Curricular events and tennis will be disposed of Friday, leaving Saturday for the track and field meet. Iowa Park won the championship of the district last year, and every effort will be made to repeat that performance this year.

Winners in the district are entitled to go to regional competition at Dallas.

Regular monthly meeting of the Farmers Union local 101 was held Monday night, April 2, at the Valley Farms community house. In the absence of the president Harold Staber, Vice-President Lee Trimm presided.

Time was given mostly to the discussion of the newly acquired Co-op, and the biennial Farmers Union Leaders conference held in Denver March 11-15. Lee Lovell discussed the Co-op and what it would handle, such as feeds, insecticides and types of machinery. Mr. Lovell went on to say that if anyone wanted any information about the Co-op or the Farmers Union they could write Box 159, Iowa Park.

John Williamson gave a report on the Denver conference. He pointed out the alarming situation of Texas farmers that are leaving the farm. John also told of a petition that has been sent to the Soil Conservation and other agriculture offices in Wichita Falls to see about getting them moved to Iowa Park, which would be of great benefit to farmers of this area, especially in getting places to park.

The motion to move the meeting time from 7:30 to 8:00 p.m. was passed. Also the motion to pay the Community House Council \$5 a month for the use of the Farmers Union was made.

Refreshments were served by Mrs. Trimm and Mrs. Joe Cope, which was coffee and cake.

The Iowa Park Co-op Elevator is now a reality. This was assured last Thursday night at the dinner held in the school cafeteria. That the Co-op would be ready to do business by the time of wheat harvest was a fact.

During the evening there was a number of talks given on behalf of the elevator. F. E. Hill, president of the State National Bank, gave some important facts that could not be overlooked in setting up a business of this type. Jno. Murphree, who has been giving the Co-op legal advice, also had a few comments to make.

Present at the dinner was a representative of the Amarillo Consumers Co-operative, who reported on the fine work the co-ops have been doing in Amarillo. Then for a local slant on the situation, John Williamson, chairman of the board, told of the advantages of a co-op to the community.

Now that the Co-op is "born," we, the people of the community, must raise it to the fullest extent of its possibilities. It is going to take time, lots of time, and a great deal of work to put the co-op on sound and solid feet.

Last week while flying over the country, I was surprised to see how spotty the wheat was around over the country. I not only flew over the vicinity of Wichita Falls, but also over to Lawton. As a whole the wheat does not look like it will turn out well. There is quite a bit of difference in flying over the country and driving over the same areas.

Despite the bleak outlook, I have known this country to have prospects for the sorriest crops, and turn out the best, and then again to have prospects for the best of yields and turn out the worst.

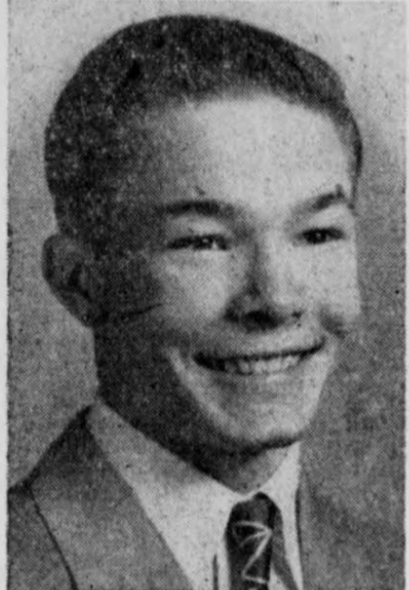

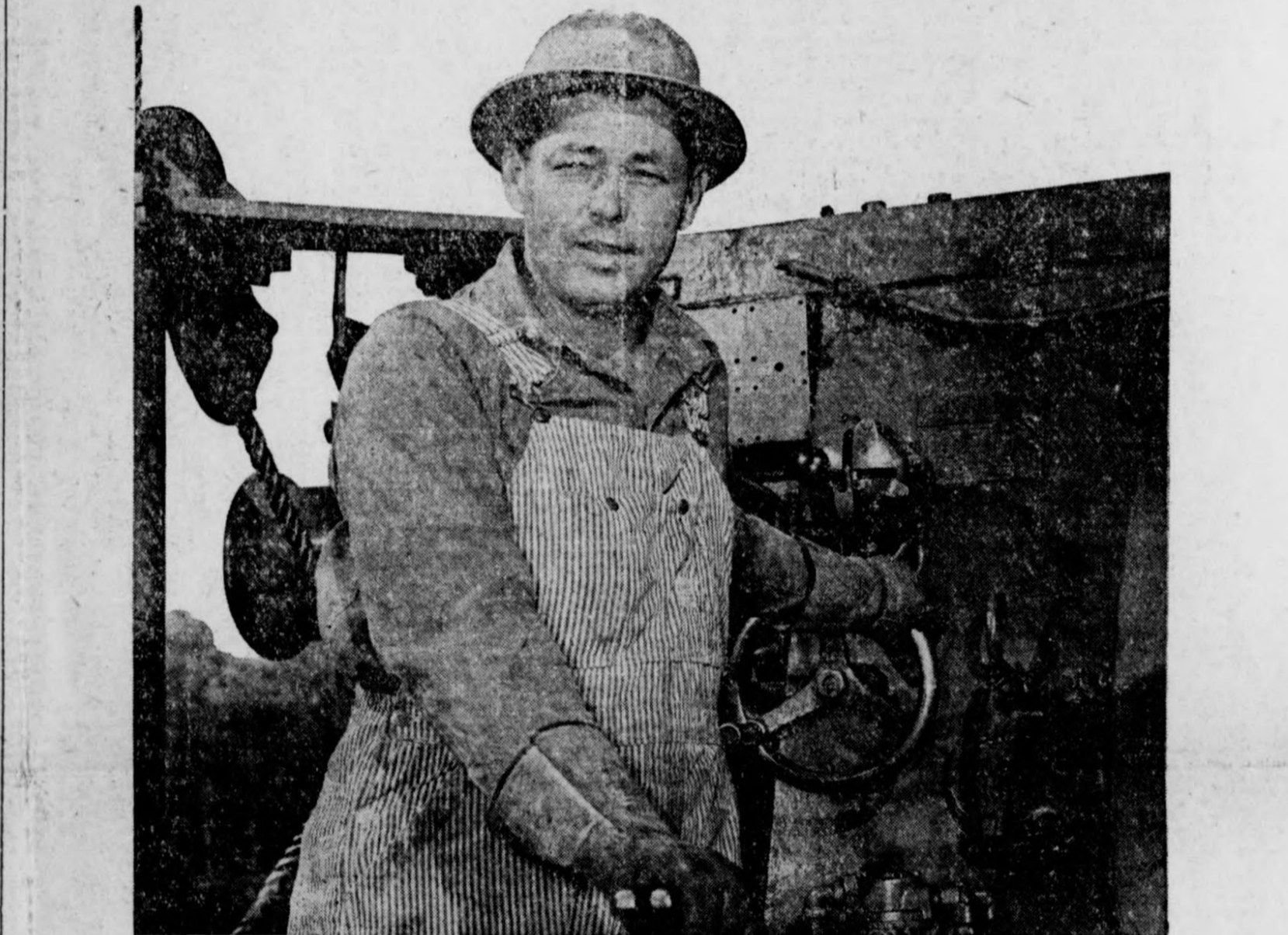

## Pastusek Gives Rules For Kite Safety

Five DON'T'S for boys and girls who fly kites were outlined this week by W. R. Pastusek, Iowa Park manager for Texas Electric Service company, in anticipation of the 1951 kite flying season.

The five DON'T'S in order of their importance are:

Don't fly kites near electric lines.

Don't use wire or metallic cord for kite strings.

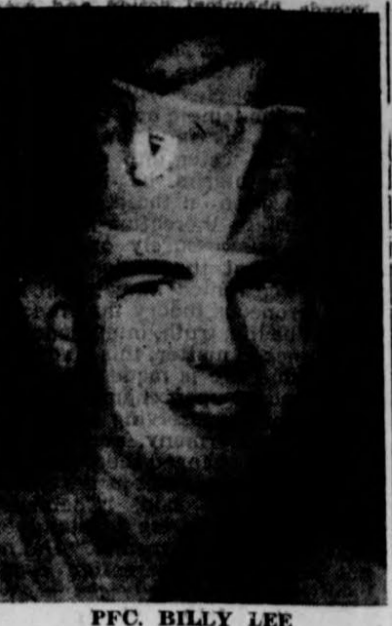
Don't use wire or metal in kite frames.

Don't fly kites in the rain, as even cotton string could become a conductor of electricity if it is wet.

Don't attempt to remove a kite from electric poles or wires should it become entangled. Call Texas Electric Service company's office and a lineman will come rescue it if at all possible.

"The importance of the second point is dramatically illustrated by what happened in a Texas city on March 2 of this year," Pat said. "A father was flying a kite for his son when suddenly a power line burned in two, two-thirds of the city was deprived of electricity, two radio stations went off the air for want of power and numerous grass fires were started. Why? The man was using a Christmas wrapping cord with tinsel woven in it. The tinsel shorted out the power line in which it became entangled. It was nothing short of a miracle that someone was not injured or killed."

"Local youngsters who fly kites have been careful in the past about where and when they fly kites," Mr. Pastusek stated. "We had a perfect record last year with not one boy or girl being injured and only a few kites demolished. This year, I fully expect that even the number of kites lost will be reduced because it seems that every year our boys and girls listen more carefully to our warnings and co-operate better in making kite flying safe."

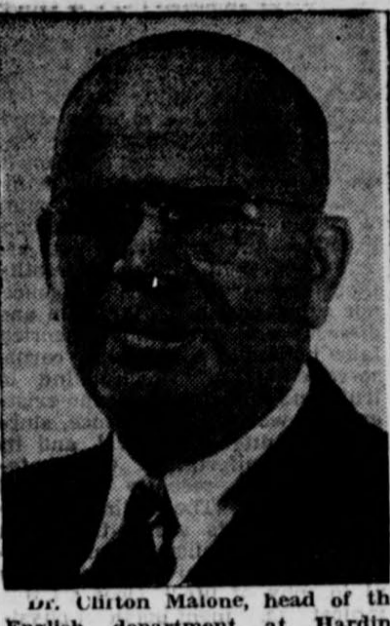

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**CONTRASTS NEW, OLD**

The east window at the Rexall Drug Store is carrying this week a novel display which emphasizes a "then and now" theme.

One side of the window holds a group of shelf bottles that were used many years ago when druggists had to compound their own capsules and liquid medicines. Along with the antiquated bottles are a number of prescriptions that were filled at the store in 1915 and 1916 when it was owned by a Mr. Killcrease.

The prescriptions were written by Dr. Frank Clark (deceased) and his son Dr. Joe Frank Clark, now of Georgetown, father and brother of T. M. Clark who now shares ownership in the drug store with his brother-in-law, Fenton Dale. Dr. Gordon G. Clark is another son of Dr. Frank Clark.

The present owners say they have prescriptions dating back to 1901 in their files. Among Iowa Parkians who were sick in 1915-16 and whose prescriptions are in window are Ruth Belote (now Mrs. Swan Reaves), Grace Mills (now Mrs. Bratton Reaves), Mrs. J. A. Tanner, Buddy Tanner, Mrs. Lula Morgan, Mrs. Albert Johnson, Mrs. Will Dettlefs, Mrs. A. C. Henson, Neil Johnson, Raymond Williams, John Bell.

Centering the display is a framed certificate from the Board of Pharmacy issued in 1918. On the outside glass which covers the certificate in the upper right hand corner is a 1951 pharmacist certificate. This difference of 33 years is vividly reflected in the other side of the window which contains sulfa compounds, penicillin and other new discoveries in medicine.

Mr. Dale and Mr. Clark have owned the store since 1919. A few weeks back a renovation program was instituted by Mr. Dale and Iowa Park will have a modern looking store in the near future as the outgrowth of long years of experience in the drug merchandising business.

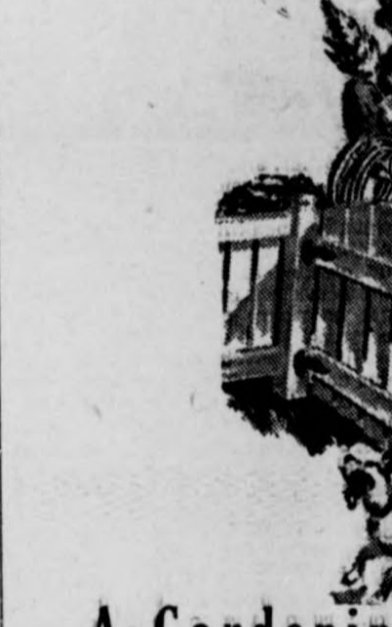
