The Burnetts were apparently returning home after having lunch at The Friendly Door, the senior citizen center in Iowa Park, when the accident occurred at approximately 12:40 p.m.

Traveling on FM 368, they were about to turn south at the Rocky Point Y, when a late model luxury car heading east on FM 367 failed to give right of way at the yield sign and crashed into their small, economy

The point of impact, according to signs on the pavement, was in the extracted from the car.

eastbound lane where Burnett had apparently swirved to the left to avoid the collision.

The Burnett car came to rest in the dich on the south side, facing the west. The other vehicle was spun 180 degrees and halted almost at the point of impact facing west.

According to a spokesman for the Department of Public Safety, charges are being prepared against the driver of the other vehicle, Jimmy Floyd Thompson of Vernon.

# Cheating at junior high blown out of proportion

A cheating incident at Iowa Park Junior High has resulted in a large portion of the eighth grade students being assigned extra work to be handed in before the end of school.

But while the majority of the class is involved, Principal Jimmy Alsup says the incident has been blown out of proportion because of misinformation published in the Wichita Falls newspaper.

Initial source of the situation is that hand-picked student aides had copied chapter review answers from a eacher's textbook, and distributed the answers to friends who, in turn, passed them on to others.

First notice of the situation was Thursday, when science teacher Karen Whisnand was having her students answer questions at the end of one chapter and saw a paper being passed across an aisle from one student to another.

The answers to the chapter questions were on the intercepted

Investigation by the principal and eacher determined that students who work in the library and others on the school annual staff knew of the eacher's textbook and at various imes they would copy the answers from it.

A teacher's textbook for every class in school is kept in the book room, according to Alsup. But the science book is the only one used for copying answers, he said.

The book room is kept under lock and key. Student aides, when needing into the room to work, used a key kept by Carolyn Richter, librarian.

Alsup said punishment for those who admitted participating in the cheating would be answering all 52 chapter reviews, with the work to be urned in by May 22. He would not give a figure on how many students were being punished, but said it was a large number.

# First Step history, purpose is explained

sergeant in the U.S. Air Force seven years and retired to become a mental health counselor for First Step, Inc., gave the program for the Thursday evening meeting of the Iowa Park Lioness Club. It was held at the Lions Club building and hosted by Mrs. Grover Cleveland and Mrs. Keith Aulds.

It now has six staff members, including a counselor and social worker besides he hotline volunteers, who took 800 calls from women of the area last year, the majority of these having children.

The speaker said that wife battering has no boundaries, it occurs a all economic groups, and crosses all educational levels. According to a sheet of facts she distributed, a woman is beaten every 18 seconds by men who come from battered homes for the most part and just consider it a way of life. The FBI estimates that one out of two women will be physically abused at some point in life by men with whom they live, and that many will not report it because of fear of reprisal.

The counselor discussed some of

he effects of family violence on children to include learning disabiliies, subject to anger and resentment, and the misfortune of having to grow up too soon.

In addition to the 24-hour crisis ho line and emergency shelter, the services of First Step include information and referral services, medical and legal referrals services, employment and law enforcement assistance, individual and support group counseling, and others.

and library aides. The library aides (or student helpers) are trained in the work of the library and also have had access to the keys to the book room. Students who are members of the annual staff have also, at times, had access to this room. May I stress that hese students are always handpicked: trusted, reliable, capable students. Perhaps we erred in crusting them too much or perhaps we placed too great a temptation before them. Whatever the cause, certain answers to Chapter Reviews

were copied from teacher's editions in one subject area. They were not test answers, as reported in the paper. Chapter reviews are counted as homework grades. Homework grades make up 1/6th of the total grade. Lab work counts 2/6ths and test grades count 3/6ths.

# Worth Quoting

When lightning strikes the barn, the fact that alligators are in the kitchen chewing on the occupant is often overlooked.

And that's about what is happening statewide on the reform education

The no-pass, no-play portion of HB 72 is drawing all the attention, all the publicity, all the crying-and state officials love it.

Because while the glare of publicity is on no-pass, no-play, parents and taxpayers have largely ignored the more serious consequence of the reform bill to the pocketbook.

The chewing of the alligators is about to reach the pocketbook-in Andrews and elsewhere across the

A combination of factors here in Andrews is about to bring about the largest tax increase in the school's

A loss in state aid of about a million coupled with a \$1.3 million increase in expenses means the local school district must come up with \$2.3 million in new taxes to maintain the status quo.

And since each 1c of tax rate generates about \$270,000, the local school board is looking at a tax increase of 9c to the existing rate of 40.5c. In dollars, that means about an 18 to 19 percent increase in your school taxes.

The increase will not apply to home of senior citizens because their taxes are frozen-under another reform education bill.

And many of the factors bringing about the tax increase are beyond the control of the local school board or school officials.

The move to take from those who have and give it to those who don't in the bill passed during last year's special session cost Andrews \$712,300. Some \$225,000 that was available this year from the building fund will not be available next year. So that is \$937,000 that must be made up locally.

HB 72 jumped beginning teacher salaries up all over the state and our neighbors in Odessa, Midland, Monahans, Crane, Denver City and elsewhere have bumped the salary of the beginning teacher to \$20,000 which is the figure established locally in order to remain competitive. After the first year, Andrews is still ahead of the ball game, salarywise.

A 3.5 percent increase in local teacher salaries for next year coupled with the same percentage increase in the step program for teachers will cost \$750,000 with teacher retirement payments costing another \$100,000.

Add in the costs for the three teachers needed for the state mandated new pre-kindergarten program, the three additional teachers mandated for high school math and science, and reading at middle school, and you've hit another million in costs.

And while the increases have largely been mandated by the state at the very time that state is taking funds away from school districts like Andrews, a growth factor is strictly a local situation.

Thirteen new teachers, at a cost of \$351,000, will be needed next year

#### GENERAL ENROLLMENT PERIOD ENDS SOON

March is the last month of the 1985 general enrollment period for people who failed to sign up for Medicare medical insurance at their first chance, John Bynum, Social Security manager in Wichita Falls said recently. There is a general enrollment period during the first 3 months of each year. Also eligible to enroll at this time are people who once had medical insurance but who dropped this protection. Medical insurance protection will start July 1, 1985, for people who sign up during he general enrollment period. The basic monthly premium for medical insurance is \$15.50 for the period ending December 1985. The basic premium is increased by 10 percent for each year a person could have had this protection but did not. The premium paid by those with medical insurance represents about onefourth of the costs. The remaining amount is paid by the Federal Government from general revenues. Medical insurance helps pay for doctors' services, outpatient hospital services, and many other items and services not covered by the hospital insurance part of Medicare. In general, after a person has had \$75 in approved charges for covered medical expenses in a year - the annual deductible - medical insurance will pay 80 percent of the approved charges for any additional covered services a person has during the rest

of the year.

because of an increase in enrollment of 260 students. That's a factor that no one, locally or at the state level, can do anything about.

Lump what the state says do with what must be done locally to maintain a quality school district with the same programs and the bottom line is \$2.3 million in new taxes.

And the alligators could bite even higher. Every time the price of crude drops a dollar, it costs the state of Texas about \$100 million in revenue. But the same drop costs the school district in Andrews roughly \$100,000.

Consequently, local taxpayers have more than a passing interest in the price of West Texas intermediate crude-the higher the price, the lower the alligators remain.

Many of the financial aspects of HB

72 were designed to switch state funds away from the richer school districts to those who were poorer and to big city schools.

Those districts were jubilant last year over the extra funds that dropped into their laps. Now those same districts are realizing that silver linings are often accompanied by thunderstorms.

The state mandated reforms in public education will cost them more next year than they received. Dallas. Houston, and San Antonio are finding out that not all the fiscal alligators reside in oil-rich West Texas.

Like most reform movements the cure oftentimes is worse than the disease.

# Cook of the Week

Today, chicken is probably the most universally eaten of all meats including beef. It is singularly versatile, good broiled, fried, roasted, baked, steamed, fricassed, barbecued, used in casseroles and stews, made in chicken pie or soup.

According to one writer who gave he history of chicken, it seems that man has had a close association with i since B.C. 2000, beginning in India where the red jungle fowl was first domesticated. A cookbook that appeared in Italy between 1266 and 1290 contained recipes for stuffed chicken and chicken soup. German cookbooks, a little later, gave directions for making chicken stew.

Americans certainly have a high appreciation of chicken and perhaps he majority of them preferred it fried. A high opinion of the fowl is implied in many countries today. Citizens of Rome make roast capon heir festive dish at Christmas, and he citizens of Brussels like it so well hat they have won a nickname "chicken guzzlers." It also appears in many national dishes, and chicken dishes have been named for an opera singer, opera composer and a Roman dictator.





#### Bill would prohibit forced consolidations

Rep. Charles Finnell voted this week to approve a resolution that proposed a constitutional amendment prohibiting the state from forcing the consolidation of school districts. HJR 33, by Bill Haley, D-Center, passed

Approval of a proposal for a constitutional amendment requires at least 100 votes in the House of Representatives. If approved by the Senate, the proposed amendment would be placed on a general election ballot on Nov. 5, 1985 for public approval.

While current statutory law already prohibits forced consolidation Finnell believes small rural school discricts need the protection afforded by the Texas Constitution. The amendment would permit consolidaion only if the plan were approved by he affected school boards and voters f each school district.
