Kamay woman killed in two-car

A two-vehicle accident shortly before 1 p.m. Tuesday southwest of Iowa Park took the life of a Kamay woman.

Mrs. Clifton "Shorty" Burnett, 81, was declared dead at the scene as result of injuries sustained in the collision. Her husband was also injured and taken to Bethania Hospital for treatment and observation.

The Burnetts were apparently returning home after having lunch at The Friendly Door, the senior citizen center in Iowa Park, when the accident occurred at approximately 12:40 p.m.

Traveling on FM 368, they were about to turn south at the Rocky Point Y, when a late model luxury car heading east on FM 367 failed to give right of way at the yield sign and crashed into their small, economy sized car.

The point of impact, according to signs on the pavement, was in the

eastbound lane where Burnett had apparently swirled to the left to avoid the collision.

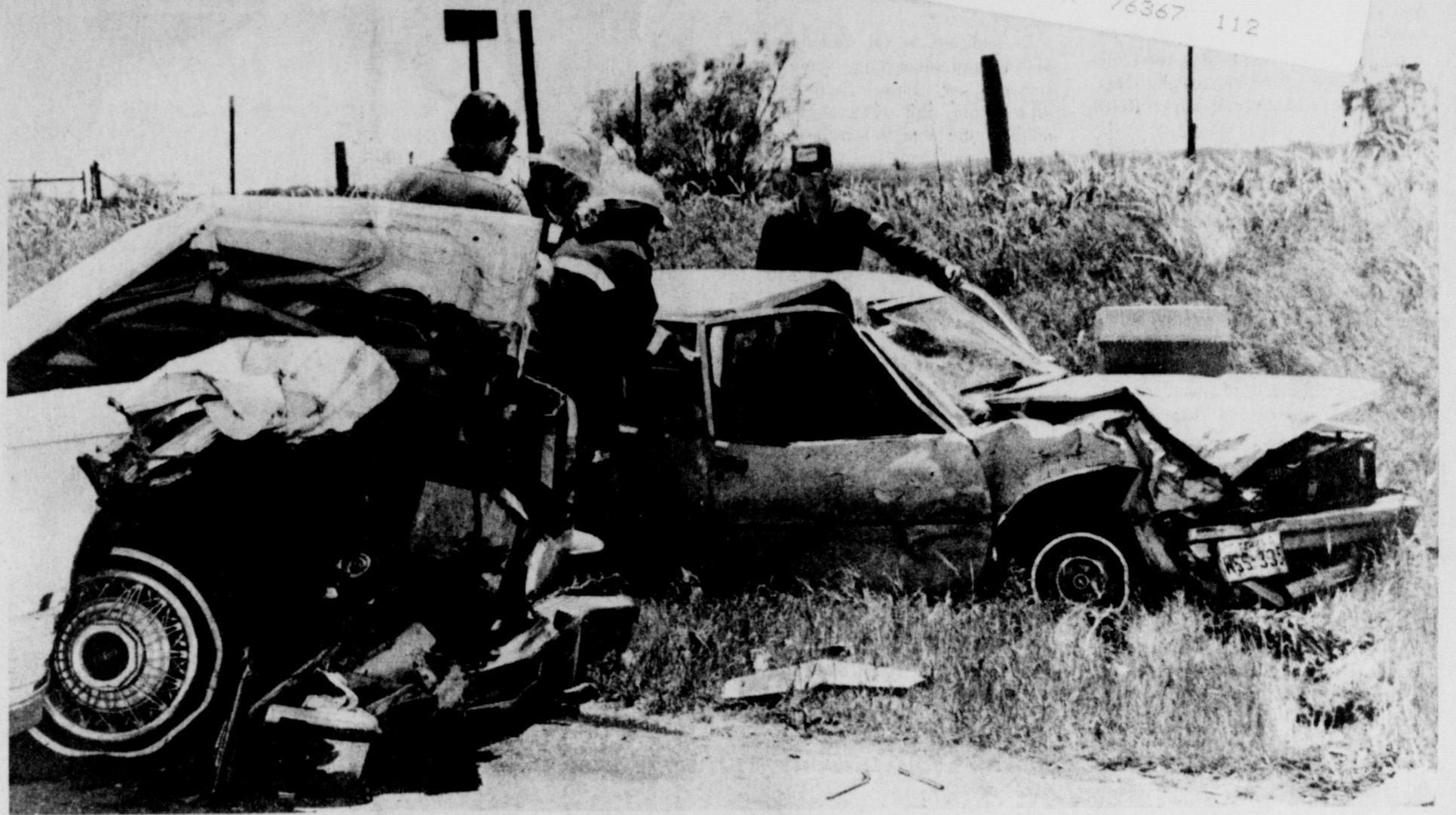
The Burnett car came to rest in the ditch on the south side, facing the west. The other vehicle was spun 180 degrees and halted almost at the point of impact facing west.

According to a spokesman for the Department of Public Safety, charges are being prepared against the driver of the other vehicle, Jimmy Floyd Thompson of Vernon.

The charge will be criminally negligent homicide, a class A misdemeanor.

Thompson, a counselor at the state school at Vernon, was driving an automobile reportedly borrowed from Henry's Auto Sales, also of Vernon. His injuries did not require emergency treatment.

Members of the Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Department had to use the jaws of life to open the door so Mrs. Burnett's body could be extracted from the car.

Fire chief helps citizen in need

Iowa Park fire chiefs in the past have been called on to help people in many ways, but Sunday's summons of Danny Skinner has to be a first.

A man who resides on James Street locked himself with a pair of handcuffs, and then found he had no key.

Police were called, but also couldn't unlock the cuffs, so Skinner was called to cut them off. And he did.

Phillip Britt reported Thursday morning that someone had skidded into his pickup parked at 115 W. Ruby, damaging it, and leaving without notifying the owner.

PRINCIPAL SAYS:

Cheating at junior high blown out of proportion

A cheating incident at Iowa Park Junior High has resulted in a large portion of the eighth grade students being assigned extra work to be handed in before the end of school.

But while the majority of the class is involved, Principal Jimmy Alsup says the incident has been blown out of proportion because of misinformation published in the Wichita Falls newspaper.

The situation came to light Thursday. Letters were sent to all parents of students in the class. A reporter from the Times and Record News contacted Alsup, but he refused

to comment and later told the parents he wanted them to hear the information first-hand, rather than read it in the paper.

An article appeared in the daily paper's Saturday edition, quoting at least one parent who said the students had been caught cheating on tests.

The principal called a meeting with the parents Monday evening, and the school's library was filled beyond its seating capacity. Alsup read from a prepared statement, explaining the background of the problem, corrective measures, and offered any parent

an opportunity to schedule a personal meeting, and closed the meeting.

Initial source of the situation is that hand-picked student aides had copied chapter review answers from a teacher's textbook, and distributed the answers to friends who, in turn, passed them on to others.

First notice of the situation was Thursday, when science teacher Karen Whisnand was having her students answer questions at the end of one chapter and saw a paper being passed across an aisle from one student to another.

The answers to the chapter questions were on the intercepted

paper. Investigation by the principal and teacher determined that students who work in the library and others on the school annual staff knew of the teacher's textbook and at various times they would copy the answers from it.

A teacher's textbook for every class in school is kept in the book room, according to Alsup. But the science book is the only one used for copying answers, he said.

The book room is kept under lock and key. Student aides, when needing into the room to work, used a key kept by Carolyn Richter, librarian.

Alsup said punishment for those who admitted participating in the cheating would be answering all 52 chapter reviews, with the work to be turned in by May 22. He would not give a figure on how many students were being punished, but said it was a large number.

LETTER

The letter of notification sent to parents Thursday stated: "Dear Parents of Eighth Grade Students:

"It has just today come to my attention that a group of our most trusted students have violated an important school policy. Certain

students, with access to the book room, have copied answers from Teachers' Editions of school textbooks and passed them among their fellow students. We have determined that this has been happening since the beginning of the school year.

It is not my wish to punish students who are not guilty. Please discuss this situation with your child and if you are convinced that he/she is in no way involved, please call me at 592-2196 on or before Tuesday, April 30, 1985.

I deeply regret the necessity for this letter and appreciate your support in this matter."

MEETING STATEMENT

Text of Alsup's statement at the Monday meeting was:

"Thank you, parents, for coming to this meeting.

"It is a meeting I would have preferred not to call but necessary, nevertheless, to clarify some aspects of the recent cheating incident. I feel that the 'facts,' as reported in the paper, were distorted and the incident has been blown 'out of proportion'. I did not respond to the reporter's request for information because I wanted you parents to know firsthand, from me, before it was published in the paper. As a result, much of the information you read in Saturday's paper was false.

"May I explain to you what has occurred to date. Each year, certain students are chosen to work as office

Building permits near \$1-million for year

When contractor Nathan Phillips took out a building permit for "repairs" to 410 West Alameda, his permit was for more money than all building permits issued by city hall during the first three months of this year.

Phillips is the contractor who submitted the low bid to remodel the Burnett home so it can be used as the community's new library.

The permit was for \$360,905, some \$24,000 greater than all permits issued during January, February and March, which accounted for \$336,308.

The remodeling permit also brought April's total to \$562,116, which makes the year's sum \$898,418.

First Step history, purpose is explained

Felice Liquori, who was a sergeant in the U.S. Air Force seven years and retired to become a mental health counselor for First Step, Inc., gave the program for the Thursday evening meeting of the Iowa Park Lioness Club. It was held at the Lions Club building and hosted by Mrs. Grover Cleveland and Mrs. Keith Aulds.

She said that the purpose of First Step, Inc. was to provide help for wives and children of domestic violence, and that the work started in England. The first hotline was started in Wichita Falls in 1970 and the first shelter opened in 1979. It now has six staff members, including a counselor and social worker besides the hotline volunteers, who took 800 calls from women of the area last year, the majority of these having children.

The speaker said that wife battering has no boundaries, it occurs at all economic groups, and crosses all educational levels. According to a sheet of facts she distributed, a woman is beaten every 18 seconds by men who come from battered homes for the most part and just consider it a way of life. The FBI estimates that one out of two women will be physically abused at some point in life by men with whom they live, and that many will not report it because of fear of reprisal.

The counselor discussed some of

the effects of family violence on children to include learning disabilities, subject to anger and resentment, and the misfortune of having to grow up too soon.

In addition to the 24-hour crisis hotline and emergency shelter, the services of First Step include information and referral services, medical and legal referrals services, employment and law enforcement assistance, individual and support group counseling, and others.

During the business meeting that followed the program, the club voted to give a monetary gift of \$100 to First Step and officers for 1985-86 were elected.

Members answered roll call with their favorite birds, and Mrs. D.O. James used "A Prayer for the Home" by John W. Drakeford for the devotion.

Cook of the Week

Today, chicken is probably the most universally eaten of all meats including beef. It is singularly versatile, good broiled, fried, roasted, baked, steamed, fricassed, barbecued, used in casseroles and stews, made in chicken pie or soup.

According to one writer who gave the history of chicken, it seems that man has had a close association with it since B.C. 2000, beginning in India where the red jungle fowl was first domesticated. A cookbook that appeared in Italy between 1266 and 1290 contained recipes for stuffed chicken and chicken soup. German cookbooks, a little later, gave directions for making chicken stew.

Americans certainly have a high appreciation of chicken and perhaps the majority of them preferred it fried. A high opinion of the fowl is implied in many countries today. Citizens of Rome make roast capon their festive dish at Christmas, and the citizens of Brussels like it so well that they have won a nickname "chicken guzzlers." It also appears in many national dishes, and chicken dishes have been named for an opera singer, opera composer and a Roman dictator.

Two of the recipes submitted by Theresa (Mrs. Frankie) Jones this week call for chicken and chicken broth is used in two of them to enhance its flavor.

Mrs. Frankie Jones

12 oz. jar diced pimientos, drained
Cook broccoli as directed, drain, cut up and reserve. Melt margarine in 3 quart saucepan. Stir in baking mix, ginger and garlic powder. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly until smooth and bubbly. Remove from heat, stir in broth and lemon juice. Heat to boiling, stirring constantly; boil and stir one minute, reduce heat. Stir in broccoli and remaining ingredients. Cut off tops of puffs (recipe below), fill bottoms with mixture, and replace tops.

POPOVER PUFFS

Heat oven to 400 degrees. Heat 1/2 cup water and 3 T margarine to boiling. Add 1/4 cup baking mix, all at

once. Stir vigorously over low heat until mixture forms a soft ball, 1 1/2 minutes. Remove from heat, beat in 3 eggs, one at a time, until smooth. Drop 6 mounds of dough 3 inches apart onto aluminum foil-covered cookie sheet. Bake until dark golden.

CHINESE TING-A-LINGS

1 big can Chinese noodles
1 cup salted peanuts, more or less
1 cup small marshmallows, more or less
1 large pkg. butterscotch pieces
Melt butterscotch pieces in top of double boiler. Pour over noodles and nuts and marshmallows; stir. Drop by easpoons onto wax paper. Cool.

FINGER SQUARES [For morning coffee and an evening party]

3 eggs
1 cup milk
1 cup flour
1 tsp. salt
1 tsp. baking powder
1 lb. mild Swiss cheese, grated
2 pkgs. chopped frozen spinach, thawed and drained
Drops of Tabasco
4 T butter

Heat oven to 350 degrees. Place butter in 9x3x2 inch pan and melt in oven and remove. Beat eggs, add milk, flour, salt, baking powder. Mix cheese, spinach and drops of Tabasco. Pour in butter and mix well. Pour ingredients into 9x13 inch pan and bake 35 minutes. Remove and cool 50 minutes to set. Cut in squares. These will keep several days or freeze. Heat

before serving at 325 degrees about 10 minutes.

CHICKEN ENCHILADAS [Bake 45 minutes at 350 degrees Serves 4]

12 uncooked tortillas
1 can cream of chicken soup
1 large can of evaporated milk
2 cans of chicken or a fryer, boiled and boned
1/4 lb. sharp cheese or 2 cans of Cheddar cheese soup
1 can mild enchilada sauce
1 small can chopped Old El Paso 4 oz. peeled green chilies
1 medium onion, chopped
Dice onion and saute in oleo. Add soups, milk, chilies, then chicken (in bowl). Grease pan and put some sauce in it. Put 6 tortillas in large baking dish, cover with half sauce and half cheese. Repeat.

3 10 1/4 oz. cans condensed chicken broth
1 pkg. (10 oz.) frozen peas and carrots
1/4 tsp. pepper
Egg Dumplings

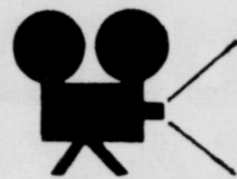
Cook and stir ground beef in Dutch oven until brown; add remaining ingredients except Egg Dumplings (recipe below). Heat to boiling, reduce heat. Prepare Egg Dumplings and drop by level teaspoons into soup. Simmer uncovered until dumplings are firm, about 5 minutes.

EGG DUMPLINGS

1/2 cup Bisquick baking mix
3 T grated Parmesan cheese
1 T snipped or 2 T parsley flakes
1/4 tsp. ground nutmeg
1 egg
Mix baking mix, cheese, parsley and nutmeg. Stir in egg and blend well.

1 lb. ground beef
2 cups shredded cabbage
1/2 cup chopped onion
1 cups water

Bill would prohibit forced consolidations

Rep. Charles Finnell voted this week to approve a resolution that proposed a constitutional amendment prohibiting the state from forcing the consolidation of school districts. HJR 33, by Bill Haley, D-Center, passed 108 to 31.

Approval of a proposal for a constitutional amendment requires at least 100 votes in the House of Representatives. If approved by the Senate, the proposed amendment would be placed on a general election ballot on Nov. 5, 1985 for public approval.

While current statutory law already prohibits forced consolidation Finnell believes small rural school districts need the protection afforded by the Texas Constitution. The amendment would permit consolidation only if the plan were approved by the affected school boards and voters of each school district.

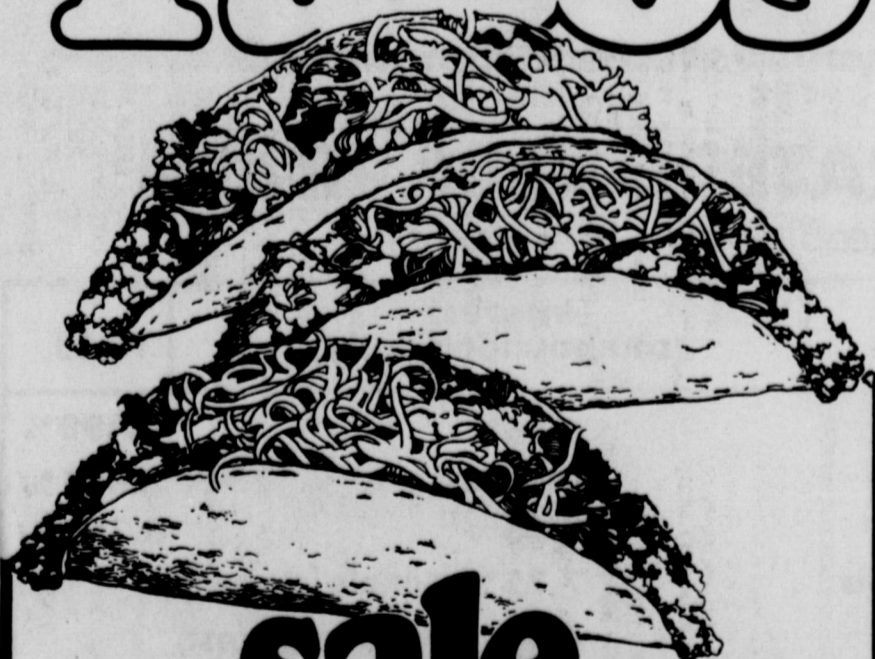

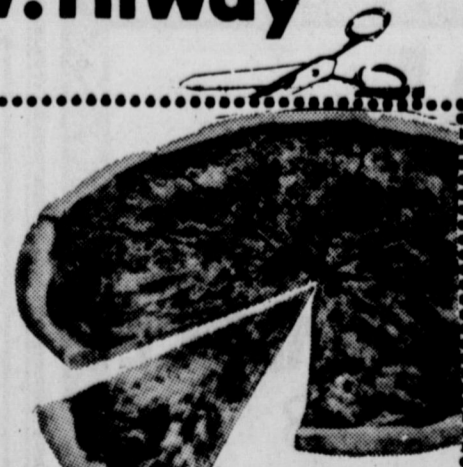

Area oil, gas report

At a location four miles northeast of Holliday, Wichita County, The Quintin Little Co. of Ardmore has finalized a new oil producer in the Daves Field.

The well is designated as the No. 3 L.R. Monaghan, pumping oil at the rate of 39 barrels per day.

Location is in a 1,334-acre lease in the Denton C.S.L. Survey, A-57. Bottomed at 5,407 feet, the well will produce from perforations in the Conglomerate Formation, 5,301 to 5,322 feet into the wellbore.

The well is located 2,100 feet from the west line and 1,680 feet from the north line of the lease.

A new producer has been brought on line in the Wichita Regular Field, with Finnell Oil Co. of Wichita Falls as the operator.

Located six miles east of Kamay the well is in a 160-acre lease in the DCSL Survey, Block 7, League 4. It is designated as the No. 1 Cook's Corner.

The well pumped oil at the rate of 24 barrels per day. It bottomed at 4,858 feet, and will produce from a set of perforations 4,664 to 4,690 feet into the hole.

Drillsite is 330 feet from the north line and 530 feet from the west line of the lease.

John D. Swanson of Electra has filed first production figures on a new oil well in the Wichita Regular Field. The No. 30 W.T. Waggoner "A" showed potential to pump 14 barrels of oil per day.

The operator has 80 acres leased, with drillsite in the A. Gibson Survey, A-455, five miles south of Electra.

The well will produce from an interval 1,900 to 1,12 feet into the wellbore.

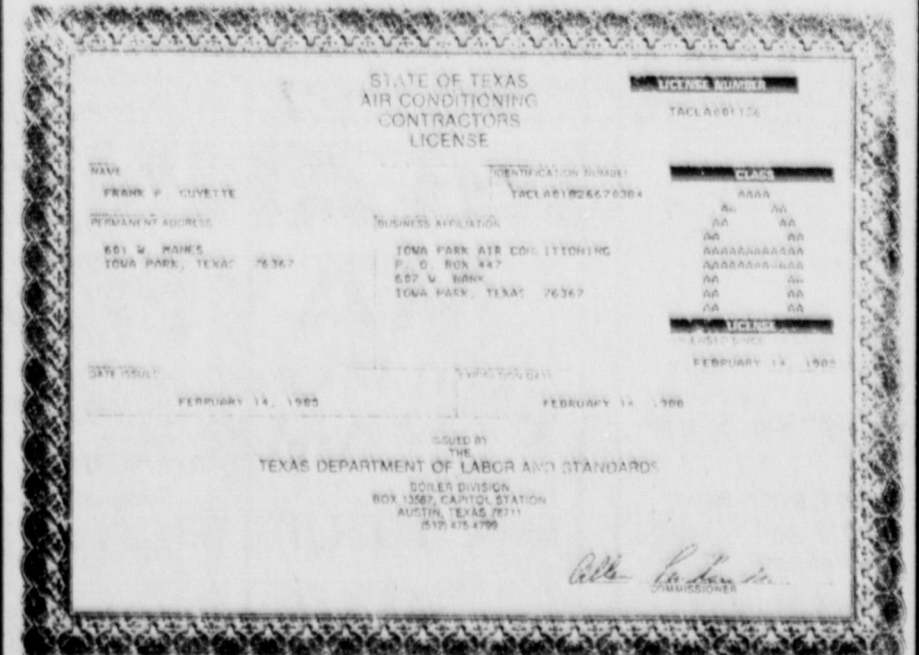

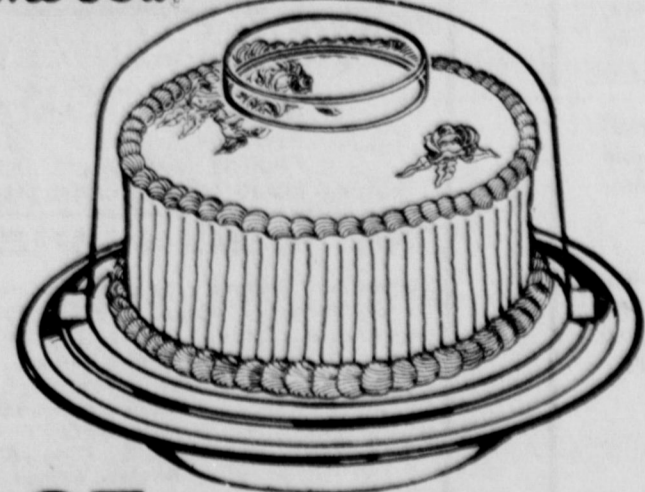
