Polls to open Tuesday for general election

Four voting polls will be open in the area Tuesday for the general election in which candidates all the way down from president of the United States to the Justice of the Peace, as well as three amendments to the Texas constitution, will be voted on.

Polls, which will open at 7 a.m. and remain open until 7 p.m., are: Precinct 32, county agriculture building (east of First Baptist Church); Precinct 33, Faith Baptist Church; Precinct 34, West Wichita Co-op (metal building on Valley View school campus), and Precinct 60, Baptist Chapparel Camp.

Voters who do not know in which precinct they vote can refer to their voter registration card. The precinct number is above the voter's name and just to the right of the

There are four candidates for president, and their vice president candidates are listed with their names on the ballot: Republican - George Bush and Dan Quayle; Democratic - Michael S. Dukakis and Lloyd Bentsen; Libertarian - Ron Paul and Andre Marrou, and New Alliance - Lenora B. Fulani and Rafael Mendez.

Candidates for U.S. Senator from Texas are Beau Boulter (R). Lloyd Bensen (D), and Jeff Daiell

Running for the U.S. Representative of Dist. 13 seat, vacated by Boulter, are Larry S. Milner (R), and Bill Sarpalius (D).

Four candidates are running for Railroad Commissioner: Ed Emmett (R), James E. (Jim) Nugent (D), Richard Draheim (L), and Reynaldo

Lozano Jr. (N). Kent R. Hance (R) and Clint Hackney (D) are candidates for an unexpired term as Railroad Commissioner, a seat to which Hance was appointed.

The Iowa Park school board will not meet the second Tuesday of this month, Supt. Glen Mitchell announced this week.

Instead, trustees will meet Nov. 22, a date that had previously been scheduled to hold a called meeting.

Disgruntled residents to get their answers

Some Iowa Park property owners who are openly upset with an ordinance restricting improvements on their land should receive answers they've been seeking Monday night.

City Administrator James Barrington said he received confirmation Friday that at least one representative from the Federal Emergency Managment Administration (FEMA) will be here that night.

The meeting is to begin at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

Residents, primarily in the northeast part of town, have been seeking relief from the city council several months from an ordinance that virtually prohibits them from making any improvements to their homes or other buildings on their property.

Before a building permit can be issued by city hall for any work, a study is required by an engineer to determine if that work will affect the flow of water onto neighboring property.

An engineer said such a study would be prohibitive in cost, and few if any engineers would agree to do such a study if asked.

The area has been designated by FEMA as a floodway.

The ordinance was written and offered to all governmental bodies in the county by FEMA, for adoption. Iowa Park passed the ordinance after it was first approved by county commissioner's court.

Failure to adopt the ordinance would, in effect, forfeit any assistance from the federal government in case of an emergency, such as a tornado, Mayor Tim Hunter explained to property owners at earlier meetings.

Without the ordinance, also, no property owner in the city would qualify for federal flood insurance.

Property owners have approached the council with such problems as: a garage is leaning and about to fall; no repairs on hail-damaged roofs; tax

appraisals on some properties have increased, but owners say their property is virtually worthless because no one would want to buy land under the present conditions.


One owner asked that the city reimburse the owners for the property, if the city will not void the ordi-

Several of the property owners attended the council meeting last week, after having been told a FEMA representative would be there.

However, that information had been given by someone other than from the FEMA office.

Upset over the failure to show up, Mayor Hunter assured the property owners he would launch a telephone campaign the following day to let state and federal elected officials know of the situation, and seek some assistance in getting a FEMA represenatative here.

"We (the council) are here taking the heat for something that's not our fault," Hunter told the group.

Library's history recalled

Mrs. W.A. George gave a brief and interesting history of the Tom Burnett Memorial Library Thursday for the Evening Lioness Club in a meeting held at the library. She was introduced by Mrs. Allen Bennett.

Mrs. George paid tribute to the Evening Lions for realizing in 1961 the need of a public library and taking steps immediately to establish

Wayne House, who was presdent of the club, with a committee of three other members began visiting libraries in neighboring towns to learn how a library could be established. They then sought the advice of Judge Calvin Ashley who presented the idea of establishing a Wichita County Free Library to the Commissioners Court.

In March 1962, the commissioners voted to establish the library in Iowa Park, and its first home was in the southwest corner of the Chamber of Commerce building. The formal opening of the library, with eight board members, was held April 14, 1962, and for the first five years operated with volunteer help.

Mrs. George continued by saying that in March 1967 the name of the library was changed, and in 1969 the Iowa Park City Council voted to accept jurisdiction of the library. The first full-time librarian was Mrs. George Bludnick.

The Friends of the Library was organized later, and the speaker said that it was largely through their dreams and continuous efforts that the Tom Burnett Memorial Library became a reality.

Continuing, she said that the library was moved from the Chamber of Commerce building in 1970 to the former Iowa Park High School home economics cottage, where it stayed until moving to its present permanent home.

Mrs. George told how the mansion that Tom Burnett built in 1924 came to be the site of the library. She said that his granddaughter, Mrs. Ann W. Phillips, presented it to the City of Iowa Park for a library in 1981, and with the presentation came a gift of \$240,000 from the Tandy Foundation to help pay for the structural changes.

She held her audience enrapt as she described the "trials and tribulations" and the joys of those structural changes which began after enough money was raised. The Tom Burnett Memorial Library was opened to the public in Jan. 1986, and the formal dedication was held March 15, 1986.

Mrs. George paid tribute to many people who played important roles in establishing a library of first rate quality, importance and size in Iowa Park. Among those were Mrs. James Sewell, Miss Ethyle Kidwell and Friends of the Library.

Mrs. Gerry Thurlo used "Beginnings" for the theme of the devotion which included a poem "Creation," author unknown.





I also get tired of finding more than half my mail each morning contains "news releases" from candidates. I've got a box all that "stuff" goes in. I'm anxious to weigh it this year.

I've been asked by several which candidates will receive the Leader's endorsement this year. Well, the simple fact is, the paper doesn't attempt to endorse anyone.

Now in some big papers, and others influenced by those big papers, candidates are endorsed. But I don't feel I have the dictatorial power to do that here.

I'll not attempt to speak for the staff, because we're each individuals.

But, by golly, I've got some strong feelings about some of the candidates and issues. And I reserve the right to express my opinion in my own column!

The top of every voting ballot has a "Straight Party" place which can be marked. That means, you can vote once, and every candidate in that party on the ballot gets your vote.

But I don't like that. I judge the candidates for themselves, and not just the party under whose banner they run.

I must admit, however, that this year I will be voting mostly for the Republican candidates. Not because of party affiliations, but because I plainly don't like some candidates on the Democratic ticket.

Dukakis is one. The main one. I could use as many pages as we had in the Centennial Issue to list them all. But the fact that I don't like him will have to do here.

I resent the Texas legislature having given a candidate the right to run for more than one office at a time,

I didn't like it when they did it for Lyndon Johnson, and I feel just exactly the same way with Lloyd Bentsen this year. Talk about having your cake and eating it too

My vote will be on the line with Beau Boulter's name on it.

To tell you the truth, I'll probably not make up my mind until I mark my ballot on the US Representative race between Larry Milner and Bill Sarpalius. Milner never felt the need to visit here, and there are some bills Sarpalius voted for, like school reform and 9-1-1 emergency phone, that lacked some common sense.

In the Railroad Commissioner race, I don't like one incumbent, Jim Nugent, whom I consider a political hack, but I do, and always have, liked Kent Hance, who isn't running against Nugent.

Oh, and as I've said before, if you don't want to study the issues and vote with knowledge and confidence, don't vote.

Preferring the term "domestic engineer" to housewife, this week's featured cook, Sherry (Mrs. Kevin) Coffman, is just that.



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
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Graham waxes **Hawks** 40-0

Graham's Steers jumped on Iowa Park's Hawks Friday night, and didn't get off until the final seconds of the game, to earn a 40-0 Dist. 5-AAA victory.

The story of Graham's dominance is indicated by the fact the hosts punted only once in the entire game, and the Hawks' deepest penetration was the Steer 35.

It was a costly game, besides the score. Two more green and white players were sidelined with injuries, to join a growing host of their team mates. Starting tackle Pete Armstrong and starting back Marc Cruz both left the game with shoulder injuries.

Friday was so much Grahams, that the only Steer fumble the entire evening was covered for a touchdown. The hosts didn't even draw a yellow flag all night long.

Unlike any game this season, however, the Hawk defense did not give up a big play. Graham's longest gain of the evening was 29 yards. But the Steers controlled the ball throughout the evening, getting off 61 rushing plays and seven passing, and allowed the Hawks only 37 offensive plays.

Iowa Park managed only 14 offensive plays the first 24 minutes of the game. The Hawks' two first downs of the first half came immediately after Graham scored its 20th point, 5:17 before halftime. They were on runs by Mathew Blackman, 10 yards, and Glen Gordy, 19.

Blackman gained 46 of the Hawk's 62 rushing yards on 11 carries. Gary Tatum, who entered the game with a 4.1-yard average after 98 carries, was handed the ball only six times, and wound up with a minus six yards. He suffered a 15-yard loss on a play designed for him to pass the ball, accounting for the minus yardage.

Iowa Park got off three rushing plays and one punt the entire first quarter, and had four yards total offense.


Quarterback Jimmy Duggins didn't complete any of his four pass attempts in the second quarter, but found four of his seven targets in the third period, gaining 25 yards. He connected on two of four in the fourth for 24 more, and then suffered an interception. That was the only turnover of the entire game for the Hawks.

Making catches in the second period were Brian Luney, for 12 yards, Bruce Palmer and Tatum, three yards each, and Michael Johnson, seven. Palmer caught a 16yarder in the fourth, and Blackman caught the other for

The Steers were caught behind the line of scrimmage only three times during the game, two running and once on a screen pass. Brian Smith and Gary Green caught a runner for a 13-yard loss in the first quarter, and Chuck Brown set back a Steer two yards. The screen pass loss, two yards, was smelled out by Tatum, who made the

Luney's punting average for the evening was only 16 yards, because all three kicks were partially blocked. Tatum punted the fourth time, a 33-yarder, from a quick kick formation.

Lloyd Bentsen has received generally high marks from the oil industry during his tenure in the U.S. Senate but since he became the Democratic vice presidential nominee he has shifted his stance, no doubt because he now has to follow the party line. Thus he spoke in Oklahoma City last week and laid the entire current energy slump on George Bush. He pointed out that Oklahoma had 755 active rigs in 1981 compared with 129 now. "That's what George Bush has done to energy states," said our Texas senator.
