# 308 Pay Fines For Fishing Without Tags

Fishing violations topped the list of arrests made by game war-dens during the month of May, according to the report of the director of law enforcement of the Game and Fish Commission.

There were nearly 400 fishing arrests made by the wardens, with 308 of them for failure to have a license. The Texas license costs \$2.15 and is good for both fresh and salt water and for residents and non-residents alike

Although all legal game hunting has been closed for several months, there were several violations for killing quall, doves, ducks and even killing deer in the closed season.

The 448 persons arrested in May paid fines of \$7,596.45 plus court costs of \$852.

"We do everything we can to sublicize license requirements for the fisherman," the director said. "Despite the warnings, however, neople still take a chance on getting caught and many of them do. If you plan to fish outside your home county, or with a rod and reel anywhere and are over 16 and under 65 you'll need a license."

#### Use Care in Firing **Charcoal Briquettes**

Be careful when firing char-coal briquettes, says the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council. This major problem when cooking over an outdoor grill. Don't let an accident mar your family's enjoyment of an outdoor bar-

The Council cites two rules to observe when starting a char-coal fire: never use gasoline, either raw or in mixture, to kin-

#### Chiggers or Red Bugs Can Be Controlled

The chiggers in your lawn and the ticks that your pets bring into the yard need be tolerated into the yard need be tolerated no longer, says Extencion Entomologist James H. Hawkins. Most homemakers have a least one of these problems at some time during the year. Both pests create a problem in recreational areas, especially where wild animals are present to serve as hosts for the ticks, he said.

One application of a practical and safe insecticidal control is now available for use in controlling them. For ticks use 10 per cent DDT, 10 per cent chlordane or 2 per cent dieldrin dust at the rate of 20 to 25 pounds, or 20 per cent toxaphene dust at the rate of 10 to 15 pounds per acre where vegetation is sparse. Pacrease the dosage in heavy vegetation. If sprays are used, follow manufacturers directions for mixing. Apply at the rate of 15 to 25 gallons per acre to heavy vegetation, the entomologist said.
