90 teacher co. 1000 PARK TX 76367 112 extended by trustees

In a marathon meeting of the school board, which lasted until 1:45 a.m. Wednesday, trustees extended contracts for 90 teachers through the 1985-86 school year, established criteria for hiring of a new superintendent, and declined a request to change the scheduling of kindergarten classes.

Trustees did not get to the personnel portion of the agenda until 12:28 a.m. at which time they accepted the resignations of superintendent Harold Cowley and teachers Jo Ann Davis, Jean Johnson, Bonnie Medlinger, H.J. Cannon, Betty Dwyer, Nancy Thompson and Julie Ross.

Kenneth Watts was assigned next year to general construction, replacing Carlton Hicks who has resigned for health reasons. Watts' building trades class has been terminated due to lack of enrollment.

If enough enrollment develops before next year in auto body vocational class, Wendell Allen will teach that course half a day and do maintenance work the balance of the day. If the course does not make, Allen will administer the "alternative program" for students who for administrative reasons cannot be allowed to attend school with the other students.

The board held a 35-minute

executive session, during which Cowley and assistant superintendent Robert Palmer were called to meet with trustees.

After the meeting was re-opened to the public, chairman Roy Boutwell called for a motion to set a deadline for accepting applications for superintendent until April 18, after which interviews will be held and hiring a new one "at the appropriate time."

Cowley submitted his resignation to accept the superintendent's post at Talco-Bogata schools in east Texas, effective the end of June.

Concerning contracts, Cowley strongly recommended that choir director Allan Andrews receive the same annual \$3,000 bonus as does the band director Greg Miller. He said Andrews' bonus of \$1,800 was not equal to Miller's, when quality of instruction as demonstrated by

contest results and numbers of students taught were concerned.

The board agreed and gave Andrews the matching bonus.

Another issued approved by the board is to pay as many teachers as the school receives state funds, based on ADA, \$1,500 for career ladder bonuses.

TAX OFFICE PROBLEMS

Tax collector Allen Shewmake told the board of problems created for the district in the past by an attorney who collected delinquent taxes, and also got the go-ahead from the board to investigate the cost of purchasing an in-house computer system.

Allen said an attorney, whom he had not been able to contact, had apparently pocketed court fees he was to have paid to have delinquent tax suits cleared.

Trustees were told of dozens of suits still pending on county records, but the money settling them having been paid by the taxpayers. Without clearance from county records, financing of projects or sales of property cannot be permitted, he

Board members instructed Shewmake to pay all court costs, which amounts to more than \$1,000, and have the school's present attorney aggressively pursue collection from the former attorney.

Streets get attention during council meeting

Almost half the items on Monday's city council meeting agenda, 10 of 25, were concerned with streets.

Issues ranged from consideration of opening new streets to a proposal that one be blocked several hours daily during harvest by the railroad.

Probably the most far-reaching issue was an ordinance the council passed, which requires all future streets to be constructed of concrete instead of asphalt.

During a discussion on the issue, it was pointed out that all bids on new streets the past few years had been lower for concrete than asphalt, and the benefits of less maintenance made the material far more appealing.

Mark Bottles asked that three blocks of East Lafayette be covered by gravel, because of dirt road conditions during wet periods. He said the owners would participate in the cost of materials.

However, one family in the neighborhood complained about washing water caused by the street, and action was delayed until an engineering study and recommendations can be made.

By resolution, the council accepted the street work of newly-completed 700 block of West Louisa.

Council members also approved a change order on the street work being done on Fourth Street, to have curb and gutter installed on a half-block strip north of Van Horn. The area had been left out when curb and gutter was installed by developers, and is believed to be a source of pavement deterioration on Van Horn.

Also approved was abandoning of 40 feet right of way on the north side of the 800 block of East Park, where the 150-foot dedicated street is not

An ordinance amending the code for placement of traffic signs at intersections was approved. Stop signs will be placed for south traffic on Fourth at West Highway; east and west traffic on Van Horn at Fourth, and for west traffic on Louisa at

Yield signs for east and west traffic will be placed on Louisa at Second; north traffic on Wall at Valley and north traffic on Hope at Valley.

Aldermen rejected an appeal by developer Ray Townsend to finance the paving of East Garden Drive, and at the same time instructed the city administrator to not permit any more construction on the unpaved lots until paving is completed.

A discussion was held on the prospects of opening and paving Louisa between First and Second Streets, but no action was taken.

Aldermen turned down a request from Texoma Ag Products to block Wall traffic at the railroad crossing between 8 and 11 a.m. on certain mornings during harvest season, to allow for extra cars to be placed at the firm's loading leg.

Administrator James Barrington also reported to the council on a suit against a man who purchased the house that used to block Fourth Street on West Highway, to force its removal from the site.

Solution is proposed for Yule decorations Iowa Park, for the past few city's entire business area were made with the Dumas Cham

Iowa Park, for the past few years, has been without any Christmas decorations in the business areas, and with little or no prospects for ever having any more.

But the solution has apparently surfaced.

The city council Monday night heard a proposal to develop funding from voluntary sources, and is expected to take official action at its Mar. 25 meeting.

Mrs. Phil (Ruth) Welch told the council how the community of Dumas, in the northern Panhandle, has funded the purchase of more beautiful decorations than she had ever seen.

The solution: ask every water customer of the city to donate 10

cents per month.

The last of the tattered light post decorations were retired to the dump grounds some four years ago. They were purchased second-hand by the Chamber of Commerce decades earlier, and were beyond repair.

The Chamber, over the past 15 years, has attempted several campaigns to raise funds to buy new decorations for the business area, but without success. The organization's annual budget is less than decorations would cost for a 10-block area.

Mrs. Welch said 100 percent participation of the water customers would generate in excess of \$3,000 per year. If undertaken, decorations could be purchased annually, until the

city's entire business area were completely covered, and then additional monies beyond that point could be used to replace the earliest purchases.

City administrator James Barrington told council members the additional 10-cent donation could be listed on the monthly water bills, which are produced by the city's computer. Such a solicitation is legal, as long as the public is aware the 10-cents is being paid voluntarily, and anyone not wishing to contribute can notify city hall and the amount would not be on future bills.

Mrs. Welch explained she and her family passed through Dumas last Christmas, and said she had never seen a community so well decorated. She became curious as to how it had been accomplished, and contact was

information.

Details concerning the project are not yet worked out, such as who will put up and take down the decorations, who will administer selections for purchasing, (she suggested a prepresentative committee), where decorations will be stored, etc. But she said those things could be developed, after the fund-raising campaign was initiated.

The key to the project, she says, is ... for everybody in the community to feel the decorations are their's. Everybody can take pride in it."

Having discussed the idea with various friends, Mrs. Welch said she had received no negative reactions, all positive. That was the same reaction she received from the city council.

Local, county stock shows get underway this weekend

The annual Iowa Park 4-H and FFA Project Show, which serves as a final tuneup for the Wichita County Junior Livestock Show, is set to unfold at 9 a.m. Saturday at the school's stock barn on West Ruby.

Jointly sponsored by the Wichita County Young Farmers and Iowa Park MuleSkinners, some 140 head of stock will be displayed by local 4-H club and Future Farmers of America members, each vying for prize money and trophies as well as showmanship awards.

The order in which stock will be judged is horses, broilers, rabbits, turkeys, lambs, hogs and beef cattle. Show officials say the break for lunch will probably follow judging of lambs.

Largest classes will be lambs and hogs, in which some 45 head each is

expected.

The 16th annual county show will open Sunday at the 4-H barn on Midwestern Parkway in Wichita Falls, and conclude Tuesday evening with the premium sale.

Judging begins Sunday afternoon with broilers and turkeys. Judging of rabbits will begin at 9 a.m. Monday, to be followed by breeding sheep, market lambs, and breeding and market swine.

Dairy goats will be judged Tuesday morning, with steers and dairy stock later in the day.

The Young Farmers will hold a free chili feed for all prospective buyers, starting at 6 p.m. The sale is to follow at 7.

This year's show was scheduled next week to coincide with spring

break, which all students of county schools are observing next week. In doing so, none of the students will miss any school. Officials are aware of new school regulations restricting the time students can miss class, as set by HB 72.

Club members tour historical landmark

The 23 Study Club members toured the Kell House in Wichita Falls, a historical landmark in the area. Thursday for the observance of the annual Texas Heritage Day program.

The house built in the early 1900 period is an exciting world of color and charm with its fine old marble-topped furniture, seven fireplaces, chandeliers, priceless accessories that belonged to the Frank Kell family, and other discriminately gathered pieces of the period that have either been donated or loaned.

One of the downstairs rooms that members was the parlor where three of the Kell daughters were married. It still has the original furniture and the curtains that were hung in 1909. The room is a favorite wedding setting for many of today's brides that descend the winding stairs into the parlor.

The docent who directed the tour said that the library downstairs speaks more of Frank Kell than any room in the house. At one time it contained more than 2,000 volumes of southwest history, all of which have been donated to a large historical library.

The five bedrooms upstairs speak of Mrs. Kell and the daughters. Two of them reek with sentimental interest. The master bedroom, according to the docent, was first occupied by the oldest daughter until her marriage, then the next oldest moved in until her marriage. Miss Willie Mae was the only daughter that never married.

The guest bedroom with its Brussels carpet, clothes and dolls of the early 1900s, brass bed draped with a bedspread made by Miss Willie Mae, who had discriminating taste, and partially covered with a fine quilt made by Mrs. Kell, has a wide range

A Texas Heritage program presented by Miss Linda Ayres on Jefferson, a community in East Texas and a living page of Texas history, highlighted the meeting. She said that it has charming antebellum homes, priceless antiques, a fine museum, the famous Excelsior Hotel and other historic buildings that have been carefully preserved and

The history-laden town, where the once navigable Cypress River flows past the business section, has 78 buildings that have the official Texas medallion, some of which are now en ered in the national register.

As she described the varied and interesting history of the town, the speaker noted that it was the first own in the United States to manufacture artificial ice and gas for carbonation. It was the first place in Texas to manufácture beer and the first meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention was held there.

Miss Ayres enhanced interest in the program by giving a detailed account of the story of Jay Gould, one of the prominent railroad tycoons, who put a curse on the town because the city fathers denied his request for a right of way for his railroad. She

said that it was ironic that his favorite railroad car found its resting place in he town and is a center of interest.

She gave an intersting account of the Diamond Bessie murder trial that was held there and said that Jefferson now presents a play that portrays the trial.

Miss Ayres said that Jefferson holds an annual pilgrimage the first week in May each year, the culmination of the hard work of the garden club and the entire city.

She closed with a movie presentation of several of the home and furnishings and other places of interest that are featured on the tour. These included The Museum, The Manor, Rowell House, Bluebonnet Farm, Freeman Plantation, House of Four Seasons and others.

Mrs. James Rinehart conducted the business. Members answered roll call by sharing names of Texas towns and cities where they had lived.

Trio arrested for theft

When police officer Dennis Lepak stopped a vehicle at 2:13 a.m. last Thursday, he didn't know he would turn up a stolen vehicle, as well as drug paraphernalia.

Lepak stopped the vehicle near the intersection of Johnson Road and US 287, and when he ran a check on the plates through the Department of Public Safety, the report came back that it was reported as stolen from Fort Worth.

He immediately took the three occupants, two white males and a black female, into custody. Later, drug paraphernalia, described as a small, portable laboratory, was found, but no drugs.

The city's March check was \$11,291.53, well above last year's \$9,269.45. The year's sum to date is now \$39,138.46, which is 25.54 percent above the same period in

Burkburnett's gain reportedly is 9.70 percent, Wichita Falls 8.24 percent, and Electra a minus 2.68 percent.

While the comptroller's explation is likely correct for cities of major corporations, Iowa Park's gain could reflect the expanded items and services made taxable last year by the state legislature.





School board gives personnel attention

Holliday school board focused its attention on personnel during Monday night's regular monthly meeting, awarding contracts to the majority of teachers while accepting resignations in high school and shuffling elementary personnel to accomodate the new state-mandated guidelines.

RESIGNATIONS ACCEPTED

Both the band director and assistant director, Mark Cartwright and Mark Bannister, resigned their posts, leaving the band department virtually without instructors. Also, girls athletic coach Jeannie Wilson submitted her resignation, which trustees approved.

Teachers, aides and secretaries in high school were also hired back for the 1985-86 school year, except for the vocational department, where board members agreed not to hire back head instructor Cal Gaulden for another year.

Superintendent Dan Owen, speaking of rumors currently circulating around the school district that the board was attempting to phase out the vocational agriculture program in Holliday, said the rumors are absolutely foundless, explaining that the board's decision was based on Gaulden's unsatisfactory evaluations on job performance and general attitude. "We have not made any plans on cutting it (vocational agriculture) out or cutting it back," Owen responded.

In the elementary level, grades kindergarten through sixth, all teachers were hired back for the next school year. In addition, Sue Richter, kindergarten teacher, was hired as an additional lower grade teacher, and Sandy Riddles, aide, was also hired to teach the lower grades.

The hiring of additional elementary personnel was done to meet

guidelines in HB-72 and the teacher-student ratio. All lower grade teachers were hired based on recommendations from principal Carol Magee.

In the middle school, grades seven and eight, all teachers and aides were hired back based on recommendations from principal Jake Cottrell. The board also named Cottrell as principal and teacher for the 85-86 school year, removing the experienced athletic instructor from coaching completely. He will teach social studies.

High school personnel other than Wilson, Gaulden, Cartwright and Bannister were hired back based on recommendations from principal Bill Lee, including secretaries and aides. All maintenance and cafeteria workers were also hired back, based

on recommendations from Owen.

The board also voted to add two additional personnel units in high school next year to meet guidelines in Chapter 75 for curriculum. Owen said the teachers will be hired to teach social studies, English or math, or a combination.

Trustees did not announce the salaries, wanting to first work up a preliminary budget for the coming year before earmarking the funds available. The board hopes to address salaries during its April meeting.

He makes wind music

Among the 67 participants in the 11th annual Sikes Senter Mall Art and Craft Show, to be held Mar. 21.23, is an Iowa Parkan who is patiently waiting until 1987 so he can retire and start a new industry here.

John Fecher has been in the Postal Service since 1959. But during that time, he's been involved in a number of off-duty projects that have both consumed his time and supplemented his income.

He has, the past five years, been producing various size wind chimes which are marketed throughout the southwestern states. His plans are to go into the business full time, after he retires from the Postal Service, and hopefully will create numerous new jobs in the community.

Fecher was raised in Wichita Falls, graduating high school there. He and his wife, Eleanor, moved here in 1961. He has been assigned to various areas of Wichita Falls and Sheppard AFB in his postal carrier job, and currently is working out of the University

More than 20 years of off-duty work has been in the house painting business. He still does a few jobs, but is about out of that phase.

Then he became interested in photography and began taking pictures at weddings. A major portion of his back yard on South Bell Road was consumed by a building he constructed, to serve as his studio and dark room.

In late 1980, Fecher had to undergo surgery on a knee. It was during his

recuperating time that his wife said she wanted a wind chime. So he undertook building one, and it was during that project that he discovered his interest.

He now devotes about 20 hours a week in production of the five models he has cataloged, and markets about 350 sets of chimes annually.

His models range in pipe length from 10 to 28 inches. They're attractive and musical.

His products will be on display at the Art and Craft Show, which is sponsored by the Sheppard Art League, during regular mall hours of 10 a.m. to 9 p.m.

Also displaying their products will be artists from throughout Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas and Florida.





Cook of the Week

In a household where both husband and wife work, it is almost essential that the meals be both quick and easily reheated. This week's cook, Leslie (Mrs. Jerry) Pruett, has submitted recipes such as this.

Leslie and her husband are both employed by Wichita County where she is a tax deputy. She has lived in Iowa Park all her life with the exception of a few months shortly after she married.

Of the three main dishes Leslie submitted, all are hearty and can be easily reheated. One dish in particular, the ONE DISH DINNER, requires little attention while it cooks and is practically a meal in itself.

ONE DISH DINNER

- 3 lbs. hamburger meat
- 5 med. potatoes 4 or 5 carrots
- 1 can French onion soup
- 1 can water

Place hamburger meat in roaster just as it comes from the package. Bake uncovered for 30 minutes and drain off all grease. Place potatoes and carrots (quartered or cut) around the partially cooked meat. Pour can of soup over all. Add 1 soup can hot water. Cover and cook until potatoes and carrots are tender.

LAYERED PUDDING DELIGHT

- 14 whole graham crackers 1 pkg. (6-serving size) vanilla instant pudding mix
- 2 cups cold milk
- 1 cup thawed Cool Whip
- 1 can (21 oz.) cherry pie filling

Line 9-inch square pan with whole graham crackers, breaking crackers if necessary. Prepare pudding mix with

milk as directed on package for pudding. Let stand 5 minutes, then blend in whipped topping. Spread half the pudding mixture over the crackers. Add another layer of crackers; top with remaining pudding mixture and crackers. Spread cherry pie filling over top layer of crackers. Chill 3 hours. Makes 9 servings.

- 3 tablespoons cornstarch mixed with 1/4 cup water

Finely chopped parsley

In an 8 to 10-quart kettle over medium heat, melt 4 tablespoons of the butter; add onion and celery and cook, stirring occasionally, until onion is very soft (about 10 minutes).

Add potatoes, the 1/4 cup parsley, 1/2 teaspoon of the salt, 1/4 teaspoon of the pepper, and broth. Bring to a boil; cover, reduce heat, and simmer until potatoes are tender when pierced (about 30 minutes).

Stir in milk and cook, covered, until soup is heated through (do not boil). Stir cornstarch mixture and add to soup. Continue cooking and stirring until soup boils and thickens (about 5 minutes). Season with more salt and pepper, if desired.

Just before serving, pour into a soup tureen, float remaining butter (about 2 tablespoons) on top, and sprinkle with parsley. Makes 6 to 8 servings.







NUTRITION AND EXERCISE REDUCE STROKE MORTALITY

The decline in stroke mortality in the United States may be due to better nutrition and more exercise on the part of many Americans, according to Kenneth Manton, PhD, from Center of Demographis Studies, Duke University, Durham, N.C. The stroke-related deaths declined by 46% from 1968 to 1981. Dr. Manton says this trend will continue. Effective clinical management of hypertension and prompt treatment of cerebrovascular disease also have reduced stroke mortality. But although deaths from cerebrovascular disease has dropped, it is still the third leading cause of death in the United States.



Hunting limited at city lakes

In response to inquiries about hunting at Iowa Park's two lakes west of town, shotguns only may be used to hunt birds, but only when the birds are in season.

Numerous inquiries have been made to various officials recently, concerning firing of guns at Lakes Iowa Park and Buffalo.

Under "Article Two, Parks and Playground Rules and Regulations," three paragraphs refer to hunting and firing of arms at the lakes. They are:

"(a) The discharge of any rifle, side arm, compressed air gun or air gun on park property owned by the city is prohibited except for hunting as authorized herein.

"(b) Shotguns only may be used for hunting on lake property wholly owned by the city, but located outside the city limits, for the taking of game birds during season. Discharge of shotguns outside of season is strictly prohibited. The taking of game birds shall be strictly in accordance with the general laws of the state, as the same are, or may be amended, as outlined by the state game and fish commission.

"(c) All firearms are prohibited on those easement properties surrounding the lakes. Persons trespassing on easement properties will be subject to prosecution by the owner."

The ordinance, number 236, was passed in November, 1976.





student must pass all academic classes - with a grade of 70 or above in order to be eligible to participate in extracurricular activities. These activities include athletics, drama, music, literary, 4-H, Future Homemakers of America, Future Farmers of America, and Office Education Association, as well as others.

The legislation entails that a

If a student receives one or more failing grades in one six weeks grading period, he or she is ineligible to participate for the next six weeks.

Bob Dawson, principal of Iowa Park High School, feels that this system is too strict. He said, "Before the ruling came into effect, students had to be passing four out of seven classes four days prior to an (extracurricular) event. I thought that was slightly lenient. Now the student must pass all seven course

the prior six weeks to be eligible. It's too difficult. It has gone from one extreme to the other.'

Although the ruling has affected Iowa Park schools, they have not been hard-hit. Organization sponsors indicate 66 participants are failing. However, because some students may be participating in more than one activity, the number of failing students may be fewer than 66.

The number of students failing in each activity are: FFA, 16; band, 10; choir (both chorale and A Cappella), 17; tennis, 8; boys and girls track, 11; baseball, one; and FHA, 14.

A total number of 330 students were registered to participate in extracurricular activities.

Of 346 junior high students participating in extracurricular activities, 49 students were reported as failing. This includes boys and girls athletics, 21; tennis, seven; band,

four; and choir, 17.

The total number of high school and junior high students failing was not available

Local educators agree that the problem is not in learning, but in completing assignments. "Ninety per cent of our failures are not having learning problems," said Dawson, "but are just not doing their outside class work and turning it in."

Also he said, "We're not having any more failures now than we did last year, even with an additional class each day and raising the passing grade five points (from 65 to 70)."

Although Dawson feels that the ruling "puts a great amount of pressure on the student and on the teacher in the classroom," he doesn't think that it will discourage students from participating in extracurricular activities.

The well is designated as the No. 2 Sullivan, pumping oil at the rate of 59


barrels per day. Drillsite is in a 20-acre lease in the H&TC Survey, Section 82, Block 14. Bottomed at 2,350 feet, the well will
