

Hundreds expected to walk Saturday

The "Hawks Against Hunger" CROP Walk will be held here Saturday morning, raising funds to benefit the needy.

Participants will gather at the west parking lot of the high school for a brief meeting, and then proceed on a walk that is expected to last until 12-noon.

The route will be south from the high school on Johnson Road to Magnolia, east to Wall, then Bank to Hawthorne, north on Washington to Bond, south to Cash, back to Wall and back to Magnolia and Johnson to the point of origin.

Plans had originally been for the walkers to cross the old highway into the south part of town, but changed for safety purposes.

Church World Service, an ecumenical organization that responds to the needs of people, developed the

CROP Walk as a means to provide for the hungry in the United States and around the world.

Walkers solicit sponsors on the basis of miles walked, and 25-percent of all the money raised is kept in the community to help local needy.

The balance is distributed elsewhere, as it has been the past 40 years of the project.

Three "check points" have been set up: the Methodist Church, the First Christian Church and on the return trip, at the Little League ball park.

Refreshments will be served at the end of the walk by the Iowa Park MuleSkinners.

Television personality Andy Austin will make a presentation, as well as participate. Coach Len Williams will give a "Walk For Hunger Pep Talk," and he and city officials will participate in the walk, as will members of the Hawk football team and the Mean Green Marching Machine.

Several organizations are to participate, including Cub Scouts, Scout leaders, Camp Fire workers and Cub Scouts.

CELEBRATION Homecoming, Whoop-T-Do Centennial one week away

The biggest weekend of the year, and possibly the biggest since the last Texas-Oklahoma Fair in 1962, is shaping up here next week.

Added to the annual homecoming activities of Iowa Park High School and the Chamber of Commerce sponsored Whoop-T-Do, Iowa Park will be officially observing its 100th anniversary.

Where hundreds of people come home for the homecoming festivities and Whoop-T-Do, as they have since the latter was started in 1972, thousands are expected to be here for the centennial observation.

Organizers recognize, however, that next week's attendance won't be anything like the head count that was reported at the 1956 edition of the Texas-Oklahoma Fair: 260,000.

Kicking off the weekend will be a bon fire Thursday night, shortly after 7, in the vacant block just north of West Highway, between Third and Fourth Streets.

High School Principal Richard Davis is encouraging anyone with tree branches and useless lumber to donate it for the big fire. The area is being bladed by the city this week, he said.

A parade through the downtown area Thursday afternoon will carry out the centennial theme, "Looking Back, Looking Forward."

To organize at the Methodist Church this year, instead of the Junior High School, more than 20

entries will be participating.

Starting at 4:30 p.m., entries will follow a route down Bank, turning south on Wall to Cash, west on Cash to Yosemite, north on Yosemite to Park, right on Park, making the U-turn at Wall and back to Yosemite where they will turn north to Bank, and back to the point of origin, according to the Student Council, organizers.

Twenty units had asked for places in the parade, and there is enough room for 40. Any organization not now entered can contact Scot Davis at the high school.

Something special has been added to the usual homecoming events of Friday night.

At the game, which will be played between the Hawks and Decatur Eagles, will be the coronation of the homecoming queen, who will be elected by the student body next week, and also the announcement of the "Coming Home Queen," a recognition started last year by the Alumni Association.

Immediately following the game fans will want to remain in their seats to watch a spectacular fireworks display, compliments of the City of Iowa Park in observance of the 100th anniversary.

The display will be set off south of the stadium, and fans in their seats will have a "ring side seat."

City looking for site to locate water tower

The city council Monday night decided to look at an alternate location for erecting a water tower in the south part of town.

The "ideal location," because of its altitude and being clear of development, was said to be the southwest corner of Lafayette and Colorado, James Barrington, city administrator, told the council.

However, the site is owned by Grace Baptist Church which is unwilling to sell the property.

The alternate location was said to be in the 300 block of West Emerald, where a street is dedicated but has never been opened.

Barrington explained that alti-

tude is important for locating a water tower, because it must be at the same level as the one on Johnson Road, in order to utilize an automatic system for re-filling levels.

Both the towers at city hall and Lake Gordon are unused, because of the automation system.

The council earlier had decided to either have the tower at the lake relocated to another site, such as the south part of town, or have a new tower built, whichever was the least expensive.

The tower at city hall is to be scrapped, both because of its age and being useless due to its elevation.

In other business, aldermen approved purchase of two new police cars, joining the county in forming an economic development area, formally opposing a new regulation of the Environmental Protection Agency, and doing what it can to support families in the northeast part of town to have their tax evaluations lowered.

Aldermen approved low bids for two new police vehicles which included one each from Park Ford and Bill Bates Chevrolet.

The new units will replace two used vehicles purchased two years ago, according to Chief Alan Sheffield. Both were in stock and available immediately, according to the bids.

Aldermen approved the city joining the county and other cities of the county in applying for future funding by the federal Economic Development Administration.

The city is actually joining the Texas Water Commission in opposing the EPA's new regulation which would consider the pH level in determining the lead and copper content of the system.

Aldermen were told that to meet the new mandates, the pH level

Hawks seek first win against Bull Friday

When Iowa Park and Bridgeport line up in Hawk Stadium Friday night for the kickoff, both teams will be reeling from major losses last week, and each will be fighting to stay in the hunt for a state playoff spot.

The Hawks suffered not only their sixth loss of the season last week, but lost to Bowie, a team the Mean Green was supposed to have beaten.

Bridgeport has won two games, lost three and tied one, but the Bulls' loss last week to Wise County rival Decatur has to have them wondering about themselves.

Decatur smashed the Bulls by a 53-9 margin.

The Hawks and Bulls began their series in 1984, and Iowa Park has won them all: 35-13, 24-0, 35-28 and 56-14.

Both of Bridgeport's wins have been over AA teams: 6-2 over Olney in the season opener and 14-12 over Holliday two weeks ago.

The Bulls lost 34-13 to powerful Electra, 9-7 to Lake Dallas, and then last week to the Eagles. The tie was 14-14 in the second game of the season with Northwest.

Bridgeport no longer can count on three-year starter Cason Rangel, who gave the Hawks fits offensively and defensively the three years before he graduated.

But the Bulls have another Rangel. Cason's younger brother, Carl, a 6-2, 183-pound junior who plays runningback and defensive end, and is rated as one of the stronger runners on the team.

Another junior, Mike Horne, is the team's starting quarterback. The 178-pounder is strong enough to play linebacker, and the scouting report on him is that he runs the option well, has a strong arm and is an above average passer.

Bridgeport has plenty of size, also, with a 217-pound center in Mark Cantrell, and a sophomore tackle Mingo Martinez, who also is 217. They also have a 247-pound tackle, Matt Van Hoose.

The Hawks lost more than by score last week. Linebacker Jimmy Nicholson suffered a knee injury and underwent surgery Monday morning to repair it.

His was the third knee surgery of an Iowa Park player in an eight-day

period. Varsity end Ken Allen was injured in the Gainesville game, and Ronny Berry, a junior varsity player, also underwent an operation.

While some fans are beginning to compare this year's Hawk team

School leaders encourage attendance this month

Iowa Park school administrators are encouraging students and parents of the district to cooperate all during this month, and save tax dollars.

The amount of money the district will receive from the state this year will be based on the number of students in average daily attendance (ADA) during a 20-day period, Oct. 3-28.

The district will receive \$78.80 for each day that a student attends school during that period. A count is made each day at 10 a.m., and students who arrive after that time are not included in the ADA count.

Iowa Park has 1,895 students en-

rolled this week, an increase of 41 over the same date last year.

Various incentive prizes are being offered to encourage students to be at their desks this month.

Students who have perfect attendance during the period will be eligible to win one of four bicycles to be given away at the elementary schools, according to Supt. Glen Mitchell.

Last year, the district received \$2,835,000 from the state. Approximately half the money needed to operate the school comes from the state, and the remainder comes from local taxes, Mitchell pointed out.

Sales taxes rise higher

While all four cities in Wichita County are showing increases in sales tax receipts for the year, Iowa Park, as it has the past two years, continues to have the largest increase among the four.

Iowa Park this month received a check from the state comptroller's office in the amount of \$14,316.92, a 17.45-percent increase over the same month in 1987.

That increase is almost exactly the same as the increase for the year, according to the report from Austin.


For the year, Iowa Park has received rebates of \$147,053.71, an increase of 17.08-percent over the same period last year, when the total was \$125,605.04.

All sales taxes generated in Iowa Park are earmarked by the city council for street construction and improvements.

Electra follows in percentage of increase for the year, with 10.55-percent. Wichita Falls is up 3.77 percent and Burkburnett 3.35.

Holliday has a whopping increase of 32.97 percent, having received \$51,673.59 so far this year.

October's checks represent taxes collected by monthly filers in August and reported to the comptroller's office by Sept. 20.

also provided recipes on how to make sauerkraut, lye soap and yeast.

Jo Bumgardner, president, conducted the business meeting where Dee Dee Forney gave an update on registrations for the club's annual Whoop-T-Do King and Queen contest.

The chapter voted to submit the March of Dimes, its state project for several years, as their choice for this year's project. Reservations for the district meeting to be held Sunday in Fort Worth were taken.

Special guest was Wella Pennington.

The next meeting will be held Tuesday in the home of Jo Bumgardner.




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

Okay, the Hawks have lost all six of their football games this season. I'm painfully aware.

And the "Saturday Morning Quarterbacks" are coming out of the woodworks.

Some of them aren't being too subtle about it, either. They're talking to our new Head Hawk, Len Williams, as well as anyone who'll listen to them at the coffee shops.

From all indications, the losses are all the coaches fault. That's always the case, whether it's pee wee football, high school, college and even in the professional ranks.

I'm asked, often, what I think about the team this year. In fact, the question is posed just about every place I go.

Well, first of all, I'm glad there is so much interest in our team. I just wish there was as much support.

No one is more disappointed than I, unless you are a player or coach. And those people are

suffering. I was the one who was predicting going into the season that we (notice I said "we" because I feel a part of every year's team) could very well improve on last year's record.

I made the prediction because of the size and depth of the players who were back from last year's varsity, and coming up from the JV.

The team has never had fewer than three players, key players, on the sidelines at any game this year who couldn't play because of injury. That has taken its toll on the depth.

In all honesty, I feel our line is as good as last year's, but our skill people are not the calibre of those in 1987.

The Hawks have been in every game this season, but lost. I can go back to my play-by-play notes and point out key mistakes that have cost the team win after win.

Coaches don't teach players to make mistakes. Most of their time is teaching them not to make mistakes.

There is a lacking of leadership among the players themselves. Some do their best, but an outright leader has yet to emerge.

He just may show up Friday night. And if that happens, Iowa Park could be back on the winning side of the ledger, and the Hawks have the talent, and training, to make it all the way to the playoffs once more.

Football is a team sport. And because it is such, no one segment of the team can be blamed for losses.

That team includes the players, the coaches, the student body, the fans, and the community.

would have to be increased here and it would complicate water treatment locally.

To meet the mandates, additional minerals would have to be put in the water to hold down clogging of the transmission lines.

Additionally, additional expense would be about \$3,200 annually just to have the water tested in accordance to the EPA requirements.

Water content of Iowa Park's system is safe, the council was told, and contains no harmful levels of lead and copper.

Two citizens in the audience, identified as John Stevenson and Mrs. N.C. Smith, complained to the council that their properties in the floodplane, in the northeast part of town, have been increased in value, rather than devalued.

Their homes are located in an area where city ordinance, mandated by federal requirements, prohibits not only new construction, but any new improvements as well.

Yet their values were increased by the Wichita County Appraisal District.

Mayor Tim Hunter, joined by the rest of the council, explained the city has nothing to do with property appraisals, and assured the visitors a letter explaining the situation would be sent Tuesday to the county office.

"That's all we can do," Hunter explained.

After awarding Sue Hatcher the "Employee of the Month" check, the council quickly approved four ordinances and a resolution, all termed as "housekeeping."

Portions of street right of way, in the 100 block of West Lafayette, and 400 and 600 blocks of North Victoria, were abandoned in order to make property lines even with other abandonments by the council in the

Mother took a dim view of snacking between meals but we loved nothing better than curling up with a new copy of Colliers or Saturday Evening Post and reading and eating a mixture of cocoa, sugar, and cream skimmed from the top of a milk bottle.

And when we ran out of short stories in those magazines, we filched brother Harold's dime Western novels -- and hid them behind the covers of Colliers.

Little did she know that most of those empty, dirty cups of the cocoa were our's rather than Harold's.

We remember when football practice sessions were at 11 in the morning rather than after school -- and our stomach got to craving something sweet during those sessions.

On the way to practice, we stopped at the school store and grabbed a Hershey bar and pushed it down inside our blocking pads, planning to sustain our energy level by nibbling on the bar during practice.

But the coach spotted the bar -- and made us start taking laps without touching our blocking pads. And the longer we ran, the more the chocolate melted and ran down the inside of our trousers. By the time he let us stop, our legs were coated with chocolate -- and flies.

And then there was Emmaline. She was the daughter of band director Dickinson who happened to be a full blooded Commanche Indian. Dark-skinned, dark-eyed, and wearing enough turquoise jewelry to attract an entrance, we made a pass at her on the way home from school.

She lived where the present Corner Drug is located -- and we tried to carry her books by holding her hand -- and got knocked seven ways to Sunday for our effort. An extra stern, piercing and hawkish stare from her father at the next practice session prompted us to give up the trumpet.

And we just know that if we ran for high public office that the Old'uns influence on our admission

to Baylor would come out.

The Old'un took all three kids to Waco in the fall to enroll them in Baylor -- and found that the grades of all three were too low for admission to that august institution.

The Old'un marched Wesley, Louise, and us into the commanding presence of Baylor president Pat M. Neff, former governor of Texas.


He delighted in telling us that the only reason we were allowed in Baylor was because of the Old'un.

Four years later, at graduation, the Old'un got a note from Pat Neff that said: "Congratulations -- I never thought you or the kids would make it!"





Trustees hear final cost of construction work

HOLLIDAY - The Holliday School Board heard a report on the final cost of extensive construction performed on campus during the past year during a regular meeting Monday evening.

Hares slip by Hawks; first time

It finally happened. Iowa Park lost 26-20 Friday night to Bowie, a team the Hawks had not only defeated in their last nine outings, but had outscored the Jackrabbits 315-33.

The loss had to be credited to mistakes and Iowa Park's inability to stop the big play, which has cost the Hawks in all six of their losses this season.

Iowa Park stayed with the Rabbits in the statistics, leading 21-16 and gaining almost as many total yards, 338-361. But the Hawks suffered three turnovers to Bowie's one, and allowed three pass completions in the second half that scored. Those three completions accounted for 167 of Bowie's total yardage.

Scoring was primarily in clusters. When one team scored, the other quickly rebounded. And after the score was twice tied, the Hawks led 21-20, but that lasted less than two minutes.

The first touchdown of the game didn't come until 4:41 remaining in the second quarter. Bowie covered a muffed punt reception by Marc Cruz on the Hawk 18, and scored four plays later, on an 11-yard end run. The kick for extra point failed.

Iowa Park answered the challenge about two minutes later, when Matthew Blackman scored from five yards out. The six-play drive was highlighted by a 33-yard pass from Jimmy Duggins to Dan Fannin, and runs of 18

yards by Fannin and 20 by Bunkie Imboden. Kelly McClure's kick for the extra point was wide left, and the teams went to the dressing room at halftime tied 6-6.

The Hawks took the second half kickoff, and punted four plays later. Bowie lost no time in scoring. From the Jackrabbit 46, a 13-yard run was followed by a 41-yard scoring pass play. The extra point kick was good, giving the hosts a 13-6 lead with 9:53 remaining in the third quarter.

Bowie threatened again soon after, when a pitch from Duggins to Gary Tatum fell to the ground and a Rabbit covered it on the Hawk 24. But three plays later, Vance Edwards intercepted a pass on his seven yard line.

The Hawks tied the score by marching 93 yards, sending Duggins leaping over center Scot Davis the final yard and McClure's kick splitting the uprights. Blackman carried the ball five times on the drive, with major gains of 23 and 37 yards. Also on the drive, Fannin picked up 21 yards, thanks to a booming block by Duggins. McClure's kick followed a five-yard penalty for motion on his first attempt.

Duggins' score was with 5:16 remaining in the third quarter, and there were four more touchdowns racked up by the two teams during the following six minutes.

Bowie scored at the 3:37 mark, on another 41-yard pass play. The receiver shed two green and white tacklers at the 20 yard line.

Iowa Park mounted another long scoring drive, this time a 73-yarder, after the following kickoff.

Tatum, who had picked up 33 yards on the drive, capped it off with a seven-yard plunge over right tackle. Imboden, who carried the ball only twice all evening, had a 23-yard gain, and fumbled on the Bowie seven. But Michael Johnson was on the spot, and covered to retain possession.

Iowa Park went for the victory on the extra point try. Fannin, as quarterback, took the snap and rounded right end. He stumbled after making his cut, but was able to dive the final two yards into the end zone. That gave the Hawks a 21-20 lead with only 22 seconds left in the

third quarter.

Bowie appeared in trouble after the kickoff. Starting from the Jackrabbit 28, Gary Green and Edwards tackled the runner for a two-yard loss on the first play, but a clipping penalty nullified the play and Bowie was set back on its own 14 yard line.

After the teams switched ends of the field for the start of the final period, Bowie threw an incomplete pass and ran for a yard. But on the third down, the Rabbits scored on the longest play of the night, an 85-yard pass.

The Jackrabbits tried for a two-point pass play after the TD, but it was blocked by Paul Bowling in the end zone.


That 26-21 score stood the remaining 11 minutes of the game.

The Hawks mounted a drive, primarily on a 20-yard pass catch by Bruce Palmer, and had reached the Bowie 35, but Duggins suffered his only interception of the evening, killing the drive.

Iowa Park almost had the ball back on the Hawk 19 with 4:40 remaining, but a roughing the kicker penalty gave the Rabbits possession. And the hosts were able to run off all but 2:57 on the clock, turning over the ball to Iowa Park on the Hawks' 10. The Hawks were unable to pick up a first down, and Bowie killed the final 1:49.

Blackman and Tatum each carried the ball 16 times, gaining 105 and 73 yards respectively. Fannin and Imboden each were credited with 43 yards rushing.

Big defensive plays were credited to Tatum, Jay Loggins, Raul Swanson, and Jimmy Nicholson, who was injured and had to be helped from the field.



This week's featured cook is a self-sufficient woman who believes that with a little determination, anything can be done.

BAKED QUAIL

Cut up quail in serving pieces, salt and pepper to taste and roll in flour. Brown in hot grease, then drain on paper towel.

Place browned quail in large loaf pan and pour one can mushroom soup and one can water over all. Bake 35 minutes at 325 degrees or until done.

CHICKEN 'N DUMPLINGS

Boil one chicken in three quarts of water. Salt to taste and remove chicken, saving the broth.

Dumplings:
2 cups flour
1 tsp. salt
1 egg

Mix together, adding enough water to form a stiff dough like a pie crust. Divide dough into three parts. Roll one at a time very thin. Cut into 1 1/2 inch strips. Add one at a time to boiling broth. Cook 15 minutes then add boned, skinned chicken. Serve hot.

ROLLS

1 pkg. yeast dissolved in 1/4 cup warm water

Combine in large bowl:
1/4 cup sugar
1/3 cup crisco
1 tsp. salt
Scald 3/4 cup milk and cool by adding 1/2 cup cold water. Blend in one egg and add 3 1/2 cups flour. Let rise 45 minutes to one hour. Punch down. Put in muffin tins one half full and let rise. Bake at 400 degrees until brown.

PECAN PRALINES

3 cups sugar
1 1/2 cup buttermilk
1 1/2 tsp. soda
Bring to a boil in large pan. Cook to soft ball stage, stirring constantly. Remove from fire and add:
1 1/2 tsp. vanilla
2 cups pecans
Stir until thick (loses gloss), enough to drop by spoonful on waxed paper.





The well indicated ability to pump oil at the rate of 20 barrels per day. It was taken to a 1,825-ft. bottom and plugged back to 1,718 feet. Production will be from a set of perforations in the Gunsight Formation, 1,625 to 1,643 feet into the wellbore.

The wells indicated ability to pump at a combined rate of nine barrels of oil per day, plus 121 barrels of water.

The Reilly bottomed at 1,750-ft and was plugged back to 1,579 feet. Production will be from the Cisco Formation, 598 to 1,508 feet into the hole. The Viles bottomed at 1,750-ft. with plugback to 1,672 feet. It will produce from perforations in the Gunsight Formation, 1,576 to 1,587 feet into the hole.

The operations are in a 2,100-acre lease in the SPRR Survey and a 171-acre lease in the J. Waldschmidt Survey, respectively.
