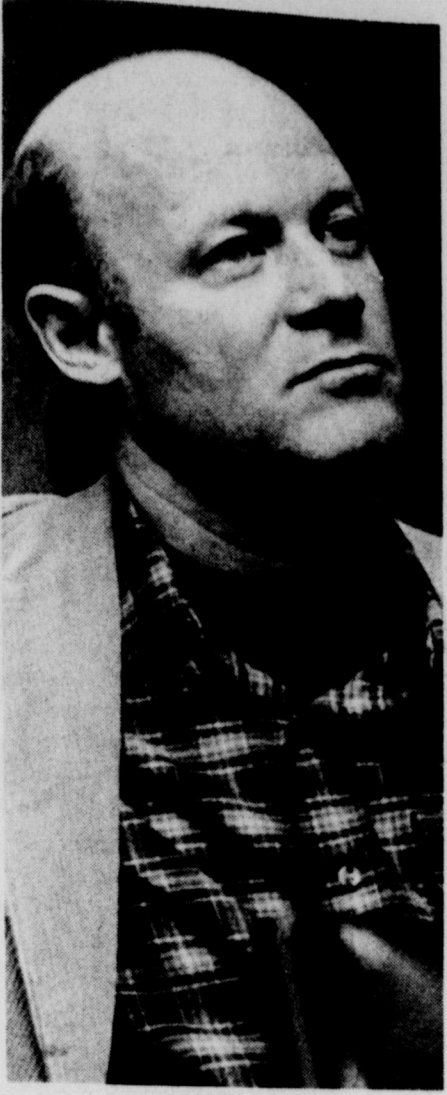

Library plans shown to Friends, official

A special guest met Thursday evening with the Friends of the Library for the first public showing of plans for renovating the Burnett home into the Tom L. Burnett Memorial Library.

Tom Beech, along with his wife, were in Iowa Park that day, not only to meet with the Friends, but also to get their first look at the landmark structure.

Beech is executive vice president of The Anne Burnett and Charles Tandy Foundation which not only purchased the Burnett home and donated it to the city for a library, but also donated \$200,000 toward renovation of the structure.

Architect Don Daugherty showed three drawings of plans for renovation, one each of the exterior, first floor and second floor.

He said he expects to have the plan specifications ready for bidding about the middle of February, which would allow for awarding of bids the latter part of March. Work should begin within 30 days after that, and completion is expected in about five months.

The exterior drawing indicated plans to retain the distinctive circle

drive in front of the structure. A large paved parking lot would be located on the west side, with an exit from the parking area onto Pacific.

Other plans for enhancement of the grounds were shown.

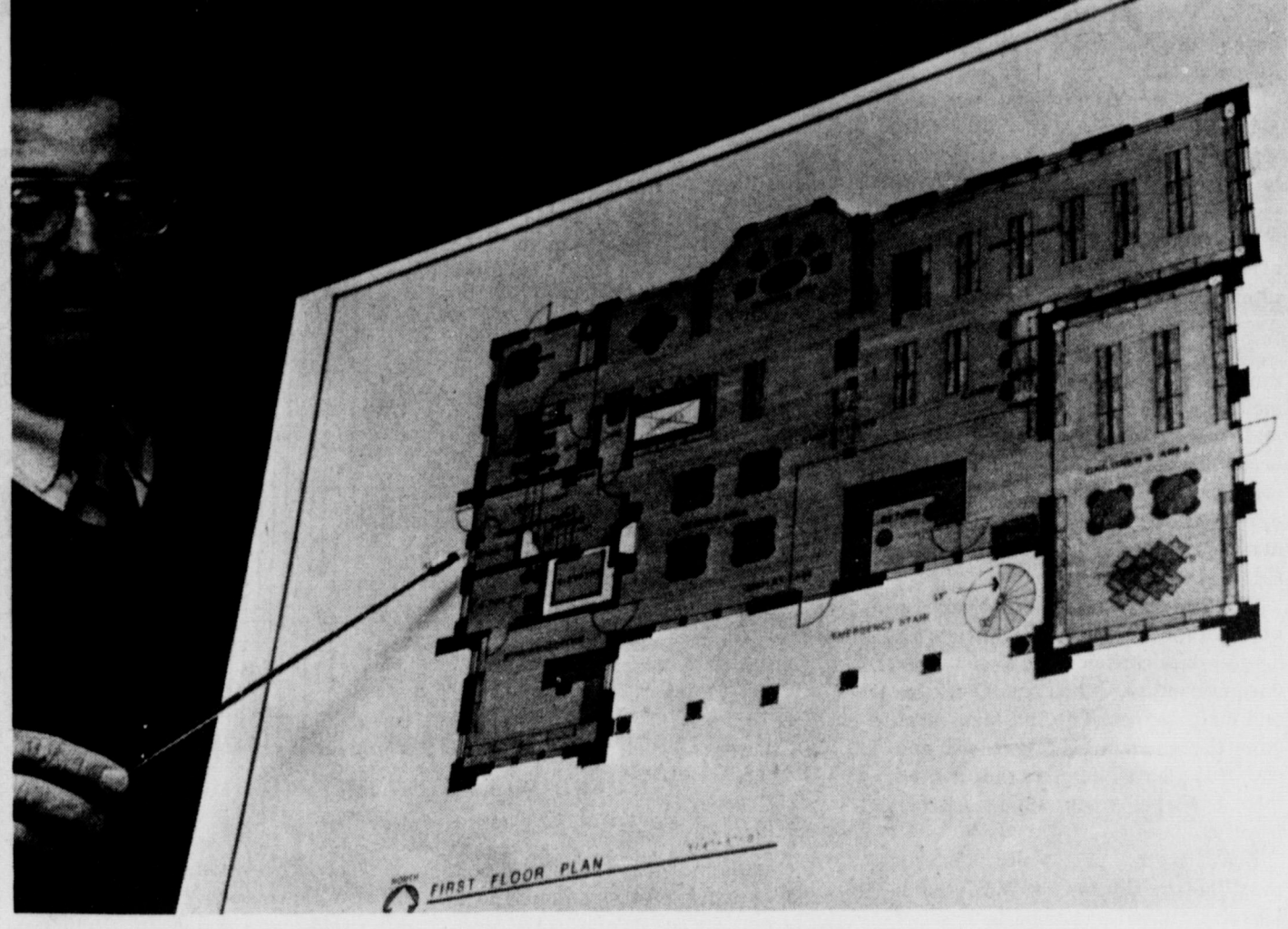
The main floor has shelving for 16,000 volumes, a large reading area, a separate area for a children's section, office, staff lounge and genealogical area.

To provide room for the shelving and reading areas, several walls of the original structure must be removed, as well as the kitchen area.

The ballroom on the second floor will be retained as a meeting area. The east end of the second floor will be made into a board room, complete with conference table, sink and cabinet area and restrooms.

There will be three accesses to the second floor. The staircase will be retained, but an elevator will be installed. The third access will be a circle stairway near the southeast corner.

More than \$400,000 is available for the renovation. Besides the money from the foundation, more than \$100,000 was raised locally and a similar matching grant was received from a federal source.

Council faces lengthy agenda Monday night

Appointments, ordinances, resolutions and reports comprise a lengthy agenda city aldermen face when the council meets at 7 p.m. Monday in council chambers.

The council will be asked to confirm appointments of one member of the electrical board, a city fire marshal and an acting public works director.

Of two resolutions to be considered, one would encourage the state legislature to adopt legislation which would give general law chartered cities unilateral annexation powers. Several cities operating under general law charters are proposing the change.

The other resolution is of paperwork nature, since the MBank of Dallas has changed to its new name, signing a new contract for that firm to act as paying agent for bonds owned by the city.

The ordinance to be considered would amend the city's code regulating discharges into the sewer system to meet state regulations.

Three bids will be considered by the council. They are for the purchase of equipment for the sewer plant, purchase of a telephone system for city hall and police department, and

insurance.

Under the administrator's report, discussions will be on:

- * final payment on the Overbey house;
- * progress of construction of Fourth Street;
- * a proposal allowing disability exemptions on taxes;

* hiring of a public works director and possible changes of requirements;

* authorization of expenses for representatives to attend a waste water release permit hearing in Austin; and

* report on the Emerald Street abandonment survey.

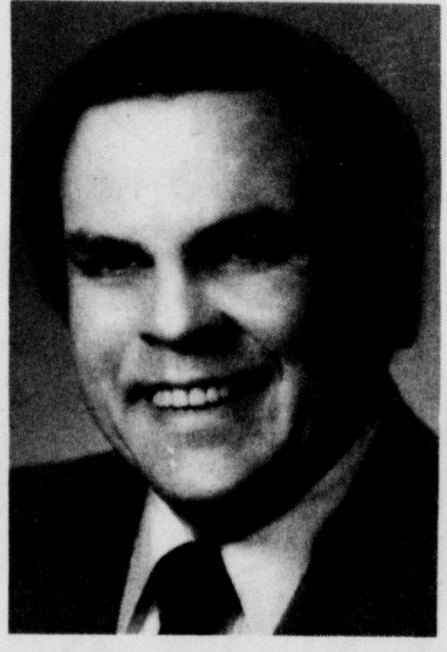

Sales taxes took a big jump during December in Iowa Park, according to a report by the state comptroller's office.

The city's share of sales taxes collected by local businesses during December was \$10,266.98, up 15.8 percent over the \$8,866.17 reported for the same month in 1983.

Iowa Park ranked second among the four cities of the county for percentage increase.

Athletes recognized at annual banquet

Five athletes were singled out for special recognition Saturday night at the annual football banquet.

Phillip Davis was named recipient of the Outstanding Player Award; Charlie Adams and Jerry Allen, Ballhawker Award, and Rocky Martin, Hustler Award.

The fifth individual is the recipient of a new award, the Jackie Denton Outstanding Junior Varsity Player Award, went to Danny Forman. The award memorializes the junior varsity coach who was killed in an accident during the past season.

The Hawk Booster Club, which annually sponsors the banquet, also recognized three adults for their contribution to the program.

Robert Wilcox, who has served several years as the public announcer and acknowledged to having missed only one home game in 37 years, was named along with Carlton Hicks, a time-keeper, and Mark Reeves, who filmed the games this year.

Guest speaker was Jerry Moore, head football coach at Texas Tech Univ. He told the players, "You are very, very special. You can do anything you want to do. You're over-achievers."

He complimented the Booster organization for sponsoring the banquet, pointing out Iowa Park is one of only a few communities where

such an event is held to recognize the school's athletes. "It shows community support," he said.

Head coach David Baugh also praised the Boosters, for financing the banquet, charter buses to road games, and other activities.

This year's seniors are very special to Baugh, he told them, because they were freshmen his first year here. He told them, "You know how to work hard, take bad breaks, sacrifice, all of which is important to make you responsible citizens."

Robert Palmer, assistant superintendent, jokingly recognized high school principal Bob Dawson for his one year as coach of the Hawks.

He said Dawson's record was "five and five... lost five games at home and five on the road."

'New-Life' Center relying on loaned vehicle

The God is Love Evangelistic Ministry on Peterson Road is experiencing some financial difficulty, to the point the group is having to use a borrowed vehicle for transportation.

The group also maintained a nativity scene on the grounds of the Center, which is being retained for public viewing through January.

3/4 cup peanut butter
3/4 cup white sugar

Let come to boil. Remove from fire and add 4 cups Lucky Charms cereal. Drop by teaspoon on waxed paper and cool.

FRUIT COCKTAIL PARFAIT PIE

1 Lb. can (2 cups) fruit cocktail
3 oz. pkg. lemon flavored gelatin
1/2 cup cold water
1 pint vanilla ice cream
Vanilla cookie crust

Drain fruit cocktail, reserving syrup. Add water to syrup to make 1 cup; heat to boiling; add gelatin and stir till dissolved. Add cold water. Cut ice cream in 6 pieces and add to hot mixture; stir till melted. Chill till mixture mounds slightly when spooned (about 15 to 20 minutes). Fold in fruit. Turn into Vanilla Cookie Crust. Chill till firm (45 minutes for firmer filling to a few hours for the firmer gelatin kind). Trim pie with extra fruit.

VANILLA COOKIE CRUST

Line bottom of buttered 9-inch pie plate with whole vanilla wafers. Trim 1/4 inch off enough wafers to stand up around edge of plate. Crumble a few wafers and fill in chinks in bottom crust.

FRUIT SALAD

Equal amounts of:
1 can (small) chunk pineapple
1 can mandarin oranges
1 cup miniature marshmallows
1 can southern style coconut

Mix with sour cream as the dressing.

SWEET PICKLE STICKS

Use enough fresh, firm medium cucumbers for 6 pint jars. Wash and cut them into sticks. Pour boiling water over them and let stand overnight. Next morning pack solidly into clean, sterilized jars.

Make a solution of:
3 3/4 cups vinegar
4 1/2 teaspoons celery seed
4 1/2 teaspoon turmeric
3/4 teaspoon mustard seed
3 cups sugar
3 tablespoons salt
Pinch of alum per jar

Boil the solution for 5 minutes. Pour boiling hot over cucumbers in jars. Put on caps, screwing bands tight. Process jars in boiling water both for 5 minutes.

ORANGE BALLS

1 pound powdered sugar
1 - 12 oz. box vanilla wafers, finely crumbled
1 stick melted oleo or butter
1 can orange concentrated juice (undiluted)
1 cup chopped nuts

Combine sugar, vanilla, wafers; add butter or oleo. Add orange juice and nuts. Chill and roll into small balls, then roll in coconut. Place on wax paper or serving dish. If they seem too moist, leave uncovered for a while.

SNOWBALLS

3 1/2 cups vanilla wafer crumbs
1/4 cup melted margarine
3/4 cup sifted powdered sugar
1 cup finely chopped pecans
1/2 cup Coca-Cola

Mix crumbs, margarine, sugar & pecans & Coke. Roll into very small balls.

ICING:
2 cups sifted powdered sugar
2 tablespoons melted margarine
1/2 cup Coca-Cola

VANILLA WAFER FRUIT CAKE

1 pound vanilla wafers
1 pound nuts
1/2 pound candied cherries
1/2 pound candied pineapple
1/4 pound raisins
2 eggs
1/2 cup white sugar
1 small can evaporated milk
1/2 teaspoon salt

Mix eggs, milk, sugar, salt and wafers; add remaining ingredients. Bake in moderate oven (400 degrees) 40 minutes.

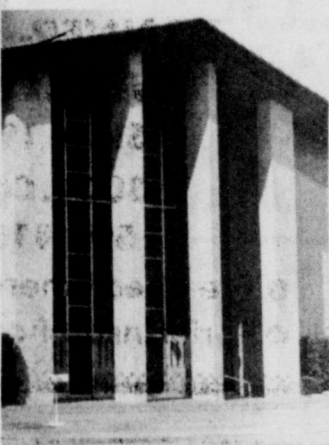

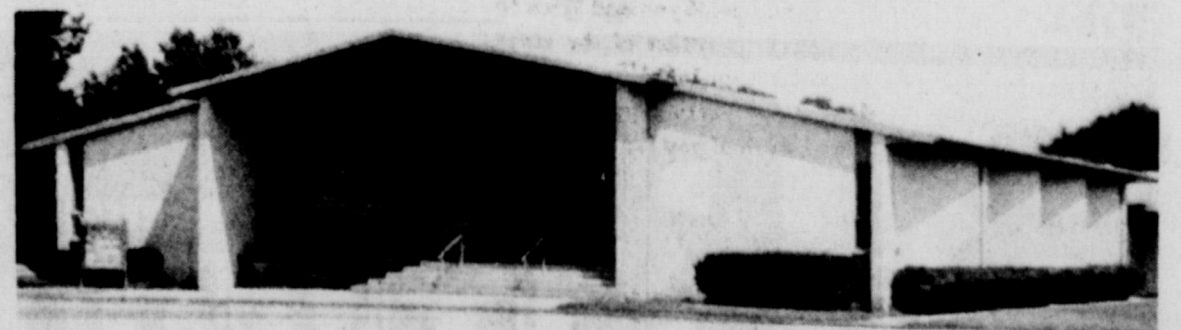

Lawn care is subject of Study Club speaker

The 23 Study Club held the first meeting of 1985 Thursday afternoon in the Lions Club building and was hosted by Mrs. Riley Thompson and Mrs. L.E. Brooks.

Don Decker, former Wichita County agent and co-owner of Farmers Grain Elevator, was the guest speaker for the annual conservation program. He spoke on "Sowing Seeds in 1985" and the urgency of spraying lawns now to get rid of the weeds that are making them so green during the winter season.

Realizing that many people will be turning their thoughts to gardening within a few weeks since February is the month to plant some vegetables

that require a cold soil, he showed samples and gave instructions on how to plant the seeds that require either cold or warm soil to germinate.

He emphasized the importance of soil temperature, seedling vigor and the mechanism which tells them when to come up after they are planted. He reminded that small seeds should be planted shallow, medium seeds about one inch deep and large seeds about one and a half inches in depth.

In discussing the urgency of controlling weeds on the lawns now, he said "anything that is green on your lawn is weeds, and I want to advise you that now is the time to control them." He recommended Roundup for a contact spray, and

Surf-King for a surfactant, suggesting the use of a pump-up sprayer in applying them.

Mrs. Joe Singer was program chairman. Mrs. Earle Denny brought an impressive devotion for the new year on "Using Time Wisely-Today." She said that the two days all people should not worry about are yesterday and tomorrow and that leaves only "today" to be recognized as a gift from the Heavenly Father and to be used for His glory.

Mrs. John Rentschler presented a piano solo "Ring the Bells," an arrangement by Paul Nicholson for the performing arts number.

wanted to share its good fortunes with the elderly in Holliday. Duke presented the 55-cup coffee maker to center coordinator Elizabeth Gorman before the noon meal.

Sales taxes tops in county

Holliday's first rebate check for 1985 from the state comptroller's office in Austin shows a slight decline from the amount received in a comparable payment period in 1984, but the city is still on top of other Archer County entities in the total amount received.

The January check for sales tax and use tax allocations through a period ending the 28th of December is for \$6,090, slightly down from the \$6,111 check received in January of 1984. That amounts to less than half

of one-percent difference in the two. Lakeside City also showed a decline from the same period last year, but this one is approximately 16-percent less, with the entity receiving a 1985 check for \$556, compared to \$662 taken in last January.

City's action paves way for doctor's purchase

Holliday City Council Monday night adopted a resolution which in effect allows Dr. E. Thornton, D.O., to purchase the lot and building which now serves as his clinic, from Archer County.

The resolution, passed during the council's bi-monthly meeting, the first for 1985, gives mayor pro-tem Elizabeth Gorman the authorization to sign a title-transfer document on Lot No. 6, Block No. 22 of the original townsite, which is located on the south corner of the 200 block of S. Main in Holliday.

The building, originally built with funding from Archer County, was sold in a sheriff's sale in 1980 to the state, county, City of Holliday and Holliday I.S.D. Thornton received permission from the Archer County Commissioner's Court to purchase the property and land for \$36,000, which includes \$3,000 for the lot and \$30,000 for the building.

The resolution calls for the taxing entities to convey the property to Thornton, and giving Gorman the authority to act as representative for the city. The resolution was adopted and passed at the request of county attorney Gary Southard.

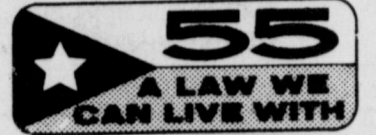

Ownership of an Iowa Park business firm changed hands in late December.

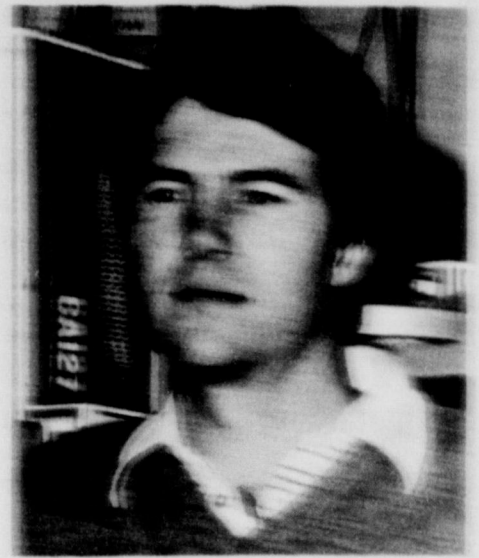

The applicants propose to impound in these reservoirs the natural runoff waters entering them, as well as municipal sewage effluent discharged into the reservoirs by the City of Iowa Park.
