# Hawks to regional after long absence

After a 29-year absence, Iowa Park's Hawk basketball team will be playing in the regional tournament. Coach Earnie Reusch will lead his Dist. 5-AAA champs into the coliseum at Texas Tech Univ. in Lubbock tomorrow evening, where they will meet the Seminole Indians at 7.

Not since 1956 has Iowa Park had a team in the regional. The Hawks, with starters Doug James, Harvey Klinkerman, Thurman Payton, Randall Price and David Sewell, made it all the way to Denton that year, but lost on the first game.

The other two Class AAA teams in the tournament this year are Dimmitt and Gatesville. Class AA teams are also having their regional tourney this week in the same gymnasium. Seminole and Dimmitt are

Seminole's two losses were to Waco High and a lone conference setback to Slaton. Terry Bailey, tallest player on


the team, racked up 32 points in the Indians' win Tuesday over Floydada.

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

She explained she had signed a paper to have tubal ligation after her second child was born, doing it while still drowsy from anesthesia. Her first child was born natural, but the second was taken by caesarean Lar

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With the knowledge she had a son and daughter and believing her family was complete, she said she felt she would not want a larger family.

However, after her divorce from Danny Parkerson and subsequent marriage to McDonald, she said she '... wanted my husband now to have the experience of having children, because he never had any children; and he was so good with my children.'

She said she had a lot of trouble finding a doctor who could perform the surgery, but learned of Dr. Silber through one of his books her sister had given her.

Asked if she had any advice for the public, Jody responded, "Don't do it (sign release for sterilization) under pressure."

# Two Iowa Park students to attend science series





# Water improvement project starts today

One of the largest and most welcomed projects for Holliday will commence today when a \$160,000 contract is dispensed, signalling the

beginning of a major water system improvement for the growing town. City officials will meet with representatives of Biggs and

Matthews this morning in the consulting engineers' office, to open advertised bids for the bulk of the work detailed in the Community Development Block Grant. At 7 p.m. Monday in the Holliday Community Center, the Holliday City Council will award the bid to the best bidder, in the council's opinion.

According to city administrator Jim Hamill, who was one of the main elements in the grant's instigation and eventual success, the start-up date for the project is set for later this month. "Everything is currently right on schedule," the administrator said. "That of course is weatherpermitting," he added.

Monday's letting of the bid will be the end of what has been several months of paperwork and patient waiting, Hamill admitted. Initially filed in the Spring of 1984, the first positive sign of acceptance came in October of the same year.

The paperwork won't disappear, though, as reports on the construction phase, which is scheduled to end in July, and the final inspection and close-out phase set for August, and September are required. This work will be done without Hamill, as the four-year chief of city operations leaves today for a new career at Sheppard Air Base.

IMPROVEMENTS NOTED

Hamill said the emphasis of the water improvement project is the replacement of the aging cast-iron water lines with a superior pipe, made of C-900 pipe. All customers in this area will have their service transferred to the new line. In addition, Hamill said, a new fire hydrant will be placed on the corner of Main St. and S. Avenue.

The work on South Avenue will require more work than anywhere else in the city, as county workers tear up the surface of the street, and, upon completion of the laying of the line, completely resurface the street with a hot-lay asphalt. "South Avenue was the only street the city didn't sealcoat because of it's bad condition," Hamill commented, referring to his five-year plan to resurface all the streets in Holliday. That plan will also be finalized this summer.

Other improvements provided by the grant is replacement of one block of four-inch line on Cherry St. with the new pipe, and one block of two-inch line of W. Chestnut with a larger, six-inch line. Workers will also install a new fire hydrant at the corner of Cherry and W. Chestnut.

Workers will also replace two blocks of four-inch cast iron pipe with C-900 plastic on W. China St., from N. Main to N. Cedar. A new hydrant will be placed on the corner of N. Main and E. China.

Also, the plans include extending a six inch line to replace a two and one-half-inch line from the corner of N. Mesquite and E. China parallel with U.S. 82-277 on the northside of the business area, reduced to a four-inch line at the twin bridges east to the corner of B.W. Gordon's driveway.

From that point, the four-inch line will be hooked to a two and one-half-inch line, then teed to the same size line south across the highway and connecting with the residence of T.H. Stone.

"East of the twin bridges, we will install two to three four-inch fire hydrants to facilitate fire protection in that area," Hamill added. Asked if the additional hydrants in the city will lower fire protection rates, Hamill indicated that they may help local businesses with their key rates.

With the large amount of work scheduled to be done, Hamill said that it is imperative for residents to be cautious when driving through the work sites, as road surfaces will be affected, in addition to the increases in vehicular traffic and to the presence of workers.

Letters have been drafted and will be delivered to each resident by city water superintendent Morganna Thorn, stating that a minimized interruption of service lasting only a few hours will occur when work is concentrated in their neighborhood.

Customers will be transferred to the new lines one at a time to help minimize the shut-off time, Hamill



#### FmHA adding to staff to handle loan processing

The Farmers Home Administration will hire additional temporary employees to help process farm loan applications in Texas FmHA State Director J. Lynn Futch said this

"We will begin hiring the extra staff immediately," Futch said. "The new employees will be temporary. They will serve for four months to help with the seasonal loan peak and to process loans for hundreds of farmers who have requested a review of their debt situation to see if they qualify for the new debt restructuring program."

Under the new program, farmers who are having trouble meeting their FmHA payments, may have their loans rescheduled or have up to 25 percent of their loans, up to \$200,000 set aside for five years with no interest. Farm loans held by commercial banks and other lenders that are classified as "problem loans," can be reduced by ten percent in exchange for an FMHA guarantee.


