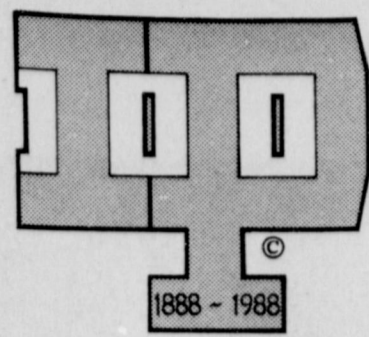

Hawks on road Friday to renew Ram rivalry

Iowa Park hits the road Friday to resume a rivalry with Mineral Wells. It will be the first meeting between the Hawks and Rams since 1983.

Iowa Park is still looking for its first win of the season after losing 12-25 to Burkburnett, 7-16 to Abilene Wylie and 13-14 last week to Breckenridge.

The Class AAAA Rams are 2-1 for the season. They knocked off the Class AAAAA Kangaroos of Weatherford 12-7 in the season opener, but fell 6-12 to Burkburnett. Last week, Mineral Wells took measure of Aledo by a 33-18 margin.

The rivalry between Iowa Park and Mineral Wells began in 1976, when that school dropped down from AAAAA classification and into the same district with the Hawks.

The Rams won the first three games, 13-6, 28-12 and 21-14, before the two clubs tied 14-14 in 1979.

The two clubs traded out on wins the last four contests. Iowa Park won its first game over the Rams 14-3 in 1980, fell 0-9 the following year, won 24-16 in '82, and lost 10-14 in the last meeting.

Head Hawk rates Ram quarterback John Ruelas, a 5-11, 180-pound junior, as a strong runner, good passer, crafty and smart.

"They don't run the veer, but he's liable to lateral off the ball any time he's carrying and gets into trouble," Williams said.

Offensively, the Rams running and passing are well balanced, according to the scouting report.

Mineral Wells has size, with nine players on the roster weighing between 200 and 235.

Iowa Park's depth in the line, which was the team's main strength at the beginning of the season, is being depleted.

Mike Lubinski is out for the season, *Chuck Brown is still recuperating* from a recurring knee injury, Pete Armstrong and Jay Loggins are hobbling with leg injuries, but are

able to play.

Then, in Friday's game against Breckenridge, another big lineman, 218-pound tackle Tony Taylor, suffered a severe ankle sprain. He was still on crutches Monday, and is questionable for Friday's contest.

But the injuries aren't restricted to the linemen.

The Hawks went into Friday's Breckenridge game with only one quarterback, Sophomore Jimmy Duggins, in uniform.

Senior Dan Fannin stood on the sidelines in his civilian clothes and jersey, restricted by a leg injury. He said he could suit out should Duggins go down, however.

The only backup for Duggins was Junior Bruce Palmer, a wide receiver who hasn't quarterbacked in a couple of years.

Coach Williams said he feels his team is improving each week, eliminating most of the early-season errors that has plagued the club.

Friday's game will be the first of three on the road. The Hawks will travel the following week to Gainesville, and then open Dist. 5-AAA play at Bowie, before returning home Oct. 14 to take on Bridgeport.

City receives 5-plus inches

Iowa Park received more than five inches of rainfall over the weekend from the remnants of Hurricane Gilbert.

Virgil Woodfin measured 2.53 inches Saturday and 2.74 Sunday for a total of 5.27 inches, but some residents have reported finding more than six inches in buckets and other gauges.

No serious flooding was reported, but motorists were having an extremely hard time getting around town before the rain stopped Sunday evening.

Some streets in the south part of town, primarily East Garden and Valley Drive, were impassable. And almost every street in flat areas that carries watershed runoff was running over its curbs.

Police received some calls on stranded motorists who flooded out in deep waters. No reports were received, however, of any home floodings.

Schools set open house

Iowa Park schools are making plans for parents and patrons to visit Bradford and Kidwell elementary schools, as well as the junior high next week.

Bradford open house will be Monday, with activities beginning at 7 p.m. with the P-TA meeting in the cafeteria. Following the meeting, the public is invited to visit classrooms and meet teachers until 8:30.

Kidwell P-TA meeting will be at 7 p.m. Tuesday with that school's P-TA meeting, and classroom visitation will also continue until 8:30.

Junior High open house will be from 7 to 8:30 p.m. Monday, and teachers will be in their rooms to receive visitors.

Burglar strikes again

Iowa Park police are investigating the second burglary of a business to have occurred here in two weeks.

All Occasions, the floral shop on West Highway, was struck by an apparent small, in size, burglar who was able to crawl through a restroom window that was only 19 inches wide and 10 inches high.

The burglary, which resulted in the loss of \$50 in cash, took place sometime Monday night or early Tuesday morning.

Using a window on the east side of the building that is partially hidden from view by an air conditioner

unit and tree, the burglar knocked out the glass, stepped down on the commode tank with muddy shoes, and rummaged through the business.

About two weeks earlier, someone knocked out the glass in the front door of Louis Jewelry, and then glass in a front showcase, and removed at least three expensive items.

Another burglary was reported to police Saturday afternoon, but was of a residence.

Someone removed a temporary wood covering on a mobile home damaged earlier by fire at 305 E. Pecan, and took a portable sewing machine valued at \$90.

A tire was slashed on a car parked in the 1300 block of Edgemoor, sometime Sunday night, police were told.

Officers were unable to locate a white male, believed to be in his 20s, who was driving west bound on US 287 in a gold and white pickup Friday morning, and stopped in the area of FM 368 and exposed himself to other traffic.

Police arrested John Duane Burke, 46, at 12:49 p.m. Friday on

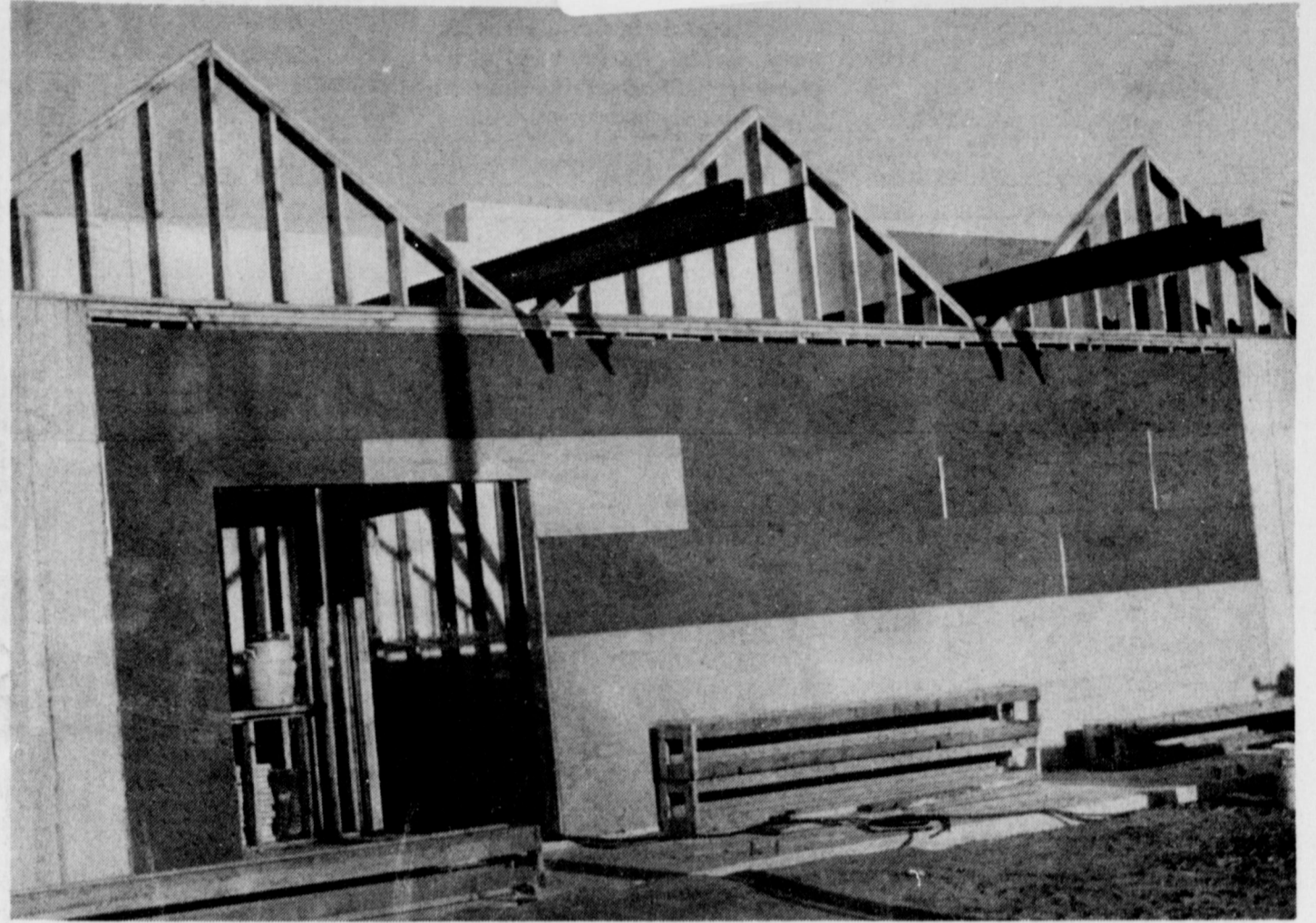
Register now to be in parade

Long-time residents are due certificates

Residents who have lived in the Iowa Park school district 10 or more years will receive a certificate from the Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce during the 100th anniversary and Whoop-T-Do celebration Oct. 22.

Certificates will be awarded in four categories to persons present to receive them that day, according to *Tom Clapp, chairman of that particular committee.*

Age classifications will be 10-25 years residency, 25-50, 51-75 and 75-and-over.

The project was one of several discussed during Monday's monthly

meeting of the Chamber board of directors.

Also disclosed is a project to bury another time capsule, similar to the one buried at the library grounds during the Texas Sesquicentennial.

The new capsule is to be buried near the corner of Cash and Wall, on the lot where the Chamber's new office is under construction.

Also during the program, a ribbon cutting ceremony will be held to commemorate the new Chamber building. And if the interior is completed, public inspection will be en-

couraged.

As part of the centennial ceremony, community historian Lita Watson will give a brief history of Iowa Park.

A special registration area will be set up for all attending the events to be listed. At that time, persons can post their years residency in the area. The registration booth project is being chaired by Dr. Richard Carver.

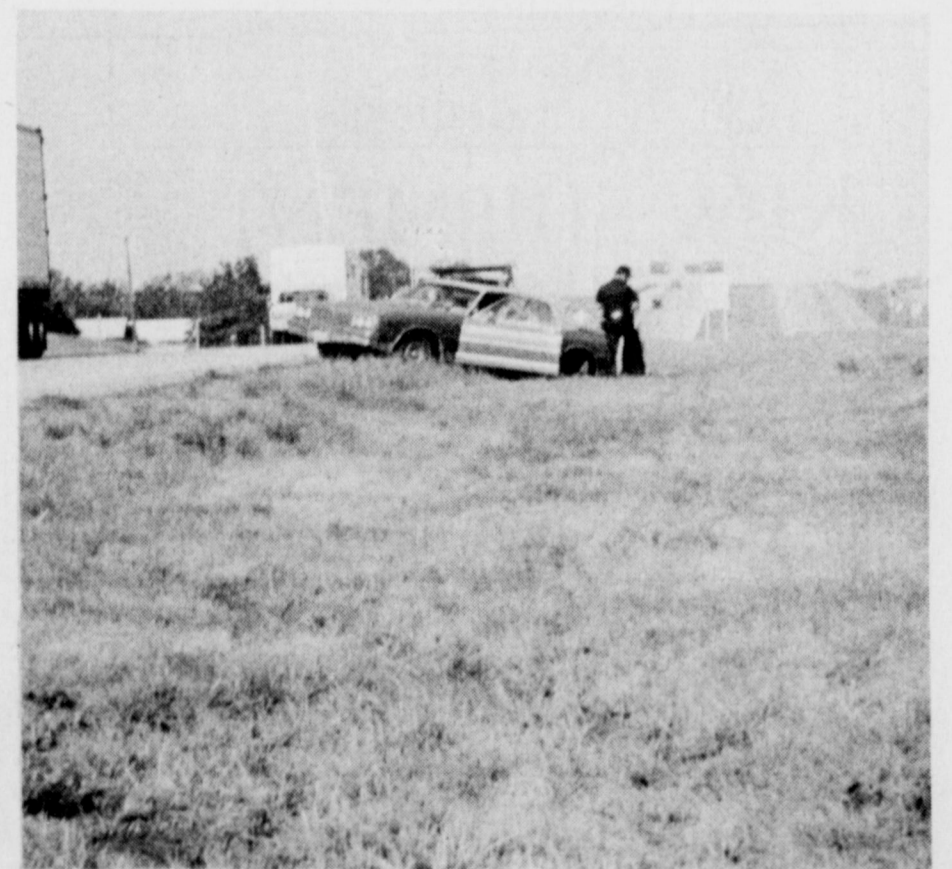
Additional entertainment is being planned for this year's special Whoop-T-Do, including a singing group from Sheppard AFB, a variety show, dog show, cloggers, hat contest, lip synchronize contest, the annual Turtle Trot, and a new event sponsored by the Epsilon Eta Sorority, to name a Centennial King and Queen (regulations for entries have not yet been completed).

Prizes to be awarded in the various events will be a paperweight stone with a centennial logo, to commemorate the 100th anniversary of Iowa Park.

Also discussed during the directors' business session were: date of the annual banquet will be Jan. 21; the All-Membership Luncheon, at which officers are elected, will be Nov. 21; a composite of old home movies transferred onto video tape is underway; community map project is about three-quarters financed, and the Chamber raised \$454 in commission with its aluminum can project.

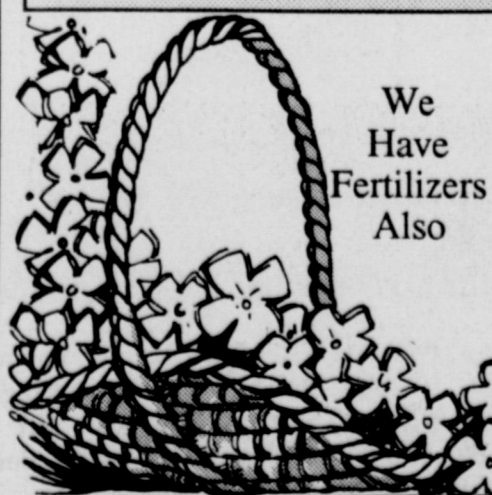

Those who ordered Hawk backpacks from the Kidwell P-TA last spring and haven't yet picked them up, have until Sunday to do so.

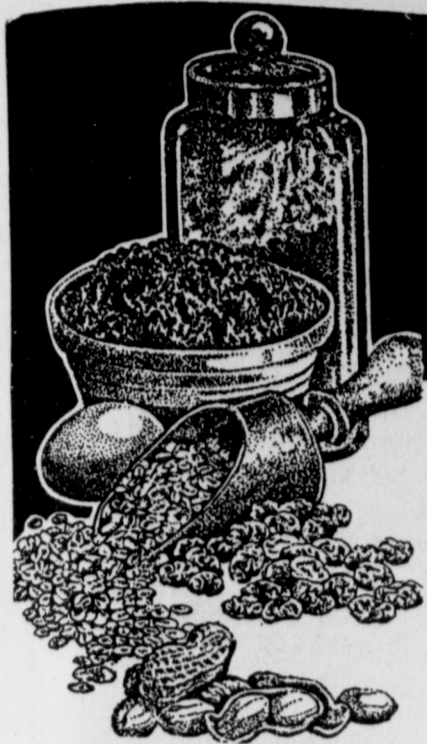
The backpacks will be available at 1005 First St., or by calling 592-9507. Those not picked up by Sunday will be sold to the public.

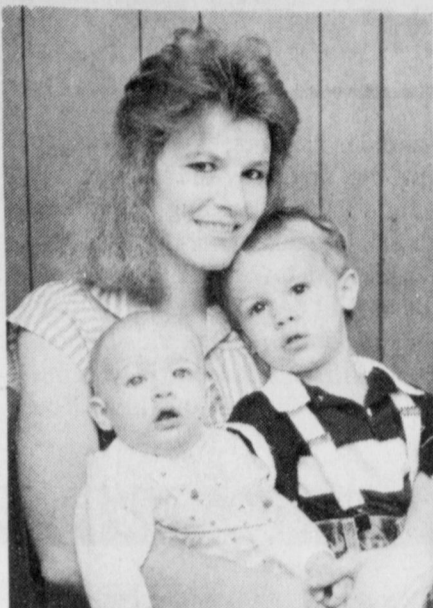
YANKEE PUMPKIN PIE

All mail to those countries are being embargoed, according to the U.S. Postal Service.

Why? The union at the British postal service is holding a general strike.

Any mail to there will be returned to the sender, and their money refunded, the announcement stated.

Attaway, unions. Take'em to their knees and get what you want! To heck with the people and the nation!

We've had a couple of similar situations in the United States that are almost equal.

For instance, that bunch of nurses out in California. They struck, and then turned down a contract that would have made them the highest-paid nurses in the nation.

Attaway, unions. Let'em die. Get what you want!

And now comes the spokesman for the teacher's union in Texas, who wants a \$5,000 salary increase for all teachers in the state.

The head of the Texas State Teachers Association has been saying the teachers haven't gotten a salary increase in two years and have slipped in ranking among the states.

He even pointed to a survey conducted of Texans, as saying teachers should get more money.

I don't disagree one should get what he can, or is worth. But did that survey inform those who were quizzed that teachers of Texas are receiving a \$1,450 annual increase until they reach \$26,600? Or did those posing the questions mention that there are raises earned on the three-ladder system?

Those are all part of House Bill 72.

And local bonuses and benefits paid by the various school districts are also not included.

9-1-1 budget on agenda for city Monday night

The city council will again consider the proposed annual budget of the 911 emergency phone system, at Monday's regularly-scheduled meeting.

Over the years, it's become apparent that union leaders must make a big fuss about salaries or benefits, in order to justify their being.

There is only one reason for the timing of the TSTA leadership. The Texas Legislature is about to open another session in January, and he wants to get his big foot in the door.

About that \$5,000 each teacher should get as an increase in salary: there are several heads of households here in Iowa Park, who still haven't found work since the slump in the oil business, who likely won't make that much this entire year.

I think our TSTA loudmouth would do well to lay low at least a couple more years before he adds to his blunder.

Aldermen are to convene at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

The council took no action on the proposal at its last meeting.

Two ordinances are on Monday's agenda. One would name the road between US 287 and entrance to Lake Iowa Park "Wigley Road."

The second ordinance affects "updated service credits" in the Texas Municipal Retirement System, and affects employees, retirees and beneficiaries of deceased retirees of the city.

Two resolutions are on the agenda that would name two foreign students attending Iowa Park High School "honorary citizens" of the city and recognizing their "contributions to the cultural enrichment of this community."

The students are Naoki Itoh and Laure Fourlel.

Widow accepts husband's medal

"Awarded to Floyd W. Merriman for Honorable Service While a Prisoner of War."

That is the inscription on the medal presented posthumously Friday morning at Sheppard AFB, and accepted by his widow, Betty Merriman.

Presentation was made by Maj. Gen. David W. Forgan, following a dedication service for the POW/MIA memorial on the parade grounds, a T-38 Flyover, in Missing Man formation, by the 90th Flying Training

Sqdn., and parade. Following the presentations, 158 balloons were released, symbolic of 158 Texas MIAs. A luncheon followed.

Merriman was captured by the Japanese in May of 1942 during the fall of Corregidor, and released when the Japanese surrendered in 1945.

He was only 17 years of age when captured, after having enlisted in the U.S. Army in February of 1941 at the age of 16.

Merriman passed away in January of 1977.

Lets not leave these kids behind. We can show our leadership with improving the future of our kids. You

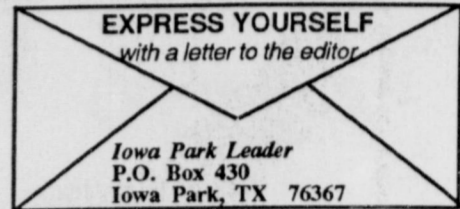
never know they might return the deed to their own some day. G.L. Tucker

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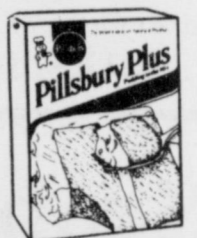
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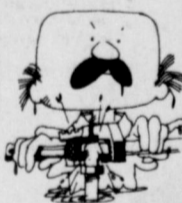
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Bucks topple Hawks 14-13

Iowa Park's attempt to score a two-point conversion fell short, and the Hawks dropped their third game of the season 14-13 to Breckenridge here Friday in a non-conference game.

The Hawks mounted two sustained drives to score, with the second touchdown pulling the Mean Green to within one point of their visitors.

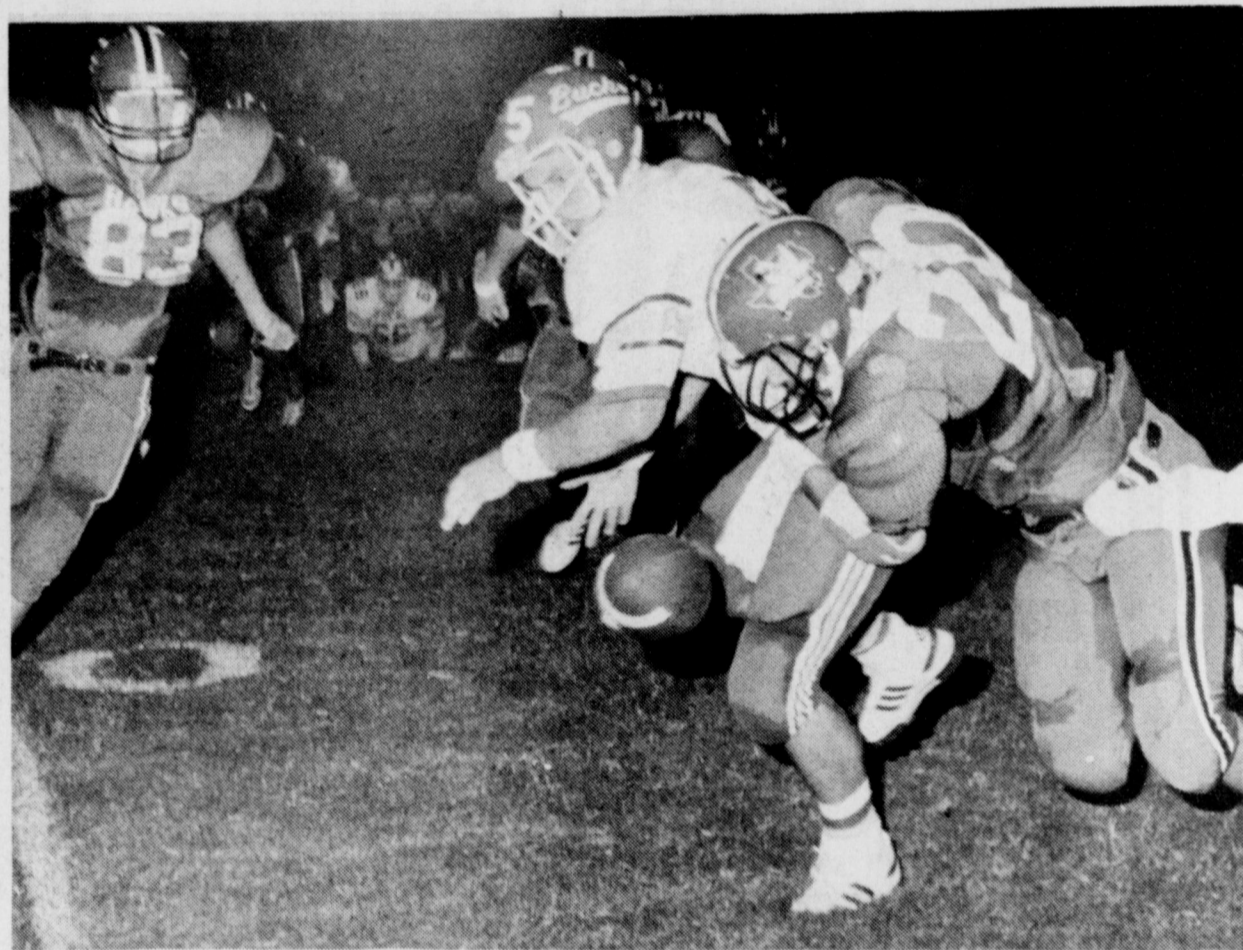
Iowa Park scored on its first possession to cap a 50-yard drive, and then, after Breckenridge had taken a 14-7 lead with two second-quarter touchdowns, mounted a 56-yarder.

With 5:18 still remaining on the scoreboard clock, quarterback Jimmy Duggins attempted a rollout around his right end, attempting to put the hawks in the lead by a point, and was cut down at the four yard line.

The Hawk defense held Breckenridge twice more after that, handing the ball over to the offense, first with 3:10 remaining at the Hawk 40, and the last time at the Buckaroo 45 with 17 seconds remaining.

The final play of the game was a 60-yard field goal attempt by Kelly McClure, who had a mild breeze to his back. But it fell short and to the left of the goal posts.

Breckenridge, on the second play from scrimmage, lost the ball on a fumble when Marc Cruz tackled the runner and Ken Allen covered it on the 50 yard line. It was the first of four turnovers

suffered by the visiting Bucks, two fumbles and a pair of interceptions.

Three carries by fullback Matthew Blackman, one a 37-yarder, plus a one-yarder by the other fullback, Gary Tatum, quickly took the ball to the Breckenridge seven yard line. After each team took five-yard penalties, Duggins hit Michael Johnson in the end zone to light up the scoreboard for the first time, and McClure split the uprights with his kick for a 7-0 lead. Only 1:59 had ticked off the clock at that point.

Breckenridge was given an opportunity to score late in the second quarter when an exchange of the ball between Duggins and Bunkie Imboden failed and the Bucks covered on the Hawk 31. However, four plays later, Iowa Park took over on the 32.

A pair of interceptions the remaining portion of the second quarter thwarted Breckenridge's attempt to score. The first was by Vance Edwards on the Hawk 21 and the other, on the final play of the half, was at the Iowa Park 19 by Imboden.

Breckenridge scored midway in the third period on a fluke play. Nailed back on their own 19, the Buckaroos attempted a long pass play, and the receiver was covered by two defenders, Edwards and Imboden. Their efforts knocked the ball into the air, and each other to the ground, and the receiver took the ball about the 50 and scampered untouched into the end zone. The play covered 81 yards, and the score was tied at 7-7 with 5:54 remaining in the third.

Breckenridge was driving on its next possession, but a fumble was covered by Bruce Palmer on the Hawk 31, ending the drive.

From there, the Hawks marched to the Bucks' 36 before stalling. Breckenridge quickly got off a pair of 19-yard runs on the next two plays, and used seven more plays to go into the lead, scoring on a four-yard plunge over right guard.

Iowa Park took the following kickoff and drove to the Breckenridge one yard line, from where

Duggins, on fourth down, leaped the final yard for the score. The drive had featured three pass completions by Duggins, 14 yards to Tatum, an 11-yarder to Raul Swanson and 19 more to Imboden, which carried the ball to the six yard line.

Coach Len Williams said a miscommunication on the play he sent in for the extra point attempt doomed the play.

"I felt like we played better (than the previous two games)," Williams later commented. "Our quarterback played real well, with the exception of the extra point try. And we had time to score late in the game, but he was sacked two times

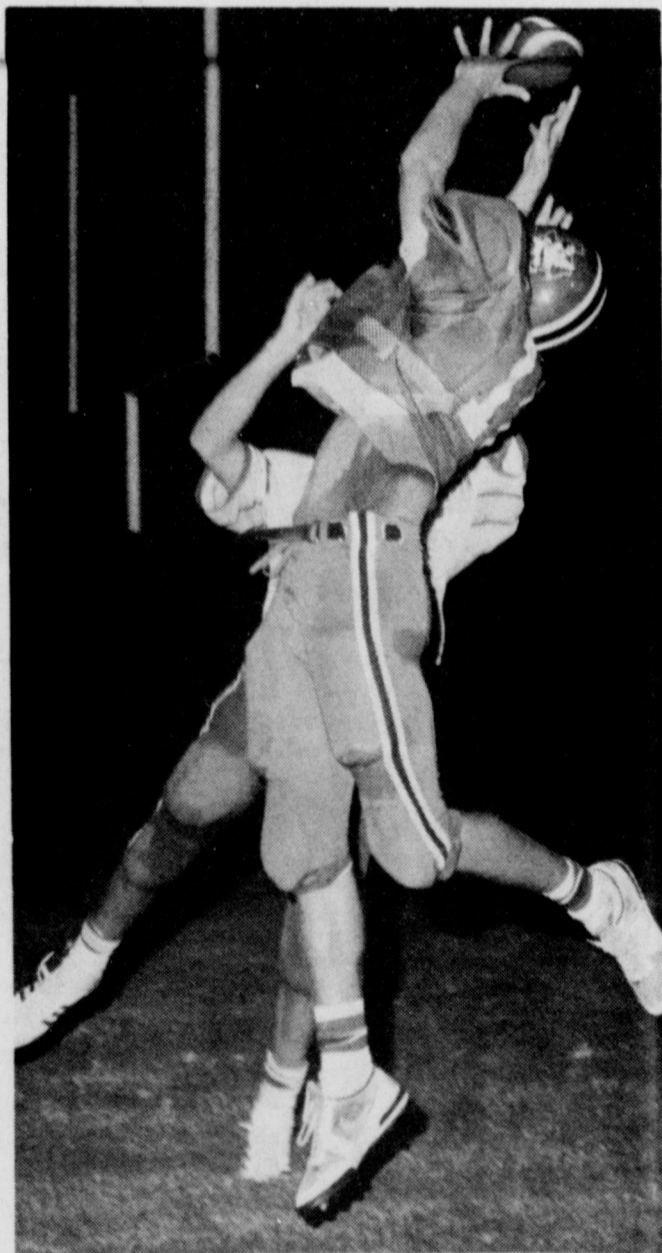
"They (Breckenridge) adjusted at the half to stop our base (running) plays. We were running against a nine-man front, and that opened up our passing game," he said.

For the evening, Duggins connected on 13 attempts with his receivers, to gain 82 yards.

Blackman, in the sophomore's second game with the varsity, gained 95 yards on 18 carries. Cruz carried 15 times for 68 yards and Tatum 10 for 27.

Big defensive plays were credited to Ken Allen, McClure, Jimmy Nicholson, Palmer, Edwards, Imboden and Lee Cokendolpher.

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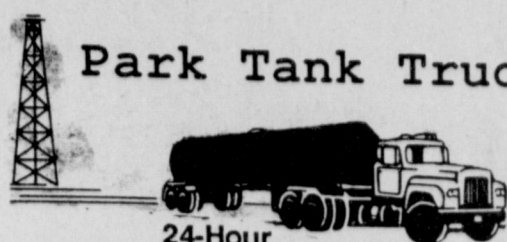

Pumping 136 barrels of oil per day, along with 10,000 CF casinghead gas, the No. 14-C C. Birk "C" was completed in Wichita County Regular Field by Commonwealth Producers of Dallas.

Drillsite is 3.5 miles northeast of Clara.

It was drilled to 1,686-ft. total depth and will produce from a perforated interval in the Gunsight Formation, 1,598 to 1,602 feet into the wellbore.

The location is in a 160-acre unit in the F. Huseman Survey. The well is located 1,290 feet from the south line and 1,135 feet from the west line of the survey.

At a location five miles northwest of Burkburnett, Wills Oil of Wichita Falls has finalized a new oil producer in the Wichita County Regular Field.

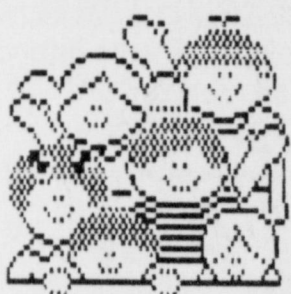

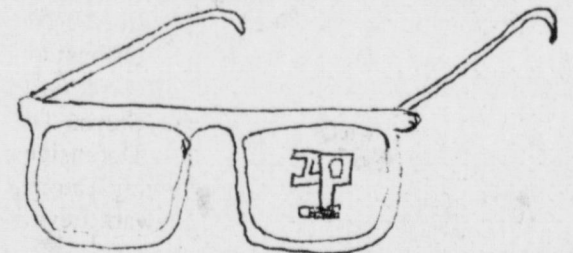

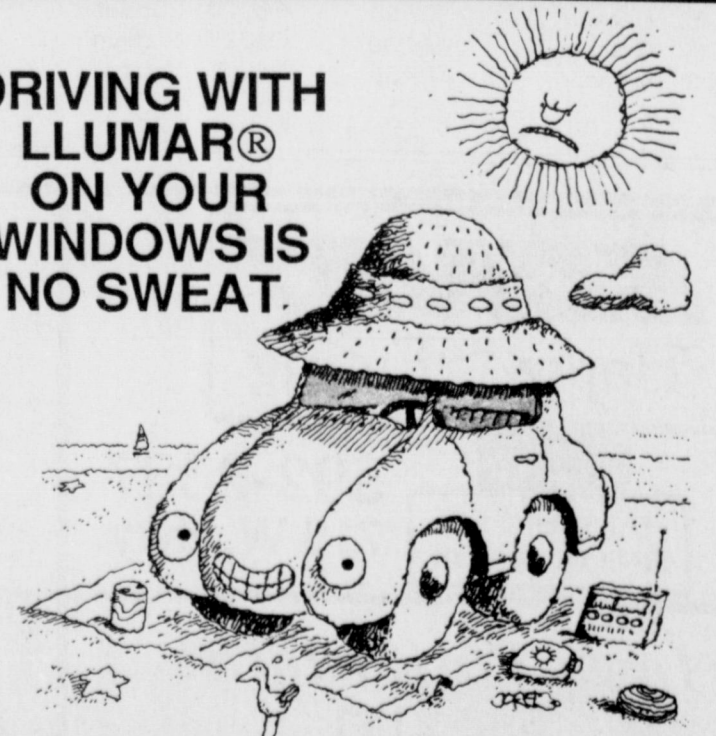

Watch offers for traveling jobs

Persons interested in being employed as a traveling (or door-to-door) sales representative should proceed with caution.

Ads offering good pay, glamour, travel, training and advancement are often used to recruit the young and unemployed. These ads usually don't indicate the company's name - only the name and local phone number of the recruiter.

Those who answer the ads are usually interviewed at a local hotel or motel. Those interviewed generally must quickly decide whether or not to accept the job.

What they find out - often once they're on the road and away from home - is that the job involves door-to-door sales for magazines, books, chemical cleaners or other products, and conditions are not at all as expected.

Crew members work long hours under close supervision. There is pressure to meet sales quotas, and pay is by commission only. Some salespersons have been left stranded, far from home, when they haven't made enough sales or have challenged the rules of the company.

Some state laws require a door-to-door salesperson to immediately show customers identification indicating who they are, the name of the company they represent, and the purpose of the visit. In many cities and counties the sales crews must register with local authorities.

Often sales supervisors ignore such regulations and do not tell their salespersons they are violating the law.

For those considering this type of job, always check out the company with the Better Business Bureau office located nearest its headquarters. Get all details in writing about the job, such as food and lodging programs, who is to pay for or provide transportation, etc. If at all possible, try to speak to several persons who have worked in sales for the company you are considering. Never be pressured into taking a job before checking out the company to your satisfaction.

On the other side of the front door are the customers who are dogged with sales pitches such as "vote for me" by buying a subscription; "I can win a scholarship with your help;" "I have almost enough points to win an award so I can start my own business."

Some salespersons claim part of the purchase price is donated to a charitable organization. In reality, most salespersons never sell near the number of products needed to win an award or contest, if one, in fact, exists.

As to donations to a charitable organization, the facts show that such donations are not made or the amount donated is so insignificant as to be meaningless.

Consumers are protected by federal regulations. In door-to-door sales of \$25 or more, consumers have the right to cancel, in writing, a transaction up until midnight of the third business day after the date of purchase. The rule also requires the salesperson to tell you of your right to cancel, give you a contract or receipt, and give you two copies of a notice of cancellation form.

If a customer cancels, the seller must, within 10 days, refund all money paid including any processing and handling fees.

• Exercise every day; it stimulates your body's production of adrenaline, which is a natural decongestant.

• Minimize exposure to allergy-producing substances such as tree and grass pollens, animal danders (including woolen fabrics and feather pillows), mildew and mold.

• Change the filters monthly in your air conditioning and heating system.

• Don't overheat your house, and be sure it is well humidified in the cold, dry months.

• Keep your head elevated two to four inches when you are sleeping by raising the head of your bed with bricks.

• Use decongestants if you do not have high blood pressure or irregular heart rhythms.

• Use antihistamines if allergy is a problem.

• Wash your hands after close contact with people who have colds. Nose-to-hand, hand-to-hand, hand-to-nose is the way most colds are transmitted.

• Consult a physician if your stuffy nose persists more than a week's time or if pain or yellow discharge develops.

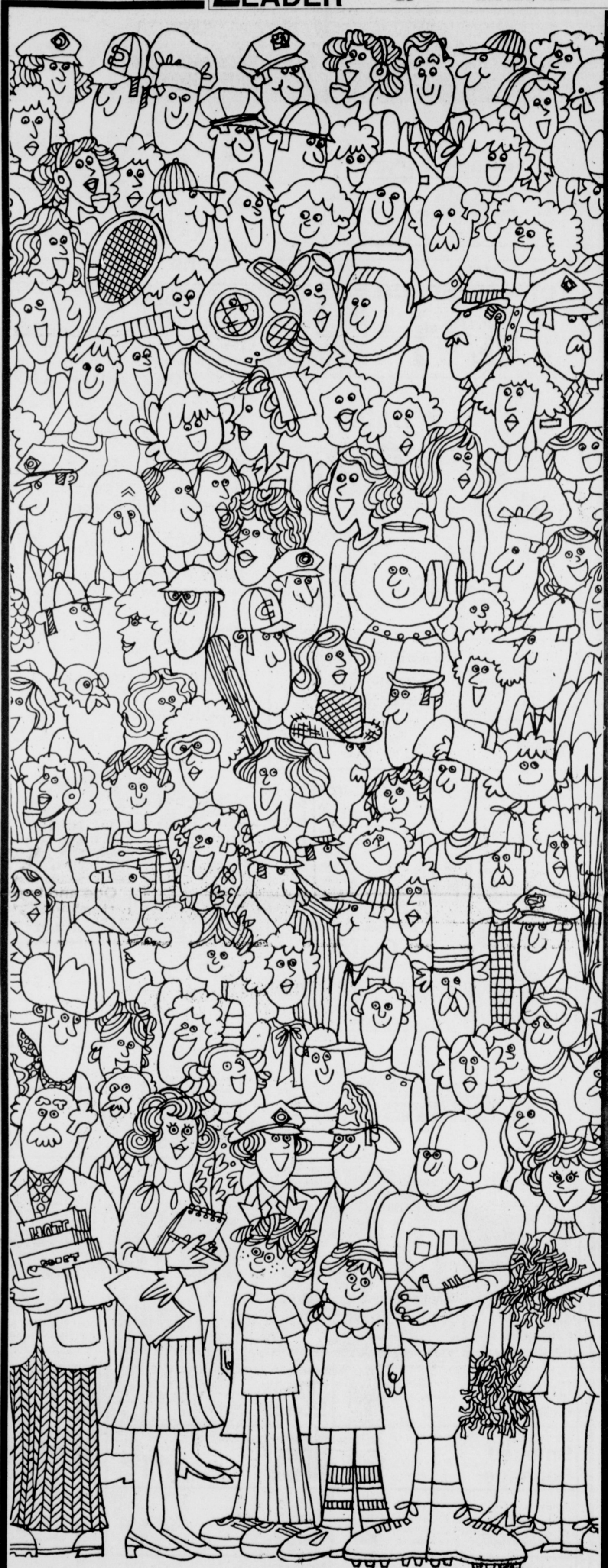
