New ordinance would make 30 fireworks illegal in city

Until the city ordinance is revised again, this will be the last July 4th fireworks will be permitted inside the city limits.

The council Monday night passed by unanimous vote an amendment to the ordinance which currently

prohibits "...the sale, offer to sale, or explode, any type or kind of fireworks, including firecrackers, torpedoes, rockets, Roman candles and any other types of explosives commonly used for such purposes, within the

The new ordinance, however, will not go into effect until proper notice to the public is published.

The changed ordinance now includes "possess" and "transport," inside the city.

During a discussion on the change, it was pointed out that the council had wanted to restrict the sale of fireworks within the city's extraterritorial jurisdiction, which is one mile outside the city limits.

However, the problem of enforcement prohibited making it unlawful to sell fireworks in that zone.

So, after the required waiting period, it will be unlawful ... "for any person to sell, offer for sale, possess, transport, or explode any type or kind of fireworks, including firecrackers,


Pat Raby, coordinator, said the band performed last year and added, "They are so popular. They went over really big."

Lawmen shut down drug lab

Law officers arrested five persons near Valley View Tuesday afternoon, and confiscated an illegal drug labratory along with numerous guns and other items believed to be stolen.

The site was a mile east of Valley View, and about half a mile north of FM 258 on McFall Road.

Arrested were Lloyd Glen Drake, 32, of 1215 North 3rd. in Wichita Falls, Mary Ellen Hubbart, 31, of Wichita, Kan., Cindy Marie Labora, 27, James Anthony Streadwick, 27, and Laura Jean Phillips, 29. The latter three gave their addresses as the McFall Road mobile homes.

Labora was charged with possession of marijauna, under two ounces, and was placed under \$200 bond.

The other four were charged with unlawful possession of controlled substance, marijauna, \$5,000 bond, and aggravated unlawful manufacturing and delivery of controlled substance (amphetamine), and placed under \$125,000 bonds.

Bonds were set by Justice of the Peace Arthur Bea Williams in Wich-

Taking part in the arrests were officers from the Wichita Falls Police Department and Wichita and Archer County Sheriff's Depart-

There were more than two mobile homes on the scene, but only two of them were occupied by the

Behind the second mobile home was an open trailer on which laboratory equipment for manufacturing amphetamine was in boxes.

A large quantify of white powder identified as amphetamine was found in small sacks.

Officers seized several hand guns, a .45-caliber machine gun, rifles, a pair of Samurai-style swords and bows and arrows.

Numerous items, including weapons, radio scanners, and a chainsaw were believed by officers to have been taken in area burglaries.

Numerous vehicles were parked around the mobile homes and in a large, unused area on the east end of the lot. At least two were also believed to have been stolen.

A fragmentation bomb and two hand grenades were discovered inside one of the mobile homes, and demolition experts from Fort Sill were summoned to destroy them.

The operation had been watched about a year by law officers, but not until intelligence was gathered in Archer County recently did officers have hard enough evidence to seek a search warrant.

Posted on the wall of a shed nearest McFall Road was a standard printed sign "No trespassing" and below it was one of the neighborhood watch stickers distributed by the K-V Kickers.

A proposed ordinance was passed which prohibits on-street parking in

the 900 block of Fourth Street, which is from West Highway to Van

Several complaints have been registered with the city about vehicles parking on the street since the city built two sand-surfaced volleyball courts in that area.

Signs are to be erected in the block by the street department in the near future.

Barrington was also authorized to advertise for two other bids, one to either upgrade or purchase replacement of the city's computer system. The administrator said the unit had been in use almost five years and was becoming overloaded.

The present computer will be advertised for sale, if a new unit is purchased, because only \$6,000 has been offered for a trade-in value.


The new unit is expected to cost about \$45,000, plus an additional \$5,000 for a municipal court program.

Iowa Park police received a call at 7:33 p.m. Saturday of an apparent sexual assault underway at Lake Iowa Park.

When officers arrived, at the request of the sheriff's department, they stopped a pickup with two men and a young girl at the gate attempting to leave for investigation.

The two men were taken into custody by sheriff's deputies, who arrived later, and transported to county jail.

Charged with public intoxication and terroristic threat were David Joe Emory, 25, and Dennis Craig Miller, 30. Both gave their addresses as 1212 15th St. in Wichita Falls. Each was placed under a \$1,000 bond.

The girl was allowed to drive the pickup from the area.

Evening Lions hear program on drugs

John Grimes of Wichita Falls, senior partner in the firm of Grimes and Tannahan Drug and Alcohol Consultant, was speaker Tuesday for the Evening Lions Club.

He was introduced by Dave Davis, who said the firm set up drug and alcohol programs for businesses and conducted seminars for different organizations over a wide region.

Grimes said the drug and alcohol problem was a serious one in practically all parts of the state and nation.



changes in work to be done were made, reducing the cost.

The council decided to make no changes in its previously-approved plan for construction of a new sewer lift station west of the city, as well as boring under US 287 for installing sewer lines.

The decision came after hearing concerns expressed by engineer Kerry Maroney about the bonding company which covers the successful bidder.

Maroney did not recommend the city change its contractor because of the bonding company, but only told of his firm's experience of law suits filed on another project by the bonding firm.

A lengthy discussion was held with representatives of the E-911 emergency telephone system, concerning responsibility of "signing off' for dispatching fire departments outside the city.

The mayor expressed concern of liability of the city when it had no authority outside the city limits.

He also said he felt the county was not paying its fair share of the costs of both firefighting and dispatching.

After it was decided that Fire Chief Danny Skinner would sign off for all fire calls outside the city, the council voted 4-0-1 in favor of the proposal, with Alderman Bud Burch abstaining and Hunter saying he would have voted against it if he had


Brad Wynn complained to police Sunday morning that someone had been taking shingles off the roof of his home at 507 E. Jefferson without permission.
