## State says district to pay more next year

School trustees last Thursday night heard a report on anticipated funds from state for next year and the past year's testing results, and also approved bids to repair roof damage as well as hiring new personnel.

The meeting was the first of two this month for board members. The other will be for an early look at the 1988-89 budget, which will be completed in August.

Supt. Glen Mitchell told trustees his early indication from the Texas Education Agency in Austin on state funding was that the district can expect to receive about \$130,000 less than last year.

Mitchell explained that two factors figure into the loss of state funding: increased tax base values and the district's tax rate being lower than the state average.

The district's loss of \$17-million in values due to the oil slump last year was offset by a \$22-million increase from the Cryovac plant expansion, leaving the district with an increase of some \$4-million in values.

Coupled with Iowa Park's low tax rate of 76-cents, which triggers the state's "equalization" process, is why the district's "local fund assignment" was increased by the state.

(The state doesn't decrease its money to a district, but allows the district to pick up a greater share of the budget, known as local fund assignment.)

Trustees approved a bid submitted by Menasco Roofing to repair building roofs damaged by the March 1 hailstorm.

Menasco bid \$169,500, well below bids submitted by three other roofing companies.

Bids were asked on three different types of roofing, and trustees approved

"modified bitumen" roofing which was about \$10,000 more than the insurance company paid, but the new type roofing is expected to last considerably longer than "build-up" roofing, according to Don Daugherty, architect on the project.

Counselors Colleen Roberts and Herman Escue reported on this year's Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills (TEAMS) testing, as well as the California Comprehensive Test of Basic Skills.

The state requires TEAMS testing of all odd-numbered classes in the district annually, and the eleventh grade test requires mastering before a student can receive a diploma.

Four eleventh graders failed the mathematics portion of the TEAMS test and one the language arts portion. The students will be given the opportunity to re-take the test again in October, and if necessary, again in the spring.

As has been the problem in past years, the writing portion of the test proved to be the most difficult for the students (it is not a part of the exit exam for eleventh graders).

Students not mastering the writing portion of the test far outnumbered those not mastering math and reading, according to the report.

Of the 119 ninth graders tested, 43 did not master writing, 14 reading and seven math.

Seventh graders not mastering writing were 37, 10 reading and two math; 124 were tested.

There were 146 fifth graders tested and 26 did not master writing, 12 reading and seven math.

Of the 126 students tested in the third grade, 24 failed to master the writing test, 14 reading and four math.

Of the 136 first graders tested, only five did not master the writing test and seven reading, but 11 did not master the math portion.

In almost every case, however, students scored well above their grade level and national average on the California test, trustees were told.

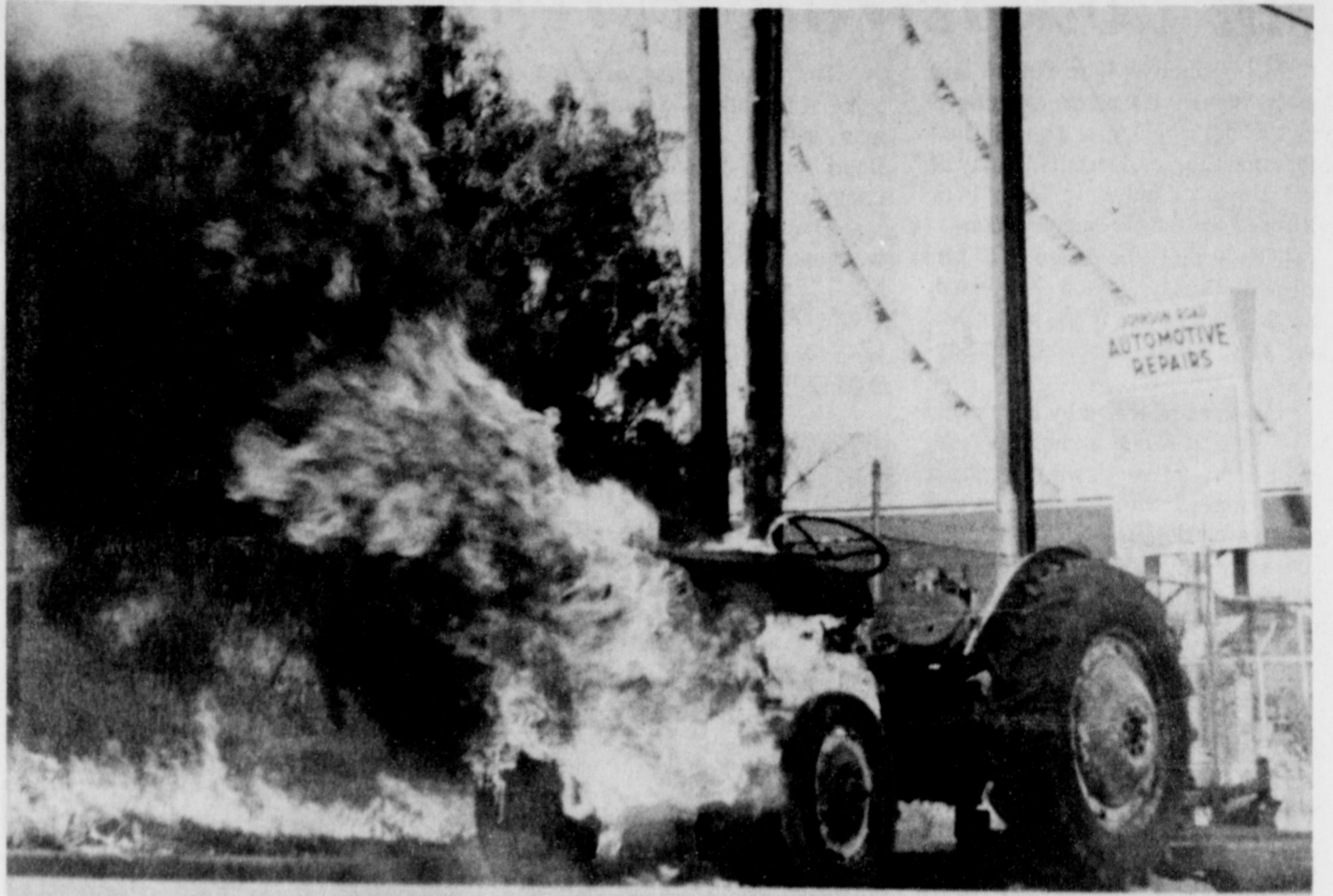
After accepting the resignations of Danny Clack, junior high history teacher who has been hired as principal next year at Chillicothe, and Mrs. Clack, elementary school library aide, board members approved a list of new personnel to be hired for next year.

New personnel included: Karen McClure, Tamara Trotter and Tandra Williams, third grade; Mary Elizabeth Alfert, Kidwell special education; Sarita Goodwin, junior high reading; Carl D. Knobloch, sixth grade social studies; Steven Jay Moody, eighth grade social studies; Jimmie Charles Cain, high school social studies and girls basketball coach; Krissy Corley, high school science; Julie Ross, elementary librarian aide; Sheri Williams, junior high special education aide, and George T. Brandt (requesting reassignment from high school horticulture and vocational agriculture), sixth grade science.

Supt. Mitchell said Brandt's place at high school is the only faculty position not yet filled.

Mitchell's recommendation that the board change its policy requiring physical examinations of personnel, to require it only of bus drivers, was

## City water projects to cost near \$600,000

The city council Monday night approved bids, and to advertise for other bids, that could almost completely drain a water department fund surplus of some \$600,000.

Aldermen also entered into an agreement with Gene Wigley to lease a strip of land that will eventually lead to the annexation of Lake Iowa Park into the city limits.

Part of the expenditure from the water department fund was accepting a bid to install a new and larger lift pump station west of the city and just across US 287 from the nearest highway rest stop.

The lift pump has been in service several years and was put there primarily to accommodate the highway department's facility. It is being replaced both because of increasing costly maintenance and to accommodate anticipated new residents in that area.

The lift pump will cost \$43,731 and a new sewer line to be installed under the highway will be an additional \$39,218.

The contract was approved by a split vote of the council, with alderman Virgil Woodfin opposing it.

Council members approved the advertising for bids to revamp the city's overhead water storage towers and replace one of the pumps from a city lake.

Proposed is the relocating of the water tower now at Lake Gordon, to a point north of US 287 and near Johnson Road.

Since the tower was built on Johnson Road, near Cryovac, neither of the other two towers have functioned, because of a control device that demands water from ground storage.

The Johnson Road tower was constructed at a higher level than the other two towers, apparently by an oversight of the engineer. This makes the city's water system act on the upper five feet of the new tower, aldermen were told.

Tentative plans are to take down the old tower at city hall which, city officials say, functions only to hold radio antennas.

Monday's actual council motion was to advertise for bids to build a new water tower or move the Lake Gordon tower.

A new pump for Lake Buffalo to supply raw water to the treatment plant was also approved for advertising for bids.

The estimated \$100,000 pump would be a variable speed unit, to replace the "constant flow" pump that actually produces more water than the treatment plant can handle, aldermen were told.

The old pump would be retained as a backup.

Land along the west side of the road leading from US 287 to Lake Iowa Park was leased by the city from owner Wigley. This move, according to previous discussions of council members, will allow the city to annex the leased land and also all the city's property around the lake.

While enforcement of city laws and policies concerning the lake has long been a problem to the council, there has also been discussion of developing property on the west side of the lake for housing, though no par-

## Rabid skunk confirmed

A strong word of caution to be watchful for rabies-infected animals was issued this week by the city's animal control officer, Sue Hatcher.

She said a skunk killed in the city June 3 has been confirmed by tests as being infected with rabies.

A young boy in the western part of the city is about to begin a series of rabies shots, unless the results of a test on his dead cat proves them unnecessary.

Another child was bitten by his dog last weekend. Though the dog had received a rabies shot, the year's limit had expired, and the dog is being observed.

Hatcher said a skunk wandered

into Iowa Park Air Conditioning June 3, left, and went across the street to Thompson Tool. In the meantime, Hatcher was called, and she in turn called a policeman, who shot the animal.

The skunk's actions were suspicious, she said, because it showed no fear of humans. Instead, it walked up to her vehicle, instead of running away.

The skunk's head was sent off for examination, and results came back positive. Rabies.

The young boy was bitten on his face by his cat. The parents took the animal to a veterinarian for observation, and the cat died the following day.

Parents and Hatcher are awaiting return of the test results.

The cat had been a stray, taken in by the household as a pet.

Hatcher warned that very few cat

owners have their pets vaccinated for rabies. And cats are most susceptible to being infested, because many are allowed to roam at large in the evenings, and can easily be exposed to the nocturnal skunk.

The animal control officer said she has long been frustrated by cat owners who do not feel their pet needs to be vaccinated against rabies.

"It seems most people just feel dogs need to be vaccinated," she said.

Any bites and scratches by pets should be reported to the animal control officer, whether serious or not, she said.

"We need the information, and we can sometimes help people if we know when something happens," she said.

Hatcher can be contacted by calling either the city hall or police department.

### Park series resumes tonight

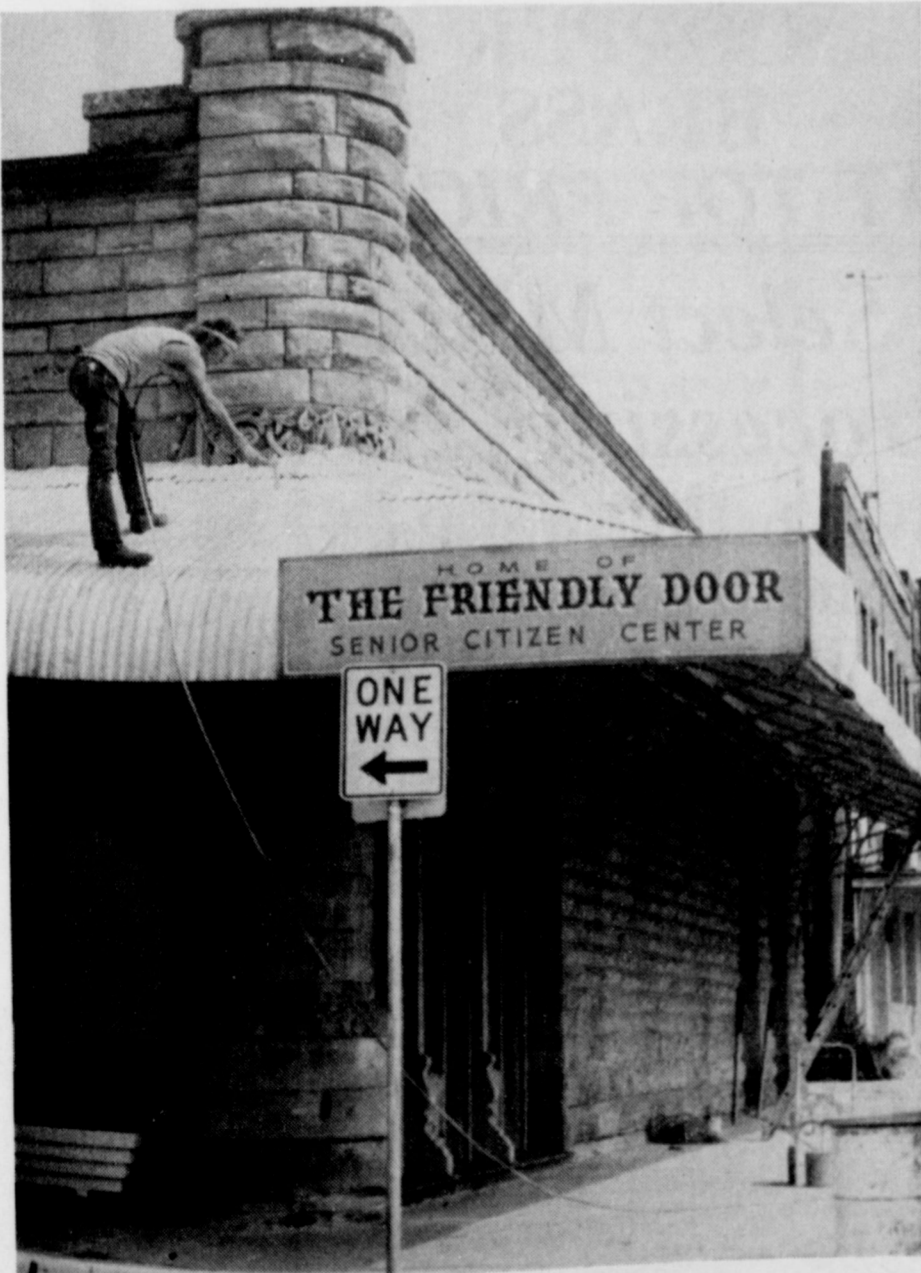
Music lovers and musicians alike should enjoy tonight's "Music Jamboree," one of several programs scheduled this summer for the city's second annual "Summer in the Park" series.

The music will begin at 6 p.m. tonight at the park located behind city hall, with the Friendly Door Band to start things off, followed by the Red River Blue Grass Band.

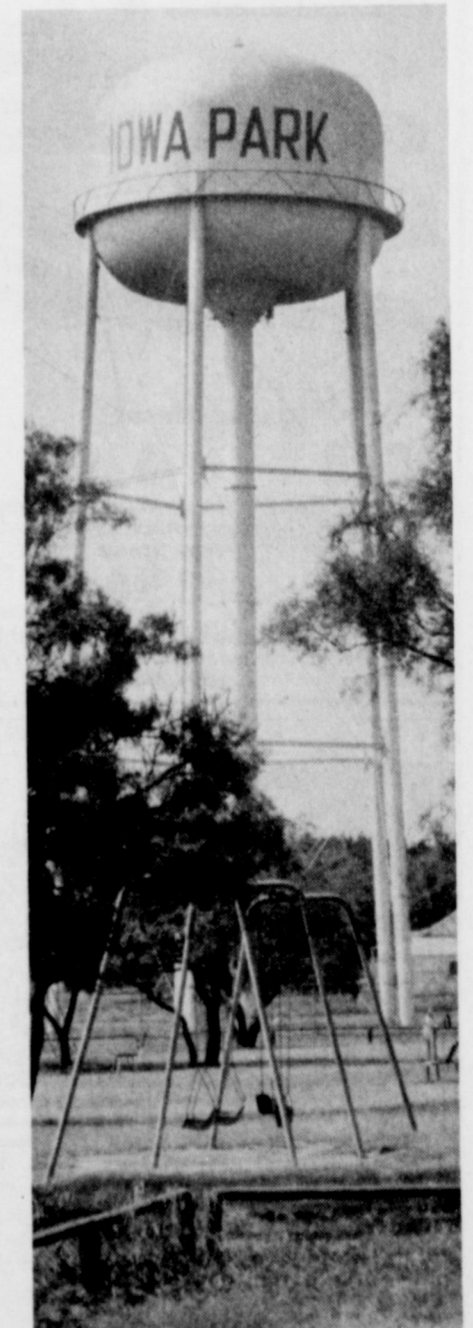

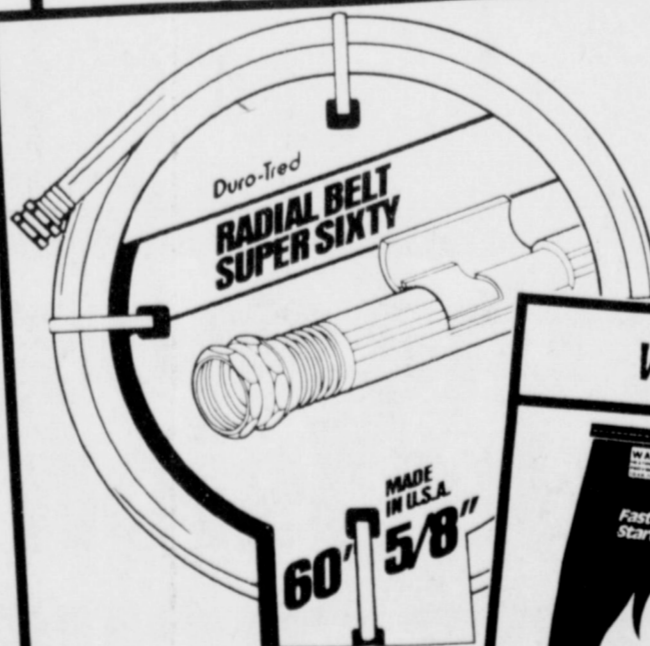
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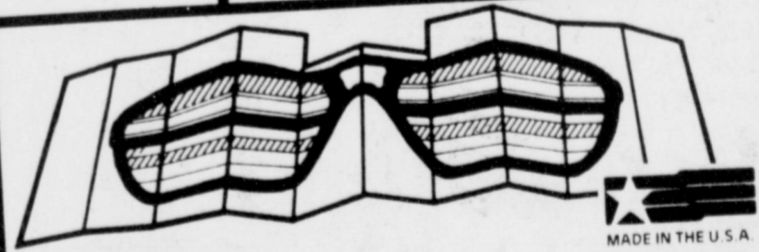
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# As I See It... By BOB HAMILTON



House Speaker Jim Wright's claim that the House ethics committee's unanimous decision to investigate his book-publishing project was a political attack hardly seems to be with merit.

Aren't there any Democrats on the committee?

The Fort Worth politician has drawn an investigation into possible conflict of interest because of a little ole, 117-page book he said he wrote.

Okay, let's look at it. Wright has pocketed about \$55,000 from the sale of about 17,000 books. He has received a royalty of \$3.25, or 55 percent, on each sale. That is way above the usual eight percent most publishers contract with authors.

But his publisher is a fellow Fort Worth "constituent" who has been paid about \$600,000 to work in Wright's campaigns over the past 10 years, according to the Dallas Morning News.

The publisher, one William Carlos Moore, is of such apparent high character, he owes the Internal Revenue Service about \$148,713 from a 1975 tax evasion conviction.

But that's just the tip of the situation. Where have most of those 17,000 books gone? Well, one of Wright's "friends" in Fort Worth acknowledged buying \$6,000 worth of them.

The Dallas paper quotes S. Gene

Payte, a developer, as saying he wanted to help Wright financially, and he had already given the maximum of \$1,000 to Wright's campaign fund.

And the Dallas Morning News has come up with numerous others who bought books in bulk, and each has political ties.

Iowa Park native John C. White, the former Texas commissioner of agriculture and former national Democratic Party chairman, acknowledged shelling out enough to buy 1,000, at \$5.95 per copy.

While Wright is crying that the charge is a Republican attempt to draw attention from the Reagan administration problems, he surely has never acknowledged he found a "loop hole," stating he has done nothing wrong.

Technically, he may be correct. But how does the nation feel about it?

I'm not sure how long America can afford Wright.

If you think that decision about a year ago to build a currency-printing plant just north of Fort Worth wasn't some of his doing, think again. And I never did see evidence that the treasury department needed it.

One other thing, few in this area know that Wright has been calling in

a lot of cards to get a government-financed airport built north of Fort Worth.

He was questioned about that one on the television show "Larry King Live" recently, and acknowledged he had worked hard to get it done.

I heard him say, as his primary reason, that it was "for the comfort and convenience of passengers" who would be using it.

Friends, there already is a major airport serving that area called the Dallas/Fort Worth Airport. It's one of the largest in the world, and is not yet near its capacity.

Secondly, the new airport he is getting financed is not designed to handle passengers. It is strictly to be used by industries their freight.

And H. Ross Perot is putting the whole thing together!

Perot and friends already have an agreement with the state of Texas to build a major east-west highway near the highway, apparently to handle the freight trucks serving the airport.

Not a bad deal. Buy up the land, then get the government to build the airport and highway, and then sell off the land around the airport to the industries for mega-billions.

Haven't noticed how many of Wright's books were purchased by Perot. Bet it was a bunch.

## Car windows are broken

Two more cases of vandals breaking out vehicle windows were reported during the past week.

Iowa Park police were told a window of a vehicle was broken out sometime last Wednesday night in the 1300 block of Westridge.

An individual, who did not report to police, said his vehicle window was broken out Saturday night while parked in the 900 block of W. Cornelia.

Several similar cases have been reported to police during the past few months.

Police last Wednesday received a report of a vehicle losing trash from its bed while enroute to the landfill. When the driver was stopped, he was checked out in the police computer and was determined to have two outstanding warrants on him by the Department of Public Safety.

David Wayne Braziel, 24, was held on instruction of the DPS until one of its troopers picked him up at the police station.

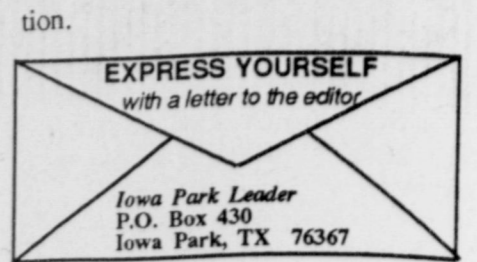
David Smiley was stopped on a traffic check by Wichita Falls police Saturday evening, and was found to have an outstanding traffic warrant on him by Iowa Park police.

ticals have been disclosed.

Council members approved a proposal from First Christian Church minister Mike Grubbs, representing the Ministerial Alliance, to hold a "Crop Walk" Oct. 15.

Grubbs explained the project was to "raise awareness of world hunger and raise funds."

Also approved was a request to permit Deryl James a water tap for land he is leasing at West Highway and Fourth for a car lot.

Bids to repair hail damage on the Recreational Activities Center and city hall roofs, at a cost of \$7,305, were approved, but no action was taken on repairs at the library. That bid was \$58,228, and aldermen wanted to negotiate the proposed fee.

Also approved was a proposal to advertise for bids to line a new landfill pit.

Administrator James Barrington told the council paperwork is expected to be ready before the council's next meeting to acquire land for a new senior Little League baseball field, in the area of Magnolia and West Highway.

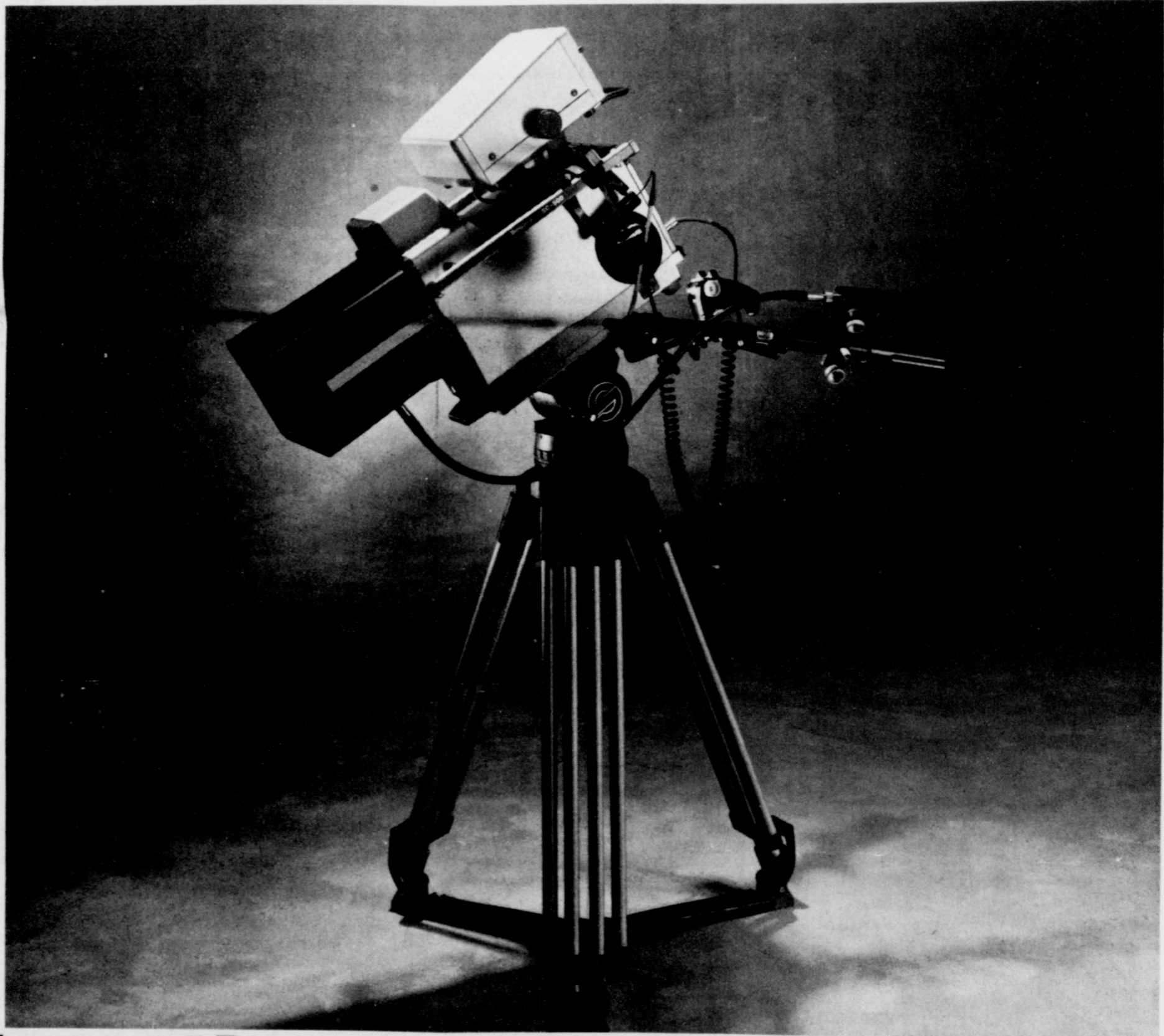
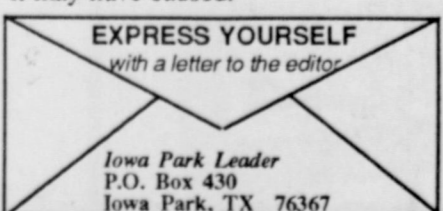
approved.

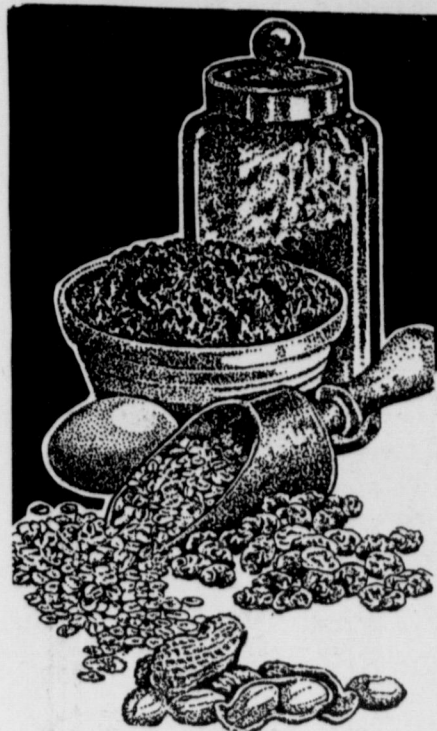

All of the recipes she submitted are tried and true, and added that the Hollywood Chicken is one of her husband's favorites, and the Fruit Pizza is a good alternative food for showers.

### HOLLYWOOD CHICKEN

- 1 lb. hamburger
- 1 large onion
- 3 Tbs. flour
- 2 cup milk
- 2 cans chicken noodle soup
- 1 medium bag potato chips

Brown hamburger meat with onion, drain grease. Stir flour into meat - add milk. Cook until thick like gravy. Heat chicken noodle soup until hot. Grease casserole dish, crush 1/2 of the potato chips into bottom of dish. Pour gravied meat and chicken noodle soup over chips. Add remaining chips on top. Bake 30 minutes at 350 degrees.

### FRUIT SALAD

- 1 bag mini marshmallows
  - 12 ounce Cool Whip
  - 2 cans fruit cocktail - drained
  - 2 bananas
  - 2 apples - cored and peeled
- Mix all ingredients together and refrigerate until serving time.

### FRUIT PIZZA

- Pillsbury sugar cookie dough out of grocer's freezer
- 8 oz. cream cheese
- 3/4 cup sugar
- Fresh fruit of your choice

Bake dough on a pizza pan until brown. While dough is cooling, cream sugar and cream cheese together and spread it onto the cooled cookie. Add fruit. Refrigerate until ready to serve.

### BARBECUE CHOPPED BEEF

- 4 lb. boneless shoulder roast
- 28 oz. barbecue sauce

Put roast into a slow cooker until tender. Chop roast up in food processor. Pour barbecue sauce and roast in a bowl and mix together. (If you don't have a food processor, tear roast up into small pieces.)

### BAKED PINEAPPLE

- 1 (19 or 21 oz.) can chunk pineapple, drained
- 1 cup grated American cheese
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 2 Tbsp. flour
- 1/3 cup butter
- 1 cup bread crumbs

Butter a 1 1/2 qt. baking dish and mix cheese and pineapple Place in baking dish. Mix flour, sugar and pineapple juice. Pour this over the pineapple and top with crumbs which have been browned in the butter. Bake 45 minutes at 350 degrees.

### BARBECUE MEATLOAF

- 1 1/2 lbs. ground beef
- 1-15 oz. can tomato sauce
- 1 cup cracker crumbs
- 1/2 cup water
- 1 chopped onion
- 3 Tbsp. brown sugar

- 1 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 2 Tbsp. prepared mustard
- 1 egg
- 3 Tbsp. vinegar
- 2 tsp. Worcestershire sauce

Mix beef, cracker crumbs, onions, salt, pepper, egg and tomato sauce. Form a loaf, place in a shallow pan. Mix remaining ingredients and pour over loaf. Bake one hour and 15 minutes at 350 degrees.

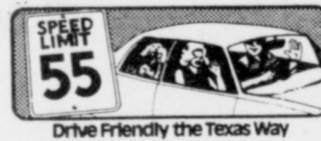
Former Show scholarship winner Fred McClure was the keynote speaker. McClure is currently Texas Air Corporation government affairs staff vice president.

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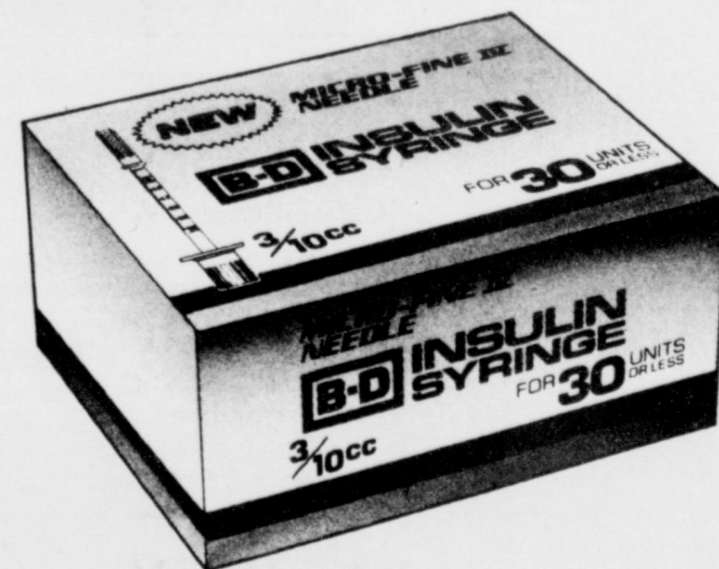

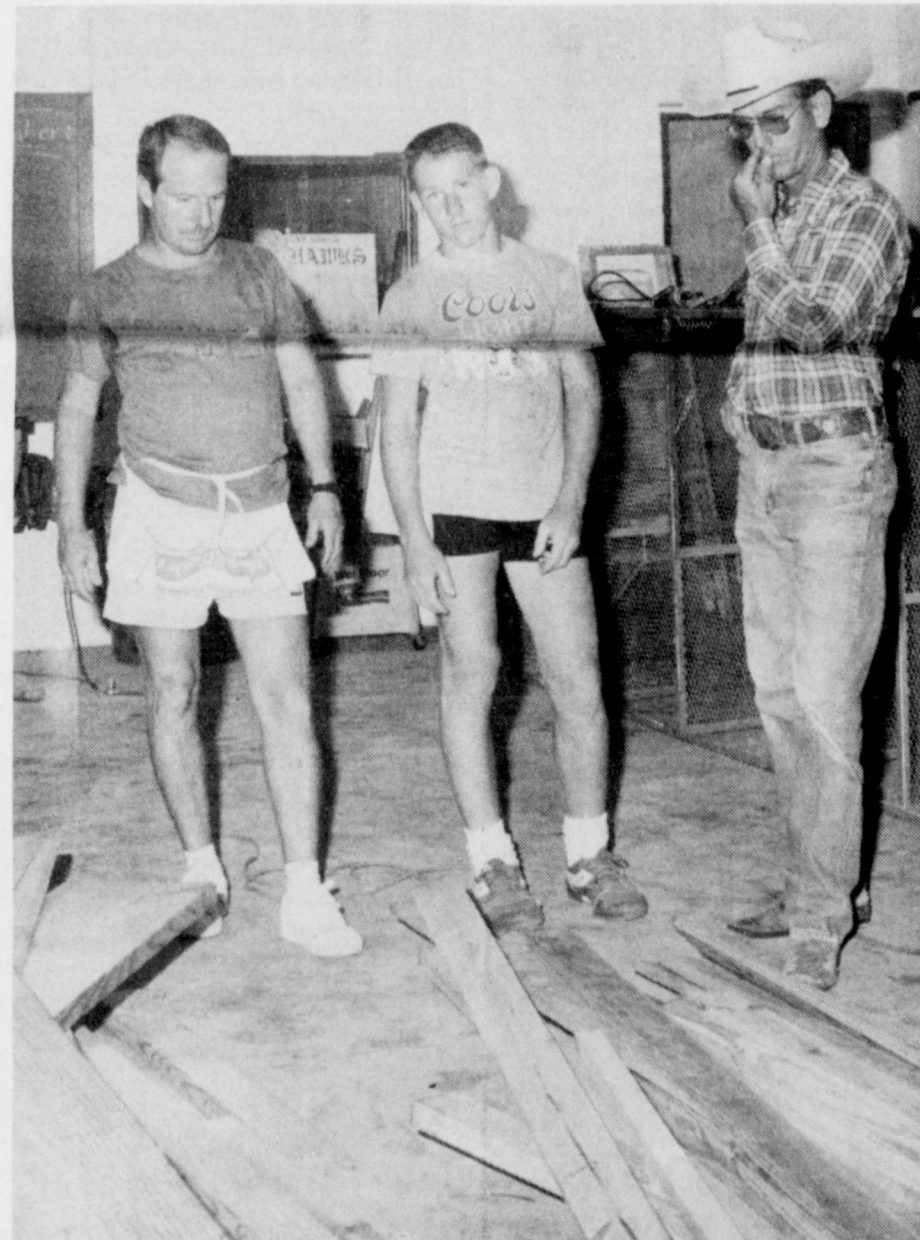

## AREA OIL & GAS NEWS

At a location three miles north-northwest of Clara, Tri Core Oil & Gas of Irving has finished two new developmental producers in the Wichita Regular Field.

Location is in a 228-acre lease in Wichita County's Lewis Powell A-242 Survey. The wells are designated as the Nos. 1101 and 1104 Kelly.

The No. 1101 Kelly was drilled to a total depth of 1,695 feet, plugged back to 1,682 feet, and will produce 17 barrels of oil per day and 57 barrels of water from perforations in the Cisco Formation 1,642 feet to 1,646 feet into the hole.

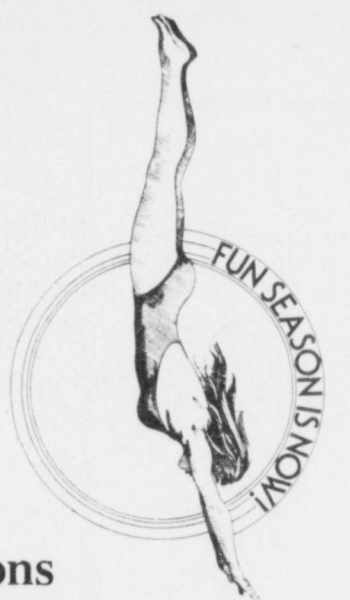
