George Bush, who was declared we winner in the presidential race,
won two of the three boxes here. Bush outpolled Michael Duk 113-654 in Precinct 32 and 187 21 in Precinct 60, but lost to Duka kis 290-253 at Precinct 33.
A large number of voters marked their ballots straight line: 290 Repub lican, 384 Democrat, 16 Libertarian,

Democrat, 32 Libertarian in Precinct 33; and 38 Republican, 77 Democrat, and 3 Libertarian, in Precinct 60 . Tom Callahan won all three boxes over challenger Ray Cannedy in the race for county sheriff: 1,196 576 in Precinct 32; 384-153 in Preinct 33, and 206-98 in Precinct 60 . tate senator between Democrace Steve Carriker of Roby and Republican Bobby Albert of Wichita Falls: 931 827 in Precinct 32; 353-179 in Precinct 33, and 156-146 in Precinct 60.

An ordinance, which was offered the city by the federal agency, was passed by the city council in 1982 which restricts construction in the area designated by the Corps of Arm Engineers as floodway and flood plain.

The speaker confirmed wa residents had been earlier told by the council, that without adopting the ordinance, no homeowner in the city would be eligible for flood insurance or other federal assistance in case of disaster.

Responding to comments and questions from the audience, Leather wood said there apparently had bee
some mistakes committed by city, both in allowing mobile homes to locate in the area and interpreting the regulations in relation to repair on existing structures in the zones. She said, "I'm hearing things that maybe we should come to the city and help them. There's been
