

FOR HAWKS Season opener set tomorrow at Burkburnett

There's a lot of "getting even" involved in tomorrow night's season opener when Iowa Park travels to Burkburnett for an 8 p.m. kickoff.

The Hawks will be trying to even their 20-year win-loss record, as the Bulldogs hold a 10-9 edge.

And Burk coach Jerry Watson, entering his second year there, likely wants to even his record with the Hawks, who edged the Class AAAA Dogs 25-18 in the 1987 opener here.

But the game won't be all to do with "even," as new Hawk head coach Len Williams will be making his debut with the Mean Green, and his aim is to establish a dominance over the black and orange.

"We're (as a team) right now where we want to be," Williams told the Iowa Park Lions Club Tuesday, when he was asked his opinion on the progress of his varsity.

Williams and Watson have each looked at films of their teams, and the Iowa Park mentor is impressed with the quickness of the Bulldogs, especially quarterback Rob Johnson and runningback Michael Ivory. He called them "game-breakers."

He said his defense must contain those two, as well as shutting down Johnson's passing game.

"Ivory is as good (a back) as I've ever seen," Williams said, "but he doesn't scare the Hawks."

Offensively, Williams' probable starters against Burk will be: Jimmy Duggins, 163, junior, quarterback; Marc Cruz, 150, junior, tailback; Gary Tatum, 189, senior, fullback, and Rual Swanson, 145, senior, wingback.

His line will likely include: Scot Davis, 204, senior, center; Jay LogLoggins, tackles; Tatum, linebacker; and Cruz and Duggins, safeties.

Also, Tony Taylor, 218, senior, and Will McCarthy, 166, senior, defensive ends; Frankie Chacon, 140, senior, corner; Mike Lubinski, 199, senior, linebacker; Lee Cokendolpher, 176, senior, nose guard, or possibly Chuck Brown, 171, junior, at nose guard.

Some of the individuals the coach singled out during his talk before the Lions, included Davis, the center. " He's not imposing to look at, but he has done an excellent job. He's probably the best center I've ever been associated with," commented the former Mart head coach who has a long string of championship clubs on his record.

About his two-way sophomore starting lineman, Green, Williams said he reminds him of Bub Deeringwater, who was a star at Rider High in Wichita Falls, Williams' alma mater. "Except he (Green) doesn't carry the ball."

With the loss of punter Robert Johnson, who was injured a week earlier in an auto accident and will likely be unable to play the rest of the season, Williams said the punting chores would be turned over to Tatum.

Michael Johnson will likely do the kicking off, and McClure the point-after and field goal kicking.

Looking further along in the season at the Hawks' chances of repeating as district champions, the coach pointed out that Vernon has been picked ahead of Iowa Park, Decatur is strong and Bridgeport is "surprising."

School year starts today

Iowa Park schools will open their doors today for the 1988-89 year, but will dismiss an hour earlier than usual.

The tardy bell will ring at 8:15 a.m. at the high school, junior high and Kidwell Elementary, but will be earlier, at 8:05, at Bradford Elementary.

Regular dismissal hours this year will be 2:35 p.m. at Kidwell, 2:55 at Bradford, 3:00 at junior high and 3:10 at high school.

Students will attend two days, and then have Monday off as a holiday, which is Labor Day. Their next holiday will be Thanksgiving, when they will leave an hour early Nov. 23 and not return to class until Nov. 28.

Because of early indications at the elementary campuses, Supt. Glen Mitchell told his board of trustees Tuesday night he was expecting a record enrollment (since he's been here) in classes this fall.

First-day enrollment last year was 1,826, a marked increase over the 1,798 in 1986.

has two trucks used almost exclusively for fighting grassfires, and they are 13 years or older.

Maintenance on one of the units is costing as much as \$5,000 a year, which firemen believe could be better spent toward new trucks.

Evans said the department had requested a truck be donated by Burlington Railroad, but the request was denied.

"I don't understand how they could deny our request," he said. "We fight dozens of fires each year that are men leave the city limits 75 percent of their calls to fight fires in the rural areas, figures show.

The department received \$8,400 in funding from Wichita County last year. That money went into the city's budget of \$38,595 for the department, according to James Barrington, city administrator.

The administrator said next year's budget calls for an increase of \$1,000. But that hasn't been acted on yet by the city council.

Council members recently went on record as being critical of the county for its lack of financial support to the volunteer departments.

The city's budget for the department is used to pay telephone, electric and natural gas bills, as well as purchasing of gasoline, medical and firefighting supplies.

None of the money is paid to the police department as the fire department's portion of radio dispatching costs, as some have believed, Barrington explained.

Accentuating the department's problems of fund-raising is the fact that the city must, during the next two years, purchase a new pumper, which is considerably more expensive than a grassfire fighting truck that costs between \$30,000 and \$40,000.

Should a new pumper not be purchased, at a time designated by the state, the "key" insurance rates would be increased for homeowners and businesses.

Evans said he was hopeful the commissioners' court would hike its funding for the local department to approximately \$20,000. He said, however, that hope and actual money could be well apart.

Firemen plan to earn money to help purchase new grassfire trucks by helping the sheriff deputy group that plans to have the Beach Boys here for a concert soon, as well as other fundraising projects.

Flames destroy landmark

Iowa Park firemen were unable to save either of two structures that burned Saturday, one of them an old landmark.

Volunteers were called out at 1:32 a.m. to the Valley Farms Community House, and again at 12:49 p.m. to the 300 block of East Pecan, where a mobile home was ablaze.

Despite the fact Iowa Park had several of its trucks joined by members of the West Wichita Volunteer Fire Dept., efforts to save the old Community House, built between 1934-38 by the WPA, were unsuccessful.

The old structure was deeded to the Wichita Valley Education Center in 1945, and returned to Farmers Home Administration in January, 1987.

It was offered for sale by invitation bids that were opened June 30 this year, and awarded to realtor Monte Beasley Aug. 9.

The owner said he was refused by two companies to cover the building with insurance.

Beasley said two individuals were developing plans to restore the structure to its original beauty.

"The great loss is the historical value and the many memories of those who have used and enjoyed this meeting place for so many functions," Beasley said.

"I pray that the individual who destroyed this magnificent piece of history will seek phychiatric help and alleviate their problem," he said.

Beasley, who blames arsonists, said there had been four fires in the area recently, and that the sheriff's office is investigating the fire.



Sounds simple, but when you have several thousand Iowa Parkans in the stands saying it in unison, it'll send chills down you spine as well as the spines of the opponents.

School budget, tax set

Iowa Park school trustees Tuesday night approved a budget for the 1988-89 school year and adopted a tax rate to fund it.

The budget of \$5,778,767 will be partially funded with a tax rate of 81-cents per \$100 valuation, with the balance coming from state and federal funding.

The tax rate is five cents higher than the 1987-88 rate of 76-cents. Of



the 81-cents, 77.5-cents will go to the general operating fund and 3.5cents to pay bonded indebtedness.

The board also amended the 1987-88 budget, which reflects a carryover of \$1,333,000 into the next year. Of that amount, Supt. Glen Mitchell said \$1,213,734 was in the general operating fund, \$96,505 in the interest and sinking fund, and \$9,967 in the cafeteria fund.

Board members expressed satisfaction with the carryover, in view of the fact that the three-classroom and restroom wing built at Bradford Elementary this summer was paid for.

Also during the meeting, trustees approved appraisers and appraisal periods (of teachers) and also appointed an asbestos coordinator and "LEA designated person."

Teacher appraisers, other than the respective campus principals, this year will be Weldon Bates and Newman Young, retired superintendents from Bryson and Seymour, respectively, Supt. Mitchell and Assistant Superintendent Robert Palmer.

Two appraisal periods were set for level-one teachers: Sept. 19-Jan. 18, and Jan. 24-May 26. Levels two and three teachers will be appraised Sept. 19-May 26.

"Formal observations shall not be conducted on the last instructional day before any official school holiday," trustees were informed.

HOLLIDAY - Following a budget hearing of the Holliday School Board of Trustees, the tax rate and budget for the 1988-89 school year was adopted during a called session Monday night.

The tax rate will stay the same as last year, according to Supt. Dan Owen, at 89.92-cents per \$100 valuation.

This was no easy fete, according to Owen, who reported the budget was approved at \$2,730,063, some \$35,000 more than last year. The board managed to keep the increase in the budget limited, even with the

\$60,000 automatic state-mandated increase in salaries.

Thursday, Sept. 1, 1988

Owen said a school bus that was hoped to be purchased for the new year was taken off the budget, and the number of personnel at the school was kept the same.

Owen said the school has hired six additional teachers in the last three years, and kept up with the classroom building requirements as a result of House Bill 72. All of the state-mandated improvements were made without additional funding from the state and Owens said he hopes for more state funds this year.

Hawks please coach in scrimmage

Head Hawk Len Williams said he was very pleased with the varsity's play in Friday's scrimmage here against Olney, pointing out that the players displayed a marked improvement over the earlier scrimmage with Holliday.

Except for two big plays, the Hawks held the visiting Cubs defensively, while the offense was plainly superior to the Class AA team.

The Hawks scored once and racked up 92 yards rushing and converted on one of five pass attempts for another 14 yards, while mustering eight first downs on its initial 20play offensive series. They were even more dominating in the second series, scoring twice, gaining 182 yards (94 rushing and 88 passing on three of six attempts) and rolling up nine first downs.

As was the case in the scrimmage at Holliday, the opponents had their most success in the initial 20-play series, thanks to two plays.

The Cubs scored twice, rolling up 81 yards rushing and 85 passing (three of nine attempts completed and one interception), and gaining six first downs.

In that series, one pass completion gained 62 yards, and a broken play turned into a 41-yard scoring run by the elusive

quarterback.

However, in their second series on offense, the Cubs were held to only 20 yards rushing and eight yards passing (one of five with one interception), lost two fumbles and gained only two first downs.

Total statistics of each team's 40 plays included: (Iowa Park first) 17-8 first downs; 186-101 rushing; 102-93 passing; 4 of 11 and 4 of 14 passes; 288-194 total yards offensively; 0-4 turnovers.

Each team was given the ball five plays at the end of the scrimmage for a goal line stand. Olney scored three times to Iowa Park's two.

Bank franchise tax paid to school, city

The bank franchise tax allocation to Iowa Park city and school this year is down somewhat from last year, but the reduction is not as low as the state average, according to the state comptroller's office.

The city received \$10,811.65, down 3.90-percent from \$11,249.91 paid last year.


The school's \$10,217.51 portion is 6.25-percent lower than the \$10,899.21 it received in 1987.

However, this year's allocation is 21-percent lower than last year over the state, the comptroller said.

Allocations represent franchise taxes paid by banks that do business in Texas. Banks must file a report with the comptroller's office by Mar. 15 each year.

The bank franchise tax rate is the same as the state's corporate franchise tax rate -- \$6.70 per \$1,000 of taxable capital and surplus, with a minimum tax of \$150.

The Texas legislature authorized the bank franchise tax in 1984, and the tax was collected for the first time in 1985.






On training cruise

Atapco of Midland has revealed plans to drill four 1,950-ft. developmental wells in the Wichita County Regular Field, five miles southwest of Burkburnett.

The Nos. 71-A and 72-A H. Reilly will be located in a 2,100-acre lease in the J. Ellis Survey. The leases are 5,100 feet from the northerly line and 929 feet from the northwesterly line, and 750 feet from the north line and 2,465 feet from the east line of the survey, respectively.

Silver called it a "penny wise and pound foolish" decision made despite the widespread popularity of the IRA, which he emphasized is not a "fat cat deduction.'



Silver noted, "The Congress made a deal with the American public that if they would set aside up to \$2,000 each year for their retirement, the government would provide them with the incentive of a tax deduction for that amount.

"The individual would win by building up a retirement nest egg to supplement social security and other pension plans and the nation as a whole wins because of increased savings and capital formation.'

The IRA deduction does not represent a permanent loss to the tax revenue because when IRA holders retire and withdraw their funds, all the money is fully taxed at the individuals' normal rates. In the meantime, however, it's invested in



ing mutual fund investments. This most successful of all retirement plans is used primarily by middle-income American families. Three of every five IRA holders have incomes of under \$40,000 a year and the annual incomes of more than 75 percent are under \$50,000.

In this nation of complicated ta laws and what are perceived as tax dodges for the rich, the IRA stands out as a simple but workable retirement program. It exists at a time when millions of Americans are unsure if they will receive social security benefits when they retire, or if they will have ample retirement funds.


