Aldermen, trustees to be elected Saturday

Three city aldermen and three school trustees will be elected by voters Saturday.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. at Kidwell and Bradford elementary schools for city voters.

The same polls and hours will be open for school voters, with the addition of a third poll at the old Valley View campus.

Only eight absentee votes were cast in the elections this year, possibly indicating a light turnout. Tuesday was the final day for

absentee voting.

This year is the first time school voters will be asked to decide on candidates by place, rather than at large. The board made the change last fall.

All three incumbents are seeking re-election to the board, but only two are being contested.

Ray Hicks is being challenged by James Richter for place one; Martha Dudley is challenged by Bob Goodknight for place two, and Roy Boutwell is unchallenged.

Voting in the city election will still be at-large, with three of the four candidates receiving the most votes being declared winners.

Candidates include two incumbents, Johnny Coker and George Hammonds, as well as newcomers to city politics, Diane Robnett and Andy Arrington.

Lita Watson is not seeking re-election.

Also on the city ballot is a referendum, asking voters if they

granting a tax exemption for the disabled.

The referendum question is: "Shall the City of Iowa Park, Texas, grant a

\$3,000 exemption from property value for ad valorem taxes to individuals who are considered disabled for purposes of payment of

disability insurance benefits under the Federal Old Age, Survivors and Disability Insurance, to be effective January 1, 1986."

City, school leaders to meet next week

Canvassing of Saturday's election results and administering of oaths to the victors will be a part of both the city and school meetings next week.

City aldermen will meet at 7 p.m. Monday in council chambers and trustees will meet at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday in the school administration building.

Following the administering of oaths to city aldermen will be the appointment of a mayor pro-tem, council member appointment to the library board, and also a resolution authorizing check signing.

Two public appearances are on Monday's agenda. Developer Ray Townsend will ask permission to construct his part of East Garden Street, to meet asphalt requirements under former standards set by the city. Also Andy Arrington will request water service to East Emerald, an area not inside city limits.

The first of two required public hearings concerning application for a community development block grant will be held. Allied to the subject, aldermen will be asked to authorize a

contract for professional services for preparation of the grant application.

A resolution is to be proposed which would encourage the state legislature to oppose any bill which would mandate single-member districts for all general law charter cities.

Another resolution would seek support of the legislature for a bill which would create a state-wide licensing of electricians.

The fourth resolution aldermen will be asked to approve is to accept construction work on Fourth Street.

The final resolution would authorize members of the North Texas Library Association, of which Iowa Park is a member, to incorporate as a non-profit organization.

Mayor Tim Hunter is to read a proclamation establishing May 1-7 "Respect for Law Week" in Iowa Park, a project of the Optimist Club.

Administrator James Barrington is to report on a suit pending on removal of a house at Fourth and West Highway, on which a court hearing is set for tomorrow.

Aldermen will be asked to approve authorization to tap the water

transmission line between here and Wichita Falls for service to the Grozier Farm, east of town, requested at the last meeting by Bill Spruiell.

Authorization will also be asked for travel expenses for Barrington to attend the Texas City Management Association meeting, as well as expenses for the mayor and other council members to attend a council member institute of the Texas Municipal League.

SCHOOL MEETING

Following the administering of oaths to board members who are elected Saturday, a reorganization of the board will be held.

Trustees are expected to take action to hire a new high school principal, and also accept some resignations of personnel.

Tax collector Allen Shewmake is to have a presentation on a proposed computer acquisition for the tax office.

Salaries for the 1985-86 school year for aides, maintenance, cafeteria, transportation and other support personnel will be set during the meeting.

School board searches for key administrators

The search is on to find two key administrators for the Iowa Park school system.

Members of the board of trustees were to hold a called meeting last night to interview candidates for high school principal, and applications will be accepted until April 10 for a new superintendent.

The positions opened this spring when Harold Cowley, superintendent, submitted his resignation effective June 30 to accept the superintendent's position at Talco-Bogata schools, and principal Bob Dawson announced his retirement at the end of the current year.

Trustees were to meet at 6:30 last evening to interview the seven candidates who applied for Dawson's position.

Two of the candidates are already in the local system. They are Richard Davis, vocational coordinator and student placement officer, and Don Ickles, assistant high school principal.

The other candidates are Mike Turner of Cisco, James Poole of Lockney, Gene Watson of Atlanta, Eddie Green of Muenster and Richard Gibson of Lolita.

Decision of the trustees for principal is expected to be finalized

and voted on at the board's meeting Monday.

With a deadline of April 18 for applicants to submit information requested for the superintendent's job, trustees are to meet the following day to screen, and interviews are to be held April 23, according to a format drafted for the search effort.

Employment is to begin July 1, but an earlier beginning date will be acceptable.

Notices of the opening have been sent to every regional service center in the state, and it is expected that every school will be notified by those centers, Cowley said.

Already seven requests for applications have been received, Cowley related, but only one has been returned.

Criteria established for consideration of applicants include four or more years of experience as superintendent of any size school, or four years or more experience as assistant superintendent of a 3-AAA school or larger.

Also required of applicants is the possession of the following:

* valid Texas certification for position of superintendent;

* above average record of academic and professional preparation -- an earned doctorate is not required but will be given consideration;

* broad based successful administrative experience in public schools and a knowledge of the superintendent, the staff and the community;

* personal and professional skills in planning, organizing, evaluating, communication and managing;

* comprehensive knowledge of public school instructional programs, Texas school law and applicable Texas Education Agency operational directives;

* above average knowledge of Texas school financing and budgeting procedures;

* respect among professional peers;

* good physical health;

* desirable traits in the areas of personal initiative, cooperation and self confidence;

* personal skills and characteristics which project a positive image of leadership; and

* a commitment for high standards in the areas of professional ethics, honesty and personal integrity.

TESTING Measuring local education

What quality of education are Iowa Park High School students receiving? How do they measure, when compared with graduates of other Texas schools, or with the averages reported nationally?

One of the ways such measures are made is through testing, with the use of the American College Test (ACT) or Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT).

The two tests are usually taken by college-bound students. While the SAT may be the more popular elsewhere, IPHS Counselor Herman Escue puts more faith in the ACT, because it breaks down the areas of education more than the SAT.

The SAT has two sections, one verbal and the other on mathematics. The ACT is broken down into four tests: English, mathematics, social studies, and science.

More Iowa Park students, over the past five years, have taken the ACT. But regardless of which test, Iowa Park students have normally made higher average grades than the averages both the state and national.

The five-year ACT average locally is 18.53; Texas 16.5, and national 18.4. Five-year SAT averages include: 931 local, 858 state and 893 national.

Over the past five years, 238 Iowa Park students have taken the ACT, while only 96 have been administered the SAT. The fact that Iowa Park students prefer the ACT over the SAT by almost a 5-2 margin indicates the interest in that particular test.

The averages reported do not include this year's testing, because they are currently being administered and results are not available.

Iowa Park's ACT scores are consistently higher than those averaged over Texas for the past five

years. When compared with national averages, the local scores were lower in two of those five years, but one was only slightly.

The 40 students taking the test in 1980-81 averaged 17.65, which was well above the state's 16.4 average,

but far below the national average of 18.5. The following year, with 57 students being tested here, the local score was 18.19. That again was above the state's 16.3, and just below the national 18.4.

Thirty-nine IPHS students took the ACT in 1982-83, and averaged 19.69. This compared with the state's 16.9 and national average of 18.3.

Considering the SAT scores, last year was the most disappointing and 1979-80 the best.

Only nine students took the SAT last year. They fell dramatically on the verbal test (381), and did little better on the math (426), for an average of 807. The state average was 866 and national 897.

In 1979-80, 17 local students took the SAT and scored an outstanding 1027 with a 486 on verbal and 541 on math. The state average that year was 871 and national 890.

In the five years the report covers, last year was the only year Iowa Park students failed to score in the 400s on the verbal exam.

More IPHS students took the SAT in 1980-81, 32, than any of the other four years of the report. That group scored a 443 on the verbal and 479 on math for a 922 accumulative. Students over Texas had 415-455 for 870, while national averages were 424-466 (identical to 1979-80) for 890.

Cryovac announces another expansion

The 15,000 square foot expansion currently underway on the east end of the Cryovac plant won't be completed before an even larger expansion project gets underway

The W.R. Grace and Company board of directors last month approved funds to add another 47,000 square feet of production, warehouse and office space. This will extend the east end of the

present structure.

In addition, a 6,000 square foot steel storage building will be located on the south end of the structure.

When completed by early July of this year, Cryovac will have some 385,000 square feet under roof in Iowa Park.

The building contract has been awarded to Electra Construction Co. of Electra, the firm currently adding on the 15,000 square feet.

Work is to begin immediately.

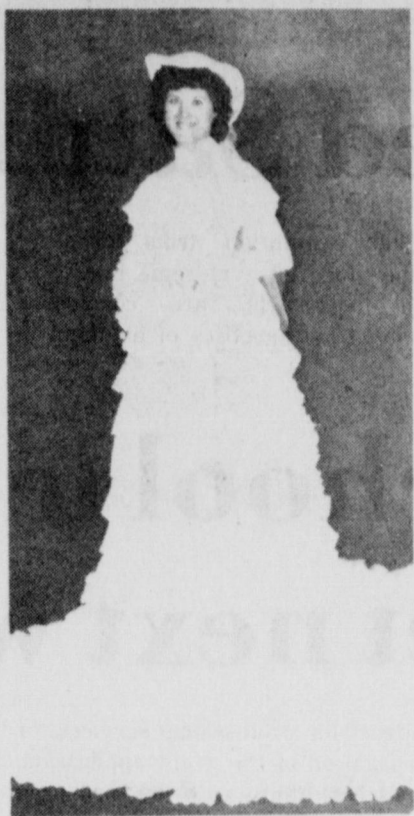
When the equipment installation is completed sometime in 1986, the latest expansion and equipment cost will be in excess of \$10 million.

"Minor adjustments" to employment are anticipated, occurring gradually over the next 18 months, according to plant manager Frank Gossett.

Cryovac currently has 482 employees.

Health Tips

SOME FOODS AND MEDICINE MAY NOT MIX WELL

Every drug is intended to work at a certain rate. When absorption is either accelerated or slowed down, a particular medication may not do what it's supposed to do. Interaction with certain foods can make a particular drug work faster, slower, or not at all.

The absorption of some drugs is affected by the presence of food in the stomach. For example, the calcium in dairy products inhibits the absorption of the antibiotic tetracycline. Calcium-containing antacids also have this effect. In contrast, citrus fruits and juices hasten the absorption of some iron pills.

Follow instructions. It matters whether you take your medicine at the prescribed time -- bedtime, morning, or after meals -- because of the timing and duration of the drug's action. Some are supposed to be used and eliminated quickly; others are intended to accumulate in the body. In writing a prescription, your doctor considers these factors.

How you can protect yourself:

- * Always ask your doctor or pharmacist if you should avoid taking any food or drink while taking a drug. Be sure they know all other drugs you take.
 - * Find out if a drug should be taken before, after, or during a meal.
 - * Do not drink alcohol while you are taking any drug, including aspirin and other over-the-counter medicines.
 - * Follow the instructions on each drug container label, including those on over-the-counter drugs.
 - * Don't take drugs with milk, soft drinks, or juice unless your doctor approves.
 - * Never put unlabeled drugs together; you might get confused about what each is for.
- Keep child-proof tops on medicines.

1 stick butter or margarine
2 eggs
Spread in bottom of buttered oblong cake dish, 9x13.
Topping:
1 lb. box powdered sugar
8 oz. Philadelphia cream cheese (softened)
2 eggs
Mix together and spread on top of cake mixture. Add nuts on top. Bake at 350 degrees, 35-40 minutes.

CHICKEN SPAGHETTI

8 oz. spaghetti
1/2 cup chopped onion
1/2 tsp. garlic
2 tbsp. butter
1 can each cream of chicken and cream of mushroom soup
2 tbsp. Hines steak sauce
1 cup milk
10 oz. shredded sharp Cheddar cheese
1 med. size chicken cooked & diced
1/2 - 4 oz. can pimientos (diced)
Salt & pepper to taste

Cook chicken and set aside. Cook spaghetti in chicken broth. Add water if necessary. Cook onion and garlic salt in melted butter 5 minutes. 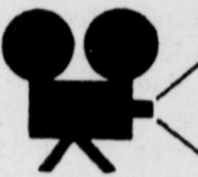

As I See It....

A couple of weeks ago, my column was centered on the topic of how things around us degenerate slowly into an unsightly mess, without our noticing.

The point still stands, but I hardly touched on how many improvements our community has experienced, and how much better off we are since they have occurred.

Iowa Park is a much more attractive community now than when we moved here back in 1969. The improvements are numerous.

For instance, the removal of the old hotel building that was crumbling from the corner of Cash and Wall was a major plus. The same goes for the displacement of an unsightly old metal building on the lot now occupied by Settle Drug. And the Texas Electric building is much prettier than the old wooden shack that was once a part of the old livery stable on West Park.

We've had numerous business owners to enhance the exteriors of their buildings. I'll lead off this topic by pointing to the Tanner-Aulds Funeral Home. Then, to the west, the buildings in the 100 block of West

Cash that include Homestead Ceramics, the MuleSkinners' Mule-Barn and Tommy Key's City Cleaners.

L.W. Teel really started something a few years ago when he bought the old Herald building. When the remodeling was completed, Park Pharmacy led the way for most of us to try to match.

State National Bank soon followed suit, and Shirley Rains' office made that block much more attractive.

Spruiell Drilling fixed their three buildings to a par with O.N. Newman's law office over on Wall. And it shouldn't go unmentioned that 16 years ago, the savings and loan building was in a shambles after being abandoned by the post office. Also Barbour Trucking has made vast improvements on East Highway.

The bank has been doing its part at Wall and Bank, where two old and unused service station structures have been cleared.

And I'll attempt to name all the attractive structures that have been built here in the past 16 years, all of which have improved the quality of our business community: State Farm

Insurance, Allsup, B&R Thriftway, Foix Garage, Harvey's Hamburgers, Ken's Pizza, Wal-Mart, Shaw Motor, B&B Car Wash, Dr. Pirkle's Clinic, Iowa Park Animal Clinic, Ayres Tire, Johnson Road Texaco, Yoder's Automotive Center, Dairy Queen, Iowa Park Air Conditioning and there are more.

A request has been made to the public for donations to the Business Improvement Fund, in care of the Chamber of Commerce.

This is not one of those "if it ain't broke, don't fix it" situations. Despite our community's many improvements, we do have some areas that are badly in need of improvement.

The donations will be used to enhance areas where funds are not available, such as trees, bushes and flowers for the median on Park Street, as well as some vacant and distracting lots in the business district. It would also be used to assist in painting of the old buildings facing the 100 block of West Highway, that have long been eyesores.

And planter boxes are scheduled to be placed on the sidewalks in the business district, as well as sidewalk improvements and other needed projects.

I've had several promises for donations, but they've not reached the bank yet. I know they will, soon, and I also believe the citizens of Iowa Park want to improve their community.

It's a simple reason: pride.

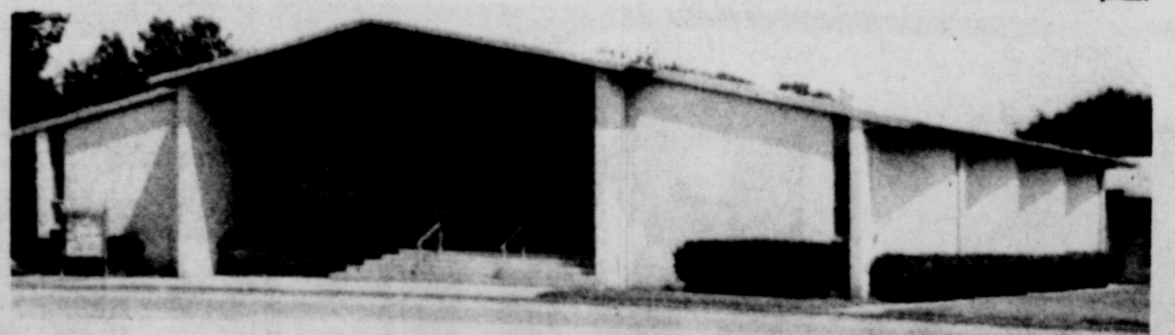

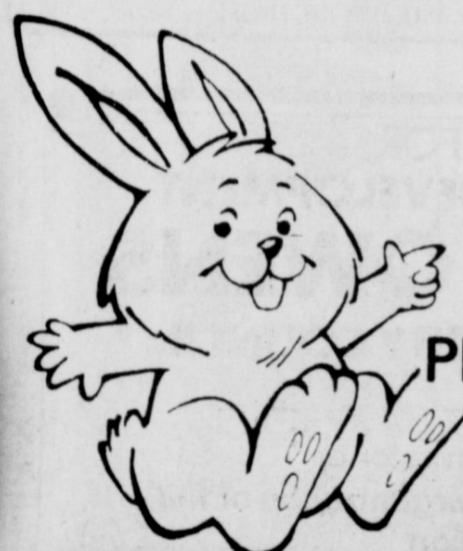

For Place 3 on the council, incumbent Jimmy Virdell will be

challenged by Glenn R. Wood, and, for Place 1 on the council, incumbent Jimmy Willis will be challenged by Roy Pursur.

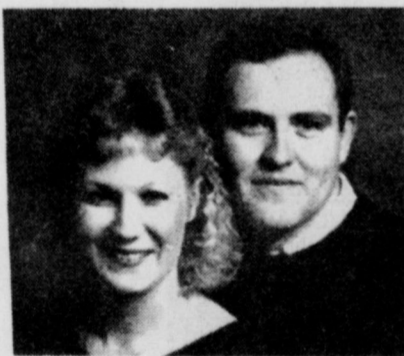
School board meeting reset

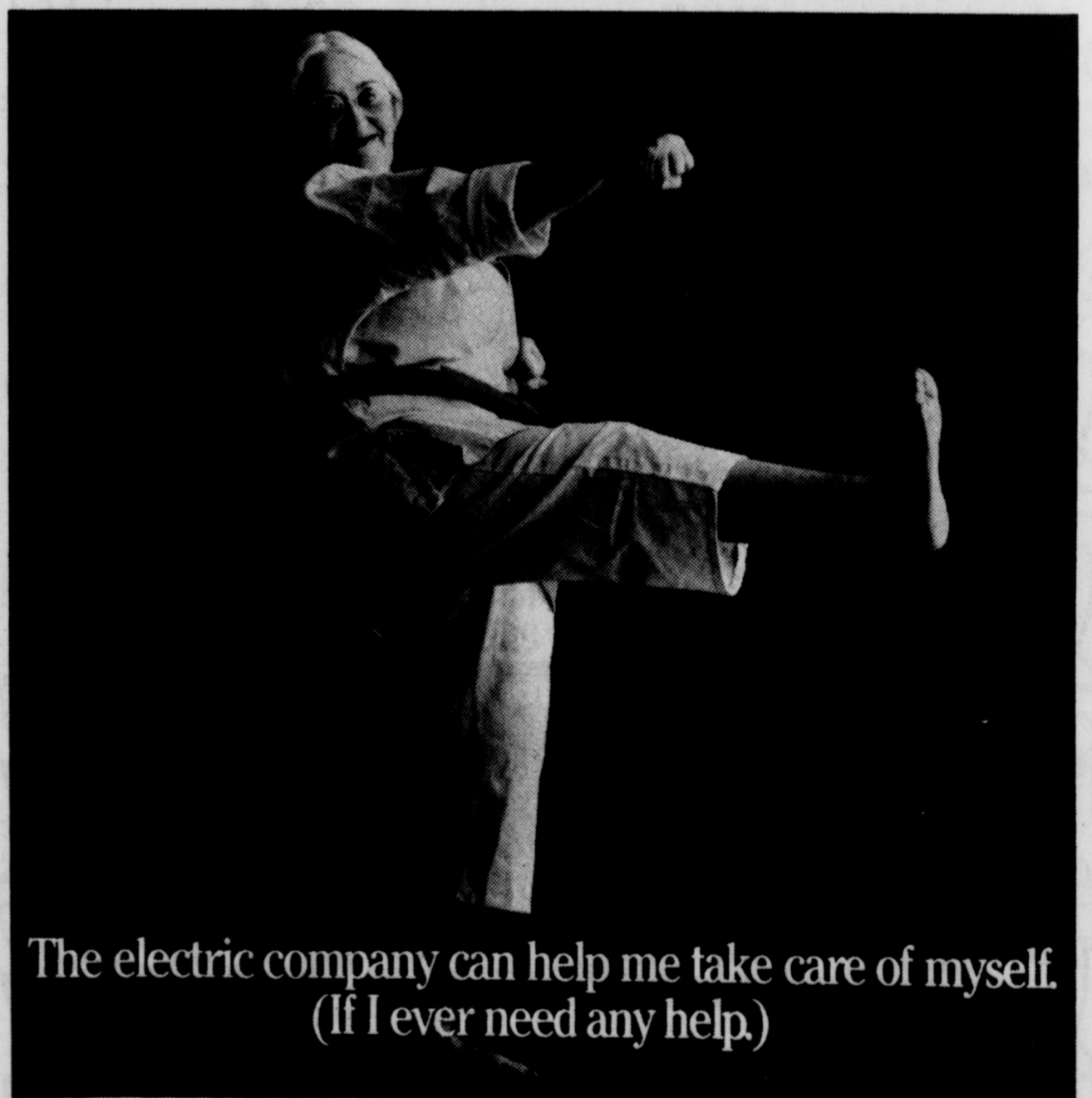

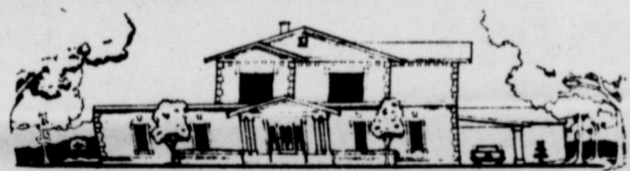

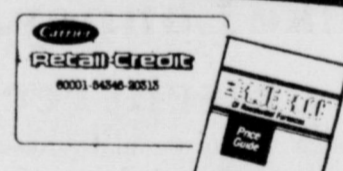

Both athletes are competing this spring on the track team. Davis runs both hurdle events and on relay teams, while Hill pole vaults and runs the open quarter.

Drillsite is six miles southwest of Burkburnett.

It was drilled to 1,708 feet total depth and will produce from an interval of 1,634 to 1,760 feet into the wellbore.

The location is in a 2,114-acre lease in the L.C. Denison Survey, A-55.

The well is located 3,140 feet from the east line and 1,050 feet from the north line of the lease.
