

Fund drive launched for city improvements

Directors of the Community Improvement Project have launched an aggressive campaign to establish a "Sustaining Fund" to help finance Phase One.

Phase One is the beautification of Iowa Park's business district, which will include creation of two parks in burned-out areas, fencing off vacant lots, sidewalk improvements, planter boxes for sidewalks, and improvements of plants in the median on Park Street.

Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce board of directors voted Monday to serve as fiscal agent on the project, which will include receiving of donations and disbursements of funds

spent on improvements. Serving as directors of the Community Improvement Project are Mayor Tim Hunter, chairman, Kenneth Via, Bob Hamilton, Tommy Key, L.W. Teel and Rip Smith.

"We believe that the business area is the key to the economic revitalization of our community," said Hunter. "If we can create what we envision for the business area, the investment will more than return to residents their donations through increased economic activity that should spawn a broader tax base, more salaries and convenience to shoppers."

The Gold Charter Members will be those who donate \$1,000 or more, and their names will be inscribed on a plaque to be displayed at the

Chamber of Commerce. Silver Charter Members will be designated for those who donate \$500 or more; Charter Members will be the designation for \$100 or more donations and those donating \$25 will be named Sponsoring Members.

Records of tax deductible gifts to the Sustaining Fund will be kept by the Chamber of Commerce, enabling donors to make periodic donations through the coming month and climb from one level of membership to

"We hope not only individuals and businesses become interested in our program but the many service clubs in Iowa Park will also," Hunter said. "We would like to see a total involvement in this program from churches, clubs, retired persons, school clubs, residents and even children and former residents who still call Iowa Park their home.

"We know that improvements to the business area will eventually lead to improvements for the entire town. We can paint our own future however bright we want it to be if we simply work together for our hometown,' Hunter said.

Tax collector aggressive on delinquent accounts

Iowa Park city and school tax collector Allen Shewmake is aggressively seeking money owed to the local political entities, including collecting from a former delinquent tax attorney.

Shewmake said he received a check for \$978 Friday from Jack Hart, of Mays and Hart in Greenville, and an additional amount is coming.

The amount paid was listed in an early correspondence with the attorney, according to Shewmake, but about \$200 more is still owed and Hart has reportedly indicated he will

The shortage was disclosed at last week's school board meeting, when Shewmake said the former school's attorney for delinquent tax collections had failed to pay court costs. Because the payments had not been made, those who had been filed on still did not have clear titles, which has caused several problems to the owners, Shewmake said.

Twenty-one suits were filed Thursday of last week, and 50 more are coming, now that the 1984 delinquent list has been turned over to the new attorney. Taxes for 1984 became delinquent in February, according to state law.

Those not paying their delinquent taxes by July will be assessed a 33-percent penalty, and letters are being mailed to the taxpayers to notify them, Shewmake said.

At last week's meeting, Shewmake said 93.47 percent of the current year's school taxes had been paid, and 92 percent of the city's taxes.



ACHIEVEMENT TESTING

Effective educational measurement and evaluation has become increasingly important in today's schools. There is a growing concern about students' mastery of the basic skills and their ability to function adequately in society. There is concern, too, about whether all students are learning and functioning as well as they are able to.

Annual achievement testing of Iowa Park students is scheduled for the week of March 25-29. The Comprehensive Test of Basic Skills (CTBS) will be administered to all students in grades 1 through 8. The series is designed to measure achievement in the basic skills commonly found in state and district

curricula. The tests provide information about the relative ranking of students against a norm group as well as specific information about the instructional needs of students. The subject areas measured are reading, spelling, language, mathematics, and reference skills.

Students in grades 2, 4, and 6 will also be taking the Test of Cognitive Skills (TSC). This is an academic aptitude test that measures general knowledge and skills not usually directly taught in school that have been shown to predice academic achievement. They are especially useful when used in conjunction with achievement tests.

Computerized test results will be sent home to parents later in the spring. Parents are encouraged to contact their child's teacher or counselor if they have questions concerning the scores. Overall district results will be communicated to the local school board to aid in the assessment of the education program.

Over a period of time, deterioration takes place and it can go almost unnoticed unless we step back and take a fresh, objective view.

Take the Leader's office, for instance. I knew it wasn't looking too good, but after we painted the walls Saturday, there was no comparison with the improvement.

Our old ceiling, which has allowed gallons and gallons of rain water to flow through it, will soon be replaced, along with our lighting system. And after that, we plan some exterior improvements.

But, like our building has deteriorated, so have parts of our business community. Several businesses have made improvements, others are planning to make them, and some haven't had the first thought to do a thing.

At the same time, we have some vacant areas that need some beautification, sidewalks that need replacing and others just plain old sweeping, and things in general some sprucing.

The Business Area Improvement project, mentioned on the front page this week, is important to our community. One of the most common suggestions made at a public meeting on the subject was the need for more businesses in Iowa Park.

The committee working on the situation feels we would have no success by just inviting new businesses to come here. Rather, we feel we must create a demand for them to locate in Iowa Park.

And the only way we can create such a demand is to improve the economic climate of the business district. In other words, create more trade than our existing businesses

So our first step is to try to create a pleasant atmosphere for shopping. We want to do this by simple cosmetic methods of hiding unattractive areas with fences, creating gardens, cleaning our businesses. In general, we want to encourage people to visit our business area because it is a pleasant place to be.

If we can accomplish this, in the first phase of the community improvement project, we feel we can create a pride among our residents. And we feel that pride will be carried over to homes, public buildings, public areas and the overall

We can make this project work, but we must be willing to work, donate, suggest, communicate and encourage.

There'll be a lot more reported on the project as things progress and goals accomplished.



Social Security

News APPLYING FOR RETIREMENT

OR SURVIVORS BENEFITS A person who plans to retire

before age 65 should apply for Social Security benefits no later than the last day of the month he or she wants the benefits to begin.

Benefits payable for months before the person becomes age 65 usually can begin no earlier than the month of application. This also holds true for widows and widowers who will receive benefits before age 65; however, widows and widowers can still receive a benefit for the month of a worker's death if they apply during the following month.

In general, a person who applies for retirement or survivors benefits after reaching age 65 can receive payments for up to six months before the month of application. It is possible to apply as early as three months before the month benefits are to start. This will help assure that the first payment is received on time.

Applicants for Social Security benefits should bring to the Social Security office their own social security card or a record of their number, and, if their claim is based on another person's record, that person's social security number; proof of age; a marriage certificate if the application is for a wife's, widow's, or widower's benefits; children's birth certificates if application is being made for them; and Form W-2 for the last two years or, if self-employed, copies of the last two Federal income tax returns.

Show on April 27 in Stanford. At 7 p.m. Barbara Cornelius, County Extension Agent will present the program "Time Management."


