Little interest shown in April 6 elections

If interest in elections is indicated by the number of absentee votes cast, there likely won't be many voters turn out at the polls April 6 to vote in the city and school elections.

As of yesterday, only three ballots had been turned in at the city and school absentee polls.

Tuesday will be the last day absentee voting can be done in person, and next Thursday morning is the deadline absentee ballots can be received by mail.

Absentee voting poll in the city election is the city hall, and the administration building is the school's

Four candidates are on the city ballot, though only three places are open. Candidates in the at-large race are newcomers Andy Arrington and Diane Robnett, and incumbents George Johnny Coker and Hammonds. Lita Watson decided not to seek re-election.

The three receiving the greatest number of votes will be declared the

There are five candidates in this year's school trustee election, and this will be the first year candidates will seek a numbered position on the board. In other words, one candidate

will oppose another candidate, instead of the old system of at-large voting.

Incumbent Ray Hicks is being challenged by James Richter for place one. Martha Dudley is seeking re-election for place three, and Bob Goodknight is attempting to unseat

Roy Boutwell is unopposed for place two.

Also on the city's ballot is an unbinding referendum, seeking voters' opinions on whether handicapped property owners should be given a tax deduction on their homes.

Aldermen give approval on donations billing

City aldermen Monday night formally approved collections of donations for a Christmas decorations fund, heard final plans for the new library renovation and took a stand on proposed legislation affecting signs and billboards.

A resolution was approved permitting city hall to put a voluntary assessment of at least 10-cents on each monthly water bill. The money will be used in the future to purchase, maintain and replace Christmas decorations.

Proposal of the project was made earlier this month by Mrs. Phil Welch, who said it had been outstanding and successful in Dumas.

Collection of the 10-cents on water bills must be voluntarily paid by water customers of the city. That is a

requirement, according to legal research by city staff. Persons not wishing to donate the 10-cents can contact city hall and it will not be included on the billing.

Administator James Barrington told the council he has a problem printing the words "voluntary assessment" on the bill forms currently used, but it can be done on future printings of the forms. Possibly an adjustment in the computer program will allow such an entry when bills are prepared, he told the council.

Voluntary donations are not limited to 10-cents monthly. Residents wishing to make regular donations to the fund can also inform city hall and the agreed amount will be printed on

Architect Don Daugherity showed final drawings and plans for renovation of the Burnett home for use as a library. Advertisement was begun last week for bids on the project by contractors. Six contractors had already picked up plans, he

The original cost estimate of \$262,000 has been raised to about \$300,000, Daugherity told the council.

Numerous items listed in the project will be included as alternates in the bidding, such as the parking lot and 50 chairs for the upstairs meeting

Anticipated completion of the project is early October.

The state legislature is considering drafting a state law limiting the use of billboards.

Aldermen adopted a resolution stating, in part, "The proposed billboard legislation is not in the best interest of the citizens of Texas because of the threat it poses to the doctrine of local self determination," meaning such restrictions should be left up to the cities themselves.

Other business attended to by the council included:

* heard a report by Barrington concerning legal action to have the old Overbey House removed from city property at Fourth and West Highway:

* approved a testing of new parking lane markers to determine if concrete parking blocks might be removed;

* received a request from Bill Spruiell to permit a tap on the water transmission line from Wichita Falls, to serve future homes to be built on

the Grozier Farm east of town; * and heard a report by Barrington on the second of three required public hearings in Austin on a request to permit affluent from the city's sewage treatment plant as irrigation on a proposed golf course north of town.

Soundproof the bedroom, Loud noises (from airplanes, trucks, sirens, etc.) may awaken you many times a night without your being aware of it. The result? A poor night's sleep. Heavy drapes and reiling tiles may help.

Don't keep the bedroom too warm. Sleeping in an excessively warm room causes sleep fragmentation - passing from one stage of sleep to another too fast. If sleep is fragmented, you won't feel refreshed when you wake up. Have a light snack before going to bed. Hunger will disturb sleep. What's more, milk and some other foods contain the amino acid 1-tryptophan, a precursor of serotonia, which may help induce sleep.

Avoid caffeine in the evening. Coffee, tea and colas may not prevent you from falling asleep, but they will cause sleep fragmentation.

Don't have a nightcap. Contrary to popular belief, alcohol does not promote sleep. It may help you go to sleep, but the quality of sleep that results will

Don't go to bed worried about not sleeping. Then you surely won't fall asleep. Stay up for awhile.

Don't smoke. Chronic use of tobacco disrupts sleep.



SODA-JELLO CAKE

Bake a white cake mix. When cool, punch holes every two inches with handle of a wooden spoon. Pour prepared Jello and one can of soda pop (any flavor) on top of cake. Put in refrigerator.

Pour soup over all ingredients (do not dilute soup). Cover pan with foil and place in oven. Bake at 400 degrees an hour and 15 minutes.

Combine beans, milk, soup, pepper and 1/2 can of onions. Spray 11/2 qt. casserole with Pam. Pour in bean mixture. Bake uncovered at 350 degrees 30 minutes. Top with remaining onions and bake 5 minutes longer.

- 2 cups soft bread crumbs
- 1/2 cup grated cheese
- 1/4 cup melted butter 1/2 tsp. salt
- 6 cube steaks
- 1 cup brown gravy Combine bread crumbs, cheese, butter and salt. Top each steak with

mixture. Roll up steak like a jelly roll and fasten with toothpick. Brown in oil; add gravy, cover and simmer 20 minutes. Serve with rice or noodles.

CREAM CHEESE SWIRL BROWNIES

- 1 pkg. Fudge Brownie Mix 1 pkg. cream cheese, softened

Heat oven to 350 degrees. Grease oblong pan, 13x9x2 inches. Prepare Brownies as directed, except spread ²/₃ of the dough in pan. Beat cream cheese and butter in small mixer bowl on medium speed until fluffy, beat in sugar gradually; beat in remaining ingredients until smooth. Spread over dough in pan. Drop remaining by

tablespoons onto cream cheese mixture: swirl lightly with spatula for marble effect. Bake 35 to 40 minutes.

Cool. Cut into 11/2 inch squares

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Tori are boney bumps or projections from the sides of the gums, or they may be found at the center of the roof of the mouth.



Tori are not cancerous or malignant tumors. They are similar to a knot on a log and made up of very hard white bone. The gum tissue is very thin when stretched over the tori and usually appears whitish and

Tori may be very small or very large. Sometimes they project toward the tongue at the front of the lower jaw and can actually touch each other.

Tori are easy to abrade or skin and many people have trouble when they eat hard things like tortilla or potato chips. If they are too large the tori must be removed in order for the natient to wear dentures.

If you check your mouth and find a swelling that is softened or whitish colored and perhaps ulcerated-see your dentist - it's not a tori.


