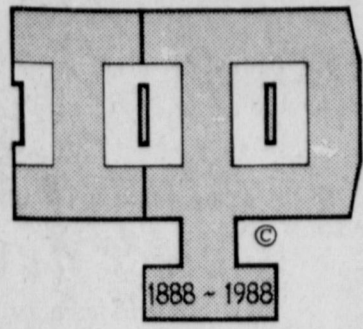

## Four ordinances on council agenda

Four ordinances will be considered by the city council when it meets at 7 p.m. Monday in council chambers.

Three would abandon portions of streets while the fourth rezones a strip of land.

The streets concerned are: 12.5 feet of 100 block of West Lafayette on the south side of Block 116; 20 feet off the 400 block of North Victoria, on the east side of Block 62, and 20 feet of 600 block of North Victoria on the east side of Block 33.

If passed, the other ordinance would rezone the south 40 feet of Lot three, Block 13, of Redin Heights, from R-1 to C-C. The land adjoins K&K Foods, and would be changed from residential to convenience commercial.

Two resolutions will also be considered.

One would be in opposition to

the Environmental Protection Agency requirements regarding lead and copper content in water supply systems.

The other would accept the certified tax rolls for the year 1989.

Aldermen will consider authorizing the city administrator to purchase cars for the police department, after having received bids which were advertised.

Under the administrator's report, aldermen will consider a possible site on the south side of town for a water tower, and also "discuss FEMA mandates."

Next Tuesday is the regular date for the Iowa Park school trustee meeting, but it has been rescheduled for Oct. 18, because of a conflict with other meetings.

## 'Petition' retracted, apologies issued

The petition that was presented Monday of last week to the city council was picked up Thursday afternoon by the woman who made the presentation and her husband.

LARRY and Janice Payton explained that the wording of the petition was not the same as was on the original petitions they had passed around to be signed.

The petition had called for the firings of City Administrator James Barrington and Chief of Police Alan Sheffield, but also made numerous accusations and accused members of the city council of not acting in the best interest of the citizens.

Mr. and Mrs. Payton telephoned city hall Thursday afternoon, and asked to meet with the mayor, Tim Hunter, and retrieve the petition.

When they arrived at city hall, they saw a television cameraman from Wichita Falls entering the building, and asked to meet with the mayor, administrator and chief in a different location.

The meeting was held, in private, in the police station, where the petition was returned to them.

The couple met with Leader Editor Bob Hamilton Friday, to explain their reason for taking back the article.

The husband acknowledged that the document, represented as a petition, turned over to the city council was not the same as had been passed around for signatures.

While he would not go on record identifying who wrote the final document, he explained that the original

contained several misspelled words and words marked out, so he had turned it over to an individual to be re-typed.

He did not receive the final document until about 6:30 p.m., which was just before the council meeting where it was to be presented.

When he looked at it, he found it had been "totally changed" from what he had asked to be typed.

Because it was not the petition he and others had circulated for signatures, he said he was embarrassed and wanted to withdraw it.

Payton said he didn't want anyone to feel he had the wording changed after they signed the petitions.

He dictated a statement he wanted to reach the public, especially those who had signed the petitions. He said:

"I want to apologize to the people. I didn't start the petition, and I didn't write the final petition.

"I was representing the people on these tax dollars. Those who started the petition were standing back and letting me do all the dirty work. The people who started it had a grudge against the city administrator and police chief.

"And I want to apologize to the city administrator, chief of police, the city council, and the people of Iowa Park. We hope that we still have our friends in Iowa Park," Payton said.

Payton wasn't the only person who reacted after the Leader published the final petition in last week's edi-

tion.

Another man, who admitted he could not read and explained he had been told the petition asked that the council not raise taxes by seven cents, told Barrington he wanted to strike the 60 signatures he had collected. He said the final petition was not what he had asked people to sign.

Hunter, after meeting Thursday with the Paytons, said those who had signed the petitions were concerned about streets, water, taxes and services.

He said he had received numerous telephone calls after the article appeared in the paper from citizens. "They said they were misled or used. Our (the council) intention is to address any concern" the people have, he said.

Signatures were reproduced from the petitions that were circulated, and turned into the city hall the Wednesday before the council meeting, with a cover letter requesting time on the council agenda.

Hunter said during that meeting, and has since said, when the citizens have concerns about what the council does, they should express those concerns at the meetings, not wait and sign petitions.

Several of the issues pointed out in the petition had been fully discussed at council meetings, but seldom are any citizens in the audience to either hear discussions or offer any comments, Hunter said.

No discussion of the retrieved petition, or topics it addressed, is on Monday night's agenda.

## Hawks going hare hunting

Nonconference games are played by high school football teams for experience, and have nothing to do with district standings.

For that reason, as the Hawks travel to Bowie Friday night, Coach Len Williams says "We're starting a new season. Everybody's 0-0."

Williams, who took over as head coach of the Hawks this season, also commented on his 0-5 first-year record, saying, "It took me four years to lose this many games (at Mart)."

Not since the disastrous 1977 season, when the Hawks went 0-10, has Iowa Park entered its sixth game of the season without a win.

And if Hawk fans could have planned which team Iowa Park would take on to open their Dist. 5-AAA schedule, it would have been the Jackrabbits.

This will be the 10th meeting between the two schools in 20 seasons, and Bowie has yet to beat the Hawks.

In fact, the Jackrabbits have scored in only three of those games. The Hawks, with a 70-0 win back in 1970 and a 66-0 here last year, lead in scoring, 315 points to 33.

Most of those games have been non-conference. Bowie came into the same district with the Hawks in 1984, and was greeted with a 31-0 loss. The closest score between the two teams was in 1983, when the

Hawks emerged with a scant 21-12 decision.

But Iowa Park and Bowie didn't face each other back during the three-year period (1975-77) when Iowa Park went 1-29.

Bowie isn't much better off than the Hawks this season, as far as a win-loss record goes. The Jackrabbits

## No male barbers in town

As of Friday afternoon, for possibly the first time in the 20th century, Iowa Park is without a male barber.

Herman Rains closed his shop, sold his equipment, and with his wife has moved to Empire, Okla.

The closing also ended two other businesses the Rains' operated: Shirley's Flowers and her real estate office.

Rains' closing left one lone bar-

ber shop in Iowa Park, and it's operated by Mary Morrow, who has been in business at 900 W. Highway several years.

She said she had heard Rains was going to close, but didn't know when and wasn't aware he had closed until some new customers arrived at her shop Saturday.

She said yesterday she hadn't been overrun by new customers, but there was a noticeable increase.

At times in Iowa Park's past, there have been as many as 10 barbers plying their trade here. The number has been reducing steadily the past 20 years, and many customers have begun having their hair trimmed at beauty salons in the community.

So, like many other things, barber shops "ain't like they used to be." At least not in Iowa Park.

## Police arrest man with drugs in car

A 26-year-old man was arrested by Iowa Park police Monday on a charge of possession of marijuana and amphetamines.

Wendell Jay Frie, who lives between here and Wichita Falls, was taken into custody at 4:06 p.m. in the 100 block of Lafayette, and transported to county jail almost three hours later, according to the police blotter.

The drugs and paraphanelia were found in his vehicle.

Two other men were arrested by police last Thursday evening, one for public intoxication and shoplifting and the other on Wichita County

warrants.

They were Matthew Curt Wallace, 30, public intoxication and shoplifting at Alsups, and David Shelton Koch, 26, county warrants.

Police are investigating three reports of thefts.

A stereo was reported Monday as having been stolen from Iowa Park Recreational Activities Center; a VCR valued at \$350 was reported Sunday as having been stolen from a home in the 900 block of East Park, and gasoline was reportedly stolen from a vehicle Friday night while parked at Woodbriar Apartments.

It's also a point that the writer wanted it done, right now. Well, Friday was the end of the city's fiscal year, and the audit is already underway.

Additionally, copies of that audit are sent to different segments of the state government, and even a couple of federal agencies. Good enough?

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
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
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
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
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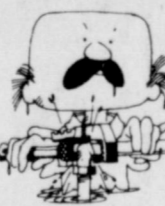
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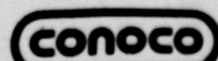


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# Leopards overtake Hawks, 28-10

The Hawks "stayed in the game" with Gainesville through the first half Friday night, and even led for a brief period in the second quarter, but suffered their fifth loss of the season, 28-10.

"I thought our defense played better against a better team, but you can't really tell it because of the score," commented Coach Len Williams afterward. "They were a very physical team, but I don't have to tell anyone that."

Two Hawks were sidelined after having their "bells rung" by hard tackling, and end Ken Allen suffered a sprained knee.

After giving up a touchdown on a 56-yard run the second time Gainesville had the ball, the Hawks tied the score on the first play of the second period, and then took a 10-7 lead with 7:12 to go in the half. But from that point on, especially in the third quarter, it was virtually all Leopards.

Gainesville took the opening kickoff, but gave the Hawks a golden opportunity on the first play from scrimmage when the handoff was bobbled in the air and Mean Green Tackle Clay Williams picked it off on the Leopards' 30.

Five consecutive carries by fullback Matthew Blackman took the ball to the 19, and a first down. Then four carries by the other fullback, Gary Tatum, took the ball to the Leopard 13, one yard short of a first down.

Gainesville picked up a couple of first downs to get the ball out to the Leopard 44, and then broke the big play to score.

The Hawks picked up a pair of firsts after taking the following kickoff, but was forced to punt the ball away. Two plays later, safety Bunkie Imboden intercepted a Leopard pass on the Gainesville 32. A penalty against the hosts took the ball to the 16, but on the last play of the opening quarter, quarterback Jimmy Duggins was sacked back on the 28.

But, after the teams switched ends of the field, Duggins hit split receiver Dan Fannin on the 16, and the senior took the ball in for the score. Kelly McClure's kick knotted the game at 7-7.

Gainesville was set back eight yards on two plays following the kickoff, on an eight-yard tackle by Rual Swanson followed by a two-yarder by Chuck Brown. Gainesville punted, and drew a major penalty on the play.

The Hawks picked up a first down on that drive,

reaching the Leopard 14, before Duggins again was sacked for a seven-yard loss. Three plays later, McClure easily split the uprights for a 32-yard field goal, and a 10-7 lead with 7:12 remaining in the half.

Gainesville returned the kickoff all the way to the Hawks' 46 and, eight plays later, scored from the nine yard line. The point after gave the Leopards enough lead that would have won the game for them. However, they would score twice more, once each in the third and fourth quarters.

Actually, the Leopards scored once more before the end of the first half, on a dippy-doodle play that saw

three different Leopards carrying the ball. But the 50-yard play was called back by the officials.

A play midway in the third quarter seemed to take whatever steam the Hawks had out of them. Gainesville was forced to punt from the Leopard 40 on its first possession of the second half. The ball hit the soft, wet turf and bounced back toward the punting team. When it did, it hit the heel of Imboden, who was about to throw a block on the defenders. Gainesville covered the ball on the Hawks' 10, and scored three plays later.

Iowa Park stopped a Gainesville drive on the first play of the final quarter, taking over the ball on the Hawk 12. They drove all the way to the Leopard 38, with the help of two major penalties against Gainesville, but stalled, unable to pick up a first down.

The Leopards scored seven plays later to nail the lid on the Hawks' coffin.

The two Hawks sidelined by hard tackles were Vance Edwards, while returning a kickoff, and Fannin, hit throwing a pass.

Besides the big defensive plays of Williams, Swanson, Brown and Imboden, Lee Cokendolpher was credited with two big tackles, Jay Loggins with three, Tatum, Kelly McClure and Jimmy Nicholson one.

Blackman carried the ball 21 times and gained a net 80 yards; Tatum 10 for 27, and Fannin two for 15.

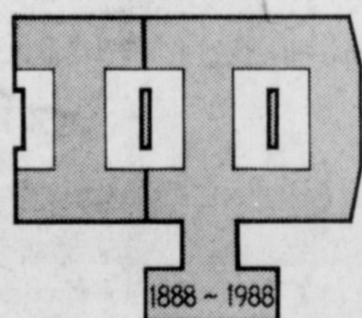
Imboden covered the three-mile course in 16:41, and placed eighth.

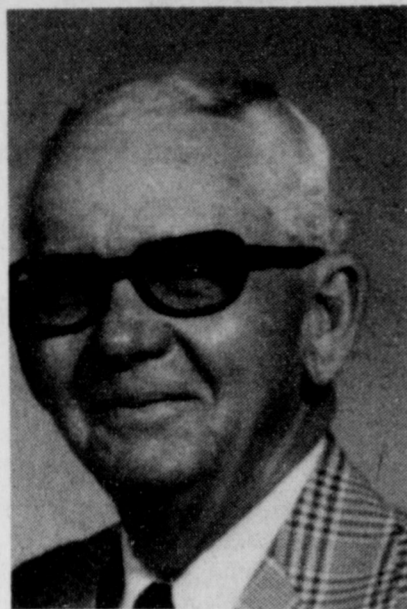

### MEXICALI CASSEROLE

1 lg. can yellow hominy, drained  
1 lg. can tamales, cut in 1/3 diagonally  
1 can vienna sausages, cut in 1/3  
1 can cream of chicken soup  
1/2 cup shredded sharp cheddar cheese

Combine hominy, vienna sausages, soup and half of the tamales. Gently mix, turn into 1 1/2 quart casserole dish. Place remaining tamales on top. Bake at 350 degrees 30 minutes. Sprinkle cheese over top and return to oven until cheese is melted. Serves 6.

### SWEET CINNAMON QUICK BREAD

**Bread:**  
2 cups all-purpose flour (not self-rising)  
1 cup sugar  
4 tsps. baking powder  
1 1/2 tsp. cinnamon  
1 1/4 tsp. salt  
1 cup buttermilk  
1/3 cup corn oil  
2 tsp. vanilla  
2 eggs  
**Streusel:**  
2 Tbsp. sugar  
1 tsp. cinnamon  
2 tsp. butter or margarine, softened

Heat oven to 350 degrees. Grease and flour bottom only of 9X5-inch loaf pan. Lightly spoon flour into measuring cup; level off. In large bowl, combine all bread ingredients; beat three minutes at medium speed. Pour batter into prepared pan. In small bowl, combine all streusel ingredients until crumbly; sprinkle over batter and swirl lightly to marble. Bake at 350 degrees for 45 to 55 minutes or until toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Remove from pan immediately. Cool completely before slicing. Wrap and refrigerate left over bread. To substitute for buttermilk, use 1 tsp. vinegar plus milk to make one cup. **NOTE:** Wrap in foil, tie with ribbon. Great Christmas gift for neighbors!

### IMPOSSIBLE PIE

2 cups milk  
3/4 cup sugar  
1/4 tsp. salt  
4 eggs  
1/2 cup flour  
3/4 tsp. butter  
1 tsp. vanilla  
Put all ingredients in blender for three to five minutes. Pour into greased and floured 10-inch pie pan. Bake 45 minutes at 350 degrees. Top with coconut or nutmeg (optional).

### SAUSAGE BALLS

3 cups Bisquick  
1 lb. sausage  
1 medium jar Cheez-Whiz  
Crumble sausage into small pieces. Melt Cheez-Whiz in microwave or double-boiler. Combine sausage, Bisquick and melted cheese to make thick dough. Shape dough into small balls and bake at 370 degrees until golden brown, about 15 minutes. May be frozen unbaked. These make great party snacks or gifts!

### BROCCOLI AND RICE CASSEROLE

(I double this for holiday dinners)

3/4 cup chopped onion  
3/4 cup chopped celery (optional)  
Saute in four tablespoons cooking oil until clear. Do not brown.  
Add:  
1 pkg. (16 oz.) frozen chopped broccoli and let cook 10 minutes.  
Add:  
1 can cream of chicken or cream of celery soup  
1/2 cup milk  
1 medium jar Cheez-Whiz  
2 cups cooked rice  
Mix and bring to a boil. Pour into casserole dish and bake 15 minutes at 350 degrees.

### PLENTY FOR TWENTY

3 lbs. hamburger, browned  
2 onions  
1 bell pepper  
1-16 oz. can tomatoes  
1 can RoTel tomatoes and chili peppers  
Simmer above ingredients 30 minutes. Then add:  
1 can enchilada sauce  
1 cup whole kernel corn  
1 can ripe olives (optional)  
1 pkg. large egg noodles, cooked  
1 lb. Velveeta cheese  
Stir until cheese melts. Cool 24 hours, then heat to serve. Great for large families or get-togethers.

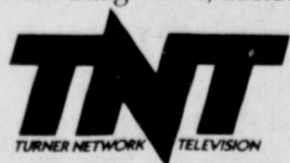

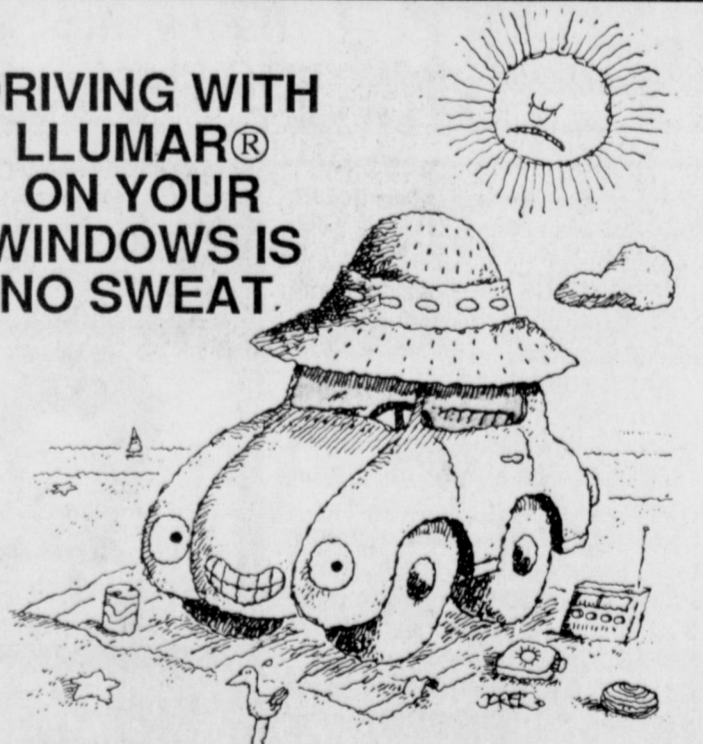
